# British Minister Says "No War"

## Government Has Good Reason To Anticipate Peace Declares Inskip

Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax Discusses Oriental Situation During Debate in House of Lords

OBAN, Scotland, August 3: (CP)—Sir Thomas Inskip, Secretary of State for the Dominions, speaking here today, said that war is unlikely and the British government has "very good reasons for making such a statement."

LONDON, August 3: (CP)—Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax declared tonight that Great Britain would be prepared to use her good offices "if and when they could usefully be employed" to mediate the Chinese-Japanese conflict. He made the statement in a foreign affairs debate in the House of Lords after giving Japan an indirect warning that anti-British agitation in North China could only make worse the relations between Great Britain and Japan "with all the consequences that deterioration must inevitably bring."

## GOV'T HAS RESIGNED

Stevens Coalition Administration in New South Wales Quits Following Revolt in Legislature

SYDNEY, Australia, Aug. 3: (CP)—Premier Bertram Stevens tendered the resignation of his New South Wales coalition government today following a revolt in the Legislative Assembly in which the government was defeated.

## JOIN FOR DEFENCES

Canadian-American Conference to Be Held Next Week in Ottawa, It Is Announced

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 3: (CP)—Air routes linking the United States, Canada and Alaska and improvement of American defences in the direction of the Pacific Ocean will be outlined at a Canadian-American conference to be held in Ottawa next Wednesday.

Among plans to be considered will be the institution of an airplane service between the United States and Alaska with or without stops in Canada.

LONDON, August 3: (CP)—A solid Scottish lass with a smile that beats diplomacy by a mile, found—if she had time to read newspapers on the eve of her 39th birthday—her own cherished ambition as a successful mother had been overshadowed by her even greater success in the glare of the British throne.

When Queen Elizabeth gave up her comparatively obscure role as a secondary figure in the royal family circle to partner George VI. as ruler of the Empire, Britons showed hearty support to a serious young wife setting out to make the best of a hard job. Halibut arrivals at the port of Prince Rupert for the month of July this year were fifty per cent heavier than in the same month last year. The total this July was 3,624,000 pounds as compared with 2,428,200 pounds in July 1938. Canadian landings this July aggregated 1,812,500 pounds in comparison with 1,318,700 pounds last year while the American total this July was 1,751,500 pounds as compared with 1,069,500 pounds.

the arduous post. Elizabeth of York, in fact, was a commoner and even though she had been in the royal family, for some years it had never entered anyone's thoughts she would one day be called upon to assume the great burden of Queenship—and assume this burden under the difficult cloud which marked the abdication of Edward VIII.

Duty-conscious Elizabeth resigned herself to high office sensing the keen sympathy of the people and walked to her Coronation chair with a spiritual glint in her eye. As in everything else she has tackled—and her activities cover the wide range from practical nursing and motherhood to sports and public speaking—she has blossomed into a radiant success.

### Gained Popularity

As head of probably the most simple and home-like of the royal family groups she paid more attention to bringing up the headdress-presumptive Princess Elizabeth and her sister Margaret Rose and giving active support to social medical schemes for children and less attention to the society and diplomatic swirl and its accompanying wardrobe of Paris creations. But her job hadn't called for a style-setter and with her time and energy occupied in less glamorous but probably more creative channels she hadn't found it very convenient or necessary to set the pace at Ascot or Mayfair.

However this shrewd Scottish girl hadn't been Queen long before it was realized her appreciation of chic and in fact originality was as good as anybody's and better than most.

Britons looked upon her again and discovered a new charm. When she got back from Canada, minus 14 pounds in weight, they looked still again and gave hearty endorsement.

The New York Yankees were beaten again by the Detroit Tigers while the Cincinnati Reds bowed once more to New York Giants. In the American League the New York Yankees are now leading the Boston Red Sox, who split a double-header yesterday with the Cleveland Indians, by seven-and-a-half games. In the National League the Cincinnati Reds are ten-and-a-half games ahead of the second place St. Louis Cardinals who were idle with Boston Bees yesterday on account of rain. The New York Giants moved into leadership of the National League second division by winning their game while Brooklyn Dodgers were being blanked by Pittsburgh Pirates.

## LOG SCALE MOVING UP

With Good Month of July, Production Has Almost Reached Level of Last Year

After lagging behind during the early part of the year, log scaling in Prince Rupert forestry district for 1939 to date has almost caught up with 1938. So far this year the scale amounts to 55,662,361 board feet as compared with 59,831,303 board feet in the first seven months of 1938. The scale for this July was 22,754,898 board feet as against 16,646,140 board feet in July 1938.

## Forest Products

Production of poles and piling in the interior for this year has amounted to 606,410 lineal feet as compared with 650,224 lineal feet in the first seven months of 1938. The pole and pile production for July this year has been 263,664 lineal feet—259,060 lineal feet cedar and 4,604 lineal feet hemlock—as against 124,618 lineal feet in July 1938, thus showing a substantial increase for the month just ended. The tie count this July was 14,851 pieces, all hemlock, as compared with 14,647 pieces in July 1938. A total of 488 cords of wood was scaled this July as compared with 447 in July 1938.

**INVASION OF ITALY**

**BRITISH MILITIA**

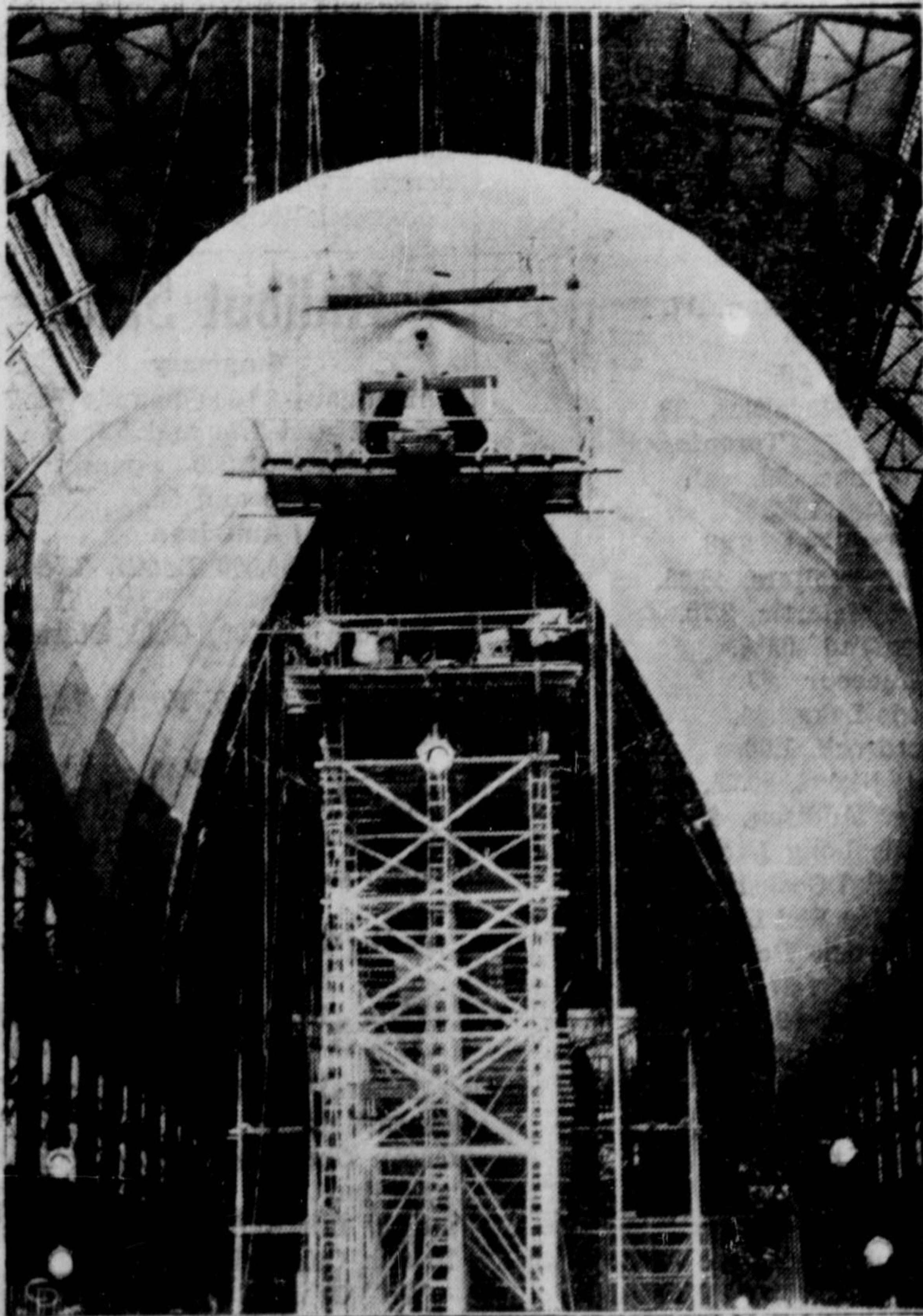
When the government decided to conscript a home defence army it expected the first draft would bring 200,000 men but in-

stead of that the number registering was 220,000. For those who objected on conscientious grounds to fighting, provision was made but against the large number of conscripts only 3775 sheltered themselves behind the provision. That was less than four per cent of the whole. It was a pretty good intimation of the feeling of the people generally.

**BOMB SHELTERS ORDERED**

The British government has ordered a supply of bomb shelters for the use of the people of Britain in case of war. We are told that a contract has been let for the supply of two and a half million. It is to be hoped that they may never be used for the purpose for which they are designed. If they are not needed they may serve as dog kennels, chicken coops or rabbit hutches when this war fever has abated. In the meantime, we are glad that any British people are ready for any emergency.

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**SERVICE CLUB IS GROWING**

Vancouver Has 250 Members, Victoria, 130; New Westminster, 50; Port Moody, 50 and Port Alberni Next

VICTORIA, Aug. 3.—The British Columbia Women's Service Club, whose aim is to train women for auxiliary service in any emergency, whether it be war or not — has grown to the point where its four units could now combine and parade almost a full peacetime battalion strong.

Last week the club achieved the first step toward its main goal, that of recognition as a definite part of the Dominion's defence forces, when Hon. Ian Mackenzie, Minister of National Defence, told a delegation of its officers that he fully approved of the work the club was doing.

The four—Mrs. N. Kennedy, president; Miss I. K. Carey, treasurer; Miss M. E. Brown, secretary, and Miss J. MacLennan, director of meetings—went over from Victoria to Vancouver for the interview with the minister.

At the same time the officers announced the formation of two new detachments in New Westminster and Port Moody.

The Victoria detachment—first of its sort to be formed in Canada—now has 130 members, a strength which its organizers believe is likely to remain stable, representing a proper proportion by militia standards.

The Vancouver unit numbers about 250 women and the new units at Port Moody and New Westminster have each between 50 and 75 members.

**Port Alberni Next**

It is expected a fifth detachment, at Port Alberni, will come into existence when the Women's Service Club, which is inactive during July and August, resumes its regular training program.

The reason the club wants to become a part of the national defence set-up—as similar organizations are in all other parts of the British Empire—is not that it yearns to parade in uniform, Mrs. Kennedy said here, but that it requires the instruction and equipment which would become available to it through a connection with the militia.

The work of the club is divided into four main sections, motor transport, including the study of motor mechanics, map reading, radio and signalling and actual driving of cars and trucks; first aid, with the members taking the St. John Ambulance Association course, training in stretcher-bearing and studying hygiene, sanitation and medical supplies; commissariat work, including dietetics, the ordering and dispensing of supplies and camp cooking, and clerical work which involves the study of army rules and procedures, military correspondence and codes.

The club differs from the register of women for national service which is being started in Ontario in that it gives actual active training. One of its main objects is to provide a corps of women ready to step in and train others in the event of an emergency.

The idea, which originated in Victoria, has already spread beyond British Columbia. Similar clubs have been formed in Peterboro, Ont., and on Quebec's Gaspé Peninsula and another is projected in Edmonton.
