The berries were brought in from the United States and were subject to freight and duty. Now that the British Columbia crop is available they are sold at a reasonable price. People have to pay high prices for out of season goods and that makes the cost of living high. If they were content, as our fathers were, to wait for the proper season, the cost would not be high.


