Far In Their Raids on England -35 Ships Brought Down

LONDON, November 14: (CP)-If any damage was done at all yesterday by two attacks by German bomber squadrons of four planes on each occasion on the Shetland Islands, it was very slight. One report said that a vacant building had been destroyed and that concussion of falling bombs had broken windows. It was only the second time since the war began that the Germans had succeeded in dropping bombs on British soil, the first time having in a raid on the Firth of

Yesterday a small British ship was torpedoed by a German submarine off the northwest coast of Spain, her crew being rescued by a trawler.

The losses of these ships followed an Admiralty announcement late last night that two German steamers-Meklenberg, 7892 tons, and Parana, 6.038 tons, both of the Hamburg-American Line-were intercepted Monday off Iceland by British warships. Rather than permit the capture of the vessels, the German crews abandoned them in a sinking condition. After rescuing the German crews, the British warships speeded the sinking of the two steamers by gunfire so they would not remain a menace to navigation. LOOKING FORWARD

Almost all the most prominent speakers of the day, when discussing the war or related subjects, have something to say about the future and the desirability of nreparing for the peace that will follow this conflict. The British and Canadian leaders realize that the world is changing and that, if democracy is to continue to function at its best, it must do so in line with the thought of the mass of the people. It was probably some such thoughts that made the C.C.F. members of the provincial Legislature spectacular, bringing down upon themselves the silent imprecations of practically the whole community.

There is one thing about war. It makes people think about peace. It stirs them as nothing else could.

CHAMBERLAIN EXONERATED.

Whether Prime Minister Chamberlain was right or wrong at Munich we do not know and it matters little. The thought occurs, however, that in view of the attitude of a few people, it is a good thing he did not declare war at that time. If he had done so he would undoubtedly have been blamed for precipitating a conflict at a time when the British Empire was not ready. Possibly it might have meant defeat but that evidently is what a few people, even in this part of the country, judging from their public expressions would like to see. They would have been proud to have goosestepped with the German army. Some seem to almse Chamberlain as an excuse for not putting on the King's uniform just now. It is a curious coincidence that some men who abuse Chamberlain for not plunging the world into war over CzechoSlovakia, Spain and China, seem to be the least concerned over Poland, Latvia, Esthonia. Finland, Norway, Sweden, Holland, Belgium or other of the lesser nowers which are endangered by Hitler. None of us liked Munich but that should not affect our attitude toward the present conflict.

SAVED BY WATER

As was mentioned in a local armistice address, the strip of water senarating Britain from the rest of Europe is ite salvation. So the threat to flood a part of Holland seems to have saved that country, temporarily at least. from invasion by the Germans. Doubtless the Dotch will continue the evacuation of those areas so that if they should become victims of Hitler's ambitions the invaders will get a damp reception.

National Red Cross War Drive

\$3,000,000

HOW is this money to be spent? The charter of the Canadian Red Cross Society sets out the X-Ray equipment, surgical apparatus objects of this great cause as follows:

"In times of peace or war to carry on and assist in work for the improvement of health, the prevention of disease and the mitigation of suffering throughout the world."

Last year the sum of \$1,000,000.00 was collected to finance the peace-time work of the Society. Today, because of the greater needs of war, three times that amount must be raised. Peacetime activities cannot be neglected and the programme of war relief must be initiated at once.

Consideration of the many aspects of Red Cross work in 1914-1918 gives some indication of the programme that will have to be undertaken in the present war.

HOSPITALS AND NURSES

Hospitals must be built and equipped in England and France to care for the Canadian sick and wounded. During the last war the Canadian Red Cross built and equipped (wholly or in part) hospitals at Taplow, Bushey Park, Ramsgate, Bexhill and Buxton in England; built and equipped one of the largest military hospitals in France; and established a depot in Boulogne for Canadian hospitals.

AMBULANCES

From 1914 to 1918 the Canadian Red Cross provided scores of ambulances to convey the sick and wounded in France and England.

MOTOR LORRIES

The Canadian Red Cross in France maintained a service of motor lorries to ensure the conveyance of Red Cross supplies with the greatest possible dispatch wherever needed.

X-Ray equipment, surgical apparatus, supplies and dressings must be purchased almost immediately. During the last war, 147,270 cases of supplies were sent to hospital units in England, in addition to supplies for hospitals in France. £2500 was contributed to equip a ward in the St. John Ambulance Brigade Hospital at Etaples in France.

FOOD AND COMFORTS

Again the Red Cross wishes to be able to send socks, cigarettes and other comforts to the front. During the last war, 341,325 cases of supplies were sent overseas. The Society sent sixty pounds of food per month to every Canadian prisoner of war, in addition to tobacco, medical supplies, clothing and books.

INFORMATION BUREAU

The Information Bureau set up at the London office rendered personal services to thousands of soldiers. Hospital visitors supplied Canadian patients with extra comforts and entertainments and reported their progress to relatives at home, and their needs to the Society. The Enquiry Department constantly searched for news of "missing" men to relieve the suspense of distant relatives.

A corps of voluntary workers will make a canvass of as many donors as possible during this drive. If one of these workers fails to get in touch with you, send in your contribution to your local Red Cross Branch. Give big-heartedly.




