Retired Naval Men to Number Twelve Thousand Being Summoned Back to Duty by British Government

LONDON, July 13: (CP)-The British Navy is calling up twelve thousand retired officers and reservists for fleet exercises in August and September, Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today. Ships in reserve will be manned for exercises combining the navy and air force. Mr. Chamberlain said that the reservists were being mobilized to obtain the fullest advantage of the combined fleet and air exercises, thereby advancing the degree of fleet efficiency.

### HERRIDGE AMBITIOUS

An Ottawa correspondent, writing of the present political situation, declares that Hon. W. D. Herridge is very ambitious. Thwarted in his wish to lead the Conservative party following the resignation of Hon. R. B. Bennett. Mr. Herridge has an idea he can so divide the rest of the country that he may become the leader of a powerful democratic party. This ambition is being opposed by the C.C. F. which refuses to give up its principles and policies in order to follow a leader not of its own political faith.

According to Norman McLeod the C.C.F. is much annoyed at Mr. Herridge going into Saskatchewan where it already had a strong hold on the people and seemed likely to make a killing. With Herridge candidates in the field the extreme left group would be split and the Liberals

would probably win there. The Ottawa report is that Herridge has shot his bolt and will follow Hon. H. H. Stevens to the discard. In any event he is not likely to be a very great factor in the election and the longer the elections are delayed the less likely are the Herridge candidates to win.

People with friends in the Arctic must do their Christmas shopping very early indeed! For R.M.S. Nascopie, which carries the yearly mail to the Eastern Arctic, leaves Montreal in July. This year her voyage will be the 270th of "the Governor and Company of Adventurers of England trading into Hudson's Bay", She covers 10,000 miles carrying supplies to mission stations, trading posts and the Mounted Police. Her cargo includes, among other things, baby carriages, Christmas presents and tobacco products.

When her smoke has faded from the horizon, the long, lonely Arctic night closes down on the traders, trappers, mission workers and policemen of Labrador and Hudson's Bay. That night would be desolate indeed but for the products of the tobacco industry. Kingsley called tobacco, suggesting moments which come to everyone, "a lone man's companion, a bachelor's friend, a hungry man's food, a sad man's cordial, a wakeful man's sleep, and a chilly man's fire".
