FINAL BULLETINS

ALASKA WATCHING

KETCHIKAN-Southeastern Alaska is watching with considerable interest the deliberations of the Canadian section of the Alaska Highway Commission which is now holding hearings in Northern British Columbia. The territory is hopeful of being connected with the highway and, therefore, favors the most westerly route. The Canadian commission will be in Ketchikan this evening for Northern British Columbia and the Yukon.

IT IS TO LAUGH

MOSCOW-Official Moscow only laughs at the extravagance of Japanese reports that 650 Soviet planes have been brought down in Mongolian-Manchoukuon frontier fighting as well as 200 tanks being captured and with thousands of Russian soldiers being killed. Such would constitute major warfare which proportions the conflict has by no means reached.

AIRCRAFT CONTRACT

OTTAWA-A contract has been placed by the National Defence Department with the Fleet Aircraft Company of Fort Erie, Ontario, for twenty-seven training planes. The machines will be used for training pilots for the Royal Air Force.

ADMIRAL IS DEAD

LONDON-Admiral Francis William Kennedy, 77, commander of H.M.S. Indomitable during the first two years of the Great War, died on Tuesday.

PURCHASING BOARD HEAD

OTTAWA-The Ottawa Journal says in a newspaper story today that it is "unofficially informed" that Robert C. Vaughan, vice-president of Canadian National Railways in charge of purchases and stores, will be chairman of the defence purchasing board. "His appointment will be made today at a cabinet meeting and will be announced in a day or so," the paper said.

MORE ARMY MONEY

LONDON-Great Britain today added £79,195,990 to the 1939-40 defence expenses to meet cost of army expansion. This increases total defence appropriations from around \$2,200,000,000 to more than 3,000,000,000.

CREDIT TO GREECE

LONDON-The Board of Trade announced today that an \$11,000,000 credit had been given Greece to purchase arms and munitions in Great Britain.

AERIAL MANOEUVRES

LONDON-Great Britain and France entered cross channel aerial manoeuvres today as part of the consolidation of their air forces and are considering making flights to Poland and other allies. A flight of 200 British bombers over French territory was described as flawless and will be followed by a return visit of French planes with other trips to follow.

PADLOCK THE CATHEDRAL

Those who think it is all right for the police of Quebec province to padlock the homes of those who dare to pass out communistic literature may pause to think what might happen if they had the padlock law in England, the home of the free. Over in that country they have a dean, the Dean of Canterbury, the man who has sole control of the ancient cathedral which is the parish church for the head of the Church of England. This dean is a socialist and even goes so far as to place his blessing on communism as practised in Russia and to state that, while living conditions in Germany are steadily getting worse, living conditions in Russia are improving. This is, of course, terrible for some of us to believe but it is true that, if they set out to padlock in that country as they do in Quebec. they might padlock the dean's house or the Cathedral in which he preaches. He not only publicly advocates socialism but he even writes pamphlets about it and issues them to the public at cost so that he has become know as the "Twopenny Dean."

This is all very terrible but it is freedom. We do not padlock the Dean. Nobody ever suggested such a thing. The British sense of justice would not tolerate such a thing. They laugh at the Dean, some criticize him, a few curse him but nobody suggests interfering with his activities. It seems to be that, if the world is to make real progress, it must be done in that way. It is wrong to advocate violence but as long as that is not done every man has a right to his opinion whether he be social crediter, C.C.F, communist, liberal or new democrat.

This can only be obtained by following the western route. The route which has been proposed, striking north from Prince George, runs through country which is remote from almost any settlement.
