## PREMIER HOLDING CONFERENCE WITH STRIKERS

### WINNIPEG VISITED BY AN IMMENSE FIRE

Five People Lost Their Lives and the Damage Done to Building and Manufacturing Plant Amounts to Three-Quarters of Million

(Special to Daily News.)  
Winnipeg, March 11.—The fire fighting force of the city was hurriedly called out Saturday night to a threatening fire in the International Harvester works. It resulted in the loss of six lives and property valued at over three quarters of a million.  
The fire was reported at 10:30 p.m. having first broke out in the company's warehouse at the corner of Sutherland avenue and Main street. The huge building was soon an immense blaze and in a very short time there was an explosion which blew out the end of the northeast end of the building, filling the air with a shower of sparks, machinery, building materials and bricks, many persons on the street being injured.  
Clarence Vicker, who was watching the fire from an adjoining room, was hurled by the concussion through a skylight and killed.

A fireman named Archie McPherson was also killed, and four citizens whose names are unknown were buried in the mass of brick and tangled wire. Three bodies have been recovered from the ruins so far.  
The flames spread to adjoining buildings and destroyed the Radford, Wright Company's shops and those of the Stuart Manufacturing Company, the Canadian Plow Company and Parlin & Orndorff. The flames were not entirely subdued until an early hour Sunday morning.  
A coroner's inquest is being held today to determine the cause of the explosion and fire late Saturday night, when six were killed and six seriously injured. It is believed to be the work of a firebug, as seven different alarms were rung in. Of the dead three were firemen and three passersby.

### NO SETTLEMENT YET IN SIGHT

More and More of British Industries Closing Down for Want of Fuel---Suburban Trains Stop and All Trams Crowded---All French Miners Strike in Sympathy With British Strike---Westphalian Miners Strike

(Special to Daily News.)  
London, March 11.—There are no signs of an immediate settlement of the coal strike, although Premier Asquith is still optimistic that an agreement will shortly be come to. Saturday, the ninth day of the strike, saw one hundred thousand more men thrown out of employment in addition to those previously reported. Sunday passed quietly and this morning brings no apparent change in the situation. The conference of the strikers and operators with Premier Asquith is to be continued this afternoon.  
London, March 11.—(Latest.)—Despite the fact that the coal struggle shows no signs of ending, everything remains quiet and much confidence is expressed in the result of the conference between the operators and miners, which is just going into session, at which Premier Asquith is to be present.  
The large paper mills in the Midlands had to close at noon today. The fuel shortage is being felt in the pottery districts and their early closing is expected. Nothing is doing in the furnaces and iron industries about Wolverhampton.  
London suburban traffic is tied up and the authorities have allowed the rule against standing in trams to be lifted, owing to the fact that few suburban trains are running and many thousands have to travel by the surface cars.

Last week only thirty thousand tons of coal were shipped from North Wales into England, while shipments generally are half a million tons.  
Berlin, March 11.—The Westphalian miners, numbering two hundred thousand, struck this morning. Most of the factories have coal to last three weeks. The police and soldiers are keeping strict order. The fight really is between the Socialist and anti-Socialist leaders.  
Paris, March 11.—The Miners' Federation of France has ordered a strike to show the government the strength of the union and as a measure of sympathy with the British miners.

### ANOTHER WHOLESALE HOUSE ADDED TO RAILROAD AVENUE

PRINCE RUPERT THE GREAT DISTRIBUTING CENTRE FOR HUNDREDS OF MILES NORTH AND SOUTH AND HUNDREDS OF MILES OF HINTERLAND.

Tourists will begin to arrive here soon and, if they have been here before, will see a new Prince Rupert. After the steam roller has been at work again they will have the opportunity of admiring the broad avenues, which they were unable to appreciate last year when these avenues and adjacent streets in the business section were dirty holes filled with rubbish on each side of the plank roadway.  
But what is sure to impress them in the first place are the great wholesale warehouses on Railway avenue—merely a beginning but still impressive for a town so young. The number of such buildings must rapidly increase in the natural order of things, for this is bound to become a really great wholesaling and distributing centre. The quantity of goods shipped up Skeena valley during the short time the hundred miles of railway has been in operation was astonishing to the railway company itself. What it will be this fall, with the rails extending to Hazelton and beyond, the development of the mining industry and the crowds of new settlers coming in, scarcely be approximated.  
With this rapidly developing trade the number of wholesale firms must grow to cope with it, and to bring into the business a healthy competition. Another wholesale house is announced today, that of Fred G. Manson. Not a word need be said to Mr. Dawson personally. He is too well and favorably known to need it. He is one of the pioneers and has been in the brokerage and manufacturers' agency business for four years. He is also one of the many of the early business men of the city who have "made good" and are now branching out on a larger scale. He has leased two whole houses, 50 by 50 feet each, of the Grey-Morris warehouse on Rail-

way avenue, and will carry a full line of teas, coffees, cocoas, spices, extracts, jams, pickles, biscuits, confectionery, nuts and grocers' specialties, commanding a wide field for business over which he is personally acquainted.

### MONTGOMERY HITS MANSON AND M'BRIDE

Land Policy of the Two-Man Government Comes in for Scathing Condemnation by the Socialist Candidate

Alderman Clayton fired the first campaign gun on Saturday night. On Sunday afternoon Alderman W. H. Montgomery, who had lent his presence at the Clayton meeting, held a meeting of his own in the Empress Theatre. Walter Shaw and W. Dinny, both of whom had been aspirants for the nomination of the Socialist convention, were present, lending their support to the candidate. That this was in striking contrast to the attitude toward each other of the rival aspirants for nomination in the Conservative ranks was pointed out by Mr. Montgomery in his address.  
The candidate's speech was from the word "go" an attack on the McBride administration, which panders, he said, to speculators and capitalistic exploiters of labor while neglecting the most primitive needs in the way of roadways, wharves, etc., of pioneers who are really developing the province.  
Montgomery smote Mr. Manson hip and thigh with the scourge of accusation. Mr. Manson, he said, met every ap-

peal made to him with the time-worn phrase: "I will see into it." He could not give a straight reply. He is essentially a politician at a time when politics had sunk so low that rather than be called a politician Mr. Montgomery would prefer to be called a rogue and vagabond. Mr. Manson's "see into it" policy never resulted in the doing of a thing for the worker or the constituency. He merely sat dumb and numb in the legislature, bobbing up like a marionette to say "Aye" when a vote was necessary on a Bowser-McBride measure. He has not the courage to stand up for the rights of the people. He is fit only to assent to the doings of the McBride government, and the McBride government, said Mr. Montgomery, "has gone through on nothing else but fraud."  
Mr. Montgomery pointed out that under the McBride government it is next to impossible for a pre-emptor to secure a few acres of land because though he locate them and stake them he is time and again out-surveyed by

some vast timber or coal claim coming after him to keep the land a shaggy wilderness for years when it might become populous and cultivated simply because some moneyed land grabber has purchased it from the McBride-Bowser administration for a twentieth part of its real value. McBride's boasted bank surplus swelled thus but lay idle when it should be devoted to the encouragement of the development of the resources of the province by the people.  
"Given the land," said Mr. Montgomery, "labor can get along and make good without capital, but capital without labor is helpless. Vote for me," he said, "if you would work toward the better administration of the resources of the province, and against McBride's two-man government, of which Mr. Manson is a supporter."  
The Socialist candidate had a big audience and rousing cheers broke out during and at the conclusion of his speech, and the addresses in his support of Messrs. Dinny, Shaw and Leblanc,

## NOT OF "BOTH-FEET-IN-THE-TROUGH" PARTY.

We hasten to apologize for a stupid blunder that crept into our news columns some days ago by which a worthy gentleman was misrepresented. The paragraph stated that old guard Conservatives were mentioning as a desirable candidate T. Vaughn Rhys of Stewart with growing confidence. Under date of the 8th inst. we have received from Mr. Rhys the following polite note:

The Editor Prince Rupert News:  
The joke is either on you or on me. But why did you make it the "Both-Feet-in-the-Trough" branch of the Conservative party?

The joke is certainly on us, for Mr. Rhys happens to be the worthy president of the Stewart Liberal Association.

## GEORGE GRAHAM AND PARTY LEADERSHIP.

George Graham, who for some time has been as a sword not taken out of its sheath, will now unsheath himself again. This does not mean that he will be the leader of the Liberal party, observes the Vancouver Sun. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is too loyal to his party to retire yet. If he were not loyal, he is too fond of excitement. If the old statesman withdrew to private life now the ghosts of the past would reach out their hands from an unforgettable world and he would have to come back again, if the shadows of age had not gathered too thickly around him. George Graham will probably become leader when age has put out the fire of vitality that is still burning brightly in Wilfrid Laurier. George Graham will have to wait until the life that flames yet in that old face is burnt out.

But George Graham, whom the House of Commons has missed more than any of those who were left at home by the voters last September, will be second in command. He is the heir-apparent and will come to the throne in the course of events. It is not likely that Wilfrid Laurier will ever be premier of Canada again. But it is not at all unlikely that George Graham will. He is very popular with his party, and if he is not now as strong intellectually as the old leader he will unfold.

The Fort George Herald says that the Liberals are well organized throughout the district, and if their candidate be a man capable of dispassionate and logical condemnation of a policy that has many shortcomings, they will be a force to be reckoned with, even in a district that will reap so much direct benefit from the forthcoming railway policy as this district of Cariboo.

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## Platform of the Liberals of British Columbia

Adopted at the Vancouver Convention, March 1st, 1912

### 1. Free Lands for Settlers—None for Speculators.

We emphatically condemn the McBride government for its connivance at the evasion of the land laws by persons, syndicates and corporations, who have been allowed to obtain millions of acres of the choicest accessible public lands, which are held without use and to the detriment of the province as a whole.

We hold that agricultural land should be disposed of only on such conditions as will ensure its continuous use and occupation.

Free homesteads to actual settlers. Holders of pre-emptions to be given benefit of this provision.

Advances to settlers on easy terms to assist in land clearing, dyking, irrigation and other permanent improvements.

Surveys of all accessible agricultural lands to be rapidly completed, and survey sheets and all necessary information to be made easily available to the public.

Settlement in block to be encouraged by the removal of reserves, which scatter population and greatly increase the cost of roads, schools and other necessary facilities.

No public land for the speculator.

### 2. Transportation.

The immediate construction of a railway to Peace River.

We will co-operate with the Dominion government in securing all-rail connection between the railway systems of Vancouver Island and the railway systems of the mainland.

The construction of a line owned by the government to give direct communication, by the best route as to grades and distances, between the Similkameen and other interior points and the coast.

We favor the husbanding of the Provincial credit to assist lines that will open up new territory.

Provincial credit and resources not to be wasted in paralleling existing lines.

No land subvention to railways beyond what is necessary for railway purposes.

Abolition of the system of giving away Crown lands for town-sites free of taxation and under railway control.

Aid to railways not to exceed what is reasonably necessary to secure construction.

The prevention of over capitalization of railways.

The Province to co-operate with the Dominion in aiding railway and highway construction.

All franchises for the construction, operation and ownership or leasing of government-aided roads to be open for public competition.

Freight, passenger and express rates and telegraph tolls of all government-aided roads to be under the jurisdiction of the Dominion Railway Commission.

With a view to meeting the demand for the transportation of grain from Saskatchewan and Alberta, the immediate construction of government-owned elevators.

The people to control the railways, and not the railways the people.

### 3. Timber.

We condemn without reserve the wholesale disposal of timber lands to speculators, which has been the only timber policy of the present government.

We advocate the survey, cruising and valuation of timber lands by the government before alienation, and the disposal of all such lands by public competition to actual users.

Improved methods of preventing timber waste and systematized reforestation.

Hand loggers licenses to be granted where conditions demand.

Coal lands not to be alienated, but leased under conditions to be fixed periodically by the legislature.

Wherever practicable and necessary government operation of coal mines to be at once undertaken with a view to reduction of existing prices.

We insist upon the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the present exorbitant coal prices.

We condemn the present educational autocracy of the government.

We recommend the appointment of a representative advisory board in educational matters, such as exists in all other provinces.

The present school curriculum is so overloaded with subjects as to render thorough education in any branch impossible.

We advocate an increase of

manual and agricultural training and domestic science teaching, and the establishment of an efficient system of technical schools.

The present school system bears unjustly on settlers in unorganized districts, and should be immediately remedied.

### 6. Representation.

The government's policy as to revision of the voters' lists and precipitating the present election without a proper redistribution of constituencies is a complete subversion of all the privileges of representative government.

We favor personal registration and insist on immediate redistribution.

We favor woman suffrage and personal property taxes, and the raising of the exemption of income limit to \$2,000.

### 7. Taxation.

Abolition of the poll tax. Exemption of improvements on all lands paying taxes to the Provincial government.

A readjustment of the system of taxation whereby the Province may receive a fairer proportion of the unearned increment.

Immediate reform of the present costly, cumbersome and inequitable system of collecting school taxes in unorganized districts.

### 8. Labor—Workmen's Compensation Without Litigation.

A Provincial department of labor to be created, and a free government labor bureau established.

Thorough and frequent inspection of all industrial premises to ensure health, sanitation and safety.

The complete prohibition of child labor in factories and shops.

The present system of employers' liability insurance bears heavily upon employers, and is a frequent source of injustice to workmen and their families. We advocate the establishment by the government of a permanent industrial insurance commission, independent of politics. This commission to have full charge of a system providing positive compensation to employees for injury received during employment, without recourse to litigation, and giving employers the benefit of accident insurance at minimum cost.

The extension of the scope of the Workmen's Compensation Act, so as to cover all hazardous employments.

The payment of wages should be made at least fortnightly.

### 9. Oriental Immigration.

We unhesitatingly condemn the hypocrisy of the Provincial government as evidenced by its refusal to re-enact its own remedy—the Natal Act—on the ground that it would embarrass the Conservative Dominion government.

We stand for a "White British Columbia," and advocate continuously increasing stringency in immigration laws until this result is attained. The Liberals of British Columbia are in favor of the total exclusion of Orientals from the Province.

We insist that the Provincial authorities shall enforce strict sanitary regulations in all congested districts.

### 10. Extension of Municipal Powers.

Increase of local control in municipal matters.

Election of license and police commissioners by popular vote.

### 11. Public Ownership of Utilities.

We emphatically declare our adherence to the principle of public ownership of public utilities, and advocate limitation of terms of franchise to corporations, renewing the same, in the public interest, in equitable terms.

### 12. Local Control of Liquor Traffic.

The liquor traffic of British Columbia is at present under the absolute control of the Provincial government, and is used by it as a political machine.

We insist upon the complete removal of the liquor question from party politics.

The control of the traffic should be vested in municipalities, or in unorganized territory, in locally elected authorities.

We favor a local option law.

In the protection of the public we insist on frequent inspection of liquor offered for sale.

### 13. Public Accounts.

We denounce the McBride government for withholding year after year the public accounts from examination by the Public Accounts Committee.

We advocate the organization of an auditor general's department, independent of the government.

### 14. Fishery Control.

We advocate immediate steps

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to restore the fishing industry to white fishermen.

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### 15. Protection of Water Supply.

We condemn the shortsighted policy of the Provincial government in alienating the timber lands on watersheds tributary to cities, towns and municipalities. It should be the immediate duty of the government to remedy the mischief caused by this mistaken policy.

### 16. Torrens System of Registration of Title.

The present system of land registration is expensive and cumbersome. We advocate the adoption of the Torrens system of titles, and a reduction of registration fees.

### 17. Non-Partisan Civil Service.

We favor the organization of a civil service commission for both inside and outside services. Appointments to the civil service should be based on fitness, and not on partisan service.

## TORY TO RUN AS INDEPENDENT

Vancouver's First White Citizen Will Throw Down the Gauntlet and Defy the Two-Man Government.

Vancouver, March 6.—Stating that he cannot receive fair play at the hands of Premier McBride, and Attorney General Bowser, Mr. Samuel Greer announced yesterday that he would run as an independent candidate at the forthcoming election. This will mean that the famous "Greer case," than which no more interesting argument was ever discussed in the courts of British Columbia, will again be brought before the public. It is with the object of "showing up" Mr. Bowser particularly that he will contest a seat in Vancouver.

# UNCLE SAM GETTING SORE

United States Making Plans to Decrease the Large Emigration to Western Canada from the Western States.

Washington, D. C., March 4.—With the co-operation of more than twenty-five states the federal authorities have entered upon a systematic campaign to prevent the emigration of persons from the United States to Canada. It is estimated that 7,500 farmers went to Northwest Canada between July 1, 1910, and July 1, 1911, and hundreds of thousands before that time. To divert emigration to different parts of the United States the department of commerce is co-operating with the state departments of agriculture and bureaus of immigration.

To this end the governors of these states have been asked for information on the following points: "Are there any public lands such as government, state or school lands open to settlement in your state? If so, state their extent, and how they may be procured, the principal products and resources, the physical characteristics and the climate."

### Shortest Route.

The authorized mileage of the Grand Trunk Pacific main line and branches is 11,500 miles, of which 1,745 miles are between Winnipeg and Prince Rupert, 1,800 miles are under contract by the Transcontinental Railway Commission, between Winnipeg and Moncton. At the completion of this national railway the trip around the world will be shortened by one week, as Europe will be brought closer to Asia, and as the maximum grade of the Grand Trunk Pacific is 1-3 of the next best transcontinental railway on the continent, time between the Atlantic and the Pacific will be annihilated when the service is in operation.

"No greater blow," said the member, "has every been dealt Western Canada than the rejection of reciprocity. The people of Eastern Canada deliberately have set themselves to injure Western Canada, and in the course of ten years there will be such an agitation in Western Canada against their binding acts that nothing but separation will suffice."

His remarks were loudly applauded among Liberal members.

Several enquiries have recently reached us in regard to the validation by the legislature of the hydro electric bylaw.

Its passage was reported at the time, but we here give the information asked for. The bill passed its third reading on February 21st and was signed by the lieutenant governor in council on February 27th.

In the preamble it recites that some doubt exists as to the validity of the bylaw on the alleged ground that it dealt with two subject matters, but a petition from the City Council of Prince Rupert having been presented it was expedient to grant the prayer of the petition, the validation clause reading:

"The said bylaw, known as bylaw No. 59 of the City of Prince Rupert, to provide for the construction of a hydro electric system to supply said city with water, electric light and power, and to create and secure a debt for the purpose of constructing the said system amounting to \$550,000," is hereby declared to be valid and binding, and the debentures issued or to be issued thereunder to be valid and binding securities, notwithstanding the said alleged defect."
