### EDITORIAL

#### THE BRITISH CABINET

The changes in the British cabinet, as announced in the latest edition of this paper yesterday, came as a surprise to most people in this country. It is presumed that Mr. Hore-Belisha was in some respects not satisfactory. He is a man with abundant energy and some originality. A Jew, he may be imbued with Jewish prejudices. We know now that many Russians have surendered and also that whole regiments had to be machine gunned to drive them into the conflict.

Subject To Many Tests Every gun goes through innum-

erable tests at various stages manufacture and the completed product is fired at proof butts. The day I stood behind a gun, holding my ears to ease the vibration, sparrows perched saucily on a brick wall above the butts.

The gun has to fire at an angle of 80 degrees before receiving a final "o, k." from the inspector. This is because it can be used as an anti-aircraft weapon in the! event of low-flying planes appearing and must be just as efficient as for horizontal firing. It was tested by a gunner shooting into a wooden box on a wall.

In contrast to the manufacture of the Bren, Vickers and small arms, the making of big guns for |battleships and anti-aircraft deace is a slower and quieter process. It wasn't so quiet though, beside a 14-inch naval gun being fired into a pile of wet sand 500

yards away. The gun barrel is tested by the firing of a stub-nosed projectile! containing a higher charge than normally. Nose of the shell is blunted so it will bury itself in the sand. Gunners must know the range or they would be liable to overshoot the wall above the sand. 
