LONDON, January 17: (CP)-There are some observers who believe that the Spanish civil war may be entering its final phase and that, if Barcelona falls, as now seems likely, the insurgents will speedily move on to a complete victory in the conflict which, in its duration of two and a half years, has caused an estimated million

Senator J. W. deB. Farris K.C., appearing on behalf of the oil cempanies, declared the Act was ultra vires of the provincial government in that it assumed federal authority by interfering with trade and commerce.

Reports of Wholesale Smuggling of Orientals Into B.C. Discounted by Official Investigator

OTTAWA, Jan. 17: (CP)-Finding that there was little, if any, basis in evidence for the fairly widespread impression in British Columbia for reports that there Coast, the report of a special immigration board of review, headed by Dr. Hugh L. Grexton Case Becomes More Baffling As Calvert Island Fails To Give Further Clue

The mystery in connection with the disappearance since December 19 of Hugh Grexton, Alert Bay fisherman, and his son, Jimmy, thickens. After a search of three days and two nights extending over some forty miles of Calvert Island, at the north of Queen Charlotte Sound, where there were indications that the two men had landed after the wreck of their fishing boat Eugenie, a landing party reported by radio to Inspector C. G. Barber, provincial police, here last night that no trace whatsoever had been found of either father or son. Trapping cabins and other possible points of shelter between Grief Bay and Safety Cove were thoroughly inspected but failed to reveal any clue of the present whereabouts of the pair. The case is becoming decidedly baffling.

Inspector Barber was awaiting receipt of further information today before deciding on the future course of the search for the Grextons. It was later announced from Victoria that the search was being abandoned, relations having expressed satisfaction that everything possible has been done.

Rumors in the south that the Grextons had been found dead are officially denied.

Death Theory Accepted

Police headquarters, however, said they had been advised by wireless that land search parties on Calvert Island have concluded that the father and son "probably got lost in the mountains and died of exposure." It is believed that they probably started overland and died of exposure in almost impassable country.
