SPEECH WITH A PURPOSE

Some people when they heard or read the speech de-, livered by Prime Minister Winston Churchill yesterday felt very glum over the outlook. Probably this speech was delivered for the nurpose of making the people of the United Kingdom redouble their efforts and also to bring home to the people of the United States the seriousness of the situation and need for their help in order to save the world from tyranny.

The condition is not worse than it was the day before. he made the speech but the effect was depressing. It also may have had a stimulating effect on many people here who possibly have felt that there was nothing they could do. One of the chief needs just now is Red Cross supplies. Women can work and men can pay and thus help keep up the regular supply of the needed articles used in caring for the sick and wounded and in providing comforts for the men in the field.

It must be remembered that it is not only the British and French soldiers who had a bad time. The opinion is held that the Germans have lost more men than the Allies and especially airmen.


