SOVIET DETERMINED TO SUBJUGATE FINLAND BY OVERWHELMING STRENGTH

All Moves For Peaceful Mediation Rejected Including Swedish and League of Nations Overtures-General Fighting is Being Resumed—Finns Holding Own

LONDON, December 5.—Russia is apparently resolved upon obtaining complete subjugation of Finland by: armed force. The Soviet has made it apparent that she will be drawn into no peaceful mediation with the official government of her little neighbor. Yesterday Foreign. Commissar Molotov rejected a call to attend sessions of

assembly at Geneva to consider Finland's appeal against the Russian AMERICANS invasion. He also spurned a proposal of the Swedish diplomatic representative at Moscow for mediation of the dispute. Today the serial bombardment of Finland was resumed with attacks on the mining fields along the Arctic coast.

Foreign Commissar Molotov declared aht Russia was not at war with Finland. In the Finnish campaign the Soviet aim was that of The Finnish appeal to the League Nations was "incompatible with the dignity of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics." Molotov refused without qualification to deal with the new Helsingfors government or to accept mediation through Swedish diplomatic channels or the League of Nations. Declining to recognize the new Finnish government headed by Risto Ryti. Molotov declared he would deal only with the puppet Communist government Russia has set

up on the frontier. All of which indicated that it would now be a fight to the finish until Finland has completely capitulated to the Soviet.

Meantime, after a temporary luli due to winter weather conditions throughout Finland, there was a resumption of the warfare today. Russian planes renewed bombing attacks on the mining city of Salmijaervi. There were varying reports as to the damage which had been caused. 

EDITORIALS

ANOTHER JUST CAUSE

Finland is fighting in a just cause. The Russians are the oppressors, pouncing on a little country in order to make her a tributary state.

It is possible that Russia remembers what happened twenty years ago when Finland drove the Russians out of the country and they had to sue for peace. Something from two to twenty-five nounds similar may happen this time. At any rate the whole world will be with the Finns in their hour of trial. It is a sad commentary on the civilization of Russia that she has to try to enforce her will on her small neighbor, especially when Finland has done nothing to provoke a quarrel except to stand up for her rights. It seems a pity that the neutral states cannot get together to withstand the steady encroachment which, if allowed, will gradually spread to their countries.

A CURIOUS REASON

One reason given so often in the American radio reports for the sympathetic references to the little country of Finland is that she paid her debt to the United States. It is a sordid reason and one that does not give credit to the mentality of the American people. The Finnish debt was not a war debt. The money was borrowed for recon- pounds between points across the struction purposes after the war and the country benefited by every dollar that was loaned. In the case of Great Britain, much of her debt was incurred for the purpose of making common cause with the United States against Germany. Much of it was releaned to France and other countries and that debt was never repaid. Britain was unable to collect and while she continued to pay for some years she had to eventually give up.

Today the British and French people are fighting al most as much for the United States as for themselves. Let Germany overrum Europe and see what will then happer to the American republic with Germany on one side and Japan on the other. As it was, the German Bund har' started a strong anitation for Fascism in the United States. Fortunately, the leader turned out to be a crook who has been convicted of various crimes. With a hostile Europe and Asia it is hard to say what might happen.

Britain is the buffer, bearing the brunt of the attacked That is made quite clear from the fact that the Germans spend mort of their time in vitameration against the Bri tish, blaming them for all their troubles. Most of the aiand submarine attacks so far have been against the British. The Germans know that once they subdue that country, the world is theirs.

GERMAN PROPAGANDA

What looks very much like German propaganda is ar article published in a British Columbia weekly with strong anti-British sympathies telling of a supposed plot prepared in London to discredit the present New Zealand government. This story has all the ear marks of the Goebbels system of publicity.

No respectable Canadian paper would have fallen so low as to publish an article of that kind under present world conditions.




