# German and Belgian Planes Clash

## Two Neutral Planes Are Brought Down And Pilot Of One Killed; Lowlands Situation More Tense

### Brussels Protests Speedily to Berlin at "Grave Violation of Neutrality and Act of Aggression"

BRUSSELS, March 2: (CP)—Two Belgium pursuit planes were shot down with the pilot of one killed and the other seriously wounded in a clash over Belgium with a German bomber. In unrelated accidents three other Belgian planes crashed. In unrelated accidents three other German planes over the "grave violation of Belgian neutrality and act of aggression." An official Belgian version of the battle said that three Belgian planes encountered a large Dornier bomber over Hubert. Belgians surrounded the craft which suddenly opened fire.

## DEATH BY STARVING

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Mar. 2: (CP)—Word received from Hopevale, Labrador, said that the bodies of three Quebec men missing since last September in an airplane had been found near there. In the party were Joseph Pecteau, pilot, Montreal; G. H. Davidson, Montreal and J. C. Cote of Three Rivers.

## LOANS ARE AVAILABLE

### United States Making Millions Available for Finland, Sweden and Norway

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 2: (CP)—Jesse Jones, federal loan administrator, announced yesterday that the United States export and import bank following passage of valuating legislation, had allocated \$20,000,000 for an additional loan to Finland, \$15,000,000 for a loan to Sweden and \$10,000,000 for a loan to Norway.

## TO HOLD BERMUDA

### "British Empire is Not For Sale" United States is Tightly Informed From London

LONDON, March 2—"The British Empire is not for sale." Such is the retort of an authoritative British spokesman to the proposal of Senator Robert R. Reynolds of North Carolina that the United States should purchase the island of Bermuda and pay for it out of war debts owing by Great Britain to the United States.

## CANDIDATES NUMEROUS

### So Far 533 in Field For Total of 245 Seats

OTTAWA, March 2—A total of 533 candidates have so far entered the federal election contest a compilation of party nominations shows. By parties the candidates are: Liberals, 204; National Government, 171; C.C.F., 92; various others, 66. There are 245 seats.

## FINNS MAY JOIN HERE

### No Objection to Those Resident in Canada Going to Fight for Homeland

OTTAWA, March 2: (CP)—The Canadian government has given official sanction to enlistment of Finnish nationals in Canada with the Finnish armed forces.

## INDIA IS RESTLESS

### Congress Party All For Complete Independence, Disassociating Itself From British War

BOMBAY, March 2: (CP)—The working committee of the All-India Congress party, meeting at Patna, adopted a resolution affirming determination that India must shape her own destiny and declaring that "Dominion status or any other status within the Imperial structure is wholly inapplicable to India."

At the same time it was decided to proceed with a nation-wide civil disobedience campaign in protest at the refusal of the British government to India.

Disapproval was expressed of Great Britain classing India as a belligerent nation. Instead, it was held, India should disassociate itself from a "British capitalistic war."

Mahatma Gandhi, leader of the All-India Congress, left ample room however, to conduct further negotiations with Great Britain.

## HITLER AND FOLLOWERS

### They Too Must Be Fought, Declares Air Marshal W. A. Bishop

TORONTO, March 2: (CP)—Air Marshal W. A. Bishop V.C., speaking last night, warned Canadians that the present war was not only against Adolf Hitler but against thirteen million young people who envisioned Hitler as their God. If Hitler was to be fought, so also must his followers.

## Gillespie Defends Ski Championship

### Montrealer Again Wins Cross-country Title at Banff Meet

BANFF, March 2: (CP)—Galt Gillespie of Montreal successfully defended his cross-country ski championship at the annual Banff Ski Carnival. He covered the eleven-mile course in one hour, forty-one minutes and 11 seconds.

## New York Mart Little Changed

### Fluctuation Slight in Stock Trading With Weakness Yesterday

NEW YORK, March 2.—Transactions on the New York Stock Exchange Friday totalled 100,000 shares, there being little fluctuation in values in a downward trend. The industrial average at closing was 146.23, off .21; rails, 30.41, off .07, and utilities, 24.59, off .05. Today the market showed tendency to strength with industrials in the first hour up .14 to 146.37 and rails up .02 to 30.43.

## PROTEST BY ITALY

### Takes Exception to Blockade on German Coal—Negotiations Resumed

ROME, March 2 (Canadian Press)—Italy is sending an official protest to Great Britain over the British decision to seize German exports to Italy, particularly coal.

Giuseppe Bastiani, Italian ambassador to Great Britain, is returning to London today after a visit to Rome to confer with Premier Mussolini and it is expected will resume negotiations with Great Britain with a view to a resumption of British coal supply.

Meantime four Italian ships which had left Rotterdam for Italy laden with Germany coal have been instructed to return there. Fifteen other Italian ships are loading coal at Rotterdam.

Yesterday Great Britain advised Italy that, beginning last night at midnight, German exports of coal to Italy would be detained under contraband control blockade. This followed authoritative reports in British government sources that temporary difficulties had arisen in Anglo-Italian commercial and financial talks in Rome.

## AIR RAIDS CONTINUING

### Royal Air Force Planes Visit Berlin Again While Nazis Harass Fish Boats Off Scottish Coast

LONDON, March 2: (CP)—German air raiders over the North Sea struck anew at British shipping lanes today as Royal Air Force scouting planes returned from reconnaissance flights which a communique said took them over Berlin and northwest Germany for the fourth successive day, drawing fire of Berlin batteries.

The Nazi planes, concentrating on the Scottish coast, were driven out to sea by anti-aircraft fire and the Royal Air Force. Two of the planes, Heinkel bombers, attacked armed fish boats which fought them off. Members of the crew of one of the fishing vessels said they had been bombed and machine-gunned, reaching port safely, however.

It was denied that any warships or armed merchantmen were attacked or sunk. Terrific gunfire was reported to have been heard for two hours between Berwick and the Firth of Forth on the Scottish coast. Four Henkel bombers were involved in the raids in that area, it is reported.

## Drew Pities Premier King

### Not Fair to Compare Defences of Canada in 1939 With Those of 1935

TORONTO, March 2: (CP)—It was a pitiful exhibition for Prime Minister King to compare Canada's defences in 1939 with those in 1935, declared Col. George Drew, Ontario Conservative leader, in speaking on behalf of the National Government party here, when every one knew that it was not until 1935 that hope of general disarmament had faded.

## REFEREE EXPIRES

### Jack Stevens Dropped Dead in Seattle Wrestling Ring

SEATTLE, March 2: (CP)—Referee Jack Stevens dropped dead after being thrown to the mat in a wrestling match here last night.

## SHIP NOT IN DANGER

### British Freighter Sent Out "S.O.S." to Effect She Was Being Attacked by Submarine.

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 1 (Canadian Press)—The United States Navy was advised today that naval planes had located the British steamer Southgate which by "S.O.S." yesterday had reported a submarine attack. The vessel is in no apparent danger.

The reason for the reported attack was not determined but it was thought the captain might have become alarmed at sighting two United States submarines which have been in the vicinity.

Mackay radio received the S.O.S. call at 6:09 p.m. from the Southgate which gave her position as 130 miles northeast of Puerto Rico and 1000 miles southeast of Miami.

Three United States destroyers and a coast-guard vessel, the Unalga, immediately rushed towards the scene of the supposed attack.

## Woodsworth No Unionist

### Winnipeg, March 2 (Canadian Press)—I. S. Woodsworth, leader of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, says he would refuse to join any union government.

## ROOSEVELT BACK HOME

### President of United States Returning to Washington After 4,000-Mile Cruise

PENSECOLA, Florida, March 2.—The 4,000-mile cruise of President Franklin D. Roosevelt ended here yesterday and the chief executive was given a rousing reception during a brief visit. He entrained for Washington where he was due to arrive early this afternoon.

## HITLER IS UNYIELDING IN DEMAND FOR ALLIES BEING SHORN OF POWER

### Insists on Nazi Control Over Bohemia, Moravia, Slovakia, Poland and Hungary—Would Have Gibraltar, Malta and Singapore Demolished

BERLIN, March 2: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler is authoritatively reported to have informed Sumner Welles, United States Under Secretary of State, in a conference of one hour and a half today, that Germany's price for peace includes permanent hegemony over Bohemia, Moravia, Slovakia, Poland and Hungary. It is reported also that Der Fuehrer asked for guarantees that Great Britain and France would not "stir up the Balkans or Scandinavia."

### Head of "National Guard" Charged With Being German Spy

BERNE, March 2.—Switzerland's chief Nazi, the head of the "Swiss National Guard," has been arrested on a charge of espionage on behalf of Germany.

## EDITORIAL

### WORKING TOGETHER

Recently the secretary of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce wrote to the secretaries of all the Boards of Trade of Central British Columbia suggesting that they all co-operate in an appeal to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to provide suitable facilities for this part of the country so that people throughout the district may get daylight radio reception. This they do not get at present.

This is just one case where it would be advantageous for co-operative action. A still more important case would be for Prince Rupert and the outside districts to co-operate more completely in the matter of buying and selling. At various times this has been discussed and with considerable mutual benefit. Now with spring approaching, is a good time to consider what might be done this year. In the first place the growers of the interior might well consider what they might do to help supply the coast market and Prince Rupert business houses might do well to consider how best they may handle the products of the interior, remembering that, in doing this, they are performing a public service.

So far as the consumer is concerned we suggest that Prince Rupert people give the preference to interior products over those coming from the south. That would be their share of the co-operation. This might apply to all products including the product of the mines.

### SPLENDID LITTLE MAGAZINE

There has come to our desk a copy of the second number of the second volume of "Canadian Nature" published in Toronto. It deals with all phases of natural history, including a section for gardeners. It is profusely illustrated, well edited and is a great credit to the publishers. Curiously enough it does not carry any advertising. While many people would consider the lack of advertising a loss, others will enjoy reading a publication which is free from suggestion of what to wear, what to eat, etc. This has to be paid for and the price of 35c for the magazine looks large to those who have been purchasing what seemed to be more for less.

### FOREIGN BORN RESIDENTS

In the United States there are many millions of foreign born citizens. The largest group of these are the Germans of whom there are close to seven millions. Italians come second with four and a half million and very close to them are the British with about two hundred thousand less. Polish number over three million and there are about the same number of Canadians and Scandinavians. Two and a half million Russians, a million and a half Mexicans and over a million Czechs make up the larger groups. Counting the Irish and the Canadians as British, the British lead all others.

**VIIPURI FALLING**  
**HELINGSFORS**—The Russians are pounding relentlessly along a thirty-mile front as Viipuri falls in flames to the invaders. There are further Russian gains along the Karelian Isthmus. In the Lake Ladoga section the Finns are still holding out. Defeat of Russian forces northeast of Lake Ladoga with two thousand invaders frozen to death was officially announced today. Finnish troops there captured one hundred tanks, mostly intact, a communique said.

**TWO NAZIS DOWNED**  
**LONDON**—The Air Ministry announced today that Royal Air Force planes had shot down two enemy aircraft—one a Dornier bomber which fell in France and the other, a Messerschmidt which fell behind the German lines. In general fighting on the Western Front, the French dispersed several German patrols.

**ARMSTRONG-GARCIA DRAW**  
**WELTERWEIGHT CHAMPION, AND CEFERINO GARCIA, NEW YORK AND CALIFORNIA** recognized middleweight king, battled to a ten round draw here last night before an estimated 20,000 fans. Garcia's title was at stake in a bitter, bruising battle. They punched toe to toe, head to head, almost throughout. Garcia suffered a cut right eye and Armstrong's left optic was early closed tight. Garcia weighed 153½ pounds and Armstrong, 142.

**FATAL QUEBEC FIRE**  
**QUEBEC**—Bertha Pilote, 26, who was to have been married today, and her sister, Delvina, 22, were identified tentatively as victims of a three-hour fire which raged through a lower town building. Three others went to hospital with burns.

**E. P. DAVIS K.C. DIES**  
**VANCOUVER**—Edward Pease Davis K.C., 80, outstanding Western Canada lawyer before his retirement nine years ago, died here last night.

**GERMAN SHIP LOSSES**  
**ARUBA, Dutch West Indies**—The German freighter Heidelberg was captured intact by a British cruiser and is being towed to Trinidad. It is reported. It is the second German loss in this vicinity in two days. Yesterday the 2390 ton Troja was set afire and scuttled rather than surrender.

**U-BOATS ON THIS SIDE**  
**NEW YORK**—At least four German submarines are believed to be prowling on this side of the Atlantic with British warships chasing them.

## PROPHESIES COME TRUE

Present Course of International Affairs Bearing Out British-Israelism, Declares Speaker

"It was just about three years ago, if my memory serves me correctly, that I stood here and endeavored to give a racy survey of the reasons for the British Israel position," said P. H. Linzey in an address on British-Israelism and the present international situation before the local Rotary Club on Thursday. "In months that have since elapsed changes of startling importance have followed one after another in rapid succession. The map of Europe has undergone a drastic change. Nazi influence has been extended to include Austria, Czechoslovakia, Memel, Danzig and Poland. The insatiable Hitler is planning still more schemes to extend German influence and power. Italy, in addition to holding Ethiopia, has taken possession of Albania. Russia has control over Estonia, Lithuania and Latvia and half of Poland and, at the moment, is busy invading Finland."

With the service boat Daly and pile driver on the job and Capt. Reg. Green in charge of the work, the Armour Salvage Co. has been this week taking down the temporary dock which it had at Barrett Point for the handling of gravel while the Northern Construction Co. was constructing fortifications there. The Northern Construction Co. has now completed its work both at Barrett and Frederick Points and removal of equipment has been recently taking place.

Capt. William Hughes is back in command of the C.P.R. steamer Princess Adelaide on the Vancouver-Ocean Falls-Prince Rupert local route after having been off for the past few months. The Princess Adelaide arrived in port at 1:30 yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 10 o'clock last night from the south and sailed at 1 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

vealed the fact that Germany was not slow to extend her hand to Russia which culminated in a pact between the two countries, the details of which are not known fully. We know that this is no love affair and, just as soon as it serves the advantage of one or the other, it will be either broken or strengthened by a firmer military alliance. Meanwhile, Russia prefers to see Germany, Great Britain and France dissipate their strength in combat, and conserve her own strength to advance her interests without serious opposition.

**Situation Today**  
"Now let us look at the situation today. Russia has already strengthened her position in Europe and, with the conquest of Finland, she will have little to fear from her real enemy, Germany. She will be master of the Baltic or, at least, joint master with Germany. The war in the west where the formidable Maginot and Siegfried lines face each other can be reckoned a stalemate. I believe I hazard nothing when I say that there will be no major fighting there as it would be virtual suicide for either side to assault the opposing wall. That both Germany and Russia have designs on the Near East all will agree. The Balkan States are in a condition of fear and trembling as to what will happen next. Italy has already secured a land base in Albania for the march East when the time comes. As soon as Russia completes her subjugation of Finland she will have made secure her back door in the Baltic and can pursue her ambitions in a warmer clime, that is the Near East. To this end she has already amassed large forces at the Caucasus. She fears the bombing of Baku, her source of oil supply, and Great Britain fears an attempt on her oil supply in Iran. Only recently, M. Sarajoglu, the Turkish foreign minister, said: 'Any attempt by Russia to march eastward across Iran and Iraq and so strike Britain's huge oil interests would be met with fierce opposition from Turkey.'

"On the German side we find that her sphere of influence is being rapidly extended from Scandinavia to the Balkans and from the Baltic to the Black Sea. As what point the Allies will challenge the Nazi juggernaut as it rolls toward Istanbul is not known. It is highly probable that Germany will go through Roumania to the Black Sea and simultaneously Italy will march eastward from Albania to protect her supposed interests in the Balkans while Russia invades Iran and Iraq. These circumstances are rapidly preparing the stage for the final drama to be enacted in the land of Palestine in accordance with the prophecies of the Bible where the prophet declares the final judgment of the nations will take place.

"Russia and her confederates are to attack Palestine. They are specifically described as an anti-Christ and anti-God aggregation and their doom is certain because the Almighty brings terrible forces of

nature against them. The Bible tells us it is the time of Israel's trouble but he shall be delivered out of it. Again speaking of the final struggle we read that 'Then shall the Lord go forth and fight against these nations as He fought in the day of Battle.'

**No Defeat**  
"There is no room for defeatism, doubt or depression in the British Israel vision. Instead it is a thrilling experience to watch the fluctuating scene as the climax to the prophetic picture regarding the time of the end hastens toward its grand finale, representing deliverance from oppression of all the nations of mankind.

"Our leading statesmen and all men who think seriously are of one mind in recognizing in this conflict the greatest warfare against high principles that has ever been waged by evil influences.

"Without cant or hypocrisy we can truthfully say that God is on our side for we were never surer than today that our cause is just and right.

"But dark days are ahead, the powerful aggregation against us is out to destroy the British Empire and this is their announced boast.

"Well might His Majesty, in his New Year Empire message, call upon all of us to reach out in the dark and take hold of the Hand of God as we stand on the threshold of another momentous year."
