CAPT. WM. NOEL DROWNED NEAR DIGBY ISLAND

S. S. PRINCE RUPERT SAILS ON HER OVERHAUL TRIP TODAY

FAVORITE STEAMSHIP WILL RETURN MAY 15TH FITTED WITH OIL BURNERS—GEORGE TAKES UP HER RUN—CAPT. BARNEY JOHNSON HOLIDAYS IN SEATTLE.

The Prince Rupert sailed for the south this morning on her last voyage for the season. On arrival in port at Victoria she will transfer her passengers, freight and baggage to the Prince George, her sister ship, which for four months has been in dry dock for overhauling and burning equipment. The George will go on to Seattle to complete the Rupert's run and remain on the Seattle-Prince Rupert route with Sunday sailings from Seattle until May 15th, when the Rupert will again go in commission, and the twice-a-week sailings for the summer season to Prince Rupert will be inaugurated.

Won't Cut Stacks.
It had been planned, while these vessels were in dry dock, to cut eight feet off each of the funnels to give the boats a more compact appearance, but company officials were not thoroughly satisfied that the oil companies would have for the present sufficient storage supply on hand

and that it might be necessary to change back with minor alterations consuming three or four hours' time to coal fuel. The improvement will be made later.

Skipper's Holiday.
Captain Barney Johnson and all the officers of the Prince Rupert will stand by during the overhauling, but the engineers and stokers will be paid off on arrival at Victoria Sunday. Both vessels will come off the dry dock improved in many ways, it is announced, and well equipped to handle the heavy excursion travel expected into the north with the resumption of travel next summer.

Captain Johnson, wife and son will go to Seattle in about two weeks on a visit to old friends, the skipper to take his first vacation since engaging with the Grand Trunk Pacific lines two years ago.

NEARLY ONE MILLION MEN WENT ON STRIKE TODAY

Premier Asquith Made a Statement to Federation of Miners That Government Recognizes Their Demand

OPERATORS REFUSE THE MINIMUM WAGE

Government Wiring Rush Orders for Coal to United States for Use of British Navy—No Industries Yet Shut Down for Want of Fuel But Many are Expected Should the Strike Continue

(Special to Daily News.)
London, March 1.—Owing to the failure of the government to settle the dispute between the coal miners and operators the men went out this morning, as per prearranged schedule, in nearly all the collieries of England, Wales and Scotland. It is estimated that the number on strike is nearly a million.

Premier Asquith made a statement last night to the Federation of Miners to the effect that the government recognized the justice of a minimum wage, but unless this was accepted by the operators by agreement the government could take no steps to enforce it. Less than 40 per cent. of the operators were opposed to it.

According to one of the leaders, the men have already won, as the recognition by the government of the minimum wage principle, for which they have so long been striving, must bring them ultimate victory.

Meanwhile the government is

confronted with the serious difficulty of fuel for its war vessels. New orders were wired last night to the collieries in Virginian and West Virginia, and the government is offering to pay the large rate of \$5 per ton freight to the coalers.

At noon today the number of strikers was computed at over a million, but no reports have come in as to the shutting down of other industries, although they are expected to do so because of the shortage of fuel on hand.

FATAL DROWNING DISASTER TODAY AT DIGBY ISLAND

Captain Noel of Government Snag Scow Drowned Before His Wife's Eyes in Dodge Bay 200 Yards From Shore---Was Well Known Old-Timer in Prince Rupert and Port Essington

Right before his wife's eyes at about noon today Captain Noel of the government snag scow fell overboard from the new launch he has just had built and was drowned in twenty-five feet of water before help could reach him. The provincial police left this afternoon with grappling hooks to recover the body. Mrs. George Frizzell accompanied their launch so as to be with Mrs. Noel, who is suffering from the shock of the sudden grief.

The accident happened just after Captain Noel had completed the trial of his new launch, the Gretna II. He had taken a spin in her around Dodge Bay, where the snag scow is at present on the ways, and was leaning over the bow to pick up his moorings when somehow he overbalanced himself. He fell head first into

twenty-five feet of water, and may have struck the mooring buoy in his fall, as he sank struggling and was unable to catch a grip on boat or buoy.

From the scow on the shore only two hundred yards away Mrs. Noel happened to glance out of the window at the very moment the captain fell into the water. She rushed out to give the alarm and get help, but help was too far away and the poor woman, frantic with trouble, could do nothing single handed. She ran to the wireless station and the boys there hastened to do what they could, but too late.

Meanwhile Gus Harrison, the engineer of the captain's launch, from on shore some distance away, had heard the cry for help from the scow. He managed to rush a boat into the water and rowed hard for the scene of the disaster, but there was no sign of the captain, who had sunk

quickly. Harrison made efforts to recover the body in time to try to save life but failed.

News of the accident was telephoned to Prince Rupert from the wireless station and Chief Owen of the provincial police at once sent officers over to recover the body. Mrs. Frizzell of Prince Rupert accompanied the launch, to do what she could for Mrs. Noel, who is prostrate with grief and the effect of the shock she underwent at sight of her husband's drowning.

Captain Noel was a very well known old timer here. He had his home in Port Essington, but was known all along the coast and up river. Only a couple of weeks or so ago he had his new power boat launched at Port Essington and engaged in Prince Rupert, little guessing that the Gretna II, in which he took such pride, was to be the means of his death.

PARKER WILLIAMS POKES FUN AT M'BRIDE'S SILENT MAJORITY

SEVERAL OF THEM HAVE CONTRIBUTED NO IDEAS TO LEGISLATURE DURING THEIR THREE YEARS IN THE HOUSE.

Victoria, Feb. 28.—"Their's not to reason why, their's but to vote an aye," said Parker Williams in the legislature on Saturday as he watched what he later referred to as the "silent majority" putting through the legislation proposed by the government. This reference to the "silent majority" elicited a protest from Mr. Parson, who expressed the hope that when the time really came for them to be numbered in that category, he and Mr. Williams would be found on the same side.

"Shoveling coal," suggested Mr. Hawthornthwaite. Mr. Speaker looked at him meditatively as if dubious about the strict parliamentary propriety of the remark, but did not call him to order.

Much of the day was consumed in speeches that did not greatly lessen the force of Mr. Williams' charge that several of the members had contributed no ideas to legislation during their three years in the House.

CAME IN FOR DEDICATION

Dr. Chown and Dr. White Arrive on Camosun to Take Part in Dedication Exercises of New Methodist Church Sunday.

Rev. Dr. Chown and Rev. Dr. White arrived last night on the Camosun to attend the opening services of the new Methodist Church. These services take place on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, when Dr. Chown will be assisted in the dedicatory ceremonies by Rev. Dr. Raley, chairman of the Port Simpson district. Dr. Chown will have the honor of preaching the first sermon in the new edifice and will honor Prince Rupert at the same time.

In the afternoon there is to be a rally meeting at 3, when the Rev. Mr. Kerr of the Presbyterian Church, and others, will speak, in addition to the new pipe organ, the first in the city, Gray's orchestra will be in attendance. At the evening service at 7:30 Dr. Chown will again preach, and the largely augmented choir will, as at the other services, render the most modern classical selections, Mrs. Sing presiding at the pipe organ.

RUPERT WELL REPRESENTED

Out of the Large Number of Delegates to the Liberal Convention at Vancouver Eight Are Given Seats.

Vancouver, March 1.—A very large crowd was in attendance at the Liberal convention, which opened yesterday afternoon, from Prince Rupert especially. The secretary stated his regrets that accommodations would not permit of seating more than eight from this city and the Rupert men decided themselves upon these eight. Duncan Ross was present as a delegate from Hazelton. The most important business, said John Oliver, who presided, was to prepare a sound working platform for the coming campaign. A committee was selected with instructions to bring in a report this afternoon.

PREPARING FOR M'BRIDE'S VISIT.

Premier McBride and the other representative of the Two-Man government are expected to reach here on their stumping campaign the week after next, and there was a rumor around town today that the Conservatives were circulating a petition requesting the Premier to pledge himself to an early sale of the government lots in this townsite. It could not be learned which of the two Conservative organizations was doing this, nor could a copy of any such petition be run down. So possibly it is the first of a series of political canards.

The idea, however, has a good deal to recommend it, for the reason that it would be a movement bound from its inception to meet with success. Mr. McBride's reply is a safe bet. He would solemnly and very respectfully take the matter under advisement and give the petitioners an answer at the earliest possible date. That date would be just before election, when the "promise" would be published in large type. If this should really happen The News would also use large type. It would print this "promise" at the head of a long list of such "promises" of the Two-Man government as to the early completion of the government dock.

The rumor run yesterday that the petitioners were to present at the same time an ultimatum: That if the petition was not favorably answered the Conservatives of the city would withdraw their support of the McBride government. It may or may not be within the ethics of party politics to hold up a premier with a loaded gun of this description, but to us it is another evidence that the rumor has no foundation in fact. Yet, the Progressives are really progressive, and might take such a step, as they have taken several, because the question at issue is a supreme matter of public polity. But the old Conservative party—never in your life; forget it. The policy engraved in their heart of hearts is: "Suck the pap hard and silently; never breathe a whisper."

REGULAR POLICE JUDGE WILL SOON BE NEEDED.

With the growth of the city, which is undoubtedly going to break into a rapid gait this summer, there will arise a necessity for a police judge who can devote at least his mornings to the work without hunting for other jobs and leaving police court cases to await the convenience of such other jobs. During the past week, for instance, a number of cases were adjourned from day to day because the magistrate had been engaged as one of the arbitrators in the Tomlinson Right-of-Way case. It was a serious inconvenience and considerable unnecessary expense for the men charged with crimes or misdemeanors to attend court, pay the fees of their lawyers and the expense of a number of witnesses on both sides from day to day.

With the Grand Trunk-Pacific, Canadian Northern, Canadian Pacific and Great Northern racing to see which can blow in the greatest number of simoleons in British Columbia during the coming season, this province, as a centre of activity, should have an anthill looking like an Indian cemetery.—Fort George Tribune.

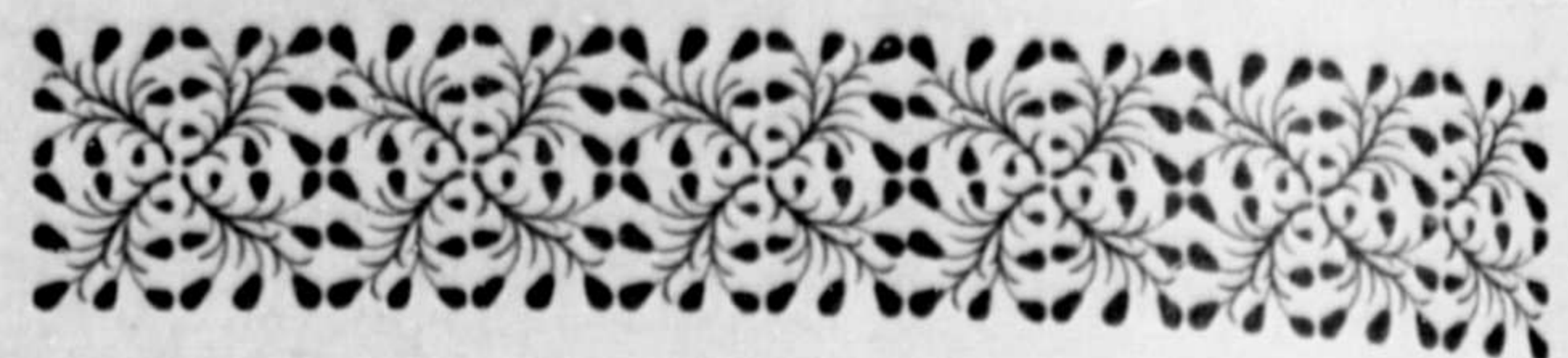

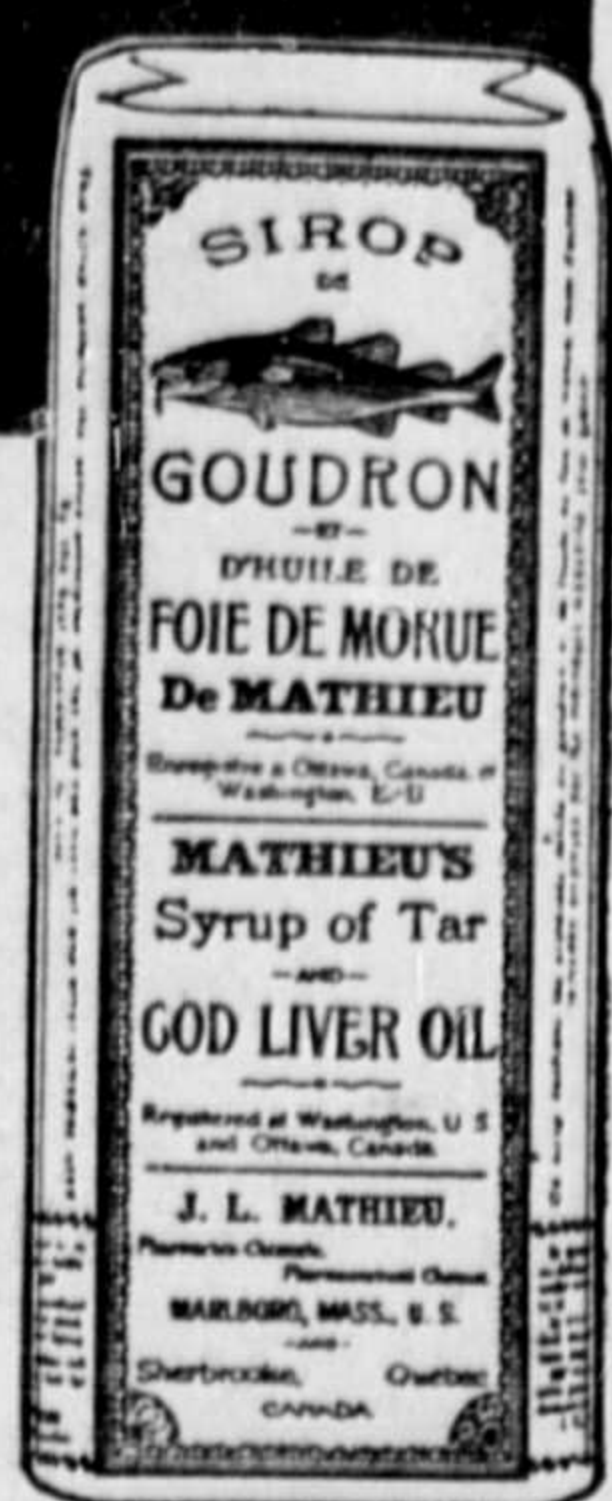

COPPER FIND AT HAZELTON

Profitable Development on Rothered Boule Property—Big Ledge of Hundred and Forty Feet—Work on American Boy.

Close to the Kelly townsite, upon the Roche de Boule property an important strike of four feet of yellow copper and one foot of galena and gray copper has been made on the crosscut. Total mineralized vein matter runs about eight feet.

Lord Leitrim, an Irish earl with large estates in the north of Ireland, is now spending two months in Florida fishing for tarpon. A romantic interest attaches to his visit because for the past five years Lord Leitrim has been searching for his lost brother, the Hon. Frank Clements, who is sole heir to his large estates. If the heir is not found the title to the estates and the peerage becomes extinct upon the earl's death. 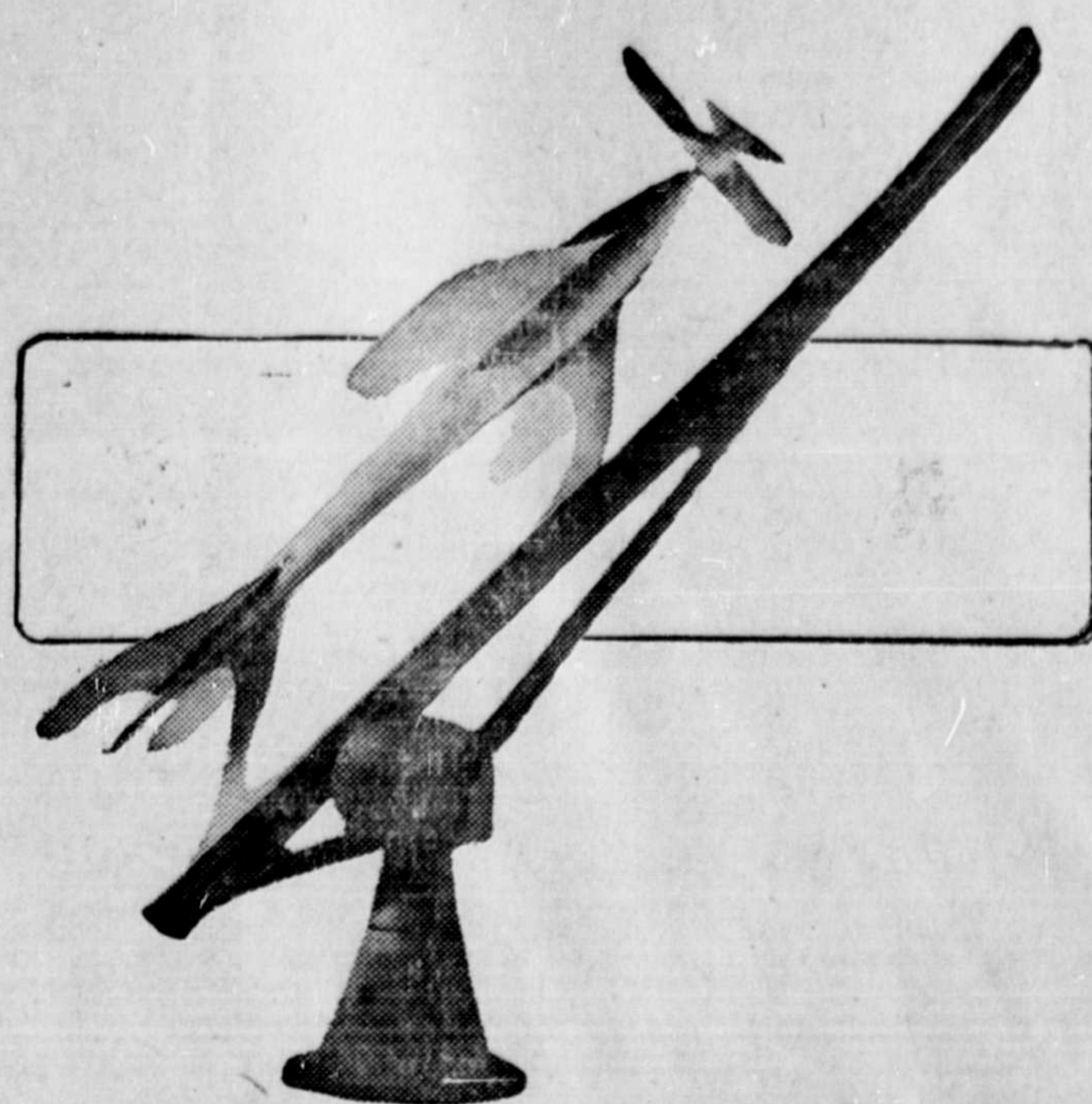

NEW RUSSIAN COLONIZATION

Rumored Large Scale Scheme for the Peopling of Fertile Naas Basin Valleys with Good Class of Russian Immigrants.

NEW COMPANY FOR STEWART

Sol. Cameron and Associates Organize Company to Operate on American Creek, Portland Canal.

With an acreage comprising a group of ten claims, located at an elevation of 3,300 feet, on American Creek, Portland Canal, the Northern Terminus Mines, Ltd., commences operations.

Sol. Cameron and associates in the Westholme Lumber Co. are the owners and organizers of the company and ore is already being rawnhided out for shipment. The ore is said to be a high grade gray copper, assaying \$200 per ton.

NEW COAST STEAMERS

To Be Placed in Service of Pacific Coast Steamship Co.

Tenders are being called for the construction of two large passenger steamers, to be 17 per cent. larger than either the President or Governor of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company. The contract for the first of the two steamers will be let next month. The new vessel will be a twin screw steamship, like the Governor, and about the same design. Her engines will be of sufficient power to enable her to maintain 18 1-2 knots an hour as compared with 16 1-2 knots, the maximum speed of the President and Governor. The dimensions of the new liner show that she is twenty-five feet longer than the Governor and five feet wider. The new vessel will have passenger accommodations for 626 passengers, 418 first cabin, 108 second cabin and 100 steerage.
