One of the reliable halibut and Cameron headed past, Morgan Teams: vessel owners states that the average catch of the industry saved on the line from Cameron. this year so far has netted \$500 per man and that, if they are lucky, there is a possibility of making another hundred dollars before July 29. This does not give the men! enough to live on much longer than during the fishing season and, as there is little other employment to be found in the district, they feel themselves badly handicapped.

Under somewhat similar circumstances the wheat growers of the prairies, also dependant on one crop a year, appeald to the government for a bonus in the form of a guaranteed price and got it. The fishermen here are not any better off than the wheat growers on the prairies. Some of them have moved to Vancouver in the hope of getting more winter employment than they could get in Prince Rupert. We have not yet heard if they have bettered their condition. It seems that some of them are worse off than before. At any rate the condition is ser-1 ious and is worthy of the careful consideration of those who take an interest in the future welfare of Prince Ru-

Many of the fishermen blame the halibut commission! for the position in which they are placed. In opposition to this it has been pointed out that, had there been no halibut commission, there would have been no halibut to catch by now. The fishing banks would have been depleted. Yet it is the present situation we have to face and try to make the most of it as it is, not as it might have been. If the regulations can be changed in such a way as to improve the condition of the Prince Rupert and Alaska fishermen. an effort should be made to secure those changes. It would be most unwise for us to sit idly by and allow the business to disappear so far as this city is concerned.

It has been suggested that the Canadian fishing boats might be bonussed to the extent of one cent a pound, the handicap they suffer at present in competition with American boats.
