

Representatives of Canada and Other Parts of Commonwealth Going to London

LONDON, Oct. 4: (CP)-It has been suggested that a British Empire war cabinet is in the making although officially it is said no such permanent cabinet is under consideration at present. Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden, Secretary for the Dominions, however, told the House of Commons that Canada, Australia. New Zealand and South Africa were sending cabinet ministers here to confer with the British government as soon as practicable.

Mr. Eden was loudly cheered. He said that the Dominions had been sounded out on the proposal and added: "I am glad to say that the suggestion has been welcomed and the governments of Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa are each arranging to send a cabinet minister to this country to confer with us as soon as practicable.

Canada will be represented by Hon, T. A. Crerar, minister of natural resources.



Just now what Canada is doing is trying to give of her best to help put down Hitlerism. At such a time when so much is at stake it cannot afford to tolerate discussions on civil liberty. There will be no liberty of any kind if we lose. These discussions on civil liberty are just a German method of trying to weaken the country and prepare the way for the advent of Hitler. They should be looked upon with suspicion. The cultivation of suspicion of the government or of the military at a time like this is an underhand way of trying to help Hitler.

AS ONE NATION

The decision of the Liberals to hold no meetings during war time unless there should be an election is one highly to be commended. Conservatives are following a similar course. Political divisions do not count when the country is in danger. Any man worthy of the name will forget petty divisions and support the nation.

The original idea of Fascism was that the country was everything and that there would be no petty factions. Under ideal conditions it might work out just as socialism might work if conditions were right. Now we have a condition approaching socialism in which men serve their country in her defence for much less pay than they could secure in civil life. Everything is found for them and if they are wounded they get a pension from the state. If they die their widows secure a pension.

We have in the country during the war a species of military government, the only kind possible when an enemy is liable to be pounding on the gates at any time.

FOR VICTORY

This restriction of our liberty is the price of victory. Subversive elements can not be allowed during war time. Those who clamor for the right to injure the state during a war are enemies of the state. They are not loyal to their country. They employ the liberty that has been theirs so long as a means of injuring their country. They are not good citizens. Socialists claim that restriction of liberty is necessary when bringing about the socialist state. That was what to k place in Russia, only the socialists there were so fond of their job of ruling that they refused to let go. They went through the motions of liberty but continued to hold the power.

In a British country when the war is over the country gradually returns to normal and liberties which have been denied for a time are again released.




