FEARS FOR FUTURE

Dorothy Thompson, wife of the well known writer Sinclair Lewis, in one of her recent articles interpreting current events fears for civilization unless plans for the future are laid now. She says in part:

"The demoralization of international trade, the bankruptcy of governments, the collapse of currencies—all will have repercussions upon neutrals as well as belligerents.

"The Communists exult in this. They believe that their moment has come in history. They wish to take this tide at the flood. William Z. Foster, in a question-and-answer column in the Soviet government's American organ, 'The Daily Worker,' blithely tells his readers that peace can come only 'if the Soviet government and such other Socialist and people's governments as may exist at the close of the war... are prepared to enforce their decision.'

"In other words the whole world, impoverished by war and disintegration of markets, with no vision of a reasonable future before its eyes to offset the despair in people's hearts, is to be plundered by mobs, raising on their shoulders numerous sub-Stalins, new popular tyrants, who, with their bands of terrorists and spies, will eventually purge the people everywhere into the deathly desolation that they call 'peace.'

PREPARE NOW

"Confronted by this apocalyptic vision, our business is to begin, right now, to prepare the plans and outlines of a new world," says the writer. In making them we must face the reality of a new epoch in history. The world of pre-1939 is dead. Humpty Dumpty has fallen off the wall, and all the king's horses and all the king's men will not put Humpty Dumpty together again.

"The ideal of the comfortable, individual bourgeois existence that dominated the last century is without the breath of life today in anyone over the mental age of 12 or under the actual age of 30. That ideal is one of the casualties of this war.

But there are other casualties. The ideal of Communism is dead. It died when the Russians made a pact with the Nazis. Every Russian soldier tramping his way into Finland today is treading into the blood-soaked ground the ideal of Communism.

"Communism is still a menace; Communism is still being preached and being carried, and it will continue to be carried, but it will be carried by the ruthless, the mentally sick, the vicious, the frustrated, the liars. It has passed its torch into the hands of the intellectual underworld. It is, indeed, no longer a torch but a brand. It had, before, some ardent and clean spirits among its apostles. They are deserting all over the world, with despair in their hearts.

NAZIISM ALSO DEAD

"And Naziism is dead," Dorothy Thompson continues. "The British and the French have not killed it. Hitler killed it. Misled they were, and from the very beginning, but nevertheless, for millions of Germans, Naziism meant the restoration of their national self-respect; it meant a cleaner and more heroic world; it meant the concept of the nation as a purifying force; it meant the racially integrated state, which was an old German dream. And, above all, it meant to them the end of the Nihilism fomented by mob leaders which, in their minds and in their experience was the fact of Communism.

"When Hitler subjected the first non-German people, the Czechs, he widened the territory of the Reich, but he stifled an ideal in the German heart. When he let loose a European war, he betrayed his most sacred promise to the German people. When he opened Europe to Stalin, he extinguished the last spark of the Nazi ideal. No possibility of human renewal, no reconstruction or renaissance can come from these two movements. All their still unburied corpses can do is to breed disease and corruption."

SPORT CHAT

Walk down dingy Budge Row, behind Cannon Street Station in London, through the dingy door of "The Gambit" and one will find war has not halted the strategical game of chess—at least not in the daytime. For 40 years now that wooden door has swung back to admit the giants of the chess world, millionaires, office clerks, newspapermen, the keeper of a stall in the Caledonia market, bankers, politicians, and one woman. Hour after hour they sit, figuring their moves with that distant look men acquire from hard concentration. They seldom speak. Sometimes two men play for hours and leave without asking each others names.

The lone woman player is Miss Edith Price, proprietress of "The Gambit" and former women's chess champion of England. She and a few waitresses are the only women admitted. Miss Price, who

held the women's crown for four years from 1922 says the war has not affected her daytime trade, but she has found it necessary to close at 6 p.m. instead of keeping the restaurant open till 11 p.m. What trade Miss Price lost may have gone to the British Correspondence Chess Association. H. G. Pearce, its honorary secretary, says membership has jumped 70 to reach the record figure of 400.

The association's first wartime tournament drew 200 contestants, 60 more than the previous record. The tournament was divided into sections of 10 each. Pearce said the association ran into no difficulties with postal authorities, who, they feared initially, might be too overwhelmed to handle their mail. The only difference was that the mail became slower. "Hitler," he shouted over the telephone. "Is a friend of mine for life. BRISK XMAS TRADE HERE

Increase of Population is Reflected in Greater Volume of Buying

Prince Rupert merchants estimate an increase in Christmas business this year of ten or fifteen per cent. This is comparable with a population increase of probably about the same proportion due to activity which has resulted from the city having become since a year ago a centre of military and naval activity. During the past year much extra work has been furnished here by fortification construction and this has also had an expansionary effect upon local business.

Commodity sales and gift purchasing are both up this Christmas. The average value of individual gift purchases at least some merchants have found has been less than a year ago. The fact that there have been so many wedding and shower presents to buy during the past fall has possibly influenced the Christmas buying and the reduced Christmas value.

In anticipation of greater Christmas business, Prince Rupert merchants put in somewhat heavier stocks on the whole this year. While buying has been active, there is still a fair choice left but, by Christmas Eve, the best will undoubtedly have gone.

Regular trains of the Canadian National Railways in and out of Prince Rupert for the past few weeks have had to have extra coaches due to increased travel and these will be kept on until after the holiday season.

PREY UPON FISHERMEN

Germans Attacking All Vessels Off British East Coast, Regardless Of Size

LONDON, Dec. 20.—During the last two days, German aircraft, in the latest phase of warfare, have attacked twenty unarmed fishing trawlers off the east coast of Eng-

land, bombing and machine gunning them. Eight have been sunk. The Germans are now attacking every ship they encounter, large or small, British or neutral.

The Aberdeen trawler Star of Scotland was towed into port today with two of her crew dead as a result of bombing and machine gunning by German planes. The trawlers Stathalbyn and Strathbannock escaped unscathed although the former was attacked twice and had a close call.

Three neutral ships perished yesterday in the war at sea—two Danish vessels striking mines and one Norwegian being torpedoed.

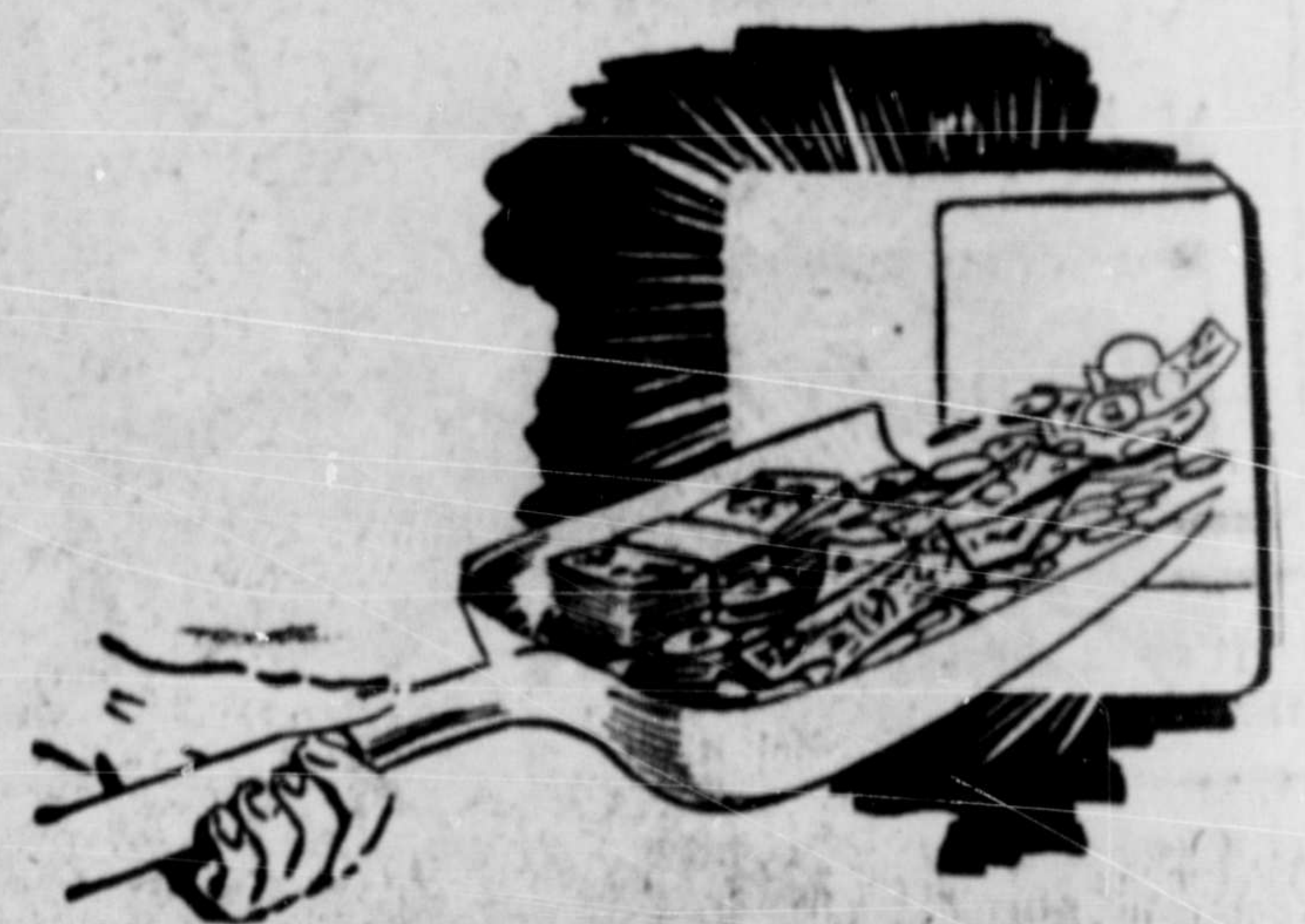

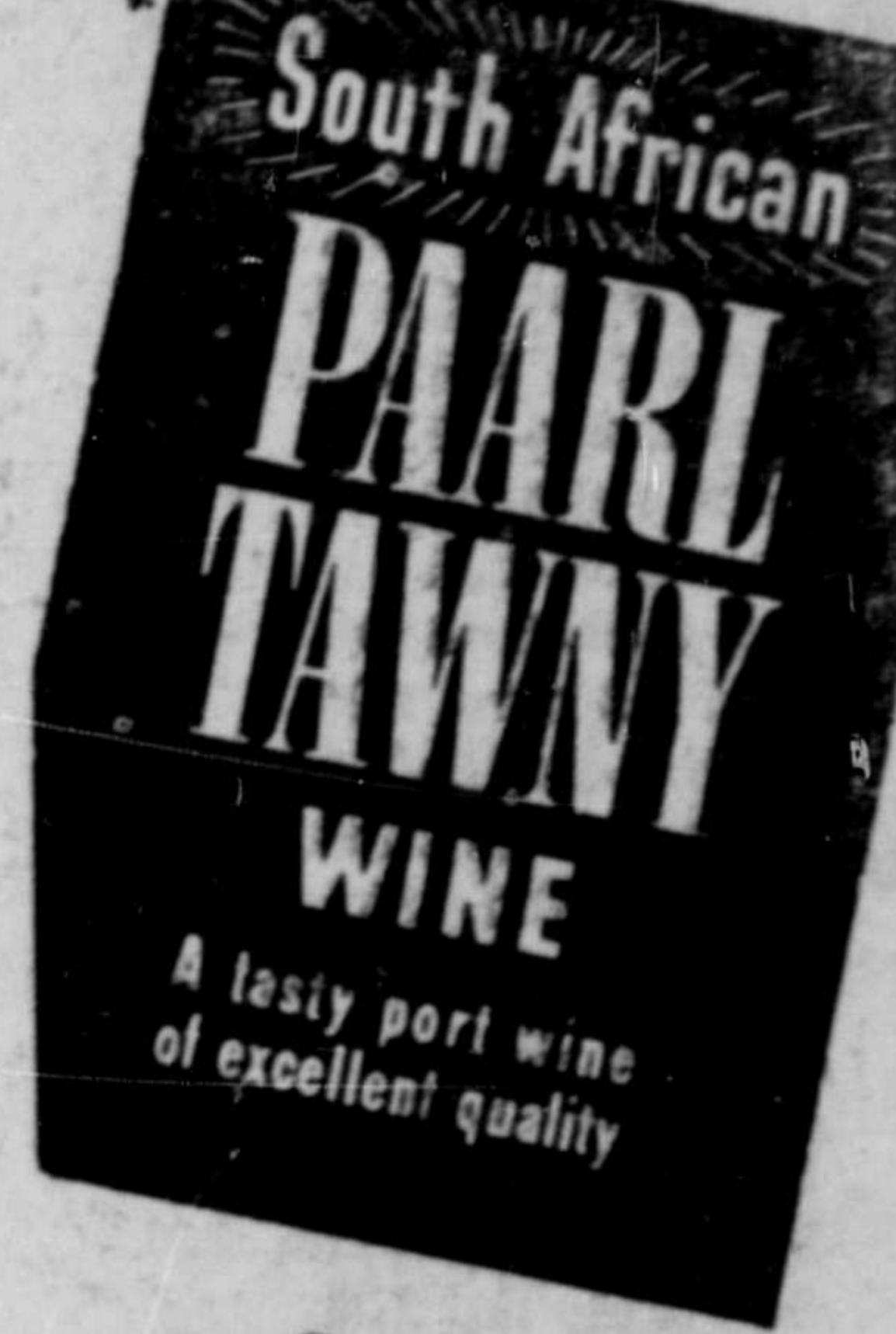
