Sinking of Soviet Ship Renders Relations With Russia More Tense

MOSCOW, Sept. 28.—The sinking of the Soviet steamer Metalist by other similar attack today on the Soviet steamer Pioneer which was forced on the rocks without loss of life further complicate the already tense and delicate situation between Russia and Esthonia which has been explosive for several days with Russian charges that Esthonia has been co-operating with Poland and other nations. The Sovliet press today published an attack on Esthonia accusing her of harboring foreign submarines.

Russia has charged Esthonia with ed Polish submarine and it was to present a new explanation in regard to that, it is believed, that Foreign Minister Karl Felter of Esthonia arrived in Moscow yesterday, paying his second visit to the Russian capital within three days.
