



Salem, Ore., Feb. 29 .- Governor Oswald West has announced that he has obtained a full confession from one of the men implicated in the robbery of the steamer Humboldt, from which in September, 1910, was stolen \$57,500 worth of gold bullion.

Twenty-five pounds of this has been recovered, and was brought to Salem and placed in the hands of the Governor, who turned it over to Steve Connell, a United States secret service operative. With Connell was an agent of the Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, which carried the loss on the bullion.
