SOCIALIST MEMBER IN TALK HERE

Social Problems Main Burden Of Two-Hour Discourse by E. E. Winch M. L. A.

The necessity of dealing in a scientific manner with the problems of mental illness and criminal tendency which he declared had been increasing in an alarming manner in British Columbia owing in a large measure to economic causes, was stressed by E. E. Winch. Co-operative Commonwealth Federation Member of the Legislative Assembly for Burnaby. in addressing a public meeting which filled the Oddfellows' Hall last night. While there was urgent and immediate need for reform of appalling conditions existing in penal institutions and mental hospitals of the province, social problems of the country could not and would not be permanently solved until economic conditions which they reflected were changed, declared the Socialist legislator. The government had the resources to deal adequately with such matters as unemployment, health insurance if it had the will One heard much talk of natural resources but these would not be much use if deterioration of the human resource, mentally, morally and physically, was allowed to continue as it had been doing. More credit to the name of Premier Pattullo would have been a much-needed physchopathic hospital in this province than the bridge across the Fraser River, Mr. Winch felt.

The nervously energetic member for Burnaby refrained almost entirely from personal criticism but held the Legislature as a body, one of which he was, as being responsible for things continuing as at present. 



REICH'S NEWEST BID FOR AIR SUPREMACY





With the nations of Europe racing for supremacy in the air, the development by Germany of this new pursuit aeroplane, the HE112, places her a step ahead of her rivals, according to German experts. The craft is built for speed, being capable of better than 300 miles an hour, although the single motor boasts but 635 horsepower. The aeroplane is armed with two machineguns and 6-10-kilogram splinter bombs. At top is a view of the aeroplane on the ground. Below, a photo-diagram, showing detailed construction. (1) Motor. HITLER TO MAKE MOVE ONCE MORE

Feeling Still Runs High In Slovakia, It Is Reported

Slovak Premier Meets Dictator

Intervention Said To Be Decided Upon-Great Britain May Not Be Interested

BERLIN, March 13: - Official Germany still appears to be "much annoyed" at the action of the Czechoslovakian government against the autonomous territory of Slovakia. Feeling still runs high in Slovakia, it is said, against the Czech control.

Chancellor Hitler today received the deposed Slovak Premier Tiso for an extended conference as acknowledgement was officially made that Germany would make some sort of an intervention in the Czechoslovak situation.

The mildest form of intervention would be diplomatic representations but the possibility of "strong action if necessary" was also mentioned at the Foreign Office.

Meanwhile at Prague official headquarters reported that the Czechloslovak government had decided to protest to Germany against the activities of the German minority within Czechoslovakia and of the Vienna radio Great Britain has made no bind-

ing guarantee of Czechoslovakian frontiers as suggested at the time of the Munich settlement, it is learned officially. Even if the British government took the view of a "moral guarantee" in effect it would be concerned with unprovoked aggression against Czechoslovakia and not secession of one of its component parts.



Regarding your editorial of March 11 dealing with the fixing of silver price at 65c per ounce, a summary of the editorial appears to oppose the idea on the assumption that the taxpayer would have to make good the margin between 45c and 65c.

You compare it with the 80c bonus on wheat. In my opinion the enacting of the proposed silver legislation would function entirely differently from the wheat bonus in as much as it is proposed to legalize the coining of newly mined silver into coins and certificates to a ratio of 25 perent of the gold that is now supposed to be the basis of currency issue in Canada.

This newly mined silver would be paid for through the newly amalgamated metal arrangement, making silver a partner of gold in the Canadian currency.

Thus it would be made possible to operate silver properties profitably, enhance the circulation money, increase employment and in my opinion, help everyone, inthe .taxpayers, which we all are locked up in mother earth, serving prior thereb no useful purpose, would be at once set to work as a medium of exchange in the transaction of the nation's business.
