Russian Premier-Foreign Commissar Says Poland Will Not be Restored and Criticizes Allies for Fighting Against Hitlerism

MOSCOW, October 31: (CP)- Russia is demanding from Finland a pact similar to agreements which have made the three small Baltic states of Esthonia Latvia and Lithuania virtual Russian protectorates, Premier - Foreign Commissar Vyacheslaff Molotoff announced in a speech to the Soviet Parliament tonight.

Molotoff declared that "there can be no question of the restoring of Poland" and that it was "absurd to continue the present war" for such a cause. He declared that, although Great Britain and France understand this, they do not want the war stopped and peace restored. He accused the Allies of seeking new excuses for continuing the war with Germany and scoffed at British and French ruling classes which "have lately been attempting to depict themselves as champions of democratic rights of nations against Hitlerism."

FINLAND TO FIGHT

Meantime at Helsingfors, on the eve of the departure of the Finnish delegation for Moscow with Finland's final answer to Soviet demands, the Diet hurried bills to passage which will give the government a clear hand in the event of war.

The Diet's action appeared to bear out predicions diplomatically that the Finnish answer to Russia granted few if any concessions.

#### VALUE OF APPLES

Owing to the war export of apples has been restricted so it becomes somewhat of a duty to use as many as possible. Prince Rupert people consume a considerable share of the crop but, possibly, they migh take more. Prices are reasonable and quality is good.

#### SUPPRESSING FACTS

The German government is trying to fool the peopl of that country by suppressing facts. The latest example was the suppression of the Pope's encyclical by refusing to allow it to be read in the Catholic churches. It is by a policy of lying and subterfuge that the German people have been kidded along. Added to that has been the system of terrorization by use of the secret police and concentration camps. 


