CONSERVATIVE NOMINATIONS AT SOUTH END

Two-Man Government on the Stump---Bowser and McBride at Field---The "Solid Five" Renominated at Vancouver

(Special to Daily News.)

Vancouver, March 9.—Bowser, Watson, MacGowan, Tisdall and McGuire, known as the "solid five," were renominated by the Conservatives last night to contest at the city elections for the legislature.

Newcastle Candidates.

Victoria, March 9.—Pooley of Esquimalt and Mayor Dier of Ladysmith were nominated by the Conservative convention yesterday as the candidates for Newcastle.

Independent Candidate.

Golden, March 9.—H. G. Parsons was unanimously renominated for Columbia riding at the Conservative convention last evening. Harold G. Forster, a wealthy rancher, wrote asking that his name be not put before the meeting, as he intended to run as an independent Conservative.

In the afternoon Premier McBride, Attorney General Bowser, Minister Taylor and Mr. Forster addressed a meeting at Field. Mr. Forster stated that he knew he could not capture the convention so had decided to run as an independent, supporting McBride.

For Similkameen Riding.

Keremos, March 9.—The Conservatives of Similkameen yesterday afternoon nominated L. W. Shatford, late member, to contest the riding in the forthcoming elections.

PIONEER MAKES A LONG MUSH

Missionary Priest Father Coccolet Gets In from Fort St. James---To Preach at Catholic Church Tomorrow, Both Services.

Father Bunoz called at the news office this morning and introduced Father Coccolet, who arrived on the train from a "mush" between seven and eight hundred miles. He makes Fort, St. James, some distance from Fort George, his headquarters, and he started from there New Year's day by a pony party way, a dog team for some of the many miles and on snowshoes the rest, arriving at Hazelton on March 7th. This is going some, but the reverend father has been musing through the wilds these many years. He is one of the few remaining pioneer missionaries of the early days of the province, a very long time ago he having founded the St. Eugene mission in East Kootenay. The father has here four years ago and his many friends will be pleased to see this old consolation bearing missionary so hale and hearty. They will have the pleasure of seeing and hearing him at Hazelton this morning and evening services at the Catholic Church tomorrow.

PRINCE RUPERT SOCIALISTS NOMINATE MONTGOMERY

W. H. Montgomery is the chosen candidate of the Prince Rupert Socialist party for the upcoming provincial campaign. Nomination was made at a meeting last night, two other candidates being nominated, but withdrawing in order to allow Montgomery's nomination to be unanimous. These two were Walter Shaw and W. Dinny, both well known and popular men in the labor world of Rupert. The Socialists announce that they mean to fight a vigorous campaign for their cause. No platform is announced, but the candidate expresses himself ready to undertake all around reform of existing conditions on behalf of his party, and as in-

stanced in his council board work. On railroad policy in the province he will be outspoken and critically constructive. On the representation of Prince Rupert in the provincial house he will be keen and caustic. He will ask the pointed questions of the electors: "Has Prince Rupert ever had representation?" The claims of organized labor will have the fullest representation in the Socialist candidate. As candidate for the Socialist party in the present campaign Alderman Montgomery will address his first meeting in the Empress Theatre at 4 o'clock on Sunday.

DEFENSE WITNESSES SWEAR THE WINDSOR IS WELL RUN

This morning the Windsor hotel case was adjourned until Friday, 16th inst., in order that Mr. Peters may secure the presence of an essential witness for prosecution. Magistrate Cars referred to the newspaper comments on frequent adjournments of other cases during the last week or two, but declared the case adjourned. Mr. Patmore asked for a correction of the Empire's report of yesterday's proceedings. In his evidence the Chinaman had given the impression that he had seen a man come out of room 23. He afterward corrected this to say that the man had come from the corridor, not from the room. The Empire had omitted the Chinaman's correction. Witnesses for the defense were today examined. Messrs. Miller,

Evans and Coleman, all of whom had been resident in the hotel during the suspected time, declared they had no reason at all to believe the street rumors regarding the conduct of the place. They considered the hotel well conducted. Mayor Newton, chairman of the license board, was present this morning and arranged with the Empire reporter for the correction of the point brought up by Mr. Patmore. Referring to the woman Daisy Adams, who as housekeeper at the Windsor had struck one witness as efficient and honest in her work, Magistrate Cars after the court adjourned remarked that if this woman was trying to lead a good life it was a shame that slur should be cast on her. He said that Rev. F. W. Kerr's recent sermon appealed to him in this matter.

PRINCE RUPERT TWENTY MINUTES AGO

Victoria, March 9.—Plans and specifications will be prepared in a few days in readiness to invite contractors for the construction of a breakwater 2,500 feet long off the outer harbor. This is the first plan of harbor works to cost several millions.

SEARCH FOR A PARK ON ACROPOLIS HILL

Mayor, City Engineer and Members of Council Proceed on a Pilgrimage With Representatives of Recreation and Athletics Interested in Proposed Grant of Ground

With the Mayor and City Engineer several members of the City Council and representatives of those interested in athletics in the city yesterday afternoon made a tour over Acropolis Hill and around the reservoir under construction to select, if possible, a suitable area for athletic grounds. The party consisted of the Mayor, city engineer, Alderman Morrissey, Alderman Maitland, Alderman Bullock - Webster, Alderman George Kerr and the redoubtable Alderman Douglas, also Rev. W. H. McLeod, Hubert Crew and A. Toby. The result of the tour proved that suitable ground extending to a considerable area exists on Acropolis Hill for the purposes proposed, and City Engineer Davis is going to prepare for the plans alternative schemes for athletic grounds, which will be staked out-and, then re-considered on the spot by the Council and those interested with a view to the final decision. That the city is disposed to grant the ground is certain.

Tom Took a Drink.

Yesterday's excursion was like a brief repetition of Mayor Manson's famous water devining expedition around the basins of Morse and Hays creeks. The

party set out from the city hall and scaled Acropolis Hill to the reservoir works, which were examined with interest by the Mayor and Alderman Morrissey, but with more intimate interest by Alderman Tom Maitland, who had a drink from the rock men's pail and a chat with the boys at the drills. It would have taken but slight persuasion to have got him to take off his coat and get busy himself.

Fine Armory Site.

Armed with a formidable scroll of blue print, the City Engineer led the way around by the west side of the hill facing the sea. Here, just below the reservoir, there is a considerable cleared and fairly level space which is most likely to be the site of the new drill hall and parade grounds granted to Earl Grey's Rifles. Seen from the harbor an imposing armory erected on this site will form a commanding feature of Prince Rupert some day, and the ground can be graded with reasonable ease for the drill park.

Douglas Lay Down.

Now the party plunged into the scrub cedar and uncleared area on the west side of the hill. Even after the past weeks of strong sunshine the ground proved marshy in places, and the Mayor bewailed his forgotten rubbers. Alderman Douglas made manful progress just as he had done on the water devining trip, but took

"EARLY" COMPLETION OF GOVT. WHARF

Whole of the Recent Correspondence With Mr. Manson and the Department---No Hopes of Wharf For This Season

The whole of the business men of Prince Rupert, irrespective of party or of the factions into which one of the parties is split up, believe that the early completion of the so-called people's wharf is of vital importance to business interests. They were led by government representatives to believe that it would be ready for business this time last year, and "Hope deferred maketh sick the heart." Promises after promises, yet weeks have lingered into months, months crept on to years, and promises of Manson only increase one's fears. The News a short time ago "butted in" to get some expression of fact in regard to the matter from our legislative representative, and wired him at Victoria. The following is the whole of the correspondence referred to. It is worth carefully reading, especially by those who believed Mr. Manson the man best fitted to represent this growing city at Victoria.

Dear Sir: Referring to our correspondence in regard to completion of government wharf at Prince Rupert, I beg to enclose herewith copy of a communication which has been received by me from the Deputy Minister of Public Works explaining the matter in detail. Sir: In connection with your letter of February 12th and interview with the Minister relating to the delay in completing the Prince Rupert wharf.

That there has been a great deal more time consumed in the completion of this structure than was originally expected is a fact that has occasioned much concern to the Department, but the weekly report sent by the clerk of works indicated, in the first place the unforeseen trouble in driving piles, i. e. the filling up of the bed by huge boulders thrown out during the course of the G. T. P. blasting operations. Then this difficulty having been overcome it was expected the work could be rushed to completion, but further trouble was experienced owing to the extreme high water and height of tide at Rupert, pre-

venting for a long time the placing of lateral braces, and even now work is proceeding very slowly owing to the above difficulties.

You will find enclosed a copy of a letter from the Westholme Lumber Company relative to the delay, and I also enclose a copy of a communication addressed this firm Feb. 9th, with copy of a letter referred to therein, written Mr. Kauffmann, by which you will see the Department has taken every action possible to preclude the likelihood of any unwarranted loss of time.

Might I also draw your attention to another feature of the case, viz: This wharf is the only one of its kind on the Pacific coast, and I am quite sure yourself and constituents will concur in the plan of having it a model one, and it would be an unwise act, for the sake of getting it into operation at this particular season, to overlook any essential features tending toward economic or satisfactory management. After the undersigned had visited Rupert and reported to the Minister, it was decided to rearrange the whole plan of shed room originally proposed, and in pursuance of the general policy of the Department separate tenders were asked for, after revised plans had been drawn out, which of course necessitated further loss of time.

DIED WHILE EATING A MEAL CAUSE OF DEATH MYSTERY

To imagine himself in such good health that he could order a plate of liver and onions, yet to be taken up dead before he had eaten more than a few mouthfuls, was the fate last night of Edward Shear, whose body now lies at E. L. Fisher's funeral chapel awaiting decision of Magistrate McMullin regarding the postmortem.

Shear died at the Eagle Cafe on Second avenue at about 1:30 last night. Falling in a faint over the counter after ordering a meal, he was taken out into the air, but never rose from the sidewalk where he was laid while a doctor was called. Constables Merritt and Adams summoned the aid of Dr. Tremayne, who

found life extinct. The doctor is unable to state precisely the cause of death and there may be an autopsy. The circumstances point to either apoplexy or heart failure, but the cause may be more obscure.

Deceased was a clever pianist and used to play the piano at the Knox Hotel, where he was well known. He was a man of about 40 years of age.

GASOLINE LAUNCH WRECKED ON FIRST RETURN JOURNEY

A new gasoline launch went up in smoke off Banks Island and two of the owners who had put their savings into it are deserving of sympathy, although they did escape with their lives. The energetic pioneers are Antoine Crompt and Robert Perry, and their gasoline launch cost about \$3,000. Their first trip was to Queen Charlotte City. They were returning from there to this city for a cargo of gasoline when off Banks Island there was an explosion and they had barely time to clamber into their little row

boat before the launch disappeared. They managed to make a landing on Banks Island, denuded of their supplies and everything except the clothes they wore, and after some trouble and delay managed to get an Indian to bring them here in his canoe. With them was a friend named A. Sullivan.

The three men were landed here this morning, and Messrs. Crompt and Perry returned to Queen Charlotte City on the Prince John this afternoon.

GLOOMIER AND GLOOMIER GROWS STRIKE OUTLOOK

(Special to Daily News.)
London, March 9.—All is still quiet among the strikers and they seem determined and confident of winning. Outside of this the situation grows gloomier and gloomier. Every hour brings news of other industries added to the long list of those shut down for want of fuel. Few trains are running and only the oil burning river boats and ferries.

Premier Asquith has again invited the parties to the coal dispute to a conference, for free and open discussion of all the points involved in the strike. This is to be held this afternoon. The gov-

ernment's proposals have not been made public, but the Premier expresses himself as hopeful of bringing the parties to an amicable settlement at this conference.

Several calls for troops have been received from mine owners for the protection of their properties, but no troops have been moved yet.

TAKING EVERY PRECAUTION

Candidate Manson to Have Special Provincial Constables at Every Poll Specially Instructed to Maintain Law and Order.

The opening of the present provincial campaign was ushered in by a descent on this constituency of a large flock of road bosses, trail builders and fire wardens, although the whole of the interior is covered deep with snow.

Another contingent to arrive early next week will be a battalion of special constables, whose energies will be devoted to maintaining law and order (heavy on the law and order) in every polling subdivision in the riding, all polling stations having less than ten votes will possibly be supplied with two special constables, in

order that there shall be no breach of the peace.

It is a very wise precaution on the part of the members and ex-mayor, Mr. Manson, to provide for every possible emergency and to stamp out the first indication of disorder on election day. Remembering the desperate condition of the city during the riot of a year ago and the absence of police protection, Mr. Manson will see to it that law and order will be maintained on election day at all cost.

However, the Department intends to have this wharf completed and put into operation just as expeditiously as possible, and I feel convinced that yourself and the committee writing you would, if they carefully reviewed all the circumstances of the case, decide that everything possible has been done.

Sir: Confirming conversation at the joint interview between Mr. S. Cameron of the Westholme Lumber Co. and myself, representing the Department of Public Works, in which you participated today.

It is distinctly understood that 4 weeks from this date you are to commence work in connection with the contract for the erection of sheds which you now hold, and press the work to completion. It being of course understood that if, for special causes the Department is satisfied that the whole of the braces which the Westholme Lumber Co. have to put in to complete their contract have not been erected, that your work is to be carried out in such a manner as not to interfere with theirs—of which Mr. Beatty, wharfinger at Rupert, will be the arbiter.

On the other hand, the Westholme Lumber Co. are to carry out their work with the utmost expedition and get clear of the space required for the sheds first.

We are using all possible despatch to complete same for our own as well as the interest of the Government, because the longer the work is in progress the greater our expenditure in proportion.

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JOHNSON AND JIM FLYNN

Twenty Round Contest for Heavyweight Championship to Be Fought July 2nd on the Nevada Border.

Salt Lake City, March 4.—Jim Flynn and Jack Johnson will meet in a 20-round bout for the heavyweight championship of the world at or near Wendover, Utah, on July 2nd. This is the substance of an announcement made this



morning by men who are financing the affair.

The statement was made after the information was received here from Carson City, Nev., that the legislature of that state did not take up before its adjournment the proposed repeal of the law permitting championship boxing matches in Nevada. It is said that the battle will take place across the line in Nevada within a few rods from the Wendover, Utah, depot.

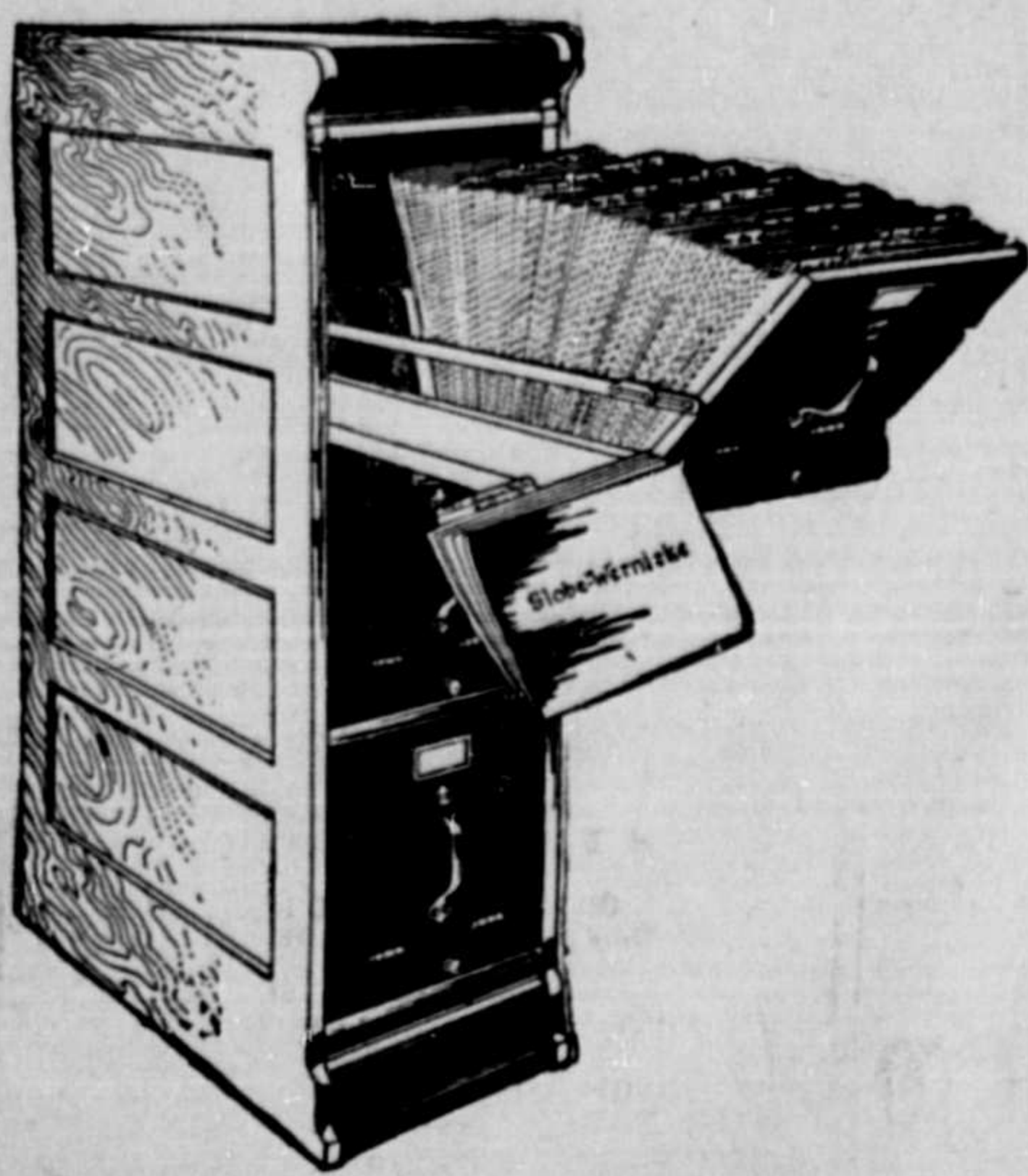
