JOIN IN WARNING

Unmistakeable Determination In Aatitude of Great Britain And France Over Danzig

* ONDON. May 12 (CP): -France has joined with Great Britain in the unmistakeable warning, as issued yesterday by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, that any action by Germany in regard to Danzig interfering with the rights or independence of Poland will mean war and that any disregard of the warning might prove fatal for Germany.

Premier Edouard Daladier of France late vesterday backed up Great Britain by threatening to further increase France's armies unless the totalitarian states cut down the mobilization of

ment will be concluded between the _two countries.
