TAKE CHAMBERLIN IN

LONDON—Premier Chamberlain went to Buckingham Palace today for a noon audience with the King amid reports from well-informed quarters that he was considering reinforcing the cabinet with the inclusion of Winston Churchill and, possibly, Anthony Eden.

FISH CAMP ROBBED

Divisional headquarters of the provincial police here have been advised of the fish camp at Parry Passage, Graham Island, being robbed of a considerable amount of cash. One arrest has been made by Constable Walter Middleton of Massett.

MORE BOMBINGS

LONDON—Time bombs blasted seven railway stations in various parts of England Sunday, doing considerable damage and injuring several persons. The bombings occurred at Leicester, Birmingham, Coventry, Derby, Stafford and Nottingham, as hundreds of extra police guarded London against recurrences of the previous weekends' bombings, which are attributed to the illegal Irish Republican army.

TIENTSIN SITUATION

LONDON—Premier Chamberlain disclosed today that the Japanese had been told any attempt to renew indignities on British subjects in blockaded Tientsin would imperil negotiations to settle the dispute. This announcement followed advice from Tientsin that Japanese gendarmes today held Edward Griffiths, second officer of a British coastal steamer, alleging he had made insulting remarks to Japanese soldiers, and that John Anderson, British newspaperman, had been forced to strip and been slapped with his passport by Japanese soldiers after a general tightening of the blockade.

Building List In June Light

Totalled Only \$1175, Bringing Aggregate for Year up to \$58,775

Providing only for repairs and alterations to existing structures, building permits were light in Prince Rupert during the month of June, totalling \$1175 in value as compared with \$116,169 in June last year when the new hospital permit was taken out. So far this year permits have totalled \$58,775 as compared with \$259,334 in the first half of 1938.

LOG SCALE PICKING UP

Production for June This Year Higher than Preceding Five Months put Together

Log scaling in Prince Rupert during the month of June this year totalled 19,835,333 board feet which was a good deal more than the entire production for the first five months of the year. Comparing with 25,188,592 board feet in June 1938, it brought the total for 1939 to date up to 32,907,463 board feet as against 43,420,162 board feet in the first half of 1938.

Poles and piling production for June this year amounted to 93,832 lineal feet—89,586 lineal feet cedar and 4,256 lineal feet—as compared with 93,657 lineal feet—91,010 cedar and 2,647—in the same month last year. The total production of poles and piling for this year to date has amounted to 412,746 lineal feet as against 526,056 lineal feet in the first six months of 1938.

The lackpines count this June was 18,690 pieces as against 23,847 pieces in June 1938.

A total of 120 cords of wood was recorded this June as compared with 36 last year.

Great Britain And France Join In Reiterating That Aggression Be Stopped

New Postal Box Rates In Effect

Considerable Reduction in Charges Under Scale in New Post Office

The Trades and Labor Council has received a communication from the Postmaster General announcing a new and lower scale of post office rates in Prince Rupert—\$2, \$3, \$5 and \$8 according to size from smallest to largest. These rates, standard for all post offices throughout Canada, are lower than have heretofore been charged in Prince Rupert. The new rates have been effective since occupation of the new Post Office.

Status Quo of Danzig Must be Maintained They Insist—Meantime Nazi Talk of Getting Back Free Port

LONDON, July 3: (CP)—The Polish and British ambassadors at Paris conferred at the week-end in Paris on the international situation with Premier Edouard Daladier of France. Poland has been assured of the unequivocal and automatic support of Great Britain and France in resisting any aggression which would threaten her independence. There is still a question, however, as to what might be considered a threat of Poland's independence. Poland reiterates that any attempt to disturb the status quo of the free port of Danzig will be resisted with armed strength.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, making an appeal last night for volunteers for the civil defence arm, repeated that the British government would take a determined stand against aggression. The country did not wish war but was ready to put in its whole strength in a fight against aggression and in coming to the defence of nations whose security Great Britain had guaranteed.

King George and Prime Minister Chamberlain tonight joined in a broadcast warning to Germany that Great Britain is resolute in its determination to prevent aggression. The Prime Minister stated that the British people were peaceful and desired no quarrels with anyone but added: "Let no one make the mistake of supposing we are not ready to resist aggression whether against ourselves or against those whose independence we have undertaken to defend." He spoke a few hours after twenty thousand men and women members of Briton's forces had marched past the King and Queen in Hyde Park.

British official circles emphasized the complete unanimity existing among the British, French and Polish governments that any attempt to disturb the status of Danzig, whether by inside coup or outside aggression, would be definitely "resisted by force of arms."

At Paris President Albert Lebrun Sunday issued a new warning against aggression as Premier Daladier conferred with General Maurice Gamelin who returned to Paris during the week end after inspecting French defences on the Italian frontier. Meanwhile, even before Gamelin reached Paris in answer to Daladier's urgent call, informed quarters said very little military steps, necessary for immediate action, up to the calling of the reservists, had been taken in the last few days.


The British government is maintaining close contact with Paris and Warsaw over Danzig. Prime Minister Chamberlain told the House of Commons today. Although Chamberlain confirmed reports that large numbers of Germans are arriving at Danzig ostensibly as tourists, diplomatic quarters took the view that Anglo-French-Polish determination to resist any change was causing the Nazis to go slow.

At the Free City of Danzig Forster, leader of Danzig Nazis, told a rally at nearby Tiegendorf that Danzigers were ready to sacrifice blood and life in order to return to Germany. Forster said Danzigers not only want to return to Germany, but will return. Other authorities of the Nazi dominated city, repeated previous assertions that union with Germany was the only acceptable solution of the Danzig problem.




