NEW POPE ENTHRONED ON SUNDAY

Traditional Ceremony, Solemn and Impressive, Carried Out in Rome as Multitude Cheers

VATICAN CITY, March 13: (CP)—Traditional ceremony, solemn and impressive, marked the coronation and enthronement yesterday of the former Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli as Pope Pius XII, the 262nd Pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church.

There were colorful scenes in connection with the coronation processions including the procession of Cardinals in their flowing capes of scarlet, Swiss, papal and noble guards played a prominent part.

His Power Widespread—Eugenio Pacelli, Pius XII, former papal secretary of state, the man upon whom falls the white mantle of the papacy becomes, in some respects, the most powerful person in the world.

His worldly empire embraces only the 108 acres and the 1,000 citizens of the Vatican. But his spiritual empire knows no bounds.

Many more are interested in what he says and does—are influenced to some extent by what he teaches. Thousands of publications—and the radio—carry his messages to the ends of the world.

Many nations are called Catholic—those of Latin America, for instance, and Italy, Spain, Portugal and Belgium. Three are said to be 100 per cent Catholic—the tiny states of Andorra and San Marino, and, of course, the Vatican state.

Catholic sources estimate the world's Catholic population as upwards of 375,000,000. Some 22,000,000 live in the United States, about 4,500,000 in Canada; 136,000,000 in the Americas as a whole; 210,000,000 in Europe; 19,000,000 in Asia; 8,900,000 in Africa.

In one sense, missionaries are the ambassadors of that empire—in all the remote places of the world they carry on the church's work.

Pope's Diplomats—But the pope has ambassadors in the more worldly sense, too—diplomatic representatives to as many nations. Some, like those to Canada, the United States and Great Britain, are called Apostolic Delegates. They are usually accorded diplomatic courtesies.

SHIP WAS RELEASED

British Blockade Runner Not Held Long By Spanish Insurgents

LONDON, March 13: (CP)—The British freighter Stangate, seized at the week-end in the insurgents' new blockade of the Spanish republican coast, was freed after two British destroyers sped to her aid.

According to reports from Madrid, the new peace-making defence council of General Hoesa Miaja was hoping to completely put down communist revolting over the week-end.

SOVIET AND REICH NOT UNFRIENDLY

Stalin's Attitude Almost Indicates Rapprochement—Perceives Strategy To Start War

MOSCOW, March 13: (CP)—The emphasis placed by Joseph Stalin's speech Saturday on the lack of any genuine basis for war between Germany and Russia sounded to foreign observers almost like a rapprochement between the two countries.

Stalin declared that Great Britain, France and United States had ceased to resist world aggression in the hope that it would lead to a ruinous war against Soviet Russia.

The anti-comintern pact Stalin felt was aimed more against the communist internationale than Soviet Russia.

Stalin denounced the Italian conquest of Ethiopia, the German coup in Czechoslovakia and the Japanese invasion of China.

TRIED AND APPROVED

LONDON, March 13: (CP)—Two-water grog (two parts water, on rum) in the British Navy instead of the former three-water variety met the men's approval and will be continued, the Admiralty announced.

Thirty-seven nations sent ambassadors or ministers to the Vatican recognizing the pope as a sovereign, Great Britain in 1933 instructed the fleet that he is entitled to a sovereign's salute of 21 guns.

The pope's great responsibilities are shared by a sort of cabinet—the 12 Sacred Congregations, which are standing committees. He is the head of the church's judicial system. His little nation has its own coinage and postage stamps.

In addition to the armies of clergymen, agents for the propagation of the Catholic Faith in all parts of the earth, there are thousands of educational, fraternal, social and recreational groups throughout the world. In some countries there is also a political expression in Catholic parties.

And the hub of all this world-wide whirl of activity in one man—His Holiness, the Bishop of Rome, Supreme Pontiff of the Universal Church.

New Policy

The appointment of 62-year-old Cardinal Luigi Maglioni, regarded as sympathetic to the democratic rather than to the dictatorship nations, is accepted as another indication of a rejuvenated and liberal foreign policy to be instituted under the new Pope Pius XII.

SOCIALIST MEMBER IN TALK HERE

Social Problems Main Burden Of Two-Hour Discourse by E. E. Winch M. L. A.

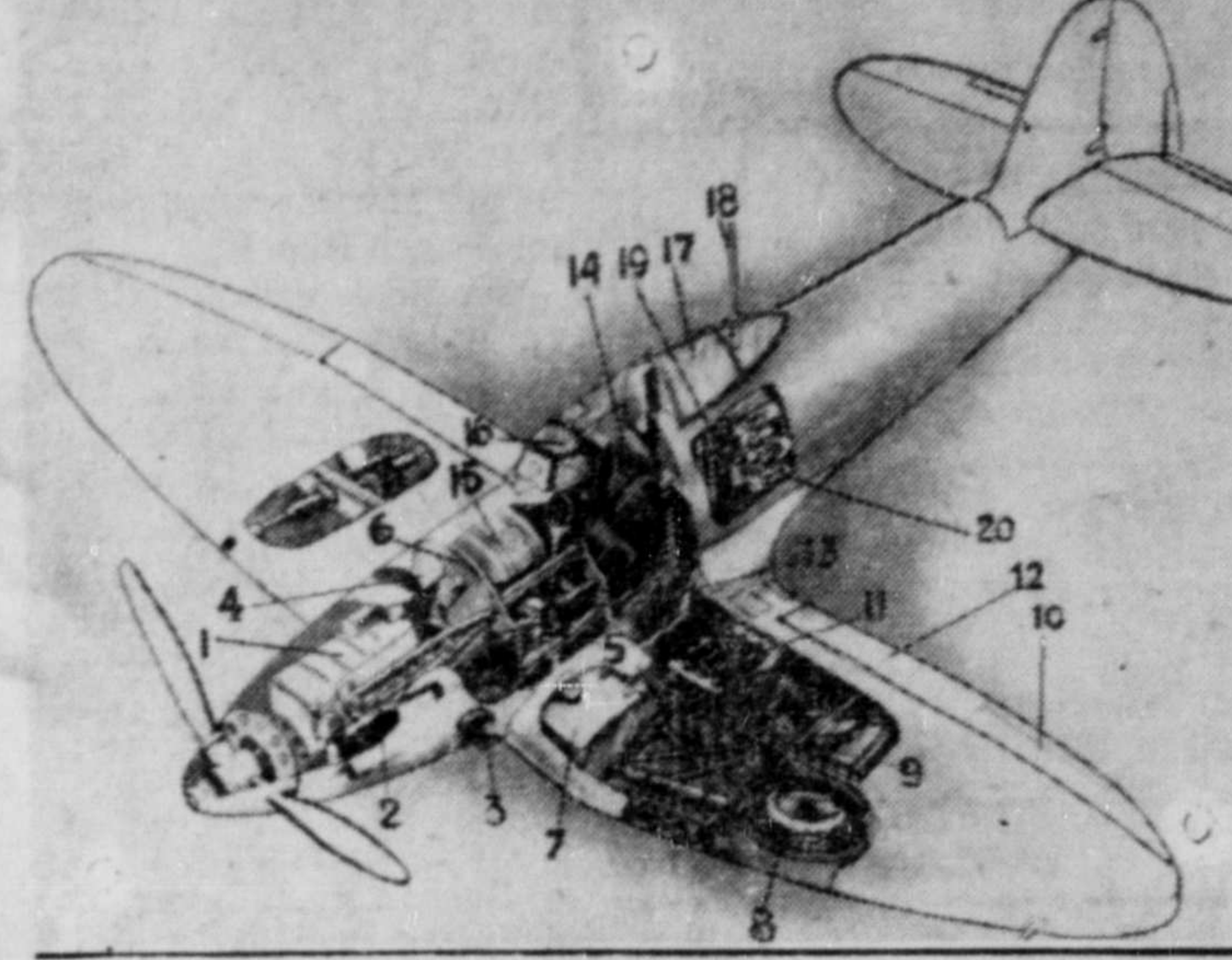
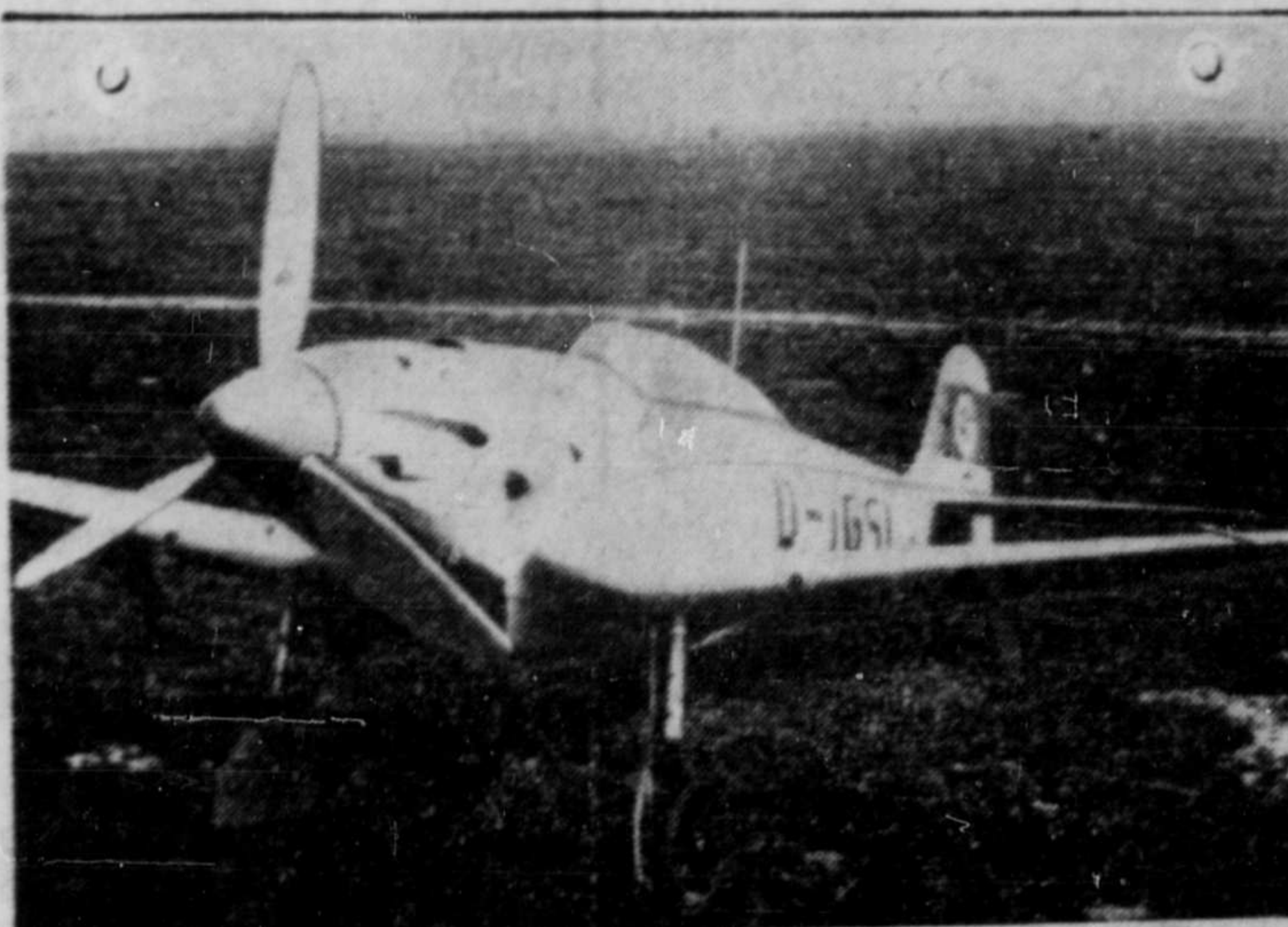
The necessity of dealing in a scientific manner with the problems of mental illness and criminal tendency which he declared had been increasing in an alarming manner in British Columbia, owing in a large measure to economic causes, was stressed by E. E. Winch, Co-operative Commonwealth Federation Member of the Legislature Assembly for Burnaby, in addressing a public meeting which filled the Oddfellows' Hall last night.

The nervously energetic member for Burnaby refrained almost entirely from personal criticism but held the Legislature as a body, one of which he was, as being responsible for things continuing as at present. He spoke for over two hours, largely on social conditions in the description of which he frequently made use of the word "appalling" and used charts and graphs prepared by himself on the basis of official government reports to illustrate his points.

James S. Black occupied the chair. Mr. Winch was critical of the manner in which business was handled in the Legislature. He deplored the time which was wasted in useless debate which resulted in no action being taken on vital questions and the manner in which legislation of real importance was rushed through without adequate consideration while problems of real importance to the well-being of the people were allowed to die on the order paper.

Mr. Winch referred briefly to some of the measures which had been passed at the last session of the Legislature including the Public Utilities Act, which he said contained great possibilities for good if properly administered although he questioned if the people would derive much benefit since it had been approved by the B. C. Electric; the credit union act, of which the people would undoubtedly avail themselves, and the redistribution bill, of which he had no complaint to make. He told of the legislation in connection with which the C. C. F. had been accepted.

REICH'S NEWEST BID FOR AIR SUPREMACY

NEW ACT FAVORED

Conservatives and C. C. F. Join In Approval Federal Government Measure To Limit Defence Contract Profits

OTTAWA, March 13: (CP)—Conservative and Co-operative Commonwealth Federation speakers in Parliament at the week-end expressed unqualified approval of a bill of Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, to control defence contract profits by creation of a purchasing board which would limit profits on contracts not awarded by public tender to five per cent on capital employed. The only qualifications, the speakers for these parties indicated, would depend upon the carrying out of the scheme as outlined. There was only one voice of opposition to the bill, J. F. Pollot, Liberal member for Teniscouta, who believed that contracts should be handled direct by the minister of national defence and his department.

HITLER TO MAKE MOVE ONCE MORE

Feeling Still Runs High In Slovakia, It Is Reported

Slovak Premier Meets Dictator

Intervention Said To Be Decided Upon—Great Britain May Not Be Interested

BERLIN, March 13:—Official Germany still appears to be "much annoyed" at the action of the Czechoslovakian government against the autonomous territory of Slovakia. Feeling still runs high in Slovakia, it is said, against the Czech control.

Chancellor Hitler today received the deposed Slovak Premier Tiso for an extended conference as acknowledgement was officially made that Germany would make some sort of an intervention in the Czechoslovak situation.

The mildest form of intervention would be diplomatic representations but the possibility of "strong action if necessary" was also mentioned at the Foreign Office.

Meanwhile at Prague official headquarters reported that the Czechoslovak government had decided to protest to Germany against the activities of the German minority within Czechoslovakia and of the Vienna radio station.

Great Britain has made no binding guarantee of Czechoslovakian frontiers as suggested at the time of the Munich settlement. It is learned officially. Even if the British government took the view of a "moral guarantee" in effect it would be concerned with unprovoked aggression against Czechoslovakia and not secession of one of its component parts.

TWO MINERS LOSE LIVES

Rockburst Proves Fatal to Young Married Man At Kirkland Lake Saturday Night

KIRKLAND LAKE, Ont., March 13: (CP)—Michael Harrington, aged 28, and George Braaten, also 28, both married, were killed Saturday night in a rockburst in the Lakeshore mine here. Two others escaped after being entombed for four hours.

### ZONING THE CITY

Some people have been wondering why it was necessary to divide the city into zones. The whole matter is very simple. The city has been trying to get some loan company to make loans in the city under the Dominion government scheme for increasing the number of home owners in the various cities throughout the Dominion. The companies will not come unless they feel that they have some assurance that the money loaned will be repaid. If any section of the city in which they hold mortgages should deteriorate, they would probably lose either the whole or part of their money.

When a section of the city is set apart as purely residential with restrictions as to the class of building that may be erected therein, it is found that it is more likely to remain residential and not be tainted by being interspersed with stores, boarding houses and similar institutions. In such a district loan companies will make loans.

There are other districts in Prince Rupert other than those chosen under the bylaw which are good residential districts but just a small portion is set apart for more expensive houses.

### VALUELESS PETITIONS

The Ottawa Journal urges Premier King to "put away his fears of Fascism," and Dr. Manion his "weariness" over those "leadership" ballots that "a young publisher in Toronto is inducing people to send to Members of Parliament." The Journal says: "Those leadership ballots, calling for nothing more than a pair of scissors to cut something out of young Mr. McCullagh's newspaper, tell only that there are people in the world who will put their names to anything, no matter how crazy, provided somebody asks them."

"There are petitions, for example, let anybody get up a petition to make it compulsory for everybody to dance the 'Lambeth Walk' and we venture to think that scores of thousands would sign it. That is why every session, tremendous bundles of petitions are dragged into the House (one member had 167,000 names on one petition alone) and laid solemnly on the table, with nobody paying the slightest attention to them, and the majority not even knowing what the blessed things are about."

"So ye're not at the barricades yet. Mr. McCullagh's 'ballots' are about as important as last year's unanimous decision that the weather was not what it used to be, and will make about as much difference to what happens in Parliament as last year's grumbling about the weather made to the weather."

A few years ago in the United States they were all talking about the mighty followings of Father Coughlin and a fellow called Townsend. Coughlin, going strong on the radio, had a 'Social Justice League' which was supposed to have 20,000,000 followers. In the headlines, the thing looked tremendous, but when Coughlin and Townsend got together in the presidential election they found they couldn't elect a single candidate. They couldn't, in fact, have elected a poundkeeper in Poughkeepsie.

"It is precisely that way with this 'leadership' league."

members the church could be made an active force for good in the community. As a mere "shrine of devotion" or "haven of heavenly rest," the church was serving little purpose. Too many church members were not accepting the responsibility of active service. Mr. Funston reiterated a previous conviction that lodges, based as they might be on the scriptures, were not the force for good in the community that might be expected. Much the same might be said of the church inactive.

ative, largely along social lines. The amendment to the Marriage Act designed to prevent the marriage of persons suffering from venereal disease through advising the principals of existence of such conditions was strongly approved by Mr. Winch. He deplored the working conditions for nurses in the majority of hospitals in the province due to long hours and declared that it was no wonder large numbers of nurses were breaking under the strain. The appalling prevalence of tuberculosis among the Indians, whose death rate was twenty times higher than the whites, was referred to. The speaker also alluded to the high cost and frequent changing of textbooks which made it difficult for parents to provide for their children.

Health of Children  
At some length Mr. Winch dealt with the condition of health of the children of schools as indicated by the government's own records of medical examination of which, incidentally, none could be found for Prince Rupert since 1932. He challenged government claims of a large decrease in the amount of malnutrition and suggested that this conclusion had been arrived at simply by leaving out the figures as had been done in the cases of Prince Rupert and New Westminster.

The speaker then turned to the necessity of more adequate and scientific facilities for the treatment of mental defectives and delinquents — both children and adults. Treatment now being accorded, Mr. Winch contended, failed in a large measure to take into account physical conditions and economic background. In the matter of juvenile delinquency he advocated a policy of prevention and care rather than isolation. Even in Prince Rupert there was a disgraceful condition of juvenile delinquency. Under conditions now existing in penal and detention institutions, criminals were being "made," not "cured."

Mr. Winch pursued the subject of treatment of mental defectives and delinquents in some detail with particular reference to the economic phases including unemployment and inadequate relief scales which forced people, particularly the young, into lives of crime and drove others into condition of mental disorder. Mental hospitals were crowded

### THE SILVER QUESTION

Editor, Daily News: Regarding your editorial of March 11 dealing with the fixing of silver price at 65c per ounce, a summary of the editorial appears to oppose the idea on the assumption that the taxpayer would have to make good the margin between 45c and 65c.

You compare it with the 80c bonus on wheat. In my opinion the enacting of the proposed silver legislation would function entirely differently from the wheat bonus in as much as it is proposed to legalize the coining of newly mined silver into coins and certificates to a ratio of 25 percent of the gold that is now supposed to be the basis of currency issue in Canada.

This newly mined silver would be paid for through the newly amalgamated metal arrangement, making silver a partner of gold in the Canadian currency.

Thus it would be made possible to operate silver properties profitably, enhance the circulation of money, increase employment and in my opinion, help everyone, instead of being an imposition on the taxpayers, which we all are. It would be a benefit to us all in as much as this silver that is now locked up in mother earth, serving no useful purpose, would be at once set to work as a medium of exchange in the transaction of the nation's business. Through the

simple arrangement of giving silver the dignity of money alongside of gold, work would start at once in taking the silver from the earth and distributing it among the people as a medium of exchange—simply taking money out of storage and putting it to work. Thanking you Mr. Editor, GEO. B. CASEY.

After the lecture, there was a short meeting of the Board of Trade which body had sponsored the lecture, and it was decided to

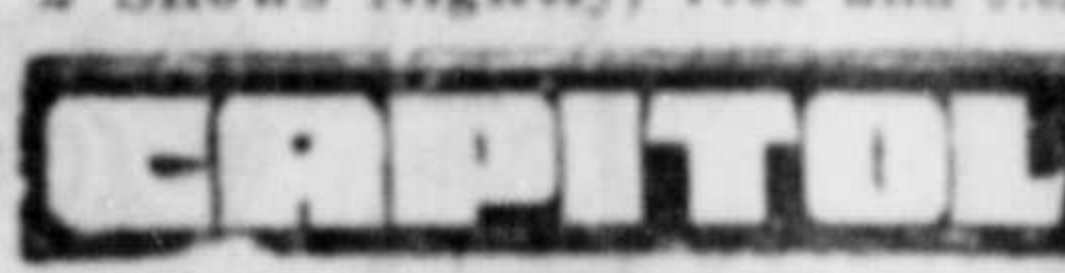

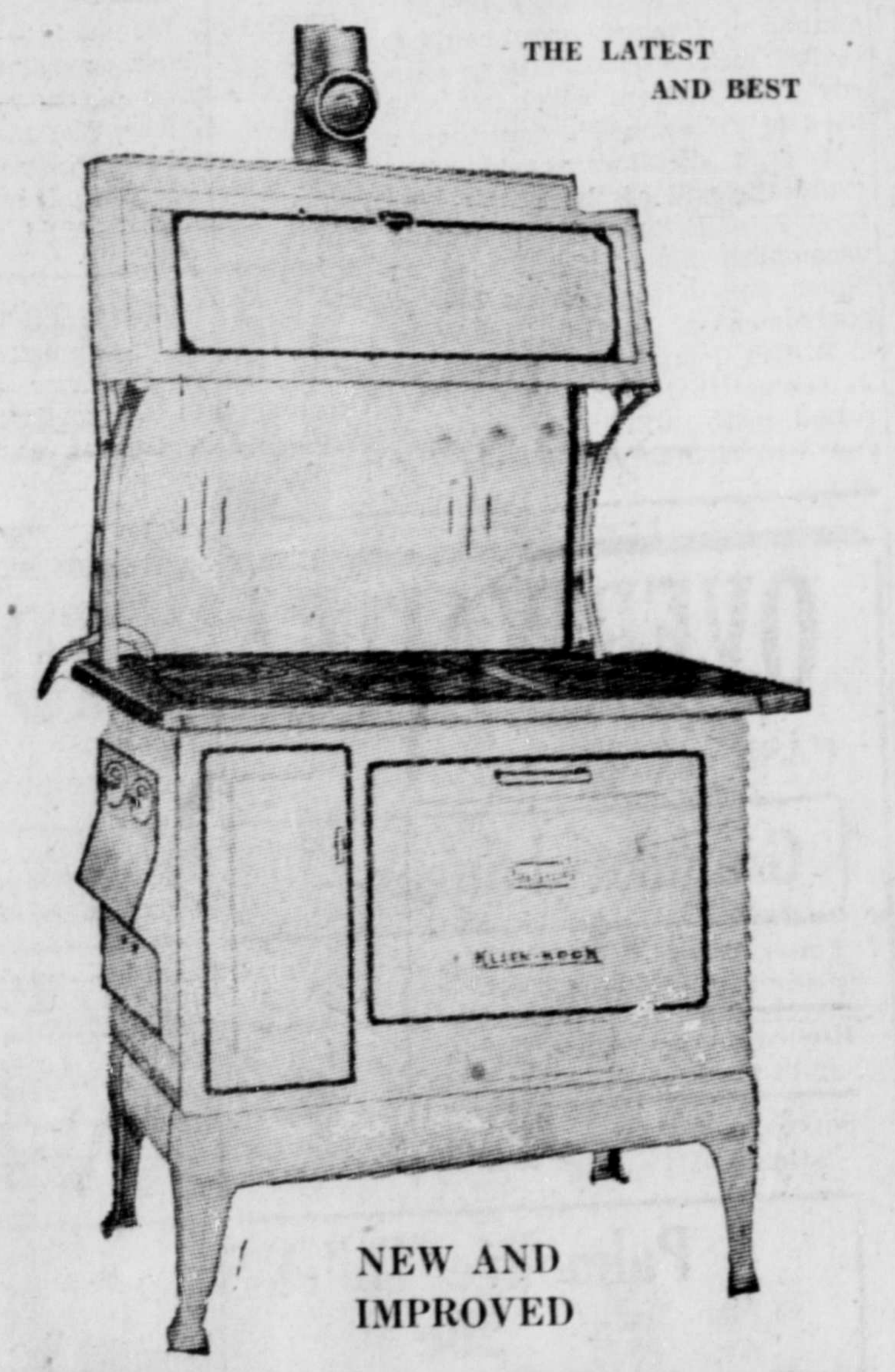
