## ITALY JOINS NAZIS- NORWAY GIVES UP- FIERCE FRENCH FIGHT

Italy went into war today on Germany's side by declaring war on Great Britain and France shortly after 9 o'clock this morning Pacific Standard Time and soon after Italian troops were reported to have entered France along the Riviera. Italy's declaration of war was made by Premier Benito Mussolini in a dramatic balcony speech in Rome before a huge gathering of cheering Fascists. Mussolini announced that a declaration of war had been given to the ambassadors of France and Great Britain.

Italy's entry into the war came sooner than some observers had expected. The most general belief yesterday appeared to be that it would be Thursday or Friday with Mussolini striking at a secret objective.

Giornale D'Italia warns Great Britain that for every Italian city bombed by Great Britain five British cities will be bombed. Bombing of Rome would be answered with even greater bombing of London.

On the Western Front the Germans struck in renewed offensive with 1,800,000 men against the Weygand Line and rushed tank divisions to a region thirty-five miles northwest of Paris. The French have taken the view that the German drive must expend itself and General Weygand said the battle was entering its "last quarter hour." Paris military authorities suggested the German offensive was weakening.

The heaviest artillery duel so far between Maginot and Siegfried lines took place early this morning. The French started it and the German guns barked back. In an hour and a quarter it was over, ending as suddenly as it began.

Today, according to Paris military authorities, may mark the crucial phase in the great German offensive against Paris which has been in progress for the last four days. With an estimated forty divisions in battle, the Nazis have unleashed an even greater attack along the entire front from the sea to Argonne.

General Maxime Weygand, commander-in-chief of the French forces, in an order of the day, said he was not unmindful of the valorous deeds of the army to date but still more was needed. There must not only be courage but all the resolution, all the fighting spirit, it possessed. The battle had reached a final phase, the situation was very serious although not desperate.

After five hours of pounding by artillery, the infantry of the Germans had advanced in mass formation, it was announced, and had crossed the Aisne both east and west of Soissons for a distance of nine miles. Saturday night it was admitted by the French that the Germans had taken a strong foothold on heights south of the Aisne River.

While admitting advances by the enemy last night, the French still insisted that the main Weygand Line had not been broken, even under the terrific German assault. Pressure on the left flank had lessened, it was said, apparently moving east. Further German tanks had been trapped. Seven hundred tanks had so far been put out of action. One hundred and fifty Allied planes had dropped tons of explosives on German tanks and lines of communication. The Royal Air Force had conducted further raids on France and Germany.

Last night the Norwegian government news agency reported that King Haakon had ordered the capitulation of all Norway to Germany. King Haakon and the Norwegian government are already in England, having been landed at a western Scottish port. Allied forces have been withdrawn from Norway, including Narvik, being more urgently required elsewhere. Norway will continue to give such assistance as possible to the Allies in the war against Germany and now Italy.

## FEAR HELD BY GREECE

Athens Sees Possibility Of 11 Duce Seeking To Grab Naval Bases

ATHENS, June 10: (CP)—Naval and military precautionary measures have been instituted by Greece following Italian entry into the war. Fears are expressed in highly placed quarters that Italy would attempt to establish naval bases on Greek Islands in the Aegean Sea.

## Robert McCook Dies On Sunday

Well Known Pioneer of City Passes Away After Long Illness

Robert A. McCook, 67, pioneer resident of this city, died Sunday afternoon in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been a patient for a week after a long illness. He came here in 1908 and had worked at the dry dock, cold storage plant and for the city. He is survived by a widow and a sister, Mrs. James Graham, in Ireland.

# Italy Takes War Plunge

## Entire French Front From Sea To Argonne Is Holding Firm; Nazis Are Harassed

PARIS, June 10: (CP)—The entire French front from the sea to Argonne is holding firm, it was stated officially today. Commanders of various French armies are keeping "complete mastery of operations and manoeuvres," it was said. A morning communique said only: "The battle is continuing with increasing violence." French headquarters said that, since the war was now a large scale movement and the enemy was on the lookout for information, no further details could be given.

Premier Paul Reynaud, in a radio address tonight, told the French nation today that "our armies have retreated slowly and only after destroying all points they have relinquished."

Bombing of German held Amiens and Abbeville during the past twenty-four hours was announced by the Air Ministry in London. German formations in western Germany were also attacked.

The British fleet is "shelling German troops on the coast of France," it was also stated tonight.

## ALASKA-BOUND IN QUEST OF ECONOMIC SECURITY, ARK FAMILY CALLS HERE

Paul Satko Tells of Journey Thus Far of Himself, Wife and Family in Unique Home Made Craft

Paul Satko, rugged Ohio-born mechanic hailing from the state of Virginia on his way from the economic uncertainty of crowded Eastern States to seek security as a homesteader and fisherman in Alaska, arrived in Prince Rupert at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon aboard his home-made boat Ark of Juneau with his wife and seven children.

The vessel will be outfitted here before continuing tomorrow morning to Ketchikan en route to Cook's Inlet, Alaska, or some other place which might appeal to the family as a likely place to settle. Tied up at the Home Oil dock yesterday, it was the centre of attraction for large crowds of local people as well as visiting tourists.

Satko, quite matter of fact, had no stirring adventures to relate on being interviewed aboard the Ark immediately after arrival. He said he had found things so far on his adventure pretty much as he had expected they would be. The members of the family, he said, were all well and they looked it. The principal experience to date, as far as the smaller children was concerned, had been the encountering of a mother bear and a couple of cubs at Bishop Cove near Butedale where Thursday night had been spent. The youngsters became pretty excited and rushed into the water to be soon picked up by the older children who were paddling around nearby.

Rough weather was encountered in the Gulf of Georgia between Nanaimo and Malaspina Strait and the run across Queen Charlotte Sound was also "sloppy," everybody getting seasick. At no time, however, was there any alarm. There was a good crossing of Milbank Sound.

"We haven't been lost since we started," said Satko. Although he

## Fascist State Ready To Face Fate Says Duce In Statement

### IS STAB IN BACK

An Old Friend Treacherously Attacked By 11 Duce, Duff-Cooper Declares

LONDON, June 10: (CP)—Hon. Alfred Duff-Cooper, minister of information, tonight declared that Premier Mussolini, the opportunist had stabbed "an old friend" in the back by declaring war on France.

"Whatever temporary successes they may achieve in the early days of the war, they will be defeated in the end," Duff-Cooper said.

WANTS TO BREAK CHAINS WHICH SUFFOCATE HIS COUNTRY — STRUGGLE BETWEEN YOUNG PEOPLE AND OLD

ROME, June 10: (CP)—Premier Mussolini, in his war announcement, declared all the world knows Italy had "tried in vain for peace." The Allies should not have repulsed peace offers made by Hitler," Mussolini shouted. "But all this is fact of the past. Now we are ready to face all risks and sacrifices of war. A great people is ready to face its destiny and make its own history in the future. We want to break chains that suffocate us in the Mediterranean. It is a struggle between a young and progressive people as against a decadent people, a struggle of one century against another century."

## Minister Of Defence Killed Today In Air Crash Near Toronto

Loses His Life Not Far From Trentonville While on Way From Ottawa to Toronto to Deliver War Speech

NEWTONVILLE, Ontario, June 10: (CP)—Hon. Norman McLeod Rogers, Canada's minister of national defence, was killed this afternoon in the crash near here of a Royal Canadian Air Force plane which was speeding home from Ottawa to Toronto to speak of Canada's war effort in the air. Three others were also killed.

Eye witnesses said the plane crashed into swampy wooded ground and burst into flames. Wreckage was strewn in all directions.

Mr. Rogers' companions were two Air Force men and a civilian. Those killed with the minister were Flying Officer J. J. Cotter of Halifax, Aircraftman O. D. Brownfield of Big River, Saskatchewan, and Aircraftman Edward Nesbitt of Saskatchewan.

Newtonville is forty miles east of Toronto. The tragedy of Mr. Rogers' death came as a shock to the whole of the country and from all quarters messages of regret and sympathy have already commenced pouring in.

Mr. Rogers, in these serious war days, was naturally a key minister and his loss at this time is a severe blow.

## BILLMOR HAS FIRE

Shingle Mill Destroyed by Blaze of Unknown Origin Saturday Afternoon

The shingle mill of Billmor Spruce Mills at Porpoise Harbor, seven miles east of Prince Rupert on the Canadian National Railway line, was destroyed by fire early Saturday afternoon.

The origin of the fire was not known, the management said.

The shingle mill had only a few days ago resumed operations and stock of shingles on hand was also burned.

No estimate was placed on the extent of damage. There was no insurance, it was stated.

## REMOVING CHILDREN

Biggest Exodus Yet From London to Be Started This Week

LONDON, June 10.—Evacuation of another 120,000 children from London will commence on Thursday. The movement is expected to take about a week and the children will go to Cornwall, Devon, Somerset and Wales in the west country. It is the largest evacuation since September. Only children registered by their parents for evacuation will be taken. These are in addition to 50,000 children moved from the east coast during the past three weeks.

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#### AT WAR WITH ITALY

Canada is at war with Italy, following automatically the declaration of Premier Mussolini that Italy is at war with France and Great Britain. That may possibly involve to some extent members of the local Italian colony. It is to be presumed that local Italians are true to their oath of allegiance to Canada. However, it has been suggested that it would be wise for them to get together in a public way and declare their allegiance to the cause of the Allies. This would prevent suspicion attaching to any of them.

We all realize the difficult position in which the Italian people in this country are placed. In the city of Trail the loyal Italians organized and declared openly and clearly where they stood and that simplified matters. We hope they will take similar action here.

#### LOCAL SHIPS PURCHASED

There is some discussion going on locally as to whether the change in ownership of the steamers Prince Charles and Prince John and the transfer of Queen Charlotte Islands service will benefit Prince Rupert or not. It is pointed out that the Union Steamship Company has been in the habit of having its ships overhauled in the south and that it never gives work of that kind to a local yard. This would be a great disadvantage to Prince Rupert. On the other hand if the giving of a weekly service to the Queen Charlotte Islands was the idea of the Union Steamship Company, it will be a decided advantage, for a weekly service to the Queen Charlottes is one of the improvements that has been sought for many years. It is to be hoped that this will be continued.

Some objection has been made to the change because it is claimed that the Union Steamship Company, being a Vancouver concern, will run the services to suit Vancouver without regard to Prince Rupert. We do not think this will hold. Prince Rupert merchants are able to command a great deal of business and, if they decided to give all their business to a rival concern, it would have a bad effect on the business of the company.

We suggest that the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce should at an early date discuss these matters with the Union Steamship Company with a view to securing the overhaul contracts for this city when the time comes and also see that Prince Rupert is always considered in any changes of schedule that may be made. In all business transactions there should be give as well as take. We feel sure that, if the Prince Rupert points of view is placed clearly before the Union Company, it will give them careful consideration.

## REDS MOVE INTO LEAD

Crucial National League Baseball Series Now Under Way Between Brooklyn And Cincinnati

CINCINNATI, June 10: CP)—Winning the first game of a crucial series affecting the supremacy of the National League for the time being at least, Brooklyn Dodgers defeated Cincinnati Reds 4 to 2 Friday, the Dodgers, as a result, assuming the lead in place of the Reds but only on a mathematical basis. The third place New York Giants lost an eleven-inning decision to the St. Louis Cardinals three to two while the fourth place Chicago Cubs downed the Boston Bees and sent them into the cellar below the Pittsburgh Pirates who were winning from the Phillies. The Cardinals are now at the top of the second division ahead of the Phils.

In the American League, both the leading Boston Red Sox and the running-up Cleveland Indians, lost on Friday, the former being swamped by the third place Detroit Tigers and the latter losing a close decision to the fourth position New York Yankees. The Washington Senators defeated Chicago White Sox and ousted them from fifth place.

## Y.M.C.A. MAN PAYS VISIT

In the course of a tour of inspection at the request of the West J. Air Command of various air bases, T. H. Hutchinson, supervisor of Young Men's Christian Association services for British Columbia, met members of the Prince Rupert co-ordinating war services committee last evening in the Canadian Legion clubrooms. The meeting was called at short notice following the arrival of Mr. Hutchinson by airplane.

Those in attendance included Mrs. S. D. Johnston, Mrs. J. E. Boddie, Mrs. D. C. Stuart, Mrs. J. W. Nicholls, Mrs. W. F. Eve, Col. J. W. Nicholls, Rev. J. C. Jackson, D. G. Borland, S. C. Thomson, J. E. Boddie, J. D. Allen, William Cruickshank and E. B. Baker. J. S. Wilson introduced Mr. Hutchinson who during the last war was with the Y. M. C. A. in France.

Mr. Hutchinson told of the success of the co-ordinating committee in Vancouver and Victoria. He was already aware of some of the activities carried out in Prince Rupert and district. The outlying air bases had not been so well looked after as the more centrally located military bases.

In the course of a free exchange of reports and questions and answers it developed that there would be a possibility of a secretary being appointed through the Y. M. C. Italy Refused to Negotiate But Stabbed Its Neighbor in the Back, Declares President

CHARLOTTESVILLE, June 10—Speaking before a gathering of the University of Virginia, President Franklin D. Roosevelt this afternoon charged that Italy had been unwilling to negotiate for a settlement of what it might have considered its legitimate aspirations. ### ALASKA-BOUND IN QUEST OF ECONOMIC SECURITY

(Continued from Page One)

coast thus far, Satko told of leaving Anacortes on May 25 to enter Canadian waters after a number of vicissitudes in getting away from Puget Sound. A call was made at Nanaimo. The Gulf of Georgia was rough so a course was set for the inside (Malaspina Strait) instead of the outside passage of Texada Island. Another call was made at Alert Bay, a squall off York Island having been the principal event on that part of the trip. Seymour Narrows was avoided, Euciataw being chosen instead.

#### From Virginia

The Satkos started this long trip from Richmond, Virginia, where the father followed the trade of machinist and welder. The partially finished hull was placed on a truck and trailer chassis and, covered with a canvas top, used as a sort of covered wagon for the transcontinental trip. At Tacoma the hull was completed and a Buick automobile (1927 model) engine installed.

Everything of the Ark is home made, even the steering wheel. "There is nothing in the boat that I can think of which is not home made," says Satko.

The unique looking boat is difficult of description. Generally speaking, it is a rough and awkward looking vessel with its most striking rounded bow, box stern, ship-lap combing and chicken wire deck-guard. The living quarters were not inspected by this writer. The side of the hull bears writings and autographs of people from many places.

The main recommendation of the ship would seem to be that "it gets there" in spite of the many warnings Satko has had. In Seattle even he had to go to court to prevent efforts to force him to abandon the undertaking.

The Ark is forty feet long. It has a speed of about six and a half miles per hour.

Telling why he started out for Alaska Satko said that things had been bad for a long time in the East owing to the depression. He had done a lot of loafing and, getting tired of such conditions, he determined to take his family to a country where he hoped they would not be affected so much by depressions. Alaska looked like the place and the means adopted appeared to be the most economical for getting there since time was not a great object. Satko is probably conscious of the value of the publicity which he is receiving. The interest attaching itself to the visit of himself and family to Prince Rupert is evidence of how much they have been discussed. Being "lost" or "missing" once in a while means just that much more publicity. Satko himself appears to be quite competent and able to look after himself. The children are obviously self-reliant.

Satko was born in Ohio and was raised on a farm until he was eighteen when he went to Virginia. A big, powerful, burly man, good-natured and cordial—independent too—he may be along in his forties. The family consists of the wife, Molly, who appears to be the business manager, and the following children: Hazel, 19; Edward, 17; Joe, 15; Grace, 11; David, 9; William, 6; Betty, 4. A baby, James, died in Tacoma.
