Dictators Talking About Turkey

Canadian Cabinet Changes Announced

Angus Macdonald Of Nova Scotia Is Chosen New Minister Of Navy

Revenue Minister J. L. Ilsley Becomes Minister of Finance—Col. Colin Gibson and Col. Mulock Enter Government

OTTAWA, July 8: (CP)—Appointment of Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia as defence minister for naval services and promotion to ministerial rank of two Liberal members of the House of Commons is announced today by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King.

Minister of Public Works J. P. A. Cardin and Munitions Minister C. D. Howe will divide the transport department portfolio which Howe held as well as munitions and supply for the past few months.

Revenue Minister J. L. Ilsley is made minister of finance succeeding Hon. J. C. Ralston who went to the Department of National Defence last Friday.

Ilsley is succeeded by Col. Colin Gibson M.P., Hamilton West, while Col. W. P. Mulock, M.P. for North York, becomes Postmaster General.

Agriculture Minister James Gardiner goes to the new national war services department.

Frenchmen Being Ordered To Turn In Their Guns

BORDEAUX, July 8:—The German authorities have ordered all Frenchmen to turn in firearms of which they may be in possession.

LONDON—The French Army Council in Toulouse sentenced Gen. Charles De Gaulle, French officer in London attempting to rally French colonies to Britain's aid to four years' in prison and fined him 100 francs in absentia for disobeying army orders and inciting soldiers to disobedience.

LOSE 2500 PLANES
LONDON—According to a statement made here today 2500 German airplanes have been destroyed since the war began.

CAIRO—Nine civilians were killed and one wounded in an Italian air raid over Malta yesterday, Royal Air Force headquarters announced.

Russian Ambassador Returns To Moscow From Istanbul Following Conference With German Envoy

ISTANBUL, July 8.—Russian Ambassador Alexei Terentiev is reported to be enroute to Moscow following a conference here with German ambassador Franz von Papen. Informed sources said that the ambassador discussed demands Russia is expected to make upon Turkey shortly. Foreign diplomats understand that Germany, Italy and Russia are working closely together to decide their attitude toward Turkey.

Submarines Off Canada; One Is Sunk

NEW YORK, July 8:—Persons arriving here from Halifax tell of two German submarines having been sighted off the Atlantic coast of Canada. One is said to have been sunk by a Canadian bomber.

BELIEVED DROWNED

Sven Olaf Hedstrom Believed To Have Lost Life On Waterfront

Provincial police have been dragging since the end of the week along the harbor shore off the railway track about midway between Hays Cove and Seal Cove for Sven Olaf Hedstrom who is feared to have been drowned there last Thursday evening. That tragedy had befallen Hedstrom appeared evident when at 7:10 Friday night C. J. Norrington reported the finding of his cap and sweater coat lying on the banks near one of the railway track retaining walls over which there is a sheer drop into the deep water. Investigation was instituted at once by Constable Jack Lockie of the city police and the police boat P M L 8 commenced dragging. Identity of the ownership of the clothing was definitely established as the sweater pocket contained Hedstrom's military discharge papers.

British Children In United States

First Group Of Seventy-one Are Landed From Old Country In New York

NEW YORK, July 8:—The first of many which are expected, seventy-one British children arrived here yesterday on the liner Scythia to enter American homes for the duration of the war. They were accompanied by parents and relatives.

ROYAL AIR FORCE TAKES INITIATIVE WHILE NEXT BLITZKREIG IS AWAITED

Widespread Damage is Done by British Raids on Military Objectives of Enemy—Ready to Meet Fire With Fire

LONDON, July 8.—The Royal Air Force has assumed and is maintaining the initiative in aerial warfare between Great Britain and Germany. Constant raids on military objectives in enemy or enemy-controlled territory are doing tremendous damage. The German response, while persistent, is proving comparatively ineffective despite Nazi claims of successes.

Air attacks have been conducted by the Royal Air Force on bases in Germany, Norway, Holland, Belgium and France. In all seventy-eight points have been bombed in fourteen days. There is not an air-drome, dock or arms factory of the enemy which is not in constant menace of attack from the vigorous offensive. Emden and Kiel were among important German bases attacked yesterday. Three to five British planes are missing as result of Sunday raids on Germany and Holland.

Royal Air Force planes successfully attacked oil supply tanks at Bergen and set them as well as a tanker afire. They were dive bombers. All returned safely to their bases from this attack.

The Royal Air Force is also intensively active in North Africa with marked success as the Italians are now learning. In Libya and elsewhere troop concentrations, oil tanks, ships and submarines have been successfully attacked.

An Air Ministry communique yesterday said that German aircraft, in a day long series of raids lasting into the night, attempted several attacks on the northeast coast since Saturday but were driven off by anti-aircraft defences without military objectives being reached. In one village near the coast some cottages were damaged. Casualties were small in number but included a few persons killed. Later in the day attacks were essayed in south-east England but were similarly ineffectual. Casualties were light, numbering five including a policeman and children. German bombers were brought down in flames in what was definitely known and there

Awaiting Blitz

Meanwhile, calmly and knowing with confidence that she is not unprepared, the United Kingdom awaits Hitler's attack upon these islands. This is but the lull before the real storm, it is generally believed. The country has steeled itself for the real attack which it is believed cannot be long deferred and which some had expected would occur even sooner. One conception of the Nazi attack is that it will commence with mass bombing wave on wave to be followed by surface craft endeavouring to make a landing. The possibility of air infantry and parachute corps has not been overlooked. There also are reports of the possibility of sea sleds being used by the enemy, each carrying forty or fifty men and machine guns. Here is where the great British naval strength—the main fleet as well as the shadow navy, greatly reinforced of late—will come into play with anti-aircraft, great land guns, mobile home forces making any enemy landings most suicidal in nature. Auxiliary cruisers, heavily armed merchantmen and destroyer escorts are ready in great concentration.

Then, as the enemy air attacks on Britain become intensified, so will those of the Royal Air Force on Germany which will, as England does, begin to feel in its cities generally as well as in its war making centres feel the effects of "total war."

According to a German correspondent to an Italian newspaper, Ireland will be the first objective of attack on the British Isles in an attempt to surround the United Kingdom.

LONDON—An Air Ministry statement tonight said that six enemy aircraft are known to have been shot down today in attempted raids on Great Britain. A lone raiding plane identified as French is reported to have been shot down in an attack on Gibraltar yesterday, the crew being interned.

British Sub Sinks Five Nazi Ships

LONDON, July 8.—One British submarine, the Snapper, has sunk five enemy supply ships in convoy off the coast of Norway in a single day, the British Admiralty announces. The Snapper is a sister ship of the Spearfish which put the Admiral Scheer out of commission.

Searching For Sitka Spruce

Former Local Forestry Official Completes Two Weeks' Flying Trip Over Queen Charlotte Islands

Having been on a two weeks' trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands to look for stands of Sitka spruce which might be used in supplying the demand for this timber in the construction of war planes, E. E. Gregg, former assistant district forester here and now identified with headquarters staff of the Forest Branch at Victoria, arrived in Prince Rupert by Royal Canadian Air Force plane from the Islands Saturday afternoon in time to catch the steamer Prince George for Vancouver. Mr. Gregg has been loaned for the time being by the Forest Branch to the Canadian war purchasing authorities.

EDITORIALS

CANADIAN FORCES

Prime Minister Winston Churchill was particularly well pleased with the Canadian forces in England. The men, their equipment and their training all impressed him. So pleased was he with the result of the visit that he remained with them an hour longer than had been planned. That speaks well for the Canadian military department as well as for the men themselves. In view of the criticisms that have been made, Canadian people will be glad to know that the boys over there are making good.

ANTI-BRITISH PROPAGANDA

We have received a circular from the province of Quebec drawing attention to anti-British sentiments published in certain American newspaper and magazines. It seems that these publications use Canadian paper for this purpose and the publications have a considerable circulation in Canada. If it is found that this propaganda continues and is likely to harm the cause of the Empire in this juncture, we feel strongly that the publications, no matter how excellent they may otherwise be, should be banned from Canada and the source of paper supply cut off, even though this may be injurious to Canadian industry. This is no time for pussy-footing. The government should, if it finds it necessary, shut down emphatically and promptly on journals using us in this way.

DUTCH CO-OPERATION

It seems quite evident that there are German sympathizers in almost every country in Europe and that there are also British sympathizers in the same countries. This makes it very difficult for any country to act as a unit. It was the treachery of King Leopold that caused the downfall of the French and British union. Later developments seem to indicate that there must have been Frenchmen in high places who were ready and willing to help the enemy. Even in Great Britain there are a few people who are not considered safe and who had to be protected against themselves. The struggle seems to be ideological rather than national.


