

HYDE PARK, New York, October 7: (CP)-President Franklin D. Roosevelt today told newspapermen that he had nothing to say about Berlin dispatches that Chancellor Adolf Hitler would accept an armistice in the European war if United States proposed it. The question of whether Roosevelt was turning down a suggestion that he act as mediator or merely awaiting developments was left open.
