Will Further Appeasement be Offered Germany to Disarm?-Settlement of Danzig Without War

LONDON, July 21:-There are reports that a new appeasement offer may be made by the nonaggression nations to Chancellor Adolf Hitler in return for which he might be persuaded to agree to at least partial rearmament. It is said that Great Britain might, under such conditions. make a huge loan to Germany to put the industry of that nation on a peacetime rather than wartime basis and that later the return of some colonies might be considered. However, there would first have to be definite assurance that Germany would abandon its present warlike policies.

Meantime, it is reported that Chancellor Hitler is planning another conference with Danzig officials on the question of the future of the free port which, it is possible, may be handled separately from the Polish corridor.

At Berlin today a German government spokesman, in one of the most unequivocal utterances on the Danzig question, said it was optimistically expected a solution favorable to the Reich would be reached. The spokesman rejected the idea of force to regain the Free City. "Germany has not the least desire for conflict,' he said "to bring about the uncompromising solution we confidently expect. ELECTION POSSIBILITIES

It is curious how worried the Conservatives are about the election. The Liberals have not yet begun to choose their candidates. Next month Right Hon. Mackenzie King will give an address on the occasion of the celebration of having been twenty years at the head of his party and it is expected he will then make an announcement. In the meantime all announcements are merely speculation, It might take some people by surprise if Mr. King were to announce his retirement from public office, suggest a convention of the party to choose a successor and state that another session of Parliament would be held commencing in the fall before an appeal is made to the people. That is within the realms of possibility.

BEST DEFENSE

The best defence is usually to take the offensive. Great Britain has for months past been taking insult after insult because enemies knew that she did not want to fight and would not do so unless forced into conflict. If she had sent an airplane over Berlin and dropped a bomb near enough to the capital of Germany to let the people there know it could be done, it might have had a salutary effect. Possibly just now a message telling the Germans to absolutely stop worrying about Danzig or something will start and that quickly would be good policy.

Britain's position reminds one of a big Newfoundland dog with a little cur barking at its heels and taking every possible step to provoke a quarrel. The big dog does not even show any expression of anger. It allows the provocation as if it were part of a game.

VALUE OF HEMLOCK

Evidently the demand for British Columbia hemlock; marketed as Alaska Pine, is improving. A mill has been purchased at New Westminster for the purpose of cutting Alaska Pine and exporting it to England. As this timber is quite plentiful around Prince Rupert it is quite within the realms of possibility that a similar mill might be established here. Because mills have failed here in the past does not mean that they will always fail. The possibility of specializing on hemlock lumber instead of spruce, changes the outlook of the whole sawmill industry on the coast. It may not be so helpful for interior mills which cater mostly to the prairie and United States trade.






