### "Hands Off Americas" Warnings Sent To Germany And Italy By U.S. Department Of State

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 19: (CP)- The Department of State has instructed the United States ambassadors in Berlin and Rome to notify the German and Italian governments of United States opposition to the transfer of any western hemisphere possessions from one non-American power to another.

The sending by Secretary of State Cordell Hull of the warnings to Germany and Italy to keep "hands off" America followed a joint resolution by both houses of Congress reiterating the Monroe Doctrine. It was direct official notification to Germany and Italy that claims made on this continent as a result of military conquest will be resisted.

Great Britain, France and Holland, countries which have possessions on this continent, have been advised of the action of the State Department.

Meantime the United States Navy is keeping a close watch over France's possessions in America.

### anadian Parliament Acting Speedily Upon Conscription Measure

OTTAWA, June 19: (CP)-Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, speaking in the House of Commons last night, urged speedy adoption of the government's compulsory service bill, warning the House that "there is an emergent position of very grave character" and "not a moment should be lost." No one knows the disposition of the French

fleet, the Premier said. "Suppose the French fleet passes into German hands tomorrow, what stands between this country and the enemy but the British fleet?" He asked what would happen to St. Pierre and Miguelon, French islands in the St. Lawrence Gulf. Who could say that the French fleet was not now proceeding across the Atlantic under German control? The bill passed second reading, sending it into committee stage. Earlier the House voted 182-18 against a Co-operative Cmmonwealth Federation resolution that nationalization essential to war industries and finance precede conscription.


