### War At Sea Continues To Exact Heavy Toll On World's Shipping

Over One Hundred Lives Lost During Past Week-British Vessels Bear Brunt-Nazis Also Suffer Losses

## EDITORIALS

FINANCING CHINA

While the Russians live on starvation wages, the government of that country is able to grant credits to China to help them in their struggle against Japan. Russia granted a quarter of a billion dollars or its equivalent, largely because a section of the Chinese forces declared themselves to be Communists. This credit is not an old one. The sum of \$150,000,000 was secured recently when Dr. Sun Fo paid a visit to Moscow and negotiated the deal.

So we find Dictator Stalin, with his usual Oriental cunning, negotiating with Japan and at the same time leaning money to China to carry on the war.

Great Britain granted a credit to China some months ago to the value of something like twenty million dollars.

The Soviet is playing a waiting game in the Orient much as Great Britain and France are playing the waiting! game in western Europe. When Japan is exhausted and China stronger Russia will become the predominating influence in the far East. With her steady push to the west she seems to be making a bid for world control.

#### THE LION HAS WINGS

"Suppression of information that would make excellent propaganda has been one of the chief complaints leveled by many newspapers and parliamentarians against the policies pursued by the British Ministry of Information," says the Victoria Times. 'While these have resulted. in a complete overhauling of the organization, including the removal of one-third of the original staff, the voice of protest has not died down. There is, nevertheless, the prospect that this phase of Britain's task, like others, will gradually be fitted to the requirements of the general situation.

"No intelligent person, of course, would ask for verbal or pictorial matter if its publication would be of the slightest use to the enemy. The public merely demands that prudence and common sense shall be exercised with due regard for the vast implications of the Empire's effort-how it shall be effectively serviced in its practical essentials and what part human psychology shall be permitted to play. It is this latter aspect which has increased in importance as the war has progressed along its unpredictable and wholly perplexing lines.

"British peoples are not afraid of the truth, be it good o" bad and it is for that reason they resent the suppression of hard fact-especially when much that is true could he published with useful and heartening results. 'The Lion Has Wings' is arresting evidence of what Great Britain is doing with her air arm. It is not only a pictorial film triumph in itself; it is comforting. It should be seen by


