Madrid Has Finally Surrendered

End of Thirty-Two Month Old Spanish Civil War; Movement To Stop Hitler Being Pursued

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain Speaks in House of Commons—Further Plans to Put Britain on War-time Basis—Pacific Shipping Subsidy

LONDON, March 28: (CP)—Surrender of Madrid and its defending Republican armies was announced today as Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the British House of Commons that his government was "actively continuing negotiations with other governments" on measures to keep Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany from further aggression. Capitulation of the traditional Spanish capital virtually ended the thirty-two months' warfare which proved a constant menace to general European peace. Today nationalist leaders announced from the heart of Madrid complete military occupation of the city.

Premier Chamberlain, in discussing negotiations with other nations in the "Stop Hitler" movement, said: "The House will not expect me to make statements which cannot be complete until I am in possession of the final views of the governments concerned."

Earlier a government spokesman told the House of Commons that Great Britain feels further trade negotiations with Germany are impossible and that financial loans and subsidies fitting the British merchant marine for possible wartime use are contemplated. Further an increase in the territorial army is contemplated.

Two 25,000-ton liners for Canadian-Australian service may be built as a result of a comprehensive shipping subsidy scheme which was outlined in the House of Commons by Rt. Hon. Oliver Stanley, President of the Board of Trade. The liners would be built in British shipyards at a cost of £3,000,000. Last July Sir Edward Beatty, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, said that the vessels would be built as soon as economic conditions warranted, building costs then being prohibitive. It is reported that additional orders for ships will also be placed by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

AROUND EUROPE TODAY

LONDON—Speaking in Parliament yesterday, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain renounced the Munich principle of personal negotiation with Chancellor Adolf Hitler.

MADRID — General Francisco Franco's forces are encircling this former capital city of Spain as the republican defence council takes steps to demobilize. Elsewhere in the portion of the country still held by republicans, smashing nationalist gains are reported with thousands of the rebel soldiers surrendering.

LONDON—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain stated yesterday that Great Britain had no intention of applying economic pressure upon Germany following Czechoslovakia absorption as had been done by the United States. At the same time it was announced that Great Britain was negotiating a trade agreement with Roumania at the invitation of Roumania.

PARIS—Premier Edouard Daladier was reported last night to have received the support of his cabinet in refusing to discuss terms with Italy until that country submitted definite proposals. Meantime France continues to put itself on a war basis.

GOLD DROP WAS HEAVY

Decrease in Export Brought South Africa's Trade Down in 1938

CAPE TOWN, March 28: (CP-Reuters)—A big decrease in South Africa's overseas trade, due principally to a £30,000,000 (\$141,000,000) drop in the export of gold, was recorded in 1938.

Official figures for the year's trade, issued by the Department of Commerce and Industries, indicate that at the beginning of 1939 the visible balance of the Union's trade reflected an export surplus of £9,871,000, (\$46,393,700) against an export surplus of £21,971,000 (\$89,423,970) at the beginning of 1938.

Excluding gold, the Union's total exports during 1938 amounted to £2,503,000 (\$52,764,100) against £4,422,000 (\$199,383,400) in 1937, a drop of 24.4 per cent. Actual exports of gold amounted to £52,521,000 (\$246,598,700) against £82,739,000 (\$387,873,300) in the previous 12 months. With £20,000,000 (\$94,000,000) worth of gold earmarked for export, the Union's total exports for the year reached £105,730,000 (\$503,211,000) against £125,161,000 (\$578,256,700) in 1937, a drop of 15.5 per cent.

Miss Constance Lindsay Skinner Of British Columbia Dies In New York

NEW YORK, March 28: (CP)—Miss Constance Lindsay Skinner, aged 60, native of Barkerville, British Columbia, who wrote a novel at the age of eleven, an operetta at fourteen and numerous newspaper articles before she was seventeen, died here yesterday. She was educated at Vancouver and Victoria and became prominent as a poet, novelist, historian and geographer.

BIG BUDGET OF DEFENCE

United States Passes Bill Providing For Expenditure of \$513,000,000—Only One Dissident

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 28:—United States largest peacetime defence budget, totalling \$513,000,000, was passed by the Senate yesterday with only one dissident, Senator William H. King of Utah who, warning against the country being caught in a world embroglio, would have sent the budget back to committee.

Early in the day's trading there were gains of fractions to two points with later recession to an irregular close with an average loss of 2-10 of a point. The day's turnover was 566,000 shares, the lightest since February 23.

Two Seattle Men Plunge To Death

One Leaped From Thirteenth Floor of Building—Another From Hospital Window

SEATTLE, March 28.—Two persons plunged to their deaths from windows of Seattle buildings yesterday. Both were ill. A man, suffering from a fractured leg, jumped from the thirteenth floor of the Medical and Dental Building to the street below. From the fourth floor of a city hospital an elderly man, recovering from pneumonia, leaped.

MEASURE IS DISALLOWED

Dominion Government Refuses Alberta Right to Outlaw Debts—Other Bills Not Touched

OTTAWA, March 28: (CP)—Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the government had disallowed Alberta legislation entitled the Limitation of Actions Act whereby all debts contracted prior to July 1, 1936, might be outlawed unless action for recovery is started by July 1940 or the debts revived by new agreements.

Mr. Lapointe further stated that the government was not interfering with the new Alberta Debt Adjustment Act or the bank incorporation tax which the minister of justice suggested would probably be ruled unconstitutional by the courts.

ASSISTANCE TO GROWERS

First New Wheat Legislation Introduced Yesterday at Ottawa by Minister of Trade and Commerce

OTTAWA, March 28: (CP)—The Dominion government took the first step in its new program of assistance to western wheat growers yesterday when the minister of trade and commerce, Hon. W. D. Euler, introduced an amendment to the Wheat Act providing for the guarantee of a price of 69c per bushel for No. 1 northern wheat at Fort William. Certificates will be issued to the producers so that, when the wheat is sold, they may share in the surpluses if any. The new minimum is effective next year and replaces this year's eighty cents.

A later bill to be introduced by Mr. Euler will provide for closer supervision of trading on the Winnipeg grain exchange.

Hon. J. G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture, will bring in legislation designed to encourage co-operative marketing.

Not Satisfactory

CALGARY, March 28: (CP)—

John L. MacFarland, prominent wheat marketing expert, is dissatisfied with the federal government's new wheat marketing policy. Elimination of the fixed minimum price is a policy of "defeatism," he says. The proposed guaranteed price of 60c at the lakehead will mean that less than 40c per bushel will be received by the farmers.

Will Not Disturb Unknown Warrior

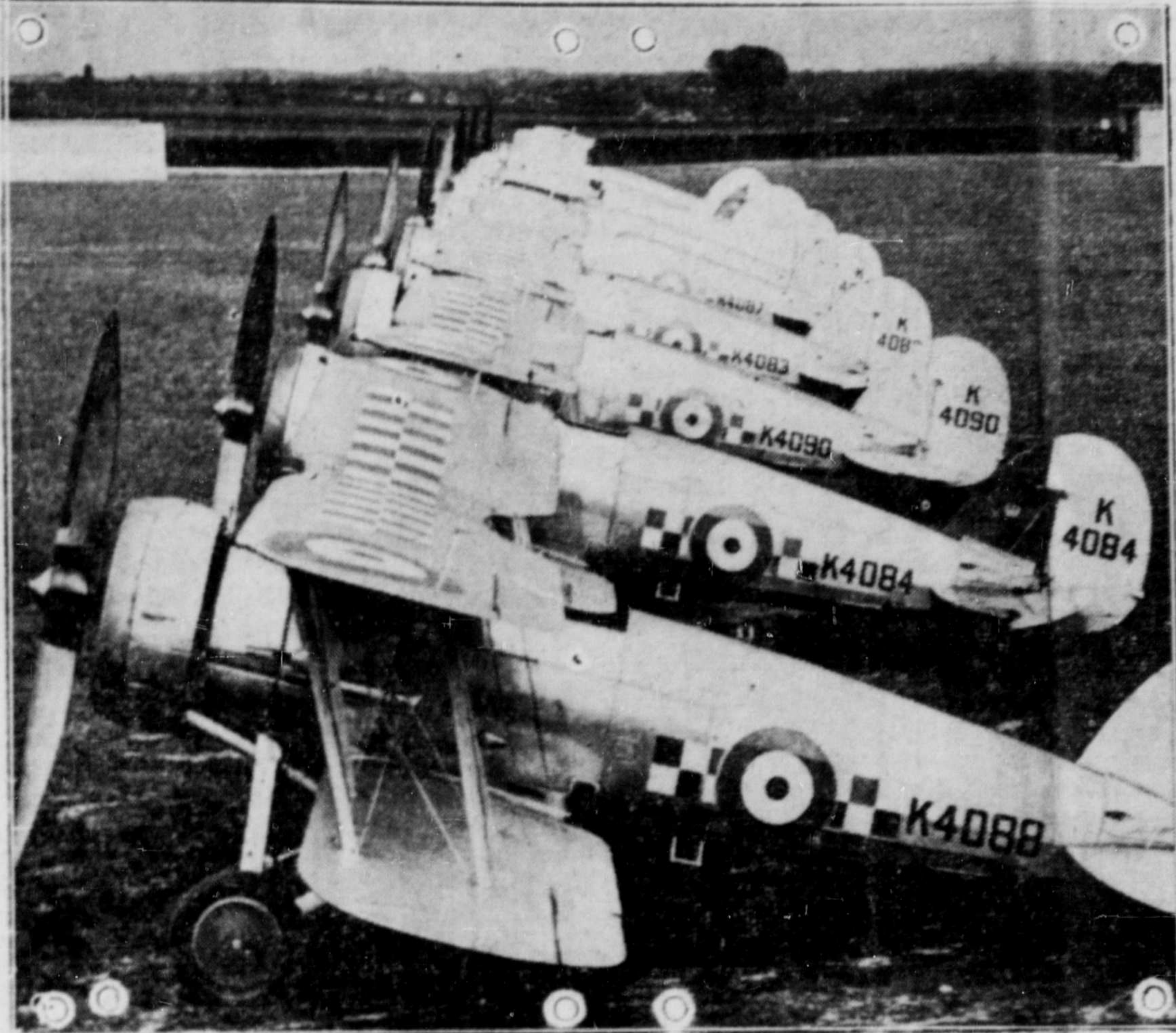
Proposal, Designed to Protect Shrine, Strongly Criticized

CAPTURE IMPORTANT

Taking of Kiangsi By Japanese Claimed to Have Cut China Off From Munitions Plants

SHANGHAI, March 28: (CP)—The Japanese Army today announced the capture of Kiangsi, important provincial city of Nanchang, describing it as a crushing blow to Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek.

The fall of Kiangsi came as the climax to a seven-day offensive which was the greatest in the past five months of the Sino-Japanese war.

The Japanese said that it meant Eastern China was cut off from important Chinese munitions plants.

PREPARING FOR KING

Manager of Jasper Park Lodge Leaves Ottawa For West

OTTAWA, March 28:—Robert Sommerville, manager of Jasper Park Lodge, leaves Ottawa tonight to begin preparations for the arrival at Jasper of the King and Queen who are due to visit Jasper National Park June 1.

Already, according to wire advice received by Mr. Sommerville from Jasper yesterday, it is springtime in the Rockies. The greenkeeper of the golf course wires that the snow in the Athabasca Valley has disappeared completely and he has put the power mowers to work trimming the grass on the greens. This is the earliest date on record that grass cutting on the Jasper golf course has been possible.

JUMPERS SCHOOL

SYDNEY, N.S.W., March 28: (CP)—The first parachute-jumping school in the British Empire will open near here when a 200-foot tower is erected and other equipment installed. Students will make their jumps off the tower.

Canada's Royal Guests— KING'S CRUISER WILL HOLD DOWN ITS HIGH POWER ON OCEAN TRIP

H.M.S. Repulse is Speedy Warship But Royal Crossing of Atlantic Likely to be More Leisurely

LONDON, March 28: (CP)—H.M.S. Repulse, whose engines and boilers are being overhauled and modernized in Portsmouth's naval dockyard, will make no attempt to challenge speed records on the historic trip to Canada next May with the King and Queen. Credited with 32 knots in her trial 22 years ago, the 32,000-ton battle cruiser was still capable of nearly 39 knots when she entered drydock.

Following her refit, the Repulse has now been taken on a short trial spin in home waters and a "shake-down" cruise in the Mediterranean. Her ultimate maximum speed, however, will remain an Admiralty secret.

Fascism is abhorrent to the average man and so is Communism.

SPAIN'S HORRIBLE WAR

War is always hell but a civil war, it seems to us, must be worse than any other. In Spain there has been war between the government which until the last few weeks has been dominated by the Communists and the army which refused to submit to Communism. It was a very bitter fight full of tragedy. It was a period of suspicion when no one felt he could trust his neighbor or even members of his own family. Happily it seems to be almost at an end. Communism has been crushed if not exterminated and there is possibility of early peace in that country.

Puts Damper On Football Pools

Great Social Evil Says South African Leader in Tightening Laws

CAPE TOWN, March 28: (CP)—Pin tables and participation in football pools conducted outside the Union of South Africa have been made illegal with passage in parliament of the Gambling Amendment Bill. Justice Minister Smuts in debate on the bill described football pools as a great social evil.

SPORT CHAT

Carl Cronin, popular 30-year old star rugby player and former coach of Calgary Bronks in the Western Canada interprovincial rugby-football union, is through with the game unless a Canadian club makes him an offer. He told the Canadian Press two offers from United States teams were rejected as "I would sooner live in Canada." The former Chicagoan, 11th of a family of 12, has only one disappointment as he leaves Canada's rugby picture and settles down in Calgary. "My one ambition was to come back after being trimmed in Toronto," he said, in referring to the 13-0 defeat of Winnipeg in the 1933 Dominion final against Toronto Argonauts. "However, I will try to reconcile myself to selling it's a fascinating game." Cronin, married here a year ago, is employed as a stock and bonds salesman. "I've been in Canada seven years and I'd rather stay here." It would be foolish for me to go to the United States and start coaching there although my connections are good. I'll do my quarterbacking on Monday mornings from now on and I'll always be right!"

Cronin has a coaching record unequalled in Western Canada since modern football made its invasion six years ago. He came to Winnipeg from Notre Dame College in 1932 and brought with him knowledge received from the late Knute Rockne. He coached Winnipeg in 1932 and the next year he led the team East after the Grey Cup. While at Toronto, Hamilton Tiger officials eyed him. The next season found Carl enroute from his Chicago home to Hamilton. "Before I was at Hamilton long, I found out Tigers had hired Johnny Farraro as head coach and I wasn't satisfied with the perspective there. I went back to Chicago. After playing one game with St. Louis in the United States professional league, I decided pro football was too tough for me."

Since coaching Bronks, Cronin piloted his gridders into four Western Canada finals, losing twice to Regina and twice to Winnipeg, although in the last two seasons Bronks won the Western Union honors. "The 1938 Bronks were the best team I ever coached," said Cronin. "I would have liked to have won the western title and got another whack at the East. Athletes have been very good to me," he said. "I have no regrets in leaving them."

EXPORTS WELL UP

Result of Trade Agreement Shown
In Better Opportunities To
Sell Canadian Goods

OTTAWA, March 28.—A gain of \$22,030,847 was shown in the value of Canada's total domestic exports to the United States during the months of January and February when compared with the corresponding months of 1938. The aggregate so far this year was \$60,067,338 in comparison with \$38,036,491. Exports of non-monetary gold totalled \$13,898,920 as against nil in January and February last year.

Southern Cross Place Of Honor

Kingsford-Smith's Famous Plane
Will Go On Show In Australia

SYDNEY, Australia, March 28. (CP-Reuters)—Southern Cross, Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith's famous plane, has been taken by road from the Royal Australian Air Force station at Richmond to the Kingsford-Smith Aerodrome, Mascot.

Although the machine could have been flown to Sydney from Richmond, it was a condition of "Smithy's" agreement with the commonwealth government when he sold it to the nation that it should not be flown again.

It will be stored at Mascot Aerodrome until completion of the new administration building when it will be placed on show.

Southern Cross, with more than 4,000 flying miles to its credit, was used by Sir Charles on his record 2,100 miles trans-Pacific flight in 1934, and flew the Jubilee Mail from England to New Zealand in 1935, when "Smithy" fought a two-hour battle with death over Tasmania Sea.

(Later that year Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith was lost in the Bay of Bengal while flying the "Lady Southern Cross.")

SCARCITY OF NURSES

Girls Decline to Enlist in Britain's Hospital Services Despite Effort to Raise Standard

By MOLLIE MCGEE
 Canadian Press Correspondent
 LONDON, March 28. (CP)—Shortage of recruits for the nursing profession in England continues. Meetings have been held attended by Royalty. Queen Mary made an appeal read at one by the Archbishop of Canterbury and headmistresses of girls' schools are endeavoring to arouse enthusiasm for nursing work among their pupils, but there has been little result.

Many among the medical profession blame the shortage on the type of menial work still given to nurses, others on the small pay. There has also been an outcry about the examinations given candidates for the nursing profession.

The latest examination paper set by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales has questions on it that seem to have strangely little to do with nursing. For instance, the applicant is asked to say who wrote the following lines: Be angry with your little boy And beat him when he sneezes, For he can perfectly enjoy The pepper when he pleases.

And she must know too, who said: "Am I my brother's keeper?" "Patriotism is not enough," "Friends, Romans, Countrymen," Future nurses must also know where, in the British Isles, the following are produced: buttons mustard, cheese, biscuits, slate, lace curtains, and name correctly the authors of "The Citadel," "Hiawatha," "The Good Companions," "Silas Marner"

Compound fractions and other seemingly irrelevant matters flourish off the paper.

Lady Novar, acting as spokesman for a number of critics, said: "Proficiency in arithmetic or knowledge of who wrote Hiawatha and Silas Marner and in what part of the British Isles buttons and mustard are made is scarcely proof that the candidate possesses those vocational qualities so necessary in a nurse."

Main Cause of Shortage

Yet those examination papers were set with a very definite purpose in view. Though the fact has not been reported the main cause of the shortage of nurses in England was brought up by frank speakers at the Congress last year. The right type of educated young woman is not entering the profession because it is filled at present with girls of the domestic servant class.

These girls are willing to do the drudgery given to pupil nurses in the hospitals at present and because of their lack of knowledge cannot aspire to any high degree of nurses' training. Their presence in the profession deters their more fortunate sisters from entering and being classed as the same.

Matrons who have worked with Canadians and Americans are quite willing to concede that as a rule the nurse on the American side of the Atlantic is superior in education, training and outlook to the English nurse. It was with the idea of cleaning out the profession so that it would appeal to the better type of girl that the much-criticized examinations were drawn up. It does not seem that they will accomplish their object.

Aussies Talk Pro Cricket

Subsidies In South Australia Seen As Challenge For All Commonwealth

SYDNEY, Australia, March 28. (CP-Reuters) — An attack on "shamateur" cricket has been made by K. O. E. Johnson, member of the executive committee of the New South Wales Cricket Association and also a member of the Australian Board of Control.

"If we are to face professionalism in cricket in Australia, let us come out in the open and say so," said Mr. Johnson. "I know there are many supporters of the game who do not believe it is desirable that professionalism should have a place in our cricket; while there are others who do not see any reason why a player should not be paid for his services."

Mr. Johnson was commenting on recent disclosures that South Australian players were being subsidized by their association. He added he thought the system was bound to lead to discontent.

"What must be the thoughts of some of the prominent players in South Australia who do not receive subsidies?" he asked. "I certainly think that what South Australia does is the concern of New South Wales. I believe that anything that affects the whole fabric of Australian cricket, as professionalism undoubtedly does, is a matter, not only for New South Wales, but for all states. The matter will have to be faced, and the sooner the better."

OWNED OLD LANDMARK

M. and N. Bar Building at Dawson, Destroyed by Fire, Once Property of Mrs. Peter Black

The M. and N. Bar building, famous three-storey landmark of Dawson, which was destroyed by fire a few days ago, was for ten years owned by Mrs. Peter Black, now of this city. Mrs. Black purchased it in 1904 for \$16,000 from Mrs. F. C. Wade and disposed of it in 1914 after coming to Prince Rupert.

One of Mrs. Black's tenants in the building was Alexander Pantages, later a famous theatrical producer, who used it as a dance hall, calling it the Savoy.

The building derived its later name "M and N" Bar through having been operated by two men, MacDonald and Nelson, who leased it from Mrs. Black, paying \$850 per month in the palmy days of the old gold camp. Many of the colorful figures of the Klondyke frequented the place.

The firm of Pattullo & Radford, of which Premier T. D. Pattullo was the senior member, eventually negotiated the sale of the historic building on Mrs. Black's behalf.
