Just what the Germans hone gain by trying to prove this does not seem clear. The Comans have been laying mines along the front line for the purpose of blowing up the British and French. They have been laying mines in the open sea without notice in the hone of blowing un British ships irrespective of who alis killed. As a result, women and children and young babies have been slaughtered. Even if the British were reponsible for a plot to kill Hitler and his confreres it "oul" be nothing like as bad as this indiscriminate killing of no trals. We do not believe the British had anything to d with it because that method seems foreign to their natur-If they did do it, we see no objection. Prince Rupert neon'c seem to have been almost a unit in wishing Hitler had been a victim of the explosion.

SPEEDING UP OF WAR

There has been a noticeable speeding up of the during the past few days both in the air and on the sea Unhappily, the neutral nations suffered most from the depredations but Britain also lost some vessels as a result of the indiscriminate mining because the British could not realize that the Germans would be guilty of such acts

In the air it has been a different story. The Germans have suffered much greater losses than the British and French, proving beyound shadow of doubt that the British and French airmen are more skilful or better equipped than the enemy. Everything points to greater activity. possibly a mass attack on the British Isles in the near future.

MUCH CONFUSION

People who find it difficult to discriminate between the false and the true must find it hard at times to judge of the progress of the war. The multitude of voices with their conflicting stories heard on the radio every day has a confusing effect on some people. Some say that the Germans seem to lose fewer ships than our own people. That is because the seas are covered with British ships but there are very few German ships outside their harbors. Many are interned for the duration of the war and others are afraid to put their noses outside their ports for fear of being captured. British merchant ships are carrying cargoes as usual except that they are careful to join convoys or take other means of protecting themselves. A few are laid up, such as the Queen Mary, because they are WANTED- Furnished apartment particularly valuable and are worth too much to risk losing. Anyway, there is little passenger traffic. Cargoes __ of war material and food supplies and other goods are being carried to Britain and coal and various kinds of merchandise are being exported to other countries regularly and yet the losses are small.

Outlawed I.R.A. Is Under Trial

One Prisoner Given Three Months For Sedition In Eire Court

DUBLIN, Nov. 23: (CP)- The Special Criminal Court recently set up to try members of the outlawed Irish Republican Army has begun its sittings. The first prisoner was sent to Arbour Hill Military De-50 tention barracks for three months on charges of membership in the 3.00 I. R. A. and having treasonable 9.00 and seditious documents.

The Court is composed of five army officers who sit in private but in the presence of the press. Names of the officers are not disclosed at trials and reports of the proceedings are, of course subject to the ordinary wartime censor-

Meanwhile more than 100 suspected persons are in custody. Some of them are reported to be refusing food and in one case, a prisoner who was unexpectedly rereleased was removed to a mure ing home. Conditions in the prison are good and the food offered is the same as that of the soldiers permitted to smoke and attend classes, receive as many letters as they wish and write two letters each week.

He deplored the "unsatisfactory and uncertain state" of Angla-Garman relations. Hirlar's conciliatory gestures and offers had been brushed aside by the British, he averred.

On frequent trips to Germany Lord Londonderry had interviews with Hitler, conversations with Goering and Ribbentrop and had been feted and banquetted in Berlin. Back in London he said that his attitude towards the Germans had been misinterpreted and his motives misunderstood.





Foster Cockshutt Was Leading Merchant and Manufacturer-Long Member of Parliament

(CP) - William Foster Cockshutt, former head of the plough manufacturing concern bearing his name, who is dead here, was in his day one of Ontario's best known and prominent merchants and manufacturers, having also taken a part in public life.

The late Mr. Cockshutt was born eighty-four years ago in Brantford. the same city in which he lived all his life and died. He was educated in Brantford and Galt Collegiate Institutes and at an early age went into business. Among other lines, he became prominent in the manuacturing of roofing materials and farm implements.

He was a member of the Ontario Power Commission and in 1903 was appointed a commissioner to inrestigate the development and disribution of electric power from Niugara Falls. He was a delegate to the Commercial Congress of the Empire in 1906 and to the British 'mperial Council of Commerce in '911. FRANCE TOO. HAS UNDERWATER FIGHTERS



The submarine is one department of naval warfare where teamwork is of the most vital importance. Every man has his specific job and very little space to do it in. There must be no slips for one brief moment of negligence might mean the death of the entire crew. The above series of photographs were made aboard the French submarine Vengeur. They are the most recent naval pictures permitted by the French navy and give the layman a graphic idea of the fighting technique of an underwater warship. Although not publicized like German U-boats the French submarines are regarded by naval experts as among the world's finest. The brains of the submarine is the man at the periscope who navigates her and gets her in position to deliver the most telling blows. The commander of the Vengeur is shown, Top Right, a the eyepiece of the 'scope, and, Top Left, is what he sees. The crossed lines in the centre are broug to bear on the spot he wishes to hit on the target. The ladder-like lines at the right give him the range. When the sub is in the position for firing, the commander transmits his orders electrically to the control room. Left Centre, from where the orders are relayed to the torpedo room, Right Centre, where a "fish" is shown being loaded into its tube. With the torpedo in its tube and the port slammed shut, a sailor is shown, Bottom Left, "dogging" the door in place. All is set now for the word "Fire," and here is the man who sends the deadly missle on its mission of death, Bottom R ght. He has no idea of his target, his is not to ask questions but simply to obey his commands. A torpedo does its greatest damage when it explodes about ten feet below the waterline of the target.
