"GOD KNOWS I'VE DONE MY BEST" DECLARES CHAMBERLAIN IN SEEKING SWEEP-ING AUTHORITY FOR GOVERNMENT—OPPOSITION GIVES CHEERING ASSENT DALADIER MOVES FOR NATIONAL UNION GOVERNMENT IN FRANCE — ALL FAC-TIONS TO UNITE TO RESIST IMMINENT GERMAN MOVE

LONDON, August 24: (CP)—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that Chancellor Adolf Hitler had demanded a free hand in East Europe and said that Great Britain "finds herself confronted with imminent perils of war." He made these statements in asking Parliament, summoned in special session, to clothe the government with sweeping powers to meet any emergency. These would include the taking over of the railways and other transportation, control of food supplies and defence against air attacks. Mr. Chamberlain told the House that the British government's first duty was to declare that British obligations towards Poland remained unaffected. Members, packing the chamber to capacity, rose and cheered the Prime Minister after he declared: "If all our efforts to find a peaceful solution—and God Knows I have done my best fail and we find ourselves forced to embark upon a struggle bound to be fraught with suffering and misery for all mankind and the end of which no man can foresee, we shall not be

fighting for the political future of a far-away state in foreign lands. We shall be fighting for preservation of those principles destruction of which would involve destruction of all possibility of peace and security for the peoples of the world."

The cheering the Prime Minister received from all sides as he completed his thirty-three minute speech seemed to evidence burial of political differ-

Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood, acting leader of the Labor Opposition, and Sir Archibald Sinclair, Liberal leader, pledged support of their parties to the government. The House adjourned until August 31 after ap-

proving the government's Emergency Powers Defence Act on third reading without division. The bill goes immediately to the House of Lords.

King George was reliably reported to have taken far-reaching steps today by the signing of orders-incouncil to strengthen Great Britain's preparedness.

### FRENCH NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

In Paris Premier Edouard Daladier made plans to form a national union government, uniting all factions in France, it was learned today as five classes of reservists massed under partial French mobilization. Emergency troops, bearing war packs, sped to the German and Italian frontiers. Some well informed diplomatic quarters predicted a German move by tomorrow and perhaps tonight.

THERE'S ALWAYS HOPE

In spite of the present unsatisfactory situation there is still hope that war may be averted although it is difficult to see just how it is to be done. Feeling in Prince Philadelphia Rupert is certainly against giving way to Hitler even if it st. Louis means great sacrifices. Nobody wants war and, if making a reasonable concession would end the tension and settle John Cobb May matters, most people would favor that action. The difficulty is that concessions never settle anything. Evident ly the best thing to do is to stand firm and fight if necessary. A courageous front often saves the day.

If we are forced into war we feel sure that Canadians More Rapidly will give a good account of themselves: Britain has been faced with possible war so long that the people are not easily stampeded and will meet anything that comes with confidence that they are ready and that their cause is just.

### GERMAN ATTITUDE

We do not think that most Germans want to fight. six miles per minute. They are kept in ignorance of the real situation by means of a controlled press. They have been told so often that Hitler does not want war that they have come to believe he will keep them out of it.

However, the Germans, like the British, will fight and fight well if the time comes that they have to do so. Very few people would try to minimize the effectiveness of the German war machine but we all have faith in the British and we know that the French also can fight effectively. CONNECTIONS WANTED Then there is an army of two million or thereabouts in WEST African importers and ex- ed to her home in Terrace after at-Poland with backs to the wall. We are saying nothing about Russia because that country is evidently not to be depended upon by either side. If it fights on the German side it will be in order to get a slice of Poland. That seems opposed to Communist ideology.

Meantime it is for us to carry on just as if nothing Africa. was going to happen. Then if nothing does happen we shall be all right.





Mr. Alder told how the first council in 1910 had put through a bylaw for \$650,000 for street grading and sewer construction. It was the fall of 1916 before the bonds had been placed, financing meantime being provided by the banks. Before the bonds were sold, at a considerable discount owing to the war, the city had paid no less than \$109,-000 in interest to the banks.

City borrowing altogether since incorporation, Mr. Alder continued, had amounted to \$2,900,000 and \$3,-900.000 had been paid back on principal and interest with a debt still left as of three years ago amounting to \$1,300,000. Such was the penalty of interest.

Mr. Alder told of some things that had been done to improve the city's financial position. Prince Rupert had been planned for ten times the population it now had and that presented a great problem. If the population was centred between the two creeks, the position would be much happier. Instead of that, however, there were twenty-one miles of streets to keep up.

Bumpy Streets

Complaint was heard, Mr. Alder said, of bumps in some of the streets. In the residential sections that was due largely to the construction of streets in the foundations of which old timber had, been laid. When the old planks rotted away, bumps developed. Rebuilding for the time being was a' matter for the future. Meantime, the only thing that could be done was to maintain a good hard surface and keep water from under-

The next major expenditure which would face the city, Mr. Alder said, would probably be sewer! replacement on Third Avenue be-I tween Fulton and McBride Streets and on Eighth Street from Third Avenue to the railway tracks. To rebuild streets possibly from \$10,-000 to \$30,000 would be required but


