The remains of a man which were brought to the city at the end of last week by provincial police from Hudson Bay Passage, Dundas Island, where they had evict ntly lain for some time, have been positively identified as being those of John Martin Jackson, Victory Cove crab fisherman, who has been missing since October 1937. Identification was made by two old friends of deceased. Ole Hamre and Charles Soini, on viewing the meagre remains and the clothing which contained them.

The opinion of the authorities is that deceased came to his death from exposure rather than from starvation. There were no traces of anything in the way of foul play. Coroner Norman A. Watt has been conducting an inquiry into
