TOTALITARIAN FINANCES

Financial subjects are usually uninteresting to the mass of readers unless they deal directly with the cost of living of those involved and, even then, it is difficult to arouse much interest or enthusiasm over manipulation of figures. F. J. Horning, in the monthly report to the Royal Bank, deals with the financial conditions of the totalitarian powers, including Germany, Italy and Japan, showing the efforts they have made to keep up their balance of trade but without success. While employment on armaments has temporarily solved the unemployment problem, BOARD, Good home cooking, 814 the cost of living has increased but wages have been kept down by mad government control. The result has been that the standard of living has declined.

The national de ts of these three countries are in CLEAN, well-furnished modern apcreasing steadily and it is increasingly difficult to purchase supplies from abroad. Gold has been used to a large extent.

It has been pointed out by this writer that any state cannot appropriate more of the national income than the net savings of the people of the country without feeling the effects. The totalitarian states have been and arc spending more. This results in inflation and it is suggest ed that further expenditures especially for armaments are rapidly approaching a peak beyond which further expansion is considered impossible.




