### Britain Stands Offensive Of Extreme Violence Under Way Along Full Frontier; By Obligations Four Cities Under Air Attack Unless Germany Withdraws Immediately From

Poland, Ambassador Will Be Withdrawn-Hitler's "Senseless Ambition"

LONDON, September 1: (CP) - Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain read to an emergency session of Parliament at 5 o'clock this evening a note sent to Berlin warning that, unless Germany suspends aggressive action and withdraws from Poland, Great Britain will unhestitatingly fulfil its obligations to Poland. If the reply to this last warning is not favorable, the British ambassador to Berlin will be instructed to ask for his passports. The Prime Minister said that he did not suggest that the German reply "is likely to be anything else than unfavorable." He added: "The time has come for action."

Mr. Chamberlain placed the responsibility "for this terrible catastrophe" on Hitler. "Mussolini has been doing his best," Chamberlain added. He said that "Hitler has not hesitated to plunge the world into misery in order to serve his own senseless ambitions."

Then the Prinme Minister continued: "No man can say that the government could have done more to try and keep open the way for an honorable and equitable 4 Rome and Berlin. settlement of the dispute between Germany and Poland. . \* Had there been the least desire on the part of the German government, the crisis could have been averted."

The Polish ambassador had earlier notified the Foreign Secretary, Lord Halifax, that Poland invoked the provisions of the British-Polish mutual assistance treaty on the grounds of German aggression.

Chamberlain announced that a bill would be introduced making military service ages between 18 and 41.

Even before the session of Parliament, the King signed an order-in-council for the complete mobilization of the navy, army and air force. Complete black-out throughout the country was ordered for tonight. Complete application of air raid warnings have also been ordered. Censorship has been imposed on postal correspondence directed to "certain foreign countries." First aid stations have been brought up to full strength. Distribution of gas masks is being made complete. Evacuation of children, mothers, invalids to the countryside is being rushed to completion. One million youngsters left London yesterday, many of them leaving their parents behind. Despite the gravity of the situation, the people remain cheerful.

All newspapers today emphasized the British obligation to Poland. Attention was drawn to the speed of Hitler's move. The suggestion was made that the publication of his sixteen demands and the statement that Poland had rejected them was an attempt to place Poland in the wrong light at the eleventh hour.

+ FRONTIER VIOLATED AT MANY POINTS AS DER FUEHRER STRIKES, PRECIPI-TATING WHAT SEEMS INEVITABLE MAJOR CONFLICT

DOES NOT DECLARE WAR BUT ORDERS ARMY TO MEET FORCE IN SUDDEN MOVE— BRITAIN AND FRANCE OBLIGED TO ACT

Germany and Poland are at war and Great Britain and France will undoubtedly be drawn into the vortex of conflict with little delay. Hostilities commenced early today with Germany's invasion of Poland at several points. Air raids of the Polish capital, Warsaw, Cracow and other cities were early reported. There has also been artillery attack.

There was no formal declaration of war by Germany. Adolf Hitler, Fuehrer of the Reich, ordered the German army to meet force with force. His order of the day to the Army read: "The Polish state has rejected my efforts to establish neighborly relations and, instead, has appealed to weapons. Germans in Poland are victims of a bloody terror, driven from house to house. A series of border violations unbearable for a great power show that the Poles no longer are willing to respect the German border. To put an end to these insane incidents nothing remains for me but to meet force with force from now on. The German army will conduct a fight for honor and the right to the life of the resurrected German

people with firm determination. I expect that every soldier, mindful of the great traditions of the eternal German military, will do his duty to the last. Remember always you are members of the National Socialist Party. Long live our people! Long live the Reich!"

A blockade of the Polish harbor of Gdvnia soon followed Hitler's orders to the Army and, after a brief period of fighting in Danzig, the Free Port was declared a part of the German Reich by Albert Forster. Almost immediately Hitler gave his legal approval to the decree. The constitution of Danzig under the Treaty of Versailles was declared dissolved as far as Germany was concerned and Forster was named head of the civic government. Hitler thanked Danzig for its loyalty.

Next developments were air raids on Cracow and other Polish cities. Later in the morning there was an air raid on a railway station eight miles from Warsaw.

Hitler, in a momentous Reichstag gathering, declared that he would achieve the return of Danzig and the Polish Corridor and halt Polish attacks on Germans or die fighting. "I am putting on a uniform and shall take it off only in victory or

Hitler has dwelt on numerous occasions of late with the possibility of his own death and he mentioned it again in the Reichstag speech. If he should meet death he mentioned Field Marshal Herman Goering as his successor. If anything happened to Goering Rudolf Hess, Hitler's deputy, would take over. If anything happened to all three, then the Senate would select a worthy leader.

Der Fuehrer spoke throughout as if war was already under way but he did not officially declare

Hitler went on to refer to recent proposals to settle the dispute with Poland by what he claimed was a moderate formula. The Poles had rejected this and he had answered with mobilization. His love of peace and his patience had been exhausted.

He had last night informed Great Britain, Hitler said, that negotiations were broken off and he had decided to talk as Poland talks - "with

Hitler said that he wanted nothing from the western powers (Great Britain and France) and "we have formally declared we have no claims against them. We do not want to wage war on women and children" he said but added, if an "enemy" dared wage "another" war of that sort he would answer "bomb for bomb, gas for gas."

Germany does not count on Italian support, Der Fuehrer said, while, on the other hand, Russia

#### RALLY TO COLORS

Evidently the war is on and we have to face a term of war conditions. Canada, as a part of the British Empire, is implicated although no official declaration can be made for a few days.

What is needed now is men. The militia officers are asking to have the ranks filled up and we feel sure there will be a rapid response. A number of young men are already in uniform and others would be if they could ge! away from their work. It is to be hoped that employers will co-operate to enable Canada to carry out her defence plans without recourse to direct orders.

We can take it for granted that within a few days Parliament will assemble and Prime Minister Mackenzie King will ask Parliament to declare that she is strongly in support of the Empire. This is no time for holding back.

#### THE MILITARY POSITION

Great Britain, France and Poland seem to be in a better position today relatively than they have ever been before. The Japanese menace seems to have been removed in the Orient and, so long as Russia is involved against the Japanese, she may not be an important factor. The menace to France of Spain or some other country operating through Spain is also removed and Italy seems to be holding back in her support of Germany. In addition, it seems clear that Great Britain, France and Poland are fully prepared for anything, much better prepar- OFFENSIVE OF EXTREME ed than these countries have ever been before in the history of the world. We cannot see where there is any fear as to the final outcome.

At one time it was said that Germany would depend upon a quick victory because she was not able to stand a long war. A year ago that might have been possible. Today it is most improbable. Even Poland could hold Gerday it is most improbable. Even Poland may hold Germany for many months alone. In spite of the present situation we feel that Canadians do not need to worry.

The German government Thursday night decided to publish the entire exchange of notes and communications between Britain and Germany and thereo, acquaint the world with its sixteen-point proposals made to Peland. This attempt to state Germany's case to the world was made after the apparent breakdown in negotiations with England and by Polish and British mobilization. The proposals included the unconditional return of Danzig, a plebiscite in the Polish Corridor under an international commission, de-militarization of Gdynia and Danzig, exchange of populations and reference of minorities complaints to international arbitration. Soviet Russia as Germany's new frierd fig. ured for the first time in the negotiations in that it, together with England, France and Italy, it would conduct the plebiscite and be a member of the joint international commission governing the carridor during the year when the plebiscite is being prepared. According to the correspondence divulged, Poland, Germany charged, failed to reply to the proposals and the German government was compelled to draw the conclusion Poland had brusquely rejected the proposals.

Hitler's address to the special session of the Reichstag was submitted to the world by radio interpretation.

The Chancellor declared that he had waited for two days for Poland to answer his request that a minister plenipotentiary clothed with full authority be sent to Poland to negotiate a peaceful settlement but none had come. "How can we tolerate such temporization?" he asked. His proposals had been answered by Poland with further mobilization and heavy reprisals.

Referring to failure of British conciliation efforts, Hitler said: "If statesmen of the west feel that my action affects their interests, I can only say that I regret it." He inferred that he expected Great Britain and France to take action.

As far as his instructions to the Army were concerned. Der Fuehrer said that it was his order to attack military objectives only. If his enemies decided on other forms of warfare, he was ready to follow suit.

The Chancellor suggested the possibility of internal dissension in Germany when he made the threat to the members of the Reichstag: "Anyone who opposes me directly or indirectly is a traitor and will die." He appealed to German women and youth for their steadfast support.

Although Hitler's proclamation to the army was considered as amounting to a state of war, military authorities denied that it was a proclamation of war. The summons to the Reichstag to meet in special session followed five hours after the issuance of the proclamation to the Army. By that time the invasion of Poland had started.

### VIOLENCE IS STRATED

A Reuters dispatch from Paris to London was given with all reserve as follows: "According to unconfirmed reports, Germany has begun an offensive of extreme violence on the whole Polish

Four large cities of Poland-Cracow, Kaotwice, Tczew and Czestocohowa-were bombed by German war planes early this morning, Warsaw stat-. ed although there was at first no official confirmation the Polish Foreign office later confirming the air bombardment of Cracow. Fighting was reported at Danzig between Poles and Nazis. Warsaw was awakened at 6:20 a.m. by sirens as an air raid was awaited. The alarm was over in forty minutes and the people went to work as usual and the capital was normal. Later it was reported that firing had been heard some eight miles from the city. It was believed that a railway station was being air attacked.

A Reuters dispatch from Warsaw to London said that Polish radio had announced the German army had invaded Poland, attacking towns near the Polish Corridor and Upper Silesia.

At Gleiwitz, Germany, a reside it erported artillery fire was heard in the distance at 5:30 a.m. Gleiwitz is but a few miles from the Polish-Silesian border. Later an ambulance carrying German wounded was reported to have arrived at Gleiwitz.

Reports from Holland said that Poland was threatened with joint invasion by Germany from the south and Russia from the north.

A Havas News Agency dispatch said: "The Reich started hostilities on Poland this morning.

Another early Havas dispatch said that the Polish embassy in France had announced "Germany has violated the Polish frontier at four points." Official German instructions have been issued to all shipping to keep out of Danzig. Aircraft have been warned to keep away from the frontier.







## FRANCE LAYS BLAME FOR PROVOKING WAR

Invasion of Poland and Air Raiding Entirely Without Provocation-Way Paved for Going to Mutual Assistance

PARIS, September 1: (CP)— The French government, in a statement broadcast to the nation, places the blame for the outbreak of hostilities on Germany. It declared that Germany, without provocation on behalf of Poland, crossed the frontier early this morning, at the same time bombing Polish cities. French sources said

called on the German Foreign Minister, Joachim von Ribbentrop, in Berlin yesterday, advising him that Poland had agreed to direct negotiations. Shortly after, German authorities issued a communique listing demands and stating that Poland had rejected them.

The French statement followed the official notification to France (and Great Britain as well by the Polish government, invoking terms of the mutual assistance treaties on the grounds of German German High Command Says it is aggression.
