At New York Following Scuttling Of Ship

Twelfth Scuttling

Internment or Freedom is Question -Tanker to Remain at Port Everglades

BERLIN, Dec. 20: (CP)- The German luxury liner Columbus is the twelfth German vessel which has been scuttled since the beginning of the war including the pecket battleship Admiral Graf Spee. This represents a tonnage of more than 103,000.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20: (CP)-The United States Navy cruiser Tus- Bids caloosa arrived this afternoon at New York, having on board 579 of the crew of the 32,000-ton German liner Columbus which was scuttled four hundred miles off Cape Henry, Virginia, yesterday rather than to submit to capture by a British warship which had intercepted her. The crew of the Columbus were landed at the immigration detention sheds at Ellis Island where it will be decided what disposal is to be made of them. If they are found to be bona fide seamen, they may be allowed to remain sixty days in the country. Should they be naval or military men, they would be interned.

The United States government announced yesterday that the Tuscalcosa had discovered the Columbus sinking more than four hundred miles off the coast between Norfolk and New York. President Franklin D. Roosevelt's washington that presumably the TRADE IN ship had been scuttled since an unidentified British warship was nearby although there was no evidence of a fight.

The Columbus left Vera Cruz, Germany-bound, last week. She had been trailed by a British cruiser, it was believed.

The Columbus, which was on a Carribean cruise when the war broke out, put into Vera Cruz where she was interned. She was the third largest vessel of the German merchant marine fleet, only the Bremen and Europa being

PREPARE NOW

"Confronted by this apocalyptic vision, our business", is to begin, right now, to prepare the plans and outlines of a new world," says the writer. In making them we must face the reality of a new epoch in history. The world of pre-1939 is dead. Humpty Dumpty has fallen off the wall, and all the king's horses and all the king's men will not put Humpty Dumpty together again.

"The ideal of the comfortable, individual bourgeois existence that dominated the last century is without the breath of life today in anyone over the mental age of 12 or under the actual age of 30. That ideal is one of the casualties of this war.

But there are other casualties. The ideal of Communism is dead. It died when the Russians made a pact! with the Nazis. Every Russian soldier tramping his way into Finland today is treading into the blood-soaked ground the ideal of Communism.

"Communism is still a menace; Communism is still being preached and being carried, and it will continue to be carried, but it will be carried by the ruthless, the mentally sick, the vicious, the frustrated, the liars. It has passed! its torch into the hands of the intellectual underworld. It, is, indeed, no longer a torch but a brand. It had, before, some ardent and clean spirits among its apostles. They are deserting all over the world, with despair in their hearts.

NAZIISM ALSO DEAD

"And Naziism is dead," Dorothy Thompson continues. 'The British and the French have not killed it. Hitler killed it. Misled they were, and from the very beginning, but I nevertheless, for millions of Germans, Naziism meant the resteration of their national self-respect; it meant a cleaner and more heroic world; it meant the concept of the nation as a purifying force; it meant the racially integrated state, which was an old German dream. And, above all, it meant to them the end of the Nihilism fomented by mob leaders which, in their minds and in their experience. was the fact of Communism.

"When Hitler subjected the first non-German people." the Czechs, he widened the territory of the Reich, but he stifled an ideal in the German heart. When he let loose a European war, he betraved his most sacred promise to the German people. When he opened Europe to Stalin, he extinguished the last spark of the Nazi ideal. No possibility of human renewal, no reconstruction or renaissance can come from these two movements. All their still unburied corpses can do is to breed disease and corruption."
