GYROS HEAR ABOUT FAIR

Al Small Gives Breezy Talk to Service Club—Impressed by Gardens and Settings

The gardens, illumination and general settings of the Golden Gate International Exposition at San Francisco proved the most intriguing feature of the great fair to A. C. Small of this city. He so informed the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday in giving a breezy luncheon talk descriptive of his recent trip to California.

The gardens were, indeed, a wonderful and colorful spectacle, Mr. Small said. When he was there such flowers as tulips, hyacinths and daffodils were in the height of their bloom. There were new and novel colors including the purple and gold of the exposition. Shrubbery and trees were also described and reference made to the scenic preparations which had been made over a period of several years for the gardens.

The illumination of the great fair buildings by night made of the place a veritable fairyland in color.

Mr. Small described in some detail the fair buildings and the general set-up. Among the exhibits visited by Mr. Small had, of course, been that from British Columbia which he found to be the only official one from Canada. There he had seen Constable Terry Stewart of this city who told him of many interesting incidents including that of a lady visitor who had marvelled at how they had been able to "dig" halibut and salmon out of the ice which she thought there must be at Prince Rupert when she learned this place was near Alaska.

There were many things in California, apart from the Exposition, to interest travellers in that state from such a place as Prince Rupert, Mr. Small said. He had marvelled at the six great bridges which were crossed as one drove to California on the coast route.

Mr. Small, while away, went as far as Mexico. He told of the anti-British feeling at present existing in that republic.

Two of the candidates are aldermen—Halford Wilson, Conservative, and H. L. Corey, the Liberal standardbearer. Mrs. Stuart Jamieson, former Burnaby juvenile court judge, is the C.C.F. candidate. The election takes place May 1.

RATES ARE INCREASED

Greater Cost of Express Shipmen From Seattle May Not, However, Be Permanent

SEATTLE, April 20.—Local fish shipping interests were advised yesterday by the Interstate Commerce Commission that while no move has yet been made to restore the old rates, new express rates from Seattle to the East, involving an increase of 42-100 per cent, may not necessarily be permanent.

CHANGE IN MINISTRY

Leslie Burgin To Head New British Supply Department—Will Be New Supply Minister

LONDON, April 20: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain announced in the House of Commons today a new ministry of supply to be established to expedite the manufacture of arms. Minister of Transport Leslie Burgin is appointed to head the new ministry. The new minister of transport is not as yet named. A bill will be introduced soon to establish the ministry.

The new department will have three functions—to expedite munitions supply, to administer certain stores for the war office and to find and store reserves of essential metals and raw materials for wartime use.

Sir John Anderson, Lord Privy Seal, has turned down a suggestion from local authorities for the construction of deep underground air raid shelters. This means the distribution of steel huts for erection in backyards will be expedited.

TELLS OF ANIMALS

Interesting University Extension Lecture Last Night By Prof. Williams of University of British Columbia

Tracing the history of American mammals as far back as an estimated sixty million years long before the existence of man on these continents, Prof. M. Y. Williams, head of the department of geology and geography at the University of British Columbia, gave an interesting university extension lecture at a public meeting in Booth Memorial High School auditorium last night on the subject "American Mammals, Past and Present." The evening was under the joint auspices of the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association and the Women's Canadian Club. Mrs. R. M. Young, president of the Parent Teachers' Association, was in the chair and there was a good attendance.

American mammals, Prof. Williams said, had had a long history and had taken a large number of forms. The American mammals of today the speaker said, were not originally American, their progenitors having come to this continent from Asia following the ice age. Immigration, in this, was similar to that of original man on this continent, Prof. Williams said, had been found to have come by way of the Bering Sea bridge, spanning over the two American continents. This, of course, had been thousands of years before the Scandinavians had first crossed the Atlantic to be followed later by Christopher Columbus in 1492.

In opening, Prof. Williams associated the study of animals with biology. Deductions from research in connection with rocks had enabled scientists to roughly estimate the age of the earth. Some radium rocks found in Canada were estimated to be over a billion years old while in Russia their age was estimated at two billion years. Remains of animal life and plants had been found embedded in rocks of great age.

The speaker said it was not his intention to deal with life of the marine, fish, reptilian or dinosaur ages. He would deal with mammals, the highest form of life—mammal-blooded, bringing forth their young alive, equipped with brain and to which species even man belonged.

Prof. Williams told of excavations of prehistoric animals in the Cypress Hills of Alberta in which he himself had engaged. Wyoming and Colorado in the United States had also yielded valuable fossil specimens of forms of mammals long since extinct.

Interesting Pictures

The greater portion of Prof. Williams' discourse was illustrated with slides depicting the various forms of animal life on this continent from through the ages, these being of a wide variety and of much interest. The age old conflict between the herbivores and the carnivores, which maintained the balance of nature today as it had in prehistoric times, was referred to on several occasions. The carnivores, which some times people might regard as cruel, had their place in nature. The fact that the carnivores preyed upon the herbivore actually kept the latter from deteriorating. Many interesting sidelights on the life and habits of mammals, ancient and modern, were given. Starting with the animals long since extinct, Prof. Williams brought the subject right up to modern times including reference to and pictures of the animals which now inhabited the land and seas of America and British Columbia. On motion of Arthur Sutton, a vote of thanks was tendered Prof.

Training School For Prince Rupert Young People

A very enthusiastic meeting was held on Tuesday evening at the Presbyterian Church when representatives of the various youth organizations of the Anglican, Presbyterian, Baptist and United Churches and Boy Scouts met to make arrangements for the Leadership Training Institute to be held in this city from April 28 to May 5.

The chairman, Ken Harding, explained briefly the purpose of the training school. He stated that at last the people who are leaders or who aspire to leadership in Christian youth work will have an opportunity for valuable training under Bert Fiddes who is being sent

by the Religious Education Council for B. C. to conduct the course. This will fill a long felt need. Mr. Fiddes is highly experienced in young people's work and will bring with him many new ideas and methods to Prince Rupert.

Following this introductory talk Mr. Harding was elected chairman of the Training Institute with T. Johnstone as Registrar. A discussion ensued as to the most suitable place for holding the sessions. Rev. E. E. Brandt generously offered the use of the Baptist Church hall which was gratefully accepted. It was decided that the course will be conducted each week-night during Mr. Fiddes' visit and will be open to leaders or aspiring leaders from the age of 15 up.

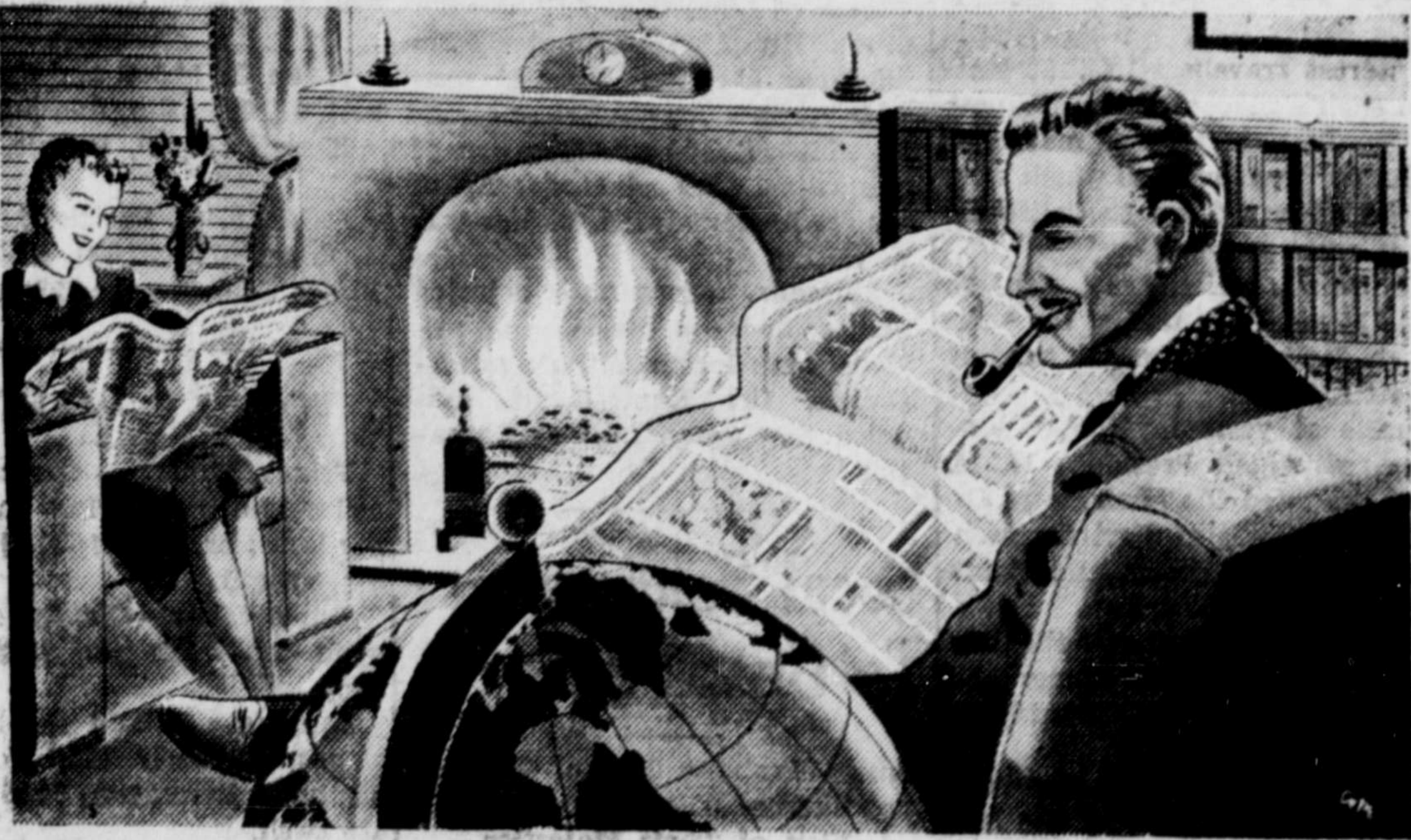
It was decided to hold as one of the chief features of the Institute a Boys' Rally open to all boys belonging to Sunday Schools, church organizations or Scouts, be-

tween the ages of 10 and 18, and also a Young People's Rally.

Arrangements for the Boys' Rally were placed in the hands of a committee with Rev. R. C. H. Durnford representing the Anglican Church as chairman, assisted by Malcolm Wilding, representing the United Church; Harold Ivarson, the Presbyterian Church; Tom Johnstone, the Baptist Church, and E. R. M. Yerburgh, the Boy Scouts.

The Young People's Rally is to be in charge of a committee consisting of Jack Hopkins, representing the Anglican Young People's Association, and Ned Tobey, representing the youth groups of the United Church.

The whole proceedings were marked with great enthusiasm and it was felt that, as a result of the training school, great benefits would accrue to the young people of this city.
