> Prince Rupert—The portion of Prince Rupert Harbor known as Fern Passage, from Pethich Point and Ritchie Point southward to Butze Point including Seal Cove, is set apart for the exclusive use of the Department of National Defence for use as a seaplane base.

> Commercial or private activity in Morse Basin, southerly from Fern Passage, in the harbor of Prince Rupert, is also to be restricted in so far as it is found necessary to prevent interference with aircraft using Fern Passage.

It was the first club luncheon since the general overhaul of the premises. Mr. Young said the phenomenon of returning animals to life, after an apparent death from freezing.
