

Port Simpson is making preparations to receive some forty or fifty delegates to the annual convention of the Native Brotherhood of British Columbia which will be held at the neighboring village commencing next Monday and lasting prob-

Delegates will come from as far south as Squirrel Cove, near Powell River, as far north as the Naas River, west to the Queen Charlotte Islands and east to Moricetown in the interior.


