STALIN THROWING NEW LEADERS INTO BATTLE

UPPER STUBBORN FINNS
Soviet Dictator Suffering Into Reverses His Forces Have Been Moves Across Frontier an Territory

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 27.—Stung by the recent severe reverses dealt to his forces by the Finns, Dictator Joseph Stalin of Russia is throwing 300,000 more Russian troops into the war against Finland under the direction of his personal friends, according to reports reaching here. A new attempt will be made to cut Finland in half at the waistline and to regain ground which has been lost in the north. Meantime, the Finns still count on the bitter winter weather and military strategy to make up for their smaller numbers and they are even planning a new drive. It is claimed that 4000 Russians have died in the campaign within the last three days, many of these being frozen to death. Sweden is reported to be sending important aid to Finland in the way of volunteer troops, war supplies and credit.

AUSTRALIA AIRMEN IN OLD LAND

Another Demonstration of Imperial Solidarity Recorded Yesterday
LONDON, Dec. 27.—Another demonstration of the Empire's solidarity in the war was marked with the arrival in England yesterday of Australia's first air contingent. The reception it received rivalled that which was accorded the first Canadian division last week. The Australian aviators will be assigned for duty to the coastal command of the Royal Air Force.

PREMIER'S MESSAGE

Peace Keynote of Mackenzie Greetings of Both Christmas King and Manion
OTTAWA, Dec. 27.—In a Christmas message, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King said that Canadians could rejoice that they had seen with clear vision the message to humanity and that this nation was responding to the greatest need of mankind, "Peace and goodwill is the essence of our objective," he declared.

FIRE AT TERRACE

Marsh Home, Later Occupied by Jack Spitzel, Destroyed
TERRACE, Dec. 27.—Jack Spitzel got out to safety just in time as fire completely destroyed his residence at three o'clock yesterday morning. The house was a large square building built in 1912 to accommodate the Anglican minister, Rev. T. J. Marsh, who had been appointed to the charge of the parish in the days when the railway was in construction. The materials used in the construction were taken from a hotel which stood near the bamboo landing at Kitsumkalum and, during the many years when Marsh and his family lived there, a fine garden was developed. Some of the ornamental trees are badly charred today and the old house there is nothing left.

Another Sub Commander Is Given Honors

LONDON, Dec. 27.—Lieut. Commander E. D. Phillips of the small British submarine Ursula which last week raided a German naval base and sank a cruiser has been awarded the Distinguished Service Order and promoted to the rank of commander. Other officers of the Ursula are also decorated for their courage and daring.

BRITISH SHIP SINKS

LONDON, Dec. 27.—(CP)—Sinking of the British ship Longships, 1562 tons, when it struck rocks it was disclosed. The crew was saved.

EARTHQUAKE CRERAR IS IN OTTAWA

Heavy Loss of Life and Property Damage in Turkey In Asia
ANKHARA, Turkey, Dec. 27.—(CP)—Severe earthquake shocks rocked Ankara and Eastern Anatolia today, causing heavy loss of life and property damage. In this city numerous buildings were badly damaged and meagre reports indicate even worse effects elsewhere. In Switzerland a seismograph recorded what was described as the most terrific earthquake shock in twenty years.

CRERAR IS IN OTTAWA

Canadian Delegate to Imperial Cabinet Minister's Meeting Returns Home
OTTAWA, Dec. 26.—(CP)—Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of mines and natural resources, returned to Canada during the Christmas week-end from England where he represented Canada at a conference of Dominion cabinet ministers in regard to war effort. He said that Great Britain and France were profoundly grateful to Canada for its contribution to the Allied cause in the war. The same gratitude was felt in regard to the other Dominions and the colonies. The United Kingdom, Mr. Crerar declared, was better organized and equipped after the first few weeks of the present war than it had been at the end of the last. Co-operation between Great Britain and France was full and complete. "A fine looking bunch of fellows," said Mr. Crerar in commenting upon the airman British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan had sent to the Royal Air Force.

PROTEST IS DELIVERED
Twenty-one nations of the Pan-American conference have delivered their protest to Germany, Great Britain and France at violation through naval action of the Pan-American neutrality safety zone.

XMAS QUIET BROKEN
PARIS.—The Christmas quiet on the Western Front was broken yesterday by German patrol activity east of the Moselle River. There was little actual fighting action however, the Nazi raiders being driven off by the French.

MORE SHIPS SUNK
LONDON.—A 2,400 ton British ship, which had left port only two hours previous, was torpedoed and sunk without warning off the west coast of England. Fourteen members of the crew are believed to have been lost. A Norwegian ship picked up some survivors. A Swedish ship was a victim of mines off the northeast coast.

XMAS ON THE LINES
LONDON.—Christmas was a great day along the front lines in France. There was special fare and entertainment for both British and French forces. Holiday edibles had been shipped by virtual mountain loads.

AIR FORCE CASUALTIES
LONDON.—Royal Air Force casualties in the war total 512. It is announced, with 380 known dead, since the outbreak of war. This does not include casualties in the air arm of the fleet.

JAPANESE ADVANCE
SHANGHAI.—The Japanese army announces troops invading Chinese Kwansei Province, smashing their way to the border of French Indo-China to cut Chinese supply lines.

TACOMA IS INTERNED
MONTEVIDEO.—The government of Uruguay has decided, it is reported, to intern for the duration of the war the German tanker Tacoma and crew which assisted the pocket battleship Graf Spee by acting as a supply ship and picking up the crew after scuttling. Armed guards are being placed on the ship and the crew taken to camp.

AIR MIGHT IS GREAT

Officially Announced That Great Britain is Four Times More Powerful Than in 1935

LONDON, Dec. 23.—(CP)—The Air Ministry discloses that Great Britain has a large secret reserve of fighting airplanes. The strength of the Royal Air Force is four times that of 1935.

COMMISSIONER NAMED

MELBOURNE, Dec. 27.—(CP)—Sir Thomas Glasgow has been appointed Australia's first high commissioner to Canada.

CAPTAIN RIPPON DIES

VANCOUVER—Captain Thomas Rippon, marine superintendent of Canadian Pacific Steamships coast fleet, died in hospital here after a brief illness. Fifty-six years of age, he became an officer with the company in 1907 and served for several years between Vancouver and Northern British Columbia and Alaska ports. In 1916 he received his first command, the old Princess Beatrice. He served mostly on the Vancouver-Victoria-Seattle run until he was made superintendent five years ago.

JAP POLITICAL CRISIS

TOKYO—Premier Abe has received a resolution signed by 250 of 462 members of the Japanese House of Representatives asking the cabinet to "give serious consideration whether it should remain in power." At political crisis is developing in Japan over the question of international rights in Japanese-occupied China and the renewal of the treaty with United States.

SEARCH PILOT KILLED

ANCHORAGE—After a mother, her baby and two men had been reported safe after three days and nights in the frozen wilderness of central Alaska, search being prosecuted out of Anchorage for pilot Hans Mirow who had been unreported since Wednesday when a search flight ended in the finding of his crashed plane containing the bodies of Mirow and a passenger, Peter Ystad.

ESPIONAGE CHARGED

HALIFAX—Preliminary hearing of Allan Findlay, charged with violating defence of Canada regulations, ended with Magistrate R. E. Inglis reserving decision until Thursday. Bail of \$25,000 was resumed for the twenty-five year old university lecturer who is accused of attempting to convey outside of Canada military information which might prejudice the security of the state by assisting Germany.

PRIZE SHIP IS THROUGH

German Steamer Duesseldorf Passes Panama From Chili to England

PANAMA, Dec. 27.—In charge of a British naval prize crew, the German steamer Duesseldorf, which was captured off the coast of Chili last week, passed through the Panama Canal and continued on to sea from Cristobal. A formal protest has been made to the Canal authorities at the vessel being allowed to pass. A breach of neutrality is claimed by Germany.

RUSSIA IS OUTSMARTED

Germany Taking Advantage of Finnish Situation To Obtain Concessions

BERLIN, Dec. 27.—(CP)—Germany is taking advantage of Russia's preoccupation in Finland to gain a number of concessions from the Soviet which it might have been impossible to obtain if the Red military forces had stood up to expectations. One of these concessions is in regard to railway traffic through Russian-occupied Poland. The standard gauge on Polish railways will be retained instead of changing to narrow gauge of the Soviet. This will facilitate the movement of goods from Roumania to Germany through Poland under the new trade agreement.

'XMAS SEES PEACE MOVE FOR EUROPE

Roosevelt And Pope Lead In Steps To Make Yuletide Truce Permanent—Gestures Well Received

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 27.—(CP)—While an unofficial truce was in effect on the western front over Christmas, powerful influences seemed to be at work to make it permanent. An important development was announcement of the appointment of Myron C. Taylor as personal representative of President Franklin D. Roosevelt to the Vatican in the capacity of a peace ambassador. Coincidentally, Pope Pius, in a Christmas message to the world, dedicated efforts towards a lasting and honorable world peace and suggested a five-point plan. His Holiness vigorously condemned the invasion of Finland by Russia. The Pope's message was addressed directly to the Cardinals in Rome. All sane statesmen, His Holiness felt confident, would hold themselves in readiness to negotiate for peace and to bring an end to the present conflict on reasonable terms. His five points were independence for the individual nations, liberation from the slavery of armaments, correction of the faults of international organizations, just consideration of the interests of minorities and observance of Christian principles by statesmen and the people generally. People should be prepared to relinquish their selfish interests and embrace the principles of divine laws.

NEW MINES BEING LAID

Great New Field Entire Length of East Coast to Protect British Shipping

LONDON, Dec. 27.—The British answer to the sowing of German mines off the British coast is a five-hundred mile charted mine field from the Orkney Islands to the Straits of Dover. The Admiralty announces that the mines will be laid in a strip thirty to forty miles wide eight miles offshore to guard coastal shipping. This will be in addition to three separate mine fields already in operation near the entrance of important ports on the east coast.

SPEAKS TO HIS EMPIRE

King George on Air Christmas Morning

LONDON, Dec. 27.—(CP)—An address by His Majesty, King George VI, featured a special Empire radio broadcast which was carried Christmas morning by the British Broadcasting Corporation and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation. Accompanied by the Queen, the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret Rose and the Duke of Gloucester, His Majesty, wearing the uniform of a field marshal, attended service in the village church at Sandringham Sunday morning. The King made his radio address from Sandringham Palace.

KILLED AT FISH PLANT

William Roberts, Employee of Fishermen's Cold Storage, Fatally Injured in Fall

William Roberts, 34, employee of the Northern Fishermen's Cold Storage, died at 11:50 Saturday night at the Prince Rupert General Hospital as a result of a fractured skull sustained at 4:15 that afternoon while employed at that plant when he fell twenty feet through a door to the dock floor below. He is survived by a widow and child. There were no eye-witnesses of the tragedy. Deceased had been carrying on his usual duties at the plant a few minutes before he was found in an unconscious condition by fellow employees on the dock evidently following the fall.

An inquest was commenced yesterday before Coroner A. J. Lancaster with jurors in the persons of G. J. Dawes, foreman, William Lamble, Arthur Phillips, Malcolm McLeod, J. C. Gilker and J. E. Davey. After viewing the body, the inquest was adjourned until this afternoon. The late Mr. Roberts was a native of Wales but had lived in Prince Rupert for many years and was well and favorably known. His widow is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Reg Clarke. The bereaved will have the sympathy of many friends.

EDITORIALS

DEAR LITTLE DEBT-PAYING FINLAND

Finland is much in the public eye and we certainly would not try to detract in the least from the glory that is hers. The only thing that irks us is the glorifying of that country on account of her being, as a radio announcer called her, "Dear little debt-paying Finland." Yet when she went to Wall Street last week for a loan she was refused. The following from the St. Thomas Times-Journal was chosen by the Financial Post as the editorial of the week:

"American people are taking a greater interest in the fate of Finland than they are in the fate of Poland, chiefly because they have a tender feeling toward the Finns for meeting their debt payments on time without fail. There is scarcely an American citizen who does not speak of Finland paying its 'war debt.' The same expression is employed by editors, including some of those on the leading dailies, and at the same time they accuse Great Britain and France of 'welshing,' thus making an invidious and erroneous comparison, taking no account of the foolishly made, foolishly accepted and impracticable terms of settlement.

"The Finland debt is not a war debt at all. It is money loaned to Finland in 1919 and later, for internal rehabilitation. The debt was funded at \$8,195,000, with interest of one-quarter per cent. The British debt was funded at \$4,368,000,000 and seven times that rate of interest. When Great Britain suspended paying she had returned \$2,024,848,817, or very nearly half the principal, in a few years, yet the interest payments brought up the aggregate obligation to \$11,105,965,000, spread over a period of 62 years. In other words, the interest of the British debt of \$4,368,000,000 amounted to \$6,737,000,000. Finland has now paid off 5,656,598.

"If Britain had been granted the same rate of interest as Finland the debt would have been liquidated long ago.

"The British government spent over \$4,000,000,000 in cash in the United States for war supplies and foodstuffs before restoring to the big line of credits. Manufacturers, large and small became millionaires; every worker, every farmer, made more money than they ever dreamed of. To use good American idiom, they became 'lousy with money.'

"The obvious fact is that all these things were sold to the Allies at profiteer prices. If fair prices had been fixed, if only, say, a ten per cent boost had been allowed, the war debt would never have arisen. Then there would have been nothing to 'settle' after the war and the cry of 'welshers' would never have been heard. There is far more justification for the contrary name of 'Shylock.' And President Coolidge would never have made his silly, unthinking crack, 'They hired the money.'

UNIVERSITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA BASKETBALLERS HERE FOR LOCAL SERIES

Locals To Go Up Against First String Senior Provincial Outfit But Are Confident of Being Able to Make Showing

To meet the Standard Oilers of Prince Rupert, Northern British Columbia champions, in a series of two exhibition games tonight and tomorrow, the first line senior basketball team of University of British Columbia in the Vancouver City League arrived in Prince Rupert this morning aboard the steamer Prince Rupert. The locals

are going up against stiff competition in this series but are confident that they have a chance. Meantime, the Vancouver visitors are getting a hearty welcome in local athletic circles and sport fans generally will be out in large numbers for the games. The Vancouver players will return south on the Prince Rupert tomorrow night.

The University of British Columbia team consists of Doug Alexander, Pat Flynn, Doug Pedlow, George Pringle, Byron Straight, Don Livingston and Brud Matheson.

N. L. Van Vleet, director of physical education at the University of British Columbia, is accompanying the team as coach.

George Pringle, who plays guard with the University team, was a member of the Canadian senior championship team three years ago. The other regular guard of the University team is Brud Matheson. The rest of the visiting players are regular forwards with Pat Flynn in the key centre position.

Herb 'Tod' Morgan, the best all-round athlete on the team, comes from noble Welsh stock and, although he was not born in the city, Herbie has been in the spotlight here since he was just a youngster. Herbie counted for an even 19 points in the first game here last winter with New Metlakatla, Alaska and all throughout the year he was a consistent scorer in all games.

Herb is treasurer of the Football Association and also the finest goal keeper in the country.

Sonny Beynon, the "shot of the team," is also the youngest member of the squad. Born in Port Simpson in the year 1912, young William first played basketball here with the old Scythian Intermediate team in 1936. Since that time he has always been in the first ten on the scoring column and very close to the top. The tougher the game the better he goes, a fact he proved by pulling the N.B.C. cup out of the hands of the Premier team last year in the playoffs.

Jackie Campbell, slender forward and the neatest ball handler of the team, will see more action this year than last and will make up one-third of the fast line of Beynon, Macphee and Campbell. He plays outfield for the city baseball team, is very adept on the soccer field, plays the traps in one of the local orchestras and sings in his spare moments.

Jim Currie forms one of the pillars of the defence and carries more weight per inch than any other member on the team. Born in Scotland at a very early age, Jim was carried to this country in the arms of his mother and immediately started following in his father's footsteps on the football field later switching to basketball. Fast on his feet and probably the best long-shot of the squad Jim should show up well this year if he takes his opportunities instead of trying to assist others in the scoring column.

Helge Holkestad, the rookie of the team, gives promise of holding down a regular forward berth on the team next season as he is working well with any of the lines and shoots well from any angle. Helge is captain of the local High School team and a very popular student at the home of the learned.

Last but not least is Bobbie Houston, the short stocky guard who starred all last season in inter-town games. A going concern for the full four periods should be called to do so, Bobby is probably the most outstanding basketball player in the city today. Bobby also plays football and tennis in summer and teamed with Angus Macphee won the city and Canadian National men's doubles title last August.

Another of the bigger boys on the team is Sev. Dominato who has switched from centre to guard to fill up the vacancy which threatened when Bobbie Houston joined up in defence of his country. Commonly known as "Wop," Sev has won many ball games with his unorthodox shooting. Sev was born in Prince Rupert in the year 1918 and has spent all his life in this northern metropolis.

Sonny Stiles, the good-looking big centre of other all-star teams in the past, is now also playing guard and with his size will undoubtedly prove the adage of a good big man being better than a good little man. If there are rebounds to be had we'll bet on Sonny. An All Star pitcher on the city baseball team and also

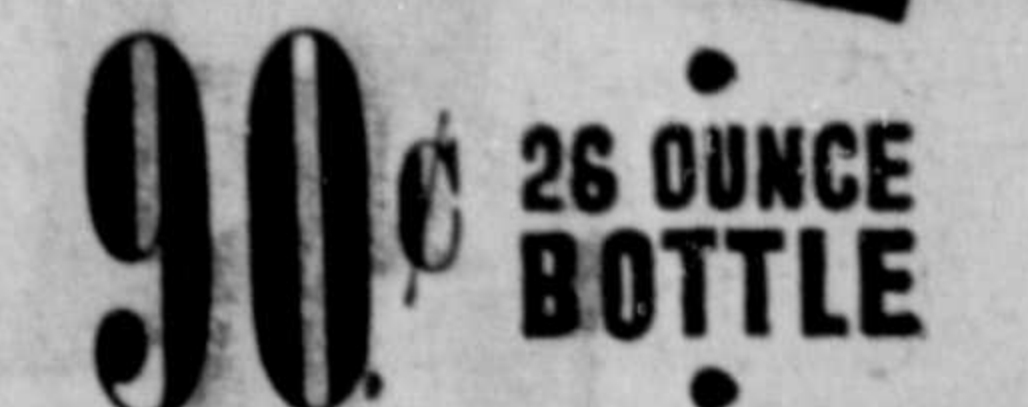

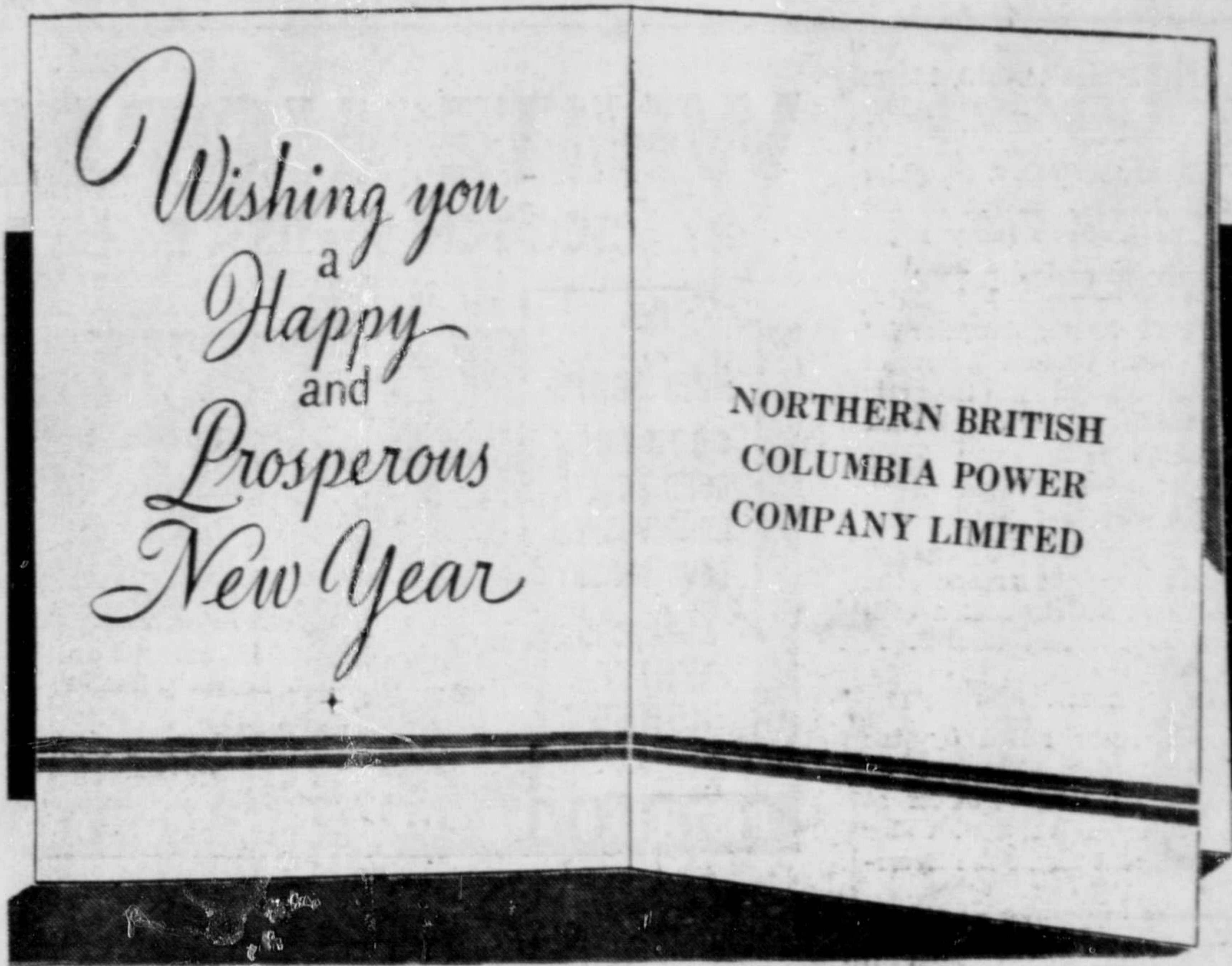
