NEW LIGHT PLANT MACHINERY IS UNDER STEAM

ANOTHER BLAST ACCIDENT IN ALLEYWAY

Blasting in Alleyway Between Second and Third Avenues Cleared Out Whole Rear Wall of McLaren's Office in Albert Block This Morning, But Fortunately No One Was Injured

A big blast and tons of rock were rolling through the rear wall of the Mack Realty & Insurance Company's office in the Albert block this morning, smashing the three-inch planks of the retaining wall to kindling. It was enough to scare anyone, even if they were insured. Mrs. DesRosiers was standing near to the second avenue entrance talking with Miss Curtin and Clerk E. V. Evitt when a big rock came sailing over her head along the narrow passage from the rear. It smashed through the night, the concussion caused the door to swing open and a shower of glass she rushed screaming to the street. The others quickly followed her. Behind them came J. Lorne McLaren, who had been sitting in his private office midway. Soon Mr. Chalmers, the flashlight picture man, was there and took a picture of the memorable scene, the quartet mentioned standing on the big rocks with a shelving pile of other rock for a background. The rear wall was entirely cleared away and the alley had come down in an avalanche and filled the room. Some of the fragments weighed over a ton. The accident took place on the alley between Second and Third avenues, which the city is now cutting through. It was said to have been caused by the drilling striking a fissure. It is the second blast accident doing considerable damage on this alleyway.

LIBERAL CONVENTION VERY ENTHUSIASTIC

Organization of an Education Campaign Begun Which is to Cover Every Constituency and be Continued Until Election---Dr. Kergin, Vice-President; Duncan Ross and George R. Naden on the Executive Committee

Vancouver, March 4.—The Liberal convention concluded its labors Saturday after the most successful meeting ever held in the history of the party in the province. Every portion of the province was represented with a full delegation and those present were full of enthusiasm and fight. Mr. Brewster was elected president, Dr. Kergin and F. J. Deane vice presidents and Duncan Ross and George R. Naden are on the executive, representing the north. The platform adopted was most radical, including land for the settler only. Woman suffrage and local option were also advanced as a labor for the legislation. It was decided to put up candidates wherever the Liberals have a prospect of winning, and to carry on an educational campaign in every constituency in the province. Organization is to begin at once and be continued until the next general election.

NEW POWER UNIT TEST TODAY

Magnificent Machinery Added to City Electric Plant is Making Good Under Both Full and Overload

GENERATING JUICE ABUNDANTLY

Two Thousand Four Hundred Volts Hurdled Through Water Resistance by Number Two Unit Under Preliminary Test—Lightning by the Barrelful at the Plant—Only Wait Switchboard to Serve City Ample

"Danger—keep out" was the sign in blue chalk at the entrance to the city electric light station on Saturday afternoon, and with very good reason, too. For Saturday saw the first full load and overload test of No. 2 unit of the two new units added to the city's electric equipment within the past month. Close by the innocent looking yet peril fraught cask with its array of insulated wiring the big two cylinder direct coupled engine and generator fairly hummed under a full head of steam. Beside them watching the tiny telltale meters Mr. Matthews and the burly expert from the States were carrying out the test. At 3:30 p. m. when The Daily News representative happened to drop in to make an enquiry of Mr. Matthews, the test had been steadily in progress since 10 a. m., a non-stop run for the power unit under trial, and everything was going like clock work. HARD HITTING BY REV. KERR AT 'MEN ONLY' MEETING SUNDAY

Young Pastor Strikes at the Snake of Social Vice and Says Things that Should Make the Reptile Writhe—Big Gathering Interested.

"Men only" meeting means most invariably a full house in any part of the world, but Rev. F. W. Kerr's meeting of this kind yesterday afternoon was phenomenally full—to the doors, in fact. A solid throng of men, mostly young men, listened with attention to the popular young pastor's address on the sad subject of the social evil. In strongest terms Rev. F. W. Kerr condemned the evil of the restricted district, which he would see abolished altogether. The blame for its existence he attributes most of all to men. The claim that such a segregated area is a necessity in social life of the west the pastor questioned. "If a disreputable district be necessary," he said, "then I would have it as far away from the city as possible." The very plank walks along Fulton street, he declared, lead a young man's steps toward the temptation that spells moral death for him. Another telling sentence of the pastor's was the one in which he declared he would have a book kept with the record of the names of all those found frequenting the segregated area, the volume to be in the police court open for public inspection at all times. Rev. F. W. Kerr pitied rather than condemns the erring women, placing the responsibility of their condition largely at the door of men. His appeal to the young men of Prince Rupert to be clean word and deed met with appreciation of his audience, there frequent applause. The pastor's vigorous contention that the death penalty should be meted out with merciless rigor upon all found guilty of frequenting was greeted with some laughter, but the preacher was fully in earnest about it. Doubtful sounding laughter met his further assertion of the idea that men who derive revenue through real estate or rents from the restricted district should have their names recorded in a book open to public inspection. "They are beyond contradiction partners with harlots," said the pastor. One point he sternly emphasized. That was the craven plea that the redlight district serves to "protect the wives and daughters of respectable citizens." That it is the duty of husband and father to protect his women-folk, and that only the meanest kind of cowards would screen their wives and daughters behind the skirts of fallen girls was the pastor's sturdy argument. The Mayor and members of the City Council were present at the meeting, with many representative citizens, and the general impression exists that Rev. F. W. Kerr made a stout stand in straightforward manner for his convictions on the sad old subject that has baffled generations of legislators.

GOLD DISCOVERY IS A FIZZLE

No Colors in the Gravels of Cochrane Declare the Mining Experts—Stampede Now Undergoing Great Hardships. (Special to Daily News.) MONTENEGRIN FORGERY CASE

Nick Rocovich Before Magistrate McMullin Today Charged with Forging Name Illegally Transferring Lots.

Nick Rocovich, accused of forging the name of Nick Martinovich to a document transferring two lots was before Magistrate McMullin today. W. E. Williams appeared in his defense. There was a large throng of Montenegrins present. The case, owing to the need for tedious interpretation, looked like being a protracted one at noon. The defense is that accused was instructed to sell the lots by complainant while Martinovich was in Europe.

ZARELLI CASE IS ADJOURNED

Two Witnesses Examined This Morning—Defense Is on Usual Lines of Foreigners' Liquor "Clubs."

This morning the Zarelli blind pig case came up, but was adjourned after two witnesses had given evidence in order that the Rocovich alleged forgery case might proceed. In the Zarelli case Mat Viedick of the Crown Bottling Works said that he had delivered liquor to Zarelli's place, but a good deal of it had been paid for by other parties than Zarelli. The clerk at Maynard's 1-2-3 bottle store testified that \$216 worth of liquor had been delivered and that most of this had been paid for by Zarelli himself. Case proceeds tomorrow.

KINDLY CURACOA WAITED TWICE

Laglasts Northbound All but Lost Their Steamer, but, Thanks to J. H. Rogers and an Obliging Skipper, They Caught Her.

Not once only but actually twice yesterday the good ship Curacoa pulled up when actually started on her northbound trip to accommodate passengers who had all but lost their passage. Two separate special launch trips were made out to the waiting steamship in harbor. It was thanks to the stentorian services of Steamer Agent J. H. Rogers with a megaphone that the second party of laglasts got their chance. The first party arrived just when the boat was pulling out. She waited on the request of Mr. Rogers, and they got a launch and reached her. Off she started again, and was passing the Foley-Welch dock when another party of passengers dashed onto the wharf. Mr. Rogers hardly thought he could do it, but with a huge megaphone he used his lungs to such good purpose and with such good authority that the Curacoa waited again and a second launch to the party out.

NO CHANGE IN MINERS' STRIKE

Million Colliers Out and Quarter Million Other Trades—Railways Short of Fuel Hundreds of Steamers Held.

(Special to Daily News.) London, March 4.—With over a million miners out and a quarter of a million of other trades idle, there was little change in the coal strike today. The railways are feeling the shortage already and the competition has ended in one line running but one train and exchanging tickets to the north. Hundreds of steamers are held in the docks. The feeling between the men and owners is good and there are little prospects of disorders.

SUFFRAGETTES RUN AMUCK

Smashed Store Windows in Knights Bridge and Brompton Yesterday—Thirty Arrested—Attempt to Burn Post Office.

(Special to Daily News.) London, March 4.—Bands of suffragettes again ran riot yesterday and at Knights Bridge and at Brompton the store windows suffered. The women were armed with hammers and smashed \$15,000 worth of plate glass. Thirty were arrested. KEY OF SUPERB NEW CHURCH HANDED OVER TO DR. CHOWN

Dedication Services of Methodists' Handsome Place of Worship Took Place Sunday Morning—Great Joint Gathering at Evening Services.

With solemn thrill the notes of the fine organ in the new Methodist Church accompanied the sacred service of dedication held in the morning. Rev. Dr. Chown preached the dedication sermon on the theme of "Holiness of Place and of People." Rev. Charles Sing, pastor of the Methodist Church of Prince Rupert, to whose energy the successful opening yesterday of the new church building is largely due, took part in the service, as also did Rev. C. H. Raley. Most interesting was the ceremony of handing over the key of the new church. Mr. Peter McLachlan handed over the key to Rev. Dr. Chown, who accepted it on behalf of the Methodist Church of Canada. Beside Mr. McLachlan stood O. H. Nelson, William Manson, A. Allison and Mr. Derry, all office bearers of the church, taking part in the ceremony. With prayer the dedication was completed. In the afternoon Sunday school rooms were opened with short addresses by Rev. F. W. Kerr, Rev. G. S. Reddick and others, and in the evening a great mass gathering of members of the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist churches assembled in the new building to hear Dr. Chown preach, the sister churches having graciously given up their evening services to share in the Methodists' rejoicing. Further celebrations are to take place during this week and next Sabbath.

RING STALWARTS COPPER YOUNG PROGRESSIVES' ACE

Going to be a lively campaign—two conservative conventions are advertised—Manson now likely to be with the "also rans."

The old line ring Conservatives have put out a despairing effort to offset the energetic politics of the young Progressives and in the language of one of the leaders, forceful and picturesque but not polite, they have "coppered the game" of the men of progress by announcing a Conservative convention on the 9th inst. It will be remembered that the Progressives opened the ball in this campaign by announcing a convention for the 11th, which is next Monday week, while the convention of the mossbacks is called for the Saturday previous. Leaders of the Progressives who were seen this morning do not appear to be at all alarmed about this move, claiming that they are assured of a full convention of real Progressives from every part of the district, and that many of those who come to attend the Stalwart convention will stay for that of the Progressives. Of course the Mossbacks have Manson for their candidate. They have to. They have no voice in the matter at all. But the Progressives have the chance of selecting a candidate of their own and they are going to do so. Not blindly, however, or with any of the impetuosity of youth. They are desirous of showing the enemy they know the game of politics pretty well already. So they are going to give the nomination to the man who tried to sell them out to the sleuth sent here by McBride to straighten out in the split in the Conservative party. Ritchie, it is now explained, acted under a mistaken impression. He is persona grata with the Two Man government and he is also personally popular in the Skeena district. It is therefore held that he would prove a successful candidate. But other candidates will no doubt be presented in the full convention and the proceedings are bound to be interesting, while those of the Mossback convention, from the very nature of things, must be cut and dried, every man there acting as a mere galley slave under the lash.

PEKIN MUTINY

Estimated That Three Thousand Persons Have Been Killed. (Special to Daily News.) Peking, March 4.—According to Yuan Shi Kai, three thousand persons have been slain since the present mutiny started. The city is quieter today, but heavy artillery firing is going on south of the city. The railway line to Tien Tsin is again opened. Foreign troops have arrived in large numbers, and the safety of the foreigners is assured.

BOURASSA WILL PROBABLY VISIT RUPERT.

We announced a few days ago that Mr. Bourassa is going for an extended tour of some three months' duration through the west to explain his policy, as he conceives it to be misunderstood. Fortunately the trip is not to be made until after the Quebec elections (a somewhat indefinite date), for in this way his western explanations cannot be used against him in the east. In the long interval he will perhaps find time to find out what his policy is since the Conservatives have come into power. His explanatory articles in the "Devoir" but exhibit his inability or unwillingness to adopt a clearly defined position. He writes like a man in a quandary.

The announcement that he is to take Mr. Armand Lavergne with him is also amusing, for has not Mr. Lavergne said that he personally favored Mr. Graham for South Renfrew, but not politically; but "the time had not come yet to fight the Borden government"? The attitude of these men before the election was clear enough. They were, according to their words, against the navy, against corruption, but above all, "Down with Laurier."

Now that they have vanquished Sir Wilfrid Laurier they are supporting, if not abetting, political dismissals and appointments, and even practically supporting a government that has not yet repudiated the Laurier navy. No doubt one of Mr. Bourassa's disciples, Mr. Sevigny, has introduced a motion which will not come up this session, for the repeal of the Navy Act, as, indeed, after such a campaign of "Point de Marine, had to be done, and we may presume that there is within doors a good deal of discussion and planning, and possibly "fighting like blazes," over the need of satisfying both ends of the country; but it is wonderful how politicians in power can get together. Meantime the bold buccaner who made the trouble seems, in his minute-gun articles in the "Devoir," to be whistling languidly for a breeze to find which way to trim his sails.

The new city hall is beginning to take on architectural features that are surprisingly charming. They are awakening among the citizens a dormant civic pride. But mingled with this eminently proper pride there is a strong dose of doubt that the building is going to cost fifteen cents or two bits more than the original estimate. There is the devil of it. No doubt the Mayor will have his instructions to keep the real cost a deep, dark-blue secret until the provincial elections are over.

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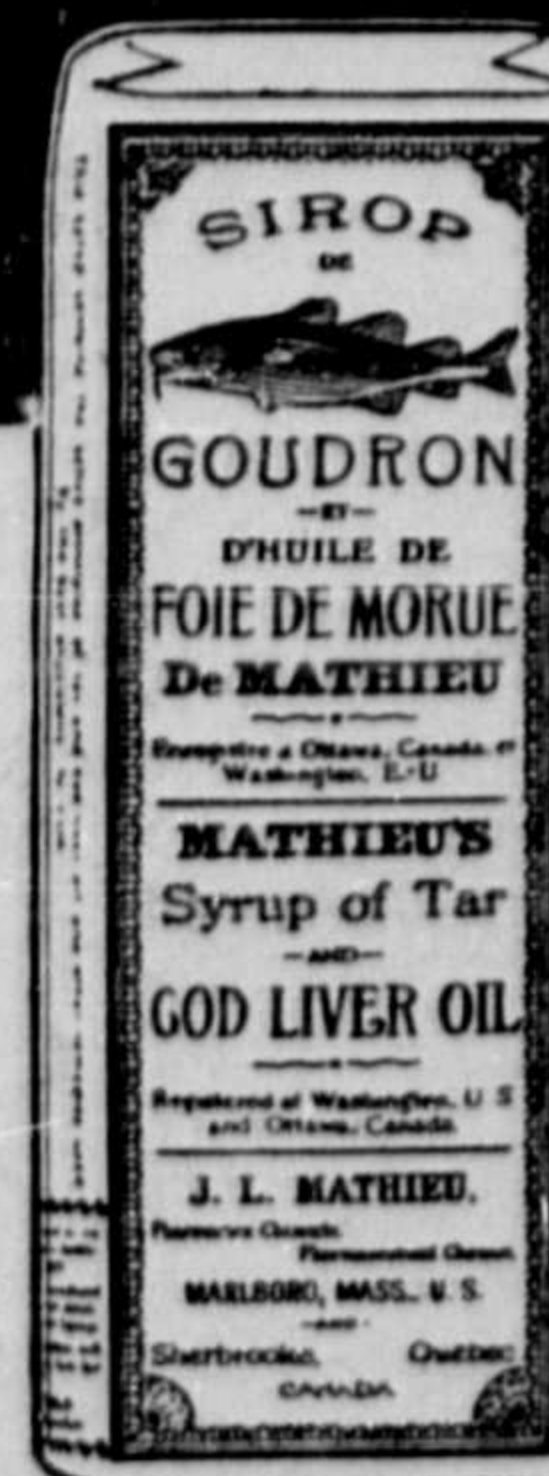

CONFESSES TO GOLD STEAL

Convict in Oregon Penitentiary Tells of Being Implicated in Humboldt Bullion Robbery Between Rupert and Seattle.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 29.—Governor Oswald West has announced that he has obtained a full confession from one of the men implicated in the robbery of the steamer Humboldt, from which in September, 1910, was stolen \$57,500 worth of gold bullion.

Twenty-five pounds of this has been recovered, and was brought to Salem and placed in the hands of the Governor, who turned it over to Steve Connell, a United States secret service operative. With Connell was an agent of the Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, which carried the loss on the bullion.

West refused to say from whom the confession was secured, but intimated that if it were stated which one of the prisoners in the penitentiary had given the confession this statement would not be contradicted. West said that there were six men implicated in the robbery, and that the other five were known. He said arrests would follow soon.

HOME RULE FOR SCOTLAND NOW

Tremendous Meeting in Trafalgar Square Endorses Latest Development of the Home Rule Agitation—Great Speakers.

Home rule for Scotland and Wales, in addition to Ireland, was demanded at a tremendous Liberal meeting held in Trafalgar Square, London. So vast was the crowd that it was necessary for speakers to make addresses from seven different platforms in order that all might hear.

Preceding the meeting an enormous parade was held. Among the orators was Sir Edward Grey, minister of foreign affairs, whose removal from office is being sought by the critics of his policy. He defended his conduct of office, vigorously declaring that it was necessary for Great Britain to maintain naval supremacy against any combination of rival powers.

Col. Arthur Lynch said: "If home rule is accomplished, we stand to make friends with thousands of men who have helped to make the United States of America what it is. If England and America stood together the combination would be invincible."

W. G. Gladstone and other members of parliament spoke. The meeting was most enthusiastic. Bands played Irish music and green flags were carried by hundreds of marchers.

OFF FOR STICKINE

May Be Bound for Headwaters of the Liard River.

A party headed by R. J. Quinn left on Monday headed for the headwaters of the Naas and Stickine rivers, via the Bear River divide, taking with them dog teams and six months' supplies of provisions. They will prospect for mineral and coal and thoroughly explore the hinterland to the northeast. Charles Knipple and John O'Malley were the other members of the party.—Portland Canal Miner.

SPIRITUALISM FACES SCIENCE

Searching Test of Table Turning Feat to Be Made in Paris Under Strictly Scientific Conditions—Carriera to Be Used.

A well known Parisian spiritualist, M. Fernand Girod, has offered to show six sceptical scientists how he can raise tables without any physical or material aid, and the challenge has been accepted.

M. Girod makes his offer in order to overcome the philosophic doubts of Dr. Albert Charpentier, who stipulates that the experiments shall be given in a doctor's laboratory, with doors and windows sealed, and under as strong a light as possible. Cameras are to be placed opposite the table in order to record the success of the experiment in a manner beyond dispute.

Dr. Charpentier also asks whether M. Girod would agree that his medium should undertake to change the equilibrium of a pair of scales placed underneath a glass cover with an electric register attached to the pointer on the adjustment.

M. Girod's acceptance of these conditions has raised the greatest expectations. Through his medium, Mme. Demange, he promises to raise a small round table under the conditions fixed by Dr. Charpentier, subject to some apparently unimportant alterations.

Cheap Money for Settlers.

Penticton, B. C., Feb. 29.—The Associated Boards of Trade for the Okanagan valley have passed a strong resolution in favor of the government organizing a loan department, and lending money to actual settlers at low rates of interest. President Bennett of the Penticton board explained that this system had worked out splendidly in New Zealand, where he had formerly resided.

NEW POWER UNIT TEST TODAY

(Continued from Page 1.)

trouble. Up to 140 kilowatts the test was carried with perfect success. Then at one swoop the whole load was jumped off the plant to test the governors. Several times this exacting test was put on the No. 2 unit quite satisfactorily. By 4:15 p. m. the test was concluded, and the steam shut off. No. 2 unit's activity was ended, and the deadly water barrel relieved of its tremendous struggle to resist the rush of current generated became innocent as a bathtub.

Test No. 1 Today.
 Today the test of No. 1 unit, also erected and ready, is being carried on, and citizens awaiting electric light will be glad to know that only the switchboard is now required before the supply of city electricity can be more than tripled. The switchboard has been on order for many weeks and is expected on any boat. It will be erected in about a fortnight after its landing at the wharf.

Arc Lights About Ready.
 Citizens are not yet aware that the whole of the arc light circuit is practically complete and that only the pole brackets are required to enable the new style of street lighting to be used. The brackets are held up somewhere in the east, probably owing to snow blocked freight traffic.
 All being well in about a fortnight after the final test to be made when the new switchboard arrives, it will be possible to serve the city with a day load from the plant—that is, to give current for power users. This has been recommended to the committee by Mr. James Matthews, the light plant superintendent, who, by the way, is an A. M. I. Mech. E. and gold medalist in electrical engineering of the Walker College, Liverpool.
Good Work Was Done.
 Very little has been said regarding the erection of the new double set of units, but the task has been no easy one. The mere mention of the fact that it was necessary to blast rock right inside the power house amidst all the delicate machinery to install the new units is enough in itself to prove that.
 Yet, as a matter of fact, the time occupied in actual erection of the new machinery from the day the materials arrived until the day steam was turned on is exactly eleven working days. Further time was simply lost through non-arrival of material

required, a frequent drawback at present in Rupert.
350 Kilowatts Available.
 There are now practically three distinct units at the power house, the old original belt drive engine and dynamo and the two new direct coupled units. Each unit is calculated to produce 100 kilowatts, 300 in all, but Mr. Matthews calculates on a possible overload of 25 kilowatts on each of the new units. Assuming that the old engine is used only for street lighting, the city will have outside of street lighting a clear supply of current up to approximately 250 kilowatts. This will be ample for the city's needs.
Points to Note.
 Current for power purposes which will be supplied where commercially profitable for the city—not in out of the way places—is to be 220 volt alternating 3-phase. For tiny motors the lighting circuit may be used. This is 110 volt alternating single phase. This difference is important in ordering power motors.
 It may be mentioned that Mr. Ross of Seattle suggested "scrapping" the present belt drive unit, but Mr. Matthews purposes using it for street lighting, thus making another 100 kilowatts available from the new units for commercial purposes.
