BRITAIN'S HOME GUARD

Only three months ago this guard was formed and it at once became so popular that no more recruits could be accepted for the present as it was difficult to arm and outfit them. Each man carried a bomb or FOR SALE-Enterprise latest model read anything about that in your bombs and a rifle. It is particularly designed to deal with parachutists should they attempt a landing. However they also take their turn at guarding bridges, factories and other possible objectives. The rifles are particularly suitable for dealing with invaders from the air, the bombs for tanks, if they should attempt to make a landing.

THE RAIDS ON BERLIN

What many Canadians have been wishing for is that Britain would raid Berlin. Now it has been done. While this may have been in response to the raids on London, the British make it clear that they are bombing only military objectives and cannot afford to waste munitions or possibly the lives of fine aviators in the useless killing of German non-combatants. This attitude is in marked contrast to the German policy of frightfulness, the killing of defenceless women and children, machine gunning of children playing on the sands and other useless brutalities.




