### BRITISH CABINET MEETING

Session Today To Consider Latest Hitler Message, Contents Of Which Are Carefully Guarded

LONDON, August 30: (CP)—A meeting of the British cabinet is called for today to consider the latest message of Chancellor Adolf Hitler in reply to the British note delivered on Monday by Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany. Hitler's message arrived in London about midnight last night. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain and Lord Halifax, Foreign Secretary, immediately went into session and at 2:30 a.m. Lord Halifax made the announcement to newspapermen that there would be a cabinet meeting today. The contents of the Hitler message, as have other communications on the subject of the German-Polish dispute during the past few days, remained a carefully guarded secret although it was intimated that Premier Edouard Daladier had been advised of the contents of the note which was a wordy document. Hitler, it is known, told how he was prepared to negotiate the Polish issue but no light was thrown on the exact nature of his latest proposals. In Berlin last night the Foreign Office said "The way is open for a peaceful settlement of the Polish question to the satisfaction of all. In the meantime, there are some indications to suggest that the scales have turned in favor of a peaceful settlement of the difficulty."

# Hitler Agrees To Negotiate Directly With Poland; Offer Of Mediation Very Welcome

CHANGE OF FACE IS INDICATION OF MODIFICATION OF POLICY—ACCEPTABILITY OF TERMS TO POLAND NOW MAJOR QUESTION

LONDON SEES POSSIBILITY OF WAR DEFINITELY HALTED FOR FEW DAYS AT LEAST—OUTLOOK TAKES BRIGHTER TURN

LONDON, August 30: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany has agreed to direct negotiations with Poland on the Danzig issue, it was reported diplomatically here today while the British cabinet was meeting to consider the Reichsfuehrer's latest message. Meantime in Berlin authoritative quarters said that Germany welcomes with "Extraordinary sympathy the offer of mediation by Queen Wilhelmina and King Leopold." The diplomatic suggestion is that Hitler is still insisting on the return of Danzig and the Polish Corridor but there is no confirmation officially. If Hitler agrees to direct negotiations with the Poles it is an indication of modification of his policy. On August 27 the French government announced that Der Fuehrer had rejected the proposal of Premier Edouard Daladier for direct negotiation. If Hitler has reversed this position, the acceptance of his terms becomes a question of major importance. "Certainly it has halted any war for a day or two at least," a source near the government said. Beyond that no opinions were ventured. The British cabinet is meeting today to consider the Reichsfuehrer's latest message. The government was in session for an hour and a half to consider his terms. Reports flying about Downing Street that Parliament would be assembled tomorrow were not verified. Officials indicated that Great Britain would probably send a communication to Berlin later in the day. The terms of the latest Hitler message were divulged to Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner. As for the offer of King Leopold and Queen Wilhelmina of mediation, the offer was not extended to the German government but to Great Britain, France and Poland. Britain, in the reported opinion of German circles, is the only nation really in a position to press upon Poland to accept. London and Paris have sent favorable replies to the sovereigns of the Netherlands and Belgium, Poland reiterating her reply to Roosevelt on the desirability of mediation. Further progress, it was indicated, depended on the German attitude. The German cabinet was assembled unexpectedly at 4:30 this afternoon, presumably to consider latest developments in the exchanges between London and Berlin and possibly to reconsider German Policy in regard to Poland.

### Lloyds Odds Against War

LONDON, August 30.—An indication of the decided veering of the international situation towards peace is the quotation by Lloyds of nine to one odds against war.

### CAPT. EDEN ON CRISIS

Situation Is Intolerable—No Compromise Possible—Must Have Victory—Prays For Peaceful One

Hitler's Boomerang  
Threat of War Has Not Terrorized Peace Lovers But Has Founded German Political Philosophy

LONDON, August 30:—"We pray that the victory may be peaceful but, whether it is peaceful or not, the challenge shall be met. The situation has become intolerable. No compromise can be accepted." So declared Rt. Hon. Anthony Eden, former British Foreign Secretary, in an address on the international situation last night. "Lasting peace," Eden declared, "must be based on good faith in international dealings. Peace must be based on respect of the pledged word. Until this is done, there can be no lasting peace. Today the world must choose between order and anarchy. More is at stake in the present crisis than the determination of one frontier, the security of one nation."

Capt. Eden referred to Hitler's extraordinary psychological error, his extraordinary calculation, in believing that the threat of war would create dismay in the British Empire. It was not, indeed, the peace nations of the world that were thunderstruck today, on the other hand, the whole German political philosophy was being thrown into confusion. Nazism could no longer claim to be the great bulwark against Communism since it had now embraced the "menace."

However, this could not affect the main issue. "Great Britain has an obligation and the obligation will be honored."

### Bread War In Los Angeles Is Still On

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30.—With the price war here continuing, five wholesale bakeries here have closed down, throwing one thousand men out of work. Bread prices here now are as low as 5c per one-pound loaf as against the former price of 10c.

### APPLIES TO ALL SHIPS

British Admiralty Control of Shipping Complete at Home as Well as Abroad

LONDON, Aug. 30: (CP)—All British merchant ships at home and abroad are now completely under Admiralty control and the most of them are receiving regular orders as to where or where not they may be effective as from midnight Saturday, all merchant ships are required to obey Admiralty instructions including any change of course that may be considered necessary by naval authorities.

### MUSSOLINI MEDIATOR?

Great Britain Understood to Favor Him as German-Polish Arbitrator

ROME, Aug. 30: (CP)—Although Italy gave a cool reception to President's peace plans Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy may be settled upon as the mediator of the German-Polish argument. The British government is said to be seeking his good offices in this capacity. There has been considerable conferring back and forward between Mussolini and diplomatic representatives of various countries. A message to Mussolini from Chancellor Hitler of Germany was delivered by the German ambassador. Its contents were not disclosed but it was reiterated that Mussolini continues his efforts on behalf of peace. Mussolini cabled Prime Minister King of Canada that he would do his utmost to preserve peace that was a just peace. Italy, like other nations, continues intensive war preparations. Virginia Gayda, Mussolini's mouthpiece editor, said yesterday: "The moment permits no prophecies. The outlook now is not quite so good. Italians have been asked to be prepared to move out of the principal cities."

### HOPING TO RUN AGAIN

Premier Pattullo Tells Peace River People He'll Be Glad to Serve Again

DAWSON CREEK, Aug. 30: (CP) Premier T. D. Pattullo, addressing a meeting here, said that the government had not been idle while awaiting the report of the Rowell Commission. On the contrary, he said, it "has in the last two years done much spade work and much more will be done in the next two years before we make our appeal to the public again."

Mr. Pattullo added: "It have represented Prince Rupert for twenty-three years now and I hope they will give me an opportunity at the next election to serve them for another five years."

### CONFLICT PLANS ARE PERFECTED

General Weygand To Have Important Post—France Commandeers Railways—Poland Mobilizes More Men

PARIS, Aug. 30: (CP)—General Maxime Weygand, former commander-in-chief of the French Army, who has flown to the Far East, is reported in military quarters to have been chosen commander of the allied forces in the eastern Mediterranean in the event of war. Premier Daladier's office announced that, effective immediately the entire French railway system, with all supplies, employees and rolling stock, have been requisitioned for military use.

More Poles Called Out  
WARSAW, Aug. 30: (CP)—Poland called out an additional 100,000 reservists to the colors today. The first mobilization posters said: "The President has ordered general mobilization" but it was authoritatively emphasized that the order was not actually general mobilization since there was a large number of exceptions.

Britain's Preparedness  
LONDON, Aug. 30: (CP)—The King, as commander-in-chief of Great Britain's armed forces, called at the War Office today, apparently to inspect details of the nation's preparedness for war.

### FRANCE IS STILL FIRM

Will Be No Turning Back On Support To Poland Against Aggression

PARIS, August 30: (CP)—In Paris as in London reports published in German newspapers that there had been agreement with the demands of Chancellor Adolf Hitler in the German-Polish crisis are ridiculed. French spokesmen insist that this country will not back down on its determination to support Poland in case of German attack and to reject "domination by force." Never has there been thought of any other course. It will most certainly be war before that.

### SABOTAGE SUSPECTED

Special Guards Being Placed Around Terminal Facilities at Churchill on Hudson Bay

CHURCHILL, Manitoba, Aug. 30: (CP)—Special guards were assigned to patrol government property at this Hudson Bay grain port following discovery that water supply at the government terminal elevator had been cut off. Police are investigating the possibility of sabotage. No water was found available for boilers and 150,000 gallons of reserve water had escaped through open valves from the tanks last night.

### Jap Sentries Thrash Nazis

TIENTSIN, Aug. 31.—A persistent but unconfirmed report circulated that Japanese sentries thrashed several Germans. Virtually all German flags in the German concession were lowered.

### SHIPS ARE RELEASED

Bremen, Normandie and Aquitania All Allowed To Leave New York This Evening

NEW YORK, Aug. 30: (CP)—Detention of foreign ships by United States authorities for search for armaments, spies or contraband is confined by no means to German vessels. The French liner Normandie and the British steamer Aquitania were also held. The Bremen was being held as a second examination proceeded. Customs Collector Harry Durning having not been satisfied with the first. This evening, following the search of customs men for contraband, she as well as the Normandie and Aquitania will be permitted to sail, Durning said tonight.

The master of the Bremen said the detention of his ship was an "unfriendly act." The German embassy at Washington was considering making a protest.

### GUARDING ACTIVITY GENERAL

Preparations For War At Prince Rupert Similarly Being Made All Over Canada

FUSILIERS ARRIVE  
Under command of Capt. Morris of the Fortress Signal Corps of Vancouver, ninety-six members of the Irish Fusiliers Regiment and small detachment of the Signal Corps and Army Service Corps arrived in Prince Rupert from Vancouver on the Prince Rupert this morning. They will be stationed at various points in Prince Rupert and district for patrol duty in view of the present international situation and the possibility of war. The soldiers remained on the steamer until after lunch, parading off at 1 p.m. In connection with their assignment, there is to be a meeting of the militia officers.

Activity in manning the fortifications at Prince Rupert as well as the guarding of vulnerable points in case of war is by no means a local measure. The activity here is part of precautions which are being taken at this time right across Canada in view of the critical European situation. Forts around Victoria and Esquimalt have been similarly manned and, on orders from Ottawa, militia regiments there were called out on a volunteer basis to take over duties on coast defence that have been mapped out for them at Work Point military headquarters. In connection with the announcement from headquarters at Victoria of Military District No. 11 that guards had been posted at forts and batteries throughout the province and that patrols of vulnerable points by permanent and non-permanent units had been established, the 102nd (Northern British Columbia) Heavy Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, and the Searchlight Company being among the units called out. Brigadier J. C. Stewart, officer commanding the district, said: "Everything is ready according to plans and the people are fitting into their places nicely."

Further recruiting had been started for the coast artillery service, Brigadier Stewart stated. From Ottawa, Hon. Ian MacKenzie, minister of national defence, announced that ten thousand members of the non-permanent militia had been called out. Units of the Royal Canadian Air Force required for coastal defence purposes were being moved to the Atlantic coast to take up assigned emergency stations.

### Japs Urged To Leave Europe

Their Government Suggests It Would Be Well For Them To Come Home

TOKYO, August 30:—The Japanese government has advised its embassies in Europe to urge all Japanese subjects in Europe to leave for home in view of the international situation. There are 1030 Japs in England, 644 in France, 421 in Germany and seventy-five in Italy.

### Silver Price Slumps Badly

Drops 3 1/2c in Day Due to International Situation

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## EDITORIALS

### THE GERMAN AIM

According to Herr Rauschning in "The Revolution of Nihilism" the Germany of the future will contain huge collective farms with the work done by aliens superintended by Germans. The new German is to be a ruler, a soldier and an administrator like the ancient Romans. This seems to be the copy of a dream by Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy who envisaged the return of the great Roman Empire.

However, Italy is to take second place along with Great Britain in this new world in which Germany is to predominate. There is no intention of subjugating Britain and France but only persuading them to take second place along with Italy and Germany as the predominant partner.

The idea of bringing all Germans within the Reich is only a temporary policy. The new Germany is to include the whole of Europe. Britain is too old, feeble and stupid to do anything; France too amiable, the United States too timid. It will take Germany efficiency to make National Socialism really work.

The new world is to be not a world union as planned under the League of Nations but a world following with Germany outstandingly in the lead. The United States will be decimated by revolution before it comes under German domination. Poland will be absorbed and so will Jugoslavia and Hungary. Poland is simply one step in the organization of this new world order and most of it will be brought about by revolutionary strategy and military pressure and diplomacy.

### UNDERLYING CAUSES

Many people have wondered what brought about national socialism in Germany and Italy. Edward G. Conklin, speaking at the convention of the National Education Association, said National Socialism came into being because of the abuses of freedom in Germany and Italy with the paralysis of governmental and social services by uncompromising conflicts among numerous political parties, labor unions, religious and social organizations, that led to the limitation of all freedom.

The winning-up Boston Red Sox defeated Cleveland Indians seven to four and cut the Yankee's margin of supremacy to twelve-an-a-half games. These were the only games played in the American League yesterday on account of rain which permitted only one game in the National League, Boston Bees winning two to one over the St. Louis Cardinals who are now five-an-a-half games behind the league-leading Cincinnati Reds.

### ANYTHING MAY COME

Some Times it Looks Like Peace, Some Times Like War—Germans Already Rationed

BERLIN, Aug. 30: (CP)—Despite optimism in some circles, financial and other responsible quarters agree that anything may yet happen in the international situation. Reports of favorable prospects for negotiations come upon a scene that in many ways seems to give the lie to optimism.

General mobilization of the Reich is now complete. Thousands of young Germans have been routed out of bed at night and called to the colors. There have been stoppages of traffic, congestion of railways, lack of gasoline and delayed deliveries of mail.

The latest move is the strict rationing of practically all articles of food.

All of which gives rise to the question among the German people, even Hitler cannot stop them from wondering: If this is Germany before war, what is Germany going to be during war?

### LANDED AT FAIRBANKS

Japanese Round World Fliers Forced to Turn Back There on Hop From Nome to Whitehorse

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 30: (CP)—The Japanese plane Nippon, in the course of a goodwill flight around the world, landed here yesterday afternoon from Nome where it had been since Sunday after completing the first stage of the flight from Japan. Unfavorable weather had held the plane up at Nome and reports were none too good for the continuation of the flight from here although the intention was to leave as soon as possible for Whitehorse, the next stop. Thence the plane will proceed southward via Prince George, Vancouver, Los Angeles and Kansas City to New York and across the Atlantic Ocean and Europe enroute home.

On leaving Nome, the plane had intended going through to Whitehorse but the unfavorable weather forced them to turn back and land at Fairbanks. The hop-off for Prince George was planned for today.

Aboard the plane is a party of seven consisting of aviators and newspapermen.

Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia was in Fairbanks when the Japanese arrived.

### FLOWERS AT SHOW ARE FINE

In spite of the very inclement weather last night and this morning there is a very fine exhibit of flowers of all kinds assembled in the Metropole Hall over Dybhavn and Hanson's office, a real surprise to those who expected that under the conditions the show might have been a washout. The exhibits are well arranged and tabled under the artistic hands of the lady members of the committee. There are three long tables running the full length of the hall, all loaded with cut flowers and plants, annuals, perennials and flowering shrubs, a revelation of what can be grown in Prince Rupert, even in a poor season.

The judge, Professor F. E. Buck of the University of British Columbia, was evidently very pleased with the efforts made to provide a good representative show. Owing to the wet morning and the consequent delay in getting the exhibits in place, judging did not commence until about ten o'clock. The show remains open until ten o'clock tonight.

Outstanding among the novelties was a framed picture of the King and Queen, the frame being made of flowers in red, white and blue, the red being sweet william, the white of English daisies and the blue of cornflowers. This exhibit was the work of Fire Chief and Mrs. H. T. Locke.

Another exhibit that is worthy of special mention as being outstanding is the group of begonias exhibited by Tom Beattie.

A Union Jack by Mrs. Tom Priest, worked in flowers, has been the subject of much favorable comment.

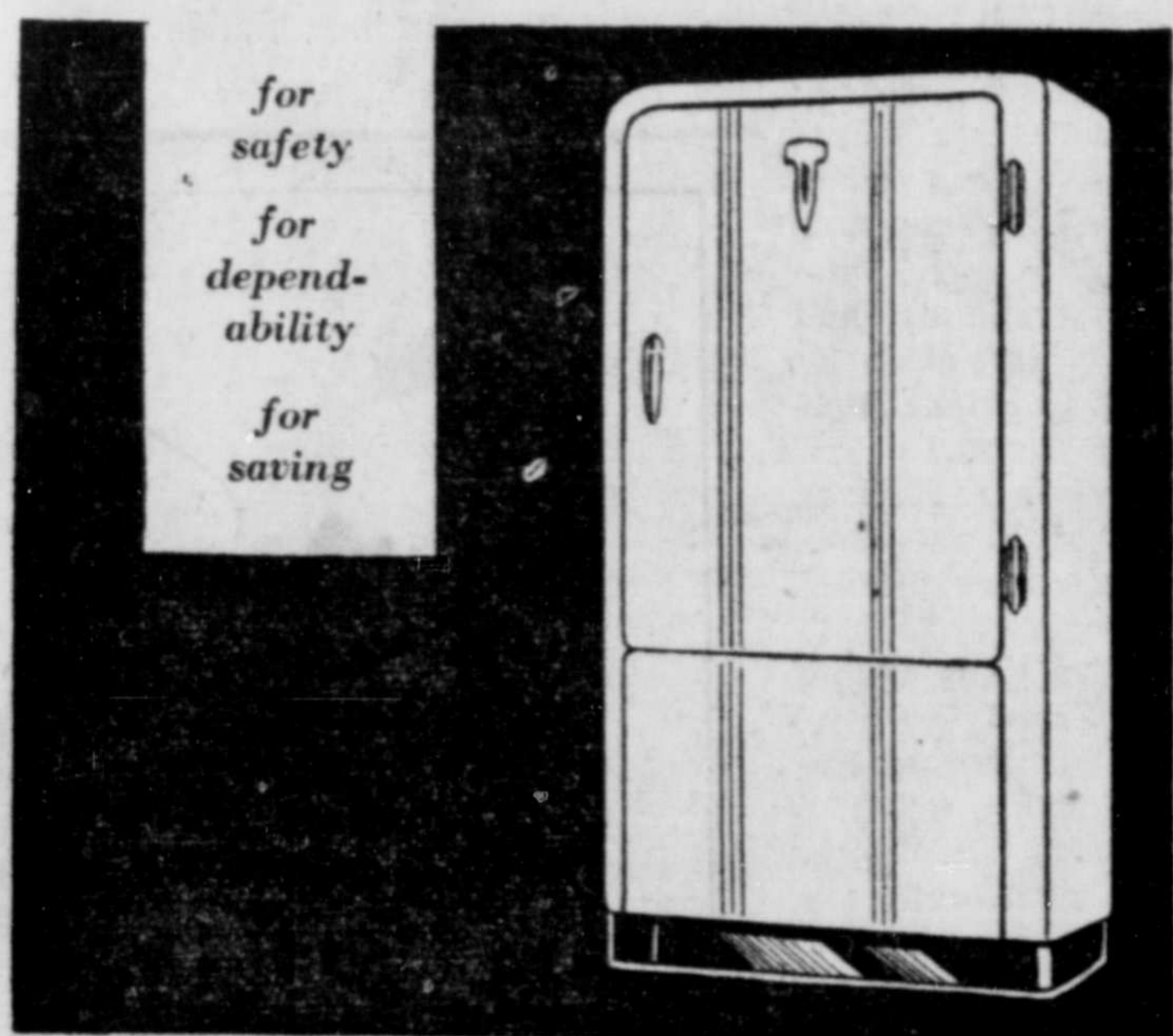

At the conclusion of the service the flowers were taken to the hospital and presented to Mrs. R. S. Sargent who, last week, suffered a severe and painful accident.

### Whifflets From The Waterfront

C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 9:30 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and sailed at 2 o'clock this afternoon for Ketchikan and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow night southbound. The vessel brought in a full list of passengers and looked somewhat like a troop ship with the party of upwards of fifty Irish Fusiliers disembarking here for guard duty in view of the international crisis.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 12:50 this morning from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and sailed a couple of hours later for Vancouver and waypoints.

C. G. S. Malaspina, Capt. Redford, now engaged in halibut fisheries patrol, arrived in port at 5 o'clock last evening for fuel and supplies, putting out to sea again this morning.

Sunnyside is the only cannery on the Skeena River that has so far closed down but others are expected to follow suit at the end of this week. On the Naas River Wales Island and Arrandale canneries are closed. The run of cohoes continues light on both the Skeena and Naas Rivers.

### KITWANGA

Now that many natives have returned from active fishing at the coast, they are turning their attention to the mountains. Berries of all kinds have been abundant in the district this season and now large quantities of huckleberries are being gathered.

In the rivers and creeks here and further away are to be seen thousands of salmon making their way up to their spawning grounds. Bears are taking their fish diet in consequence.

### Pound Sterling Is Still Weak

Withdrawal of Official Support Causes New York Price to Slump Further

NEW YORK, Aug. 30. (CP)—The British pound sterling, no longer supported by the gold stabilization fund owing to the international crisis, closed at \$4.38½ in United States funds yesterday, still hovering around the lowest mark it has reached since 1933. In spite of the withdrawal of official support, the pound showed a tendency to recover at the end of the week, getting back up to \$4.48½, but it has been since falling off again.

### Young Interior Man Succumbs

William Neale of Quick Dies Of Peritonitis At Smithers

SMITHERS, August 30.—William Neale, son of Charles Neale of Quick, succumbed to a severe case of peritonitis in the Smithers hospital on Sunday afternoon. He had been ill for about two weeks. He was about 20 years of age.

### SMITHERS

About nine o'clock on Monday evening an automobile full of passengers coming around Noel's corner from Broadway on to Main Street failed to make the turn and, crossing Main Street it crashed through the bridge in front of the office of L. H. Kenney but continued on over the end of the bridge to come to rest in the mucky bottom of the canal. It took two wrecking cars to remove the automobile from its soft resting place. The bridge and the car were somewhat the worse for the encounter but the occupants made hasty inquiries of each other and decided there were no casualties.

### Berry Picking Provides Work

Thousands of Men, Women and Children Gather Them in New Brunswick

FREDERICTON, Aug. 30. (CP)—Thousands of men, women and children are busy gathering blueberries in New Brunswick. The business is a big one for a few weeks each year.

Last year the yield fell below average, amounting to 2,000,000 pounds. The crop is good this year and, with the markets improved, all concerned are making more money. The United States, principal market, has reduced the duties on fresh and frozen blueberries. Most of the berries exported from this province are used for pies. One pie company in New York annually buys about half a million pounds. Frozen berries are preferred to canned fruit for this purpose.

The largest berry barrens are in Kent, Gloucester and Restigouche counties. Northumberland, Kings and Charlotte also have huge tracts of blueberry bushes. Quick freezing plants and cold storage facilities exist at several points, the largest at Shippegan, Saint John and Newcastle.

Last year 928,000 pounds of New Brunswick blueberries were marketed as fresh fruit and 1,073,040 pounds as frozen fruit. This did not include berries remaining in cold storage and those canned or consumed within the province. Most of the frozen berries are packed in waxed paper boxes of quart size.

Market prospects are better than in any year since 1936. A large carryover of berries canned and frozen in 1937 made the 1938 market unsteady. Since then the stored berries have been absorbed.
