German Warship Squadron At Sea

Admiral Spee Readies For Sea Naval Vessels of Enemy Are Sighted Off Jutland Not Far From Scene of Reported Fight

German Warship Not To Remain In Port It Is Now Apparent

German Government Asks for Time to Make Repairs While Great Britain Demands This Not Be Granted

MONTEVIDEO, December 15: (CP)—Refuelling of the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee began here today amid growing expectation that she would put out to sea in spite of the increased British guard outside the harbor.

The Uruguayan government received a request from the German government that permission be given the pocket battleship to remain in port for sufficient time to make repairs to extensive damage sustained from the battle with British cruisers but Great Britain demanded that international law be complied with and she be compelled to leave.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 15:—The 2889-ton German steamer Adolf Leonhardt was scuttled and sunk by her crew to avoid capture by British warships which intercepted her, it was unofficially announced.

LONDON, Dec. 15: (CP)—Spirits of British people were greatly buoyed up yesterday by the favorable news of the war at sea including the putting of the pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee out of commission in the Battle of Uruguay and the exploit of a submarine in entering a German naval base and sinking a German submarine and cruiser.

PUCK RACE CLOSE ONE

Toronto and Boston Still Tied For First Place With Canadiens Close Behind

TORONTO, Dec. 15: (CP)—Playing here last night, Toronto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins were unable to break a one-all overtime draw and the teams are still tied in the standing for first place.

Today the mass funeral took place here of thirty-eight German officers and sailors who lost their lives on the Spee in the battle.

Captains of six merchant ships and crew members totalling upwards of sixty have been released from the Spee. They had been captured at sea and held prisoners on board after their vessels had been sunk.

Can She Stay?

It had been reported earlier in the day that permission had been granted by the Uruguayan government for the Spee to remain in port as long as required to mend her damage but there seems to be some doubt as to the authenticity of this announcement.

Others say the government has not made up its mind.

FINNS ON RETREAT

Fall Back From Arctic Coast Leaving Communities In Flames—Halt Russian Invasion On Karelian Isthmus

KIRKENES, Norway, Dec. 15: (CP)—Russian troops were reported to have captured flaming Salmijaervi last night as Finnish forces retreated southward except for a rearguard detachment left to explode dynamite charges in valuable Canadian-owned nickel mines.

In Moscow Red Army heads state that a fifty-seven mile spearhead has been driven into central Finland one-third of the way across to the Gulf of Bothnia in the attempt to cut Finland in two.

In the Karelian Isthmus, meanwhile, military observers reported the Finns in position to organize counter-attacks after bringing the Red invasion to a standstill.

The Finns said the Russians had suffered great losses in casualties and fighting equipment including tanks.

Several battalions of fierce-fighting Finns cling to positions on the Karelian front in spite of the desperate attack of the Russians to break their lines with withering fire which was blackening the snow and razing the forest.

On the north, the Russians were advancing rapidly along the Arctic coast.

MAKES SAFE FROM AIR

One Hundred Million Dollar Program Is Under Consideration By United States

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 15:—A \$100,000,000 program to make the United States invulnerable to air attack is under consideration.

DEBTS ARE DUE TODAY

Finland and Hungary Only Nations to Make Payments—Some Enormous Figures

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 15:—Only two small debt installment payments to the United States were made today on the due date, totaling \$244,521.

Finland, which has never missed, made its payment of \$234,693 and Hungary paid \$9,828 on account.

Other nations sent the usual notes, regretting inability to pay.

In all fifteen European nations owe \$14,604,916,104.56 to the United States—Great Britain, \$5,574,430,793; France \$4,200,332,646, and Italy, \$2,025,525,996 with smaller amounts down the list.

Today's installments totalled \$161,000,000 in round figures on which \$122,000,000 was due from Great Britain and \$22,000,000 from France.

Finland's payment today was diverted to a special fund to make hospital and medical supplies available in connection with the war against Russia.

TRAINING FOR AIR

New Agreement Is Signed Between Australia and Great Britain To Increase Commonwealth's War Effort

SYDNEY, Australia, Dec. 15: (CP)—Prime Minister Menzies announces signature of an agreement between Great Britain and Australia on an Empire air training plan.

Premier Menzies said the plan will result in the training of ten thousand pilots, fifteen thousand observers, radio operators and gunners at a cost of £50,000,000 spread over the next three years.

Several thousand Australians will go to Canada but most of them will complete their training in the Commonwealth.

Great Britain will pay half the cost of the engines for the machines which are to be built and also the machines for the preliminary training of the men are to be provided by Great Britain.

GIVE HELP TO FINLAND

France and Great Britain Tell League, However, That War With Germany Is First Consideration

GENEVA, Dec. 15: (CP)—Joseph Paul-Boncour, French delegate, declared at the Assembly of the League of Nations yesterday that France would give Finland all possible aid in defending itself against the Russian invasion but recalled that aggressions which preceded this one "made it possible."

The British delegate, R. A. Butler, spoke in similar vein, emphasizing that nothing was as important to the Allies as the war with Germany.

Vancouver's First White Woman Dies

VANCOUVER, Dec. 15: (CP)—Mrs. Ruth Morton, credited with having been the first white woman to reside on the site of the city of Vancouver, died yesterday at the age of ninety-one. She arrived here in 1868.

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VICTORY FOR BOTH

The naval battle off the coast of South America evidently was a victory for both sides. The Germans claim victory because they crippled the Exeter and scored a number of hits on the Ajax and Achilles. The British are jubilant because they have put out of action, chased to a neutral port and bottled up a vessel much more heavily armed than their own ships and one that has already been responsible for the loss of nine merchant ships.

SPORTSMANSHIP

To show that there is no hatred for the German people the commander of the British cruiser Exeter applied for permission to land one hundred men to pay their respects at the funeral to the brave foemen who were killed on the Graf Spee. This is along the same line as when the football teams cheer each other at the close of the game. It is a matter of sportsmanship. Those who have read of the fighting which took place in the time of the Norman invasion of England will remember that tribute was always paid to the memory of a brave foe, one who has won the respect of all by his prowess.

C.C.F. LOSSES

The defeat of the C.C.F. candidates in Vancouver this week was undoubtedly due to the disloyal statements made by their leaders in the Legislature recently. Many who supported the party because of their opposition ability refused to follow them into disloyalty to the British Crown. It was a salutary lesson.

AIM OF UNION WORKERS

The workers of Canada are naturally interested in the purpose of the war, and concur fully in the attempt to overthrow Hitlerism and all it stands for, says President A. R. Mosher of the All-Canadian Congress of Labor. They believe in freedom and democracy and realize fully that there is more than this to be done," says Mr. Mosher. world-domination had to be met. They have already assured the Canadian government of their whole-hearted support and of their desire to maintain industrial harmony in order that there will be no interference with the productivity of the nation or with the mobilization of resources. The workers will play their part as loyal citizens and will expect others to do the same. "But it seems to me that there is more than this to be done," says Mr. Mosher. "The workers should formulate their own war-aims; they should give thought and study now to what kind of a world they want after the war, and strive to put themselves in a position where they will be able to use their influence with that end in view."

NATURE FAVORS FINLAND

The Finns in their struggle for liberty against the barbarian giant are finding the elements with them. It is a hard country, a wild and forbidding country, at this time of year and every day sees it becoming wilder and more forbidding. The lakes are frozen and snow is covering everything. Very soon the weather will be worse and it will be most difficult for the Russians to advance. It is suggested that, by another week, the travelling will be so difficult that the invasion may have to be abandoned until spring.

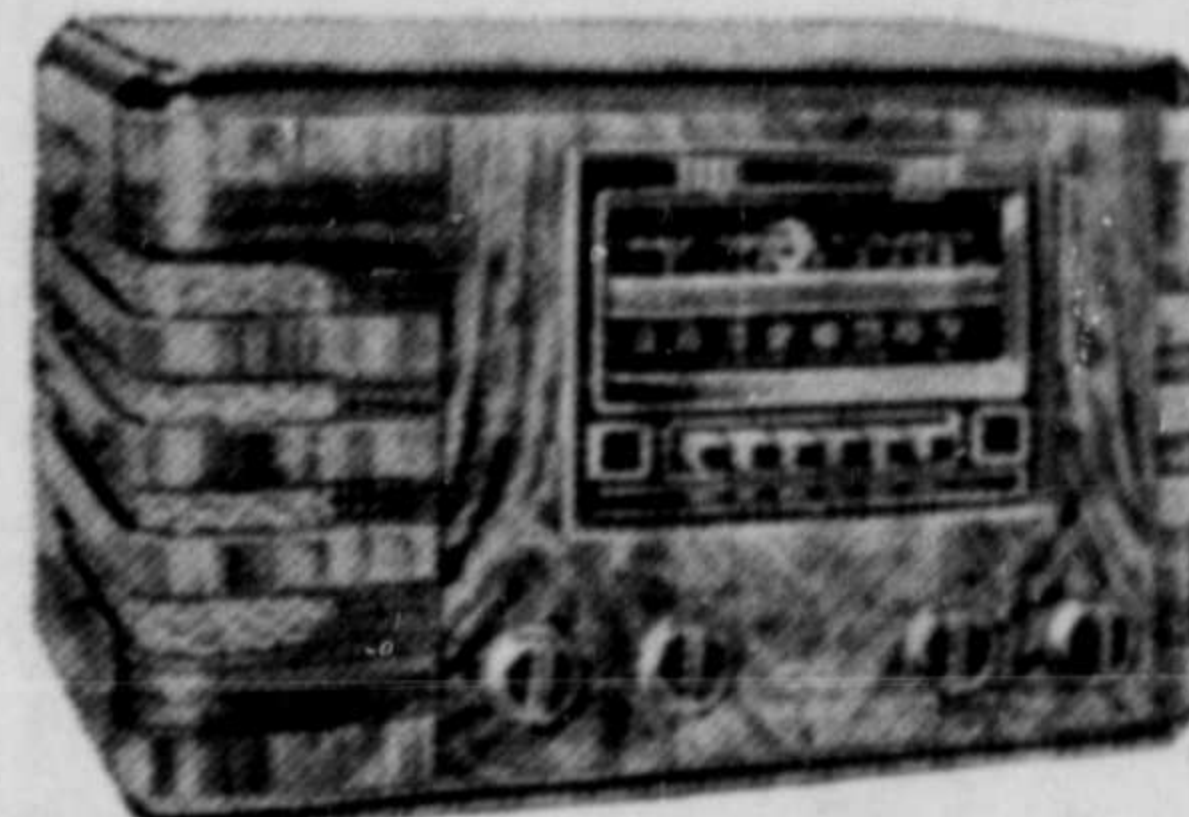

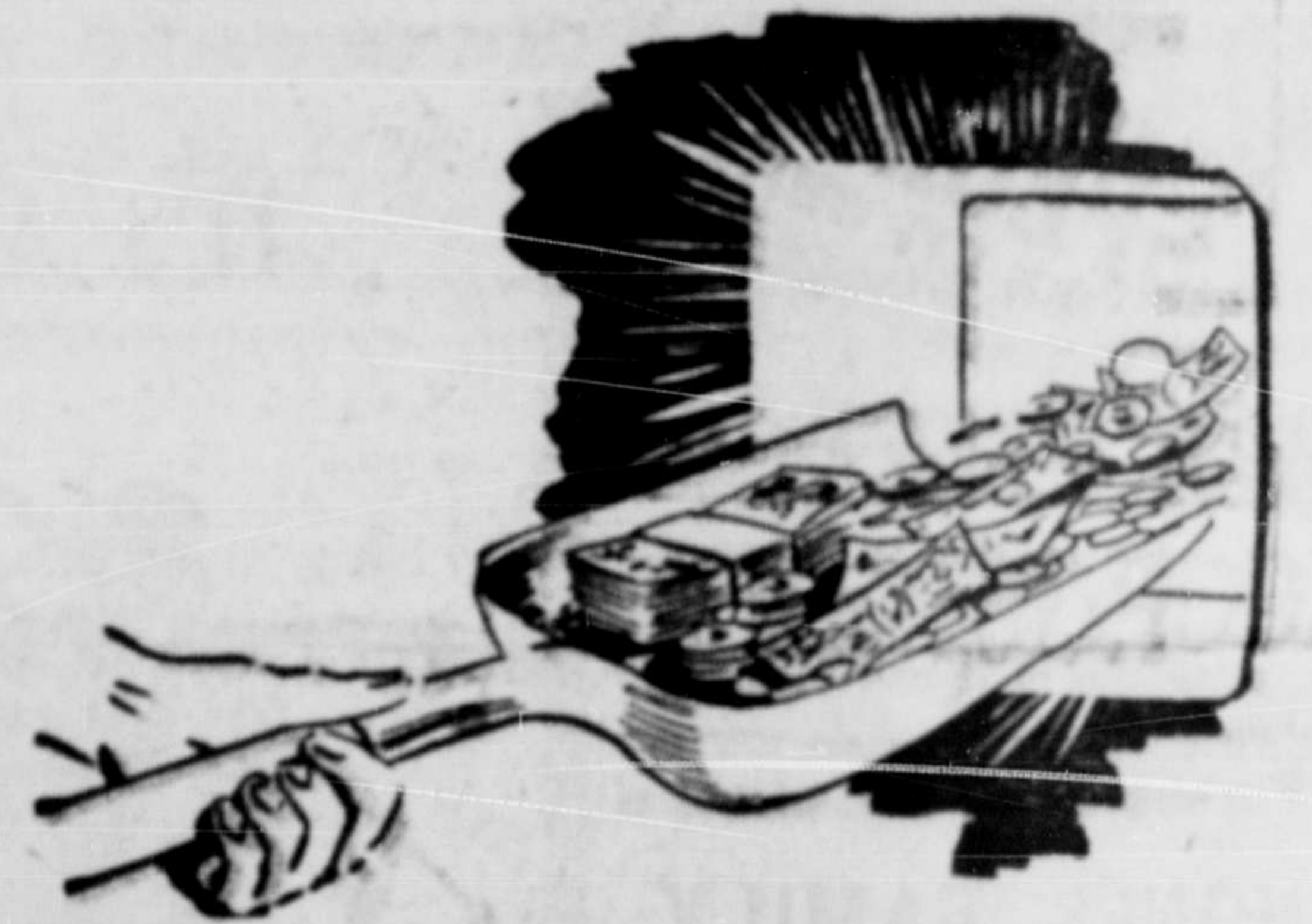

TELLS OF AMUNDSEN

Pastor of Lutheran Church Gives Interesting Description of Trip To South Pole

A particularly interesting account of the life of Roald Amundsen, the Arctic and Antarctic explorer, was given at the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Rev. J. H. Myrwang, pastor of the St. Paul's Lutheran Church, in which the speaker spoke of early education and early voyages of discovery by this intrepid mariner. The account of the discovery of the South Pole Mr. Myrwang was got from Amundsen himself. It was told yesterday as follows:

"Having satisfied himself that the North Polar regions had nothing of paramount importance to offer at this time, Amundsen set sail for the south in 1910. I have heard the story of this memorable expedition from his own lips and I found it a story as barren of oratory as the regions he visited were of flora but abounding in action and heroic achievement. Sailing southeast from the Cape of Good Hope, he passed through the

roaring forties, the foggy fifties and the icy sixties and tied up at the ice barrier at Whale Bay, southeast of Australia. He had chosen this bay as his base for many good reasons but especially because no other expedition would be likely to interfere with his work at this place. English explorers had established themselves several hundred miles farther west and Shackleton had penetrated into the Antarctic continent up to 88 degrees and 23 minutes south latitude. At this point, however, he was compelled to return.

At Whale Bay

"Amundsen made good use of his time at Whale Bay. He headed an expedition to explore the country to the south and build depots and markers along the route to be followed later so as to have provisions in readiness when needed. This was done before winter set in and, when the long night finally settled down on them, they were snugly hidden away in their vessel or in rooms which they had cut out of the ice barrier to serve as winter quarters.

"The distance to the Pole was 700 miles. As soon as the sun returned in 1911, Amundsen and his men were up and doing. The dog teams were trained to the highest point of efficiency. Supplies consisting mainly of tents, clothing and crackers and pemican were loaded on the sledges and the dangers and difficulties of the stormy and rough country through which they must make the hazardous journey to the Pole and back to their base were weighed and considered with the greatest care.

"The first leg of the journey, covering about 367 miles, was made over the comparatively low and level ice fields of the northern part of the Antarctic continent.

At the end of this part of their journey they faced a mountain barrier several thousand feet high and bristling with terrors.

"Four days of continuous labor were consumed in scaling this formidable barrier and it was necessary to rest for some time on the edge of the plateau before proceeding farther south. The plateau was found to be 10,000 feet above sea level and the temperature was correspondingly low. Frequent storms, some of them of incredible violence, swept the plateau and tried the endurance of the explorers to the utmost. The cold wind cut their faces until bleeding sores were formed that did not heal for months. The expedition pushed on, however, establishing depots and building markers in a systematic manner and progress was made in spite of every obstacle.

"When they reached 88 and 23 minutes, which was the southernmost latitude reached by Shackleton, they paused to honor this brave man. From there on they knew that the foot of man had never disturbed the snows of the polar region. As they neared their destination the weather improved greatly and travel became easier. Having but little confidence in the weather, however, they put up markers and built monuments of snow, leaving supplies of food so as to make sure of their return.

At The Pole

"December 14, 1911, found Roald Amundsen and his four companions at the South Pole. A silk tent was pitched there and a flag of silk was waving triumphantly at the pole as they left it three days later. Amundsen placed a written record of the expedition in the tent and his record was read some time later by the ill-fated Englishman Scott who failed to return to his base. He and his

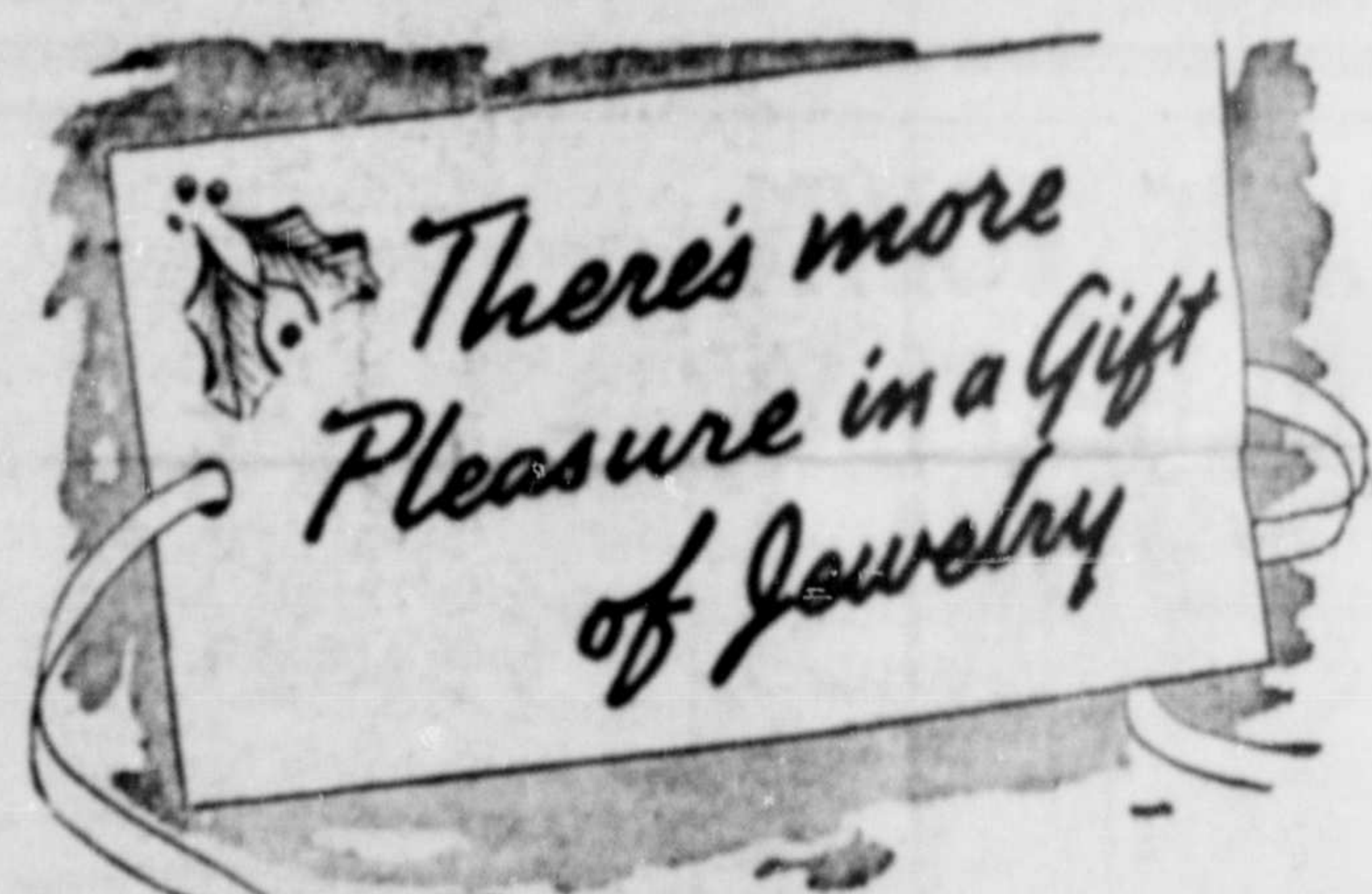
