LIBERALS IN ANNUAL MEETING

W. O. Fulton Chosen President For What Is Thought Election Year

W. O. Fulton was chosen by the Prince Rupert Liberal Association at its annual meeting last night to preside over its destinies during the coming year, possibly the election year. There was no opposition to his candidature so he was elected by acclamation. Vice-President George W. Johnston was the logical successor to T. M. Brown, who resigned recently to take the position of returning officer. He presided at the opening of the meeting last evening but explained that he was not open to accept the presidency so he was chosen once more as first vice-president. The meeting passed a resolution favoring the payment of a higher wage rate to government employees on road work and instructed the executive committee to discuss this with Premier Pattullo when he is in the city next week. With the executive will go J. M. Dunn who brought the matter up at the meeting.

The question of giving closer attention to the needs of smaller communities was introduced by Robert Frizzell, who declared himself a Liberal first, last and all the time but he wanted to see a better functioning of the federal organization.

Confidence Expressed
During the counting of the ballots brief speeches were made by several members all of whom were very confident as to the outcome of the next election but urged that it was desirable to work hard to roll up a big majority for their candidate.

A. J. Prudhomme mentioned the wonderful work done by the Liberals and said he felt sure this would be appreciated by the electors. While he feared he would not be here to take part in the election he was keenly interested and would be here if possible.

M. P. McCaffery said he had retired from public life but he was particularly pleased to see the unanimity shown in the choosing of officers for the Association. He outlined some matters of policy that would likely be followed. He mentioned the change that had taken place in the United States towards the British Empire and gave Prime Minister Mackenzie King credit for doing a great deal toward bringing it about.

W. M. Brown was glad to see a competent committee chosen for this election year so Olof Hanson might be put back for another term.

Other speakers were President W. O. Fulton, Robert Frizzell, J. M. Dunn, S. E. Parker and Jack Judge.

RESERVE ON LAND

Fine Area Northwest of Prince George Being Held Presumably For Settlement Scheme

PRINCE GEORGE, Feb. 21: (CP)—The provincial Department of Lands yesterday notified land recording division officials here that all government lands in an area of approximately five hundred square miles north and west of Prince George were being reserved from pre-emption and sale under the land and settlement acts.

This is one of the finest agricultural areas in the central interior and speculation here is that the reserve move is the first step in a land settlement scheme similar to that proposed last year by Sir Henry Page Croft who proposed the migration to Canada of financially assisted British families.

Winnipeg City Council Would Sell Gasoline

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22: (CP)—The city council of Winnipeg has decided to ask the provincial government for permission to enter the gasoline retail business. The prevailing price of 32c to 37c for gasoline in Winnipeg is considered excessive.

TOO OLD FOR JOB

This Is What Murdoch Thinks About Hungerford As C. N. R. President

OTTAWA, Feb. 22: (CP)—Correspondence in connection with the resignation of Hon. James Murdoch as a director of the Canadian National Railways was tabled in the House of Commons yesterday by Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of transport.

Mr. Murdoch had charged that there was lack of sound business judgment in the administration of the Canadian National Railways. The presidency was too big a task, Mr. Murdoch felt, for a man as old as S. J. Hungerford and in his present state of health.

He wanted a younger man with more initiative.

Mr. Hungerford, whose re-appointment to the board of directors agreed upon after Mr. Murdoch's resignation, is sixty-six years of age.

Young Woman Dies In Fire

Perished When Her Home at Issoudun, Quebec, Was Destroyed During Night

ISSOUDUN, Quebec, Feb. 22:—A twenty-year old woman died of asphyxiation when her home was destroyed by fire during the night. Her husband, aroused by the crackling of the flames, escaped.

Evading Payment For Out Of Town School Children

MOOSE JAW, Saskatchewan, Feb. 22: (CP)—School trustees of Moose Jaw are taking steps to prevent the evasion of payment of school fees by out of town students. In at least four cases it has been found that the payment of these fees was circumvented by residents of the city adopting children for the school terms.

Both Paris and Rome Deny Arms Passage In North Africa Area

French Troops Said to Be Held in Barracks and Ready to March on Moment's Notice—Some Confusion As To Authenticity

PARIS, February 22: (CP)—Tunis dispatches said today that all French troops throughout Tunisia were ordered to remain in barracks as reports persisted of a clash between French and Italian troops last Friday on the Tunisia-Libya frontier. French officers said that the troops were ready to march at a moment's notice.

Reports of the clash, which put Italian casualties at eighty and French at four, were denied at the French Foreign Office. The reports were received in Paris diplomatic circles and also in private channels. They were also denied in Rome.

RUPTURE IN RELATIONS IMMINENT

Situation in Far East Tense as Result of Latest Incidents—More Terrorism in Shanghai

TOKYO, Feb. 22: (CP)—Japanese relations with Great Britain and possibly other powers are believed to be close to rupture as a result of latest incidents at Hong Kong and Shanghai.

The Japanese cabinet was in two-hour session today to consider means of checking of terrorism in Shanghai which, it is said here, has resulted in fifty-three political assassinations in recent months.

Today two policemen were reported killed in the international settlement at Shanghai in a fresh outbreak of terrorism.

More than one hundred casualties, including nine deaths, occurred in a native quarter of Hong Kong as a result of the bombing of a railway station there yesterday. The point of attack was fifteen miles from the centre of the city. A train narrowly escaped destruction. A British military post was demolished.

Sir Robert Craigie, British ambassador to Japan, has delivered a vigorous protest on behalf of his government.

SENATOR IS DEAD

Hon. James Houston Spence K.C. Of Toronto Passes At Age Of Seventy-One

TORONTO, Feb. 22: (CP)—Senator James Houston Spence K.C. died here early today. He was a Liberal and had been in the Senate since 1928. He was long prominent in legal and fraternal circles and was a former president of the Ontario Bar Association. He was born in Bruce County seventy-one years ago and is survived by his widow and four sons. He had been ailing for some months.

The death of Senator Spence leaves thirty-three Liberals and fifty-four Conservatives in the Upper House. There are now nine vacancies in the Senate.

VANCOUVER, Feb. 22: (CP)—Fire destroyed a trout hatchery in Stanley Park yesterday with damage estimated at \$2000. Two hundred thousand fingerling trout, being kept in troughs, were saved.

Corporation Tax Is Being Amended

Teeth Being Inserted in Saskatchewan Act in Order to Provide For Collection

REGINA, Feb. 22: (CP)—The provincial corporation taxation act is being amended at the present session of the Saskatchewan Legislature with a view to putting new teeth into the measure through provision of collection machinery.

TWO MINERS ARE KILLED

Sudbury Men Lose Their Lives In Collapse of Ore at Freud Mine

COPPER CLIFF, Ont., Feb. 22: (CP)—Two miners—H. Koski and E. Lorilla, both of Sudbury—were killed and three were partially buried in a collapse of ore in a chute in the Freud mine which they were cleaning out last night.

Saskatchewan Health Plans

Communities to Be Given Authority To Operate Them in Saskatchewan

REGINA, Feb. 22: (CP)—Legislation to provide for the establishment of community health plans is being introduced in the Saskatchewan Legislature. Such plans would be financed by direct taxation, no family to be required to pay more than \$50, and would be subject to approval by the ratepayers and the provincial board of health.

CONFERENCE IN BERLIN

British Trade Emissary And Foreign Secretary In Conference Yesterday

BERLIN, Feb. 22: (CP)—Frank Atkins Watkins, British trade emissary, was in conversation yesterday with the German foreign secretary, Joachim von Ribbentrop, preliminary to more important conferences on trade between Great Britain and Germany which will take place shortly. Matters discussed included the economic status of the Balkan countries, the cost of rearmament and the Mediterranean situation.

SAYS SHIP TORPEDOED

Report Received From Mid-Atlantic Near Azores Considered Somewhat Fantastic

CHATHAM, Mass., Feb. 22: (CP)—Somewhat fantastic is considered the report of the torpedoing of a vessel believed to be of Dutch registry about two thousand miles east of New York near the Azores today. The message was received by the Radio Marine Corporation here from the American freighter Tulsa. It said that she had picked up an "S. O. S." from a ship giving call letters "PECC" stating that she was sinking after the torpedoing.

Naval headquarters at Boston said they were unable to identify the vessel from the call letters.

A hoax is suspected.

CRITICAL OF GOVT

Head of United Grain Growers Does Not Like Government's New Wheat Policy

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22: (CP)—R. S. Law, president and general manager of the United Grain Growers, speaking here, criticized the federal government's new grain policy as announced last week by Hon. James G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture.

Mr. Law declared that the government was ignoring the recommendations of last fall's prairie wheat conference which had recommended the continuation of the wheat board and the retention of the fixed wheat price policy.

Farmers Claim Discrimination

Are Aroused by Freight Rates Which Are Being Charged on Their Wheat and Corn

TORONTO, Feb. 22: (CP)—The Board of Transport Commissioners, conducting a hearing here yesterday, were told that prairie farmers were aroused by discriminatory freight rates against their wheat and corn.

Winnipeg Sitdown Strike Is Ended

Demonstration of Young Unemployed Men at Fort Garry Municipal Hall Did Not Last Long

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22: (CP)—After a night and a day, sixteen young unemployed men ended a sitdown strike at the Fort Garry municipal hall. They had been insisting on being allowed to work together.

BOOSTING AIR FORCE
LONDON—The Air Ministry has issued supplementary estimates showing that an additional £8,000,000 is necessary to meet Royal Air Force expenditures for the current fiscal year. Recruiting has increased the personnel of the air force to 102,000, six thousand over original plans.

TO STAY IN SPAIN
ROME—Premier Mussolini today confirmed to General Francisco Franco that Italian troops would remain at the Spanish leader's disposal until "final victory."

CONCLAVE MARCH 1
ROME—The opening of the conclave which elects the Pope has been delayed until March 1 when it is expected that all the cardinals will be present to take part.

ADEQUATELY DEFENDED
LONDON—Answering questions in the House of Commons yesterday the minister for war stated that Gibraltar was adequately defended at the time of the Munich crisis except in anti-aircraft guns. These had since been supplied.

Attempted Murder Trial To Proceed About Next Week

Nick Sulkoski, charged with attempted murder of Jack Rutter, railway engineer, in a "gun and knife affray" last week, was further remanded for eight days on appearing before Magistrate McClymont in police court today. By next week it is expected that Rutter will be sufficiently recovered from his injuries to go into police court and give evidence at the preliminary hearing. His eyes are still in bandages at the Prince Rupert General Hospital and it is not known definitely yet whether or not his vision will be permanently impaired as a result of the slashing he received.

HOSPITAL IS BURNED

Some Patients Carried Out While Others Walk From Montreal Institution

MONTREAL, Feb. 22: (CP)—Fire destroyed the rambling three-story Sisters of Providence Hospital in the east end of Montreal yesterday with damage estimated at \$100,000. Nuns and police carried out some of the 72 patients. All were safe. Some being able to get out themselves. Ropes and ladders were used in some cases.

A high wind rendered difficult the task of the fire fighters as the flames, starting on the top floor, worked downward.

CARRY ON OLD LAND REARMING

No Hope For Disarmament Now, Says Chamberlain—British and French Co-operate

LONDON, Feb. 22: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told Parliament last night that he did not see any chance of a successful world disarmament conference under present conditions. Immediately there did appear to be such a chance, he would not hesitate in taking the lead in calling it. Unless halted soon, the current armament race would lead to bankruptcy of every nation in Europe, the Premier said. Britain had no alternative under existing conditions but to continue re-arming.

British and French general staffs are drafting a comprehensive plan for joint and effective use of man power, munitions and war potential in the event of being forced to fight. Rt. Hon. W. S. Morrison, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, told Parliament. There could be no "limited liability" for Great Britain in the event of France being attacked, said Morrison, indicating that a British continental army would at once take the field. The only issue with the French appears to be how large that continental army would be.

The House, by a vote of 310 to 127, rejected a Labor amendment to reduce the appropriation for armaments. Then the House approved of a doubling of the government's borrowing powers for defence to \$800,000,000.

CONCEDING TO FRANCO

France Is Dropping Conditions In Connection With Recognition Of Spanish Insurgents

PARIS, Feb. 22: (CP)—The French government was reported last night to be ready to make concessions to General Francisco Franco in connection with the recognition of insurgent Spain. It is understood that Foreign Minister Georges Bonnet is prepared to drop all conditions in connection with such recognition including the granting of amnesty to loyalist leaders and the withdrawal of foreign troops.

The Burgos conference between French and insurgent representatives, which was to have been held today, is postponed until Thursday.

Probe Of Nazi Activities Is Asked By Vets

VANCOUVER, Feb. 22: (CP)—The British Columbia command of the Canadian Legion is asking the federal government for an investigation of Nazi activities in British Columbia. Robert Macneil, secretary of the command, announced yesterday.

Conservatives Are Confident

National Organizer of Party in Calgary in Course of Western Tour

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22: (CP)—Dr. J. M. Robb, national Conservative organizer, was in Winnipeg yesterday in the course of a tour of the West. He left for Calgary where a convention is to be held tonight. Dr. Robb said the Conservative party faced the prospect of a general election this fall with confidence.

HOME BUILDING MONEY

So far it has been impossible for Prince Rupert to secure loans under the federal home building scheme owing to the fact that the city building lots are too small and that there are no building restrictions. Plans are now under way for a zoning bylaw which will set apart areas for apartment houses, for business and for strictly residential sites. Also provision will be made for the restrictions of new buildings to an area amounting to at least a lot and a half, preferably two lots to a building.

The people who originally planned Prince Rupert townsite evidently did so with the object of making as much money out of it as possible and without caring what became of the city in the future. To sell 25 foot residential lots was almost criminal, especially in a country where there is so much vacant land. All that can be done now is to see that new homes are provided with plenty of garden space around them. This can be done by means of a civic bylaw.

It is hoped there will be no delay in going ahead with plans for zoning and that application to loaning companies be made as soon as possible with the object of making loans available to local people this coming summer.

BUILDING CODE

One of the important factors in any home building scheme is the adoption of a building code applicable to all citizens. This code insures a minimum efficiency in the erection of new homes so that a degree of permanency may be attained. A code is, of course, insisted upon by those who loan money which is to be repaid over a term of years. Doubtless a code adopted for Prince Rupert would be very similar to codes adopted elsewhere but with slight changes to adapt it to local conditions.




