## SITING IN WAY OF TOWERS

### Battling For Railway Lines

Planes Landing More Troops and Holding Own in Spite of Continued Heavy Air Attacks By Enemy

**MANY GERMAN SINKINGS**  
LONDON, April 29: (CP)—It is officially stated that twenty-eight German transports and supply ships have been sunk since April 8.

LONDON, April 29: (CP)—There was little change in the general position of contending land forces in the Norwegian war today. Both sides claimed successful landings of further reinforcements for their armies in the field. Aerial activity by both the Allies and the enemy continued. There are claims and counter-claims of sinking of transport vessels.

Allied troops in Norway held fast today against growing German pressure as the Admiralty announced that three German supply transports had been torpedoed and sunk. It was acknowledged that two British armed trawlers had been bombed and sunk without casualties. This was in answer to extravagant German claims that five Allied cruisers and thirteen transports had been sunk or damaged within the last forty-eight hours.

The British Air Ministry said that a Sunderland flying boat had sunk a German submarine. LONDON, April 29: Fighting continues in various sectors for control of transportation and communication lines between Oslo and Trondheim. Allied forces continue to repulse German assaults in central Norway although German forces are said to be nearing Støren from where it is said there should be little difficulty in moving downhill to the relief of Trondheim. A German advance has been halted by Norwegian forces at Ulvik near Bergen. Vicious Nazi air attacks on Allied troops and civilian populations continue. It is officially denied in London that any Allied Brigadier or staff has been captured as claimed by Germany.

German forces were reported today to have occupied Kvam, thirty-five miles southeast of Dombås, but to have been repelled in a violent attack upon a fort north of Steinkjer.

Despite new enemy air attacks on Andalsnes, Namsos and lines of communication, Allied forces are settling down in the Gula River valley south of Trondheim where another German attack is reported to have been repulsed. The Allies are now in a position to receive reinforcements or fall back to strong-er and well supported positions. Holds on various railway points are being strengthened. Both Dombås and Støren, important back doors of Trondheim, are held by the Allies and the enemy is making strenuous efforts to get control of them. Dombås has not been air attacked by the Germans in four days, the going into action of Allied anti-aircraft guns and fighter planes having had the effect of diminishing the Nazi air attack which had proven very destructive.

In addition to those at Andalsnes, thousands of British troops are reported to have been disembarked around the extreme head of Trondheim Fjord as well as at Namsos.

**Position Much Improved**  
General Carton de Wiart, commander-in-chief of the British forces in Central Norway, reports the position there now much improved. Any gains the Germans may have made have been strategically unimportant.

The situation north of Trondheim is quieter now after a strenuous week. Heavy firing was reported today to have been heard south

## Fifth Brigade Is In Panama

LONDON, April 29:—According to a Reuters dispatch from Panama to London a secret store of German arms, including machine guns, has been discovered at Panama. Panama authorities expect, it is said, to make additional discoveries of concealed Nazi arms. It is rumored that a revolution against the Panama government had been planned.

## OBJECTION BY SOVIET

Russia Is Insisting That Reich Respect Neutrality Of Sweden

LONDON, April 29:—At Tallin, Estonia, it is reported that Soviet Russia has presented a demarche to Berlin demanding Nazi respect of Swedish neutrality.

## JUGOSLAVIA AGAINST IT

Does Not Favor German-Inspired Proposal Regarding Control Of Danube River

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, April 29: (CP)—Yugoslavia has rejected the Hungarian proposal, presumably made under German pressure, that a 75-mile stretch of the Danube River near the Iron Gate be placed under international control. Roumania is hesitant about the proposal.

## Freighter Has Fire In Hold

Nordal Returns To Victoria After Having Sailed From Vancouver For Japan

VICTORIA, April 29:—The freighter Nordal, which sailed from Vancouver last week for Japan with cargo, has returned to port here, reporting fire in her No. 2 hold. There were no external signs of fire.

of Trondheim. Reports are that hardly a street or house are left intact at Namsos after the German bombings. The city had been systematically bombed from end to end by the Nazi planes. The civilian population, however, had previously moved and there was not great loss of life. The city was set almost totally ablaze.

There was also aerial bombings by the Germans in the Narvik area but it did not interfere with Allied activities and there was nothing new there today.

The Germans have been losing several planes in these air raids.

The Nazis claim to have occupied Voss near Bergen and to have captured eight thousand British prisoners at Stavanger, a figure which is generally admitted to be greatly exaggerated. Further extensive troop, plane and war material deliveries are claimed to have been made by Germany into Norway. Germany claims that its military operations in Norway are proceeding on schedule, that the junction of forces in Trondheim area will be effected tomorrow and that within ten days there will not be an Allied soldier alive or footloose anywhere in Norway except possibly around Narvik.

**Transports Around Sweden**  
Observers at Goteborg, Sweden, report having seen several German troopships passing Saturday and Sunday as well as numerous planes, all evidently bound for Norway. All avoided Swedish territory.

## IS LYING AS USUAL

Sir Samuel Hoare Replies to Hypocritical German Foreign Minister—Foul and Cowardly

LONDON, April 29.—Sir Samuel Hoare, in a speech, charged Joachim von Ribbentrop, German foreign minister, with lying in his speech on Saturday charging a British and French conspiracy to invade Norway. Such charges from the "Murderers of Czechoslovakia and Poland" were "sickening hypocrisy." All Allied resources, it was declared, would be thrown into the war in Norway to break the grip which had been obtained by the Nazis on that country as a result of treachery and striking without warning. The advantage won by a foul and cowardly blow must be redeemed by hard fighting, vigorous action and patient planning. "We can leave tactics of terrorism to the enemy. We have already struck blows which all his boasting and deceit cannot conceal."

The Allies, Sir Samuel said, had been fighting at a great disadvantage in the air. The enemy had had bases and the Allies had none. "Yet already we have done much damage. We have sunk many a ship and brought down many a plane." Sir Samuel paid tribute to the fine leadership of King Haakon of a great fighting race. The vigor and patriotism of the people of Norway was being splendidly exemplified.

## STILL IN DEADLOCK

No New Development In Oil Situation Following Price-Cutting Order

COMPANIES CHARGED

VICTORIA, April 29: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo announced this afternoon that the government is taking action under the Combines Investigation Act against oil companies which refused to accept the fuel board order cutting the wholesale gasoline price three cents per gallon. This order following rejection of a request by the oil companies that prevailing Pacific Coast prices be maintained until a price hearing was held.

VICTORIA, April 29: (CP)—The British Columbia government and the oil companies are still deadlocked over the retail price of gasoline.

The government at the end of the week refused a request of the companies that the time for selling at the old prices be extended for a week.

Dr. W. A. Carrothers, chairman of the fuel control board, said there would be no rescission of the price cutting order.

Premier T. D. Pattullo advised the oil companies to obey the law. This the oil companies said they were doing even though they had refused to sell to the dealers at new prices.

Meantime, while some Victoria, Vancouver and Lower Mainland tanks are dry, there seemed to be no shortage among motorists and, it being a fine week-end, an unusually large number were out enjoying themselves.

## Little Activity On Western Front

Enemy Patrols Broken Up By French With Germans Suffering Losses

PARIS, April 29:—The only activity on the Western Front yesterday occurred west of the Vosges accompanied by artillery fire. The French broke up enemy patrols, inflicting losses on the Nazis. So speedy and effective was French counter action that the Germans, in their hasty retreat, left dead in the field.

## GULF OF FINLAND IS MINED

Germany Gives Warning But does Not State Which Country Sowed Explosives

BERLIN, April 29.—Without stating specifically by which country they had been laid, Germany yesterday gave warning of new mine fields in waters off Estonia and Finland of which Russia claims to be in complete master.

## Made Getaway From Germans

Forty-Seven British Seamen From Captured Ship Landed At Newcastle

LONDON, April 29:—Forty-seven British seamen from a ship which the Germans captured off the coast of Norway have arrived at Newcastle from Narvik. They escaped from their Nazi guards at Narvik and joined the survivors of the destroyer Hardy. They were brought home by a British destroyer.

## REICH CROP MAY BE HIT

Agricultural Conditions None Too Good In Czechoslovakia And Denmark

BERLIN, April 29:—The severe winter and spring floods will hit Germany's grain supply through their effect on this year's crops in Moravia and Bohemia as well as in Denmark. In the southern part spring sowing has only now started. In the northern part only now is work of preparing the land commencing, this being a month later than usual.

The severe winter has also delayed spring agricultural operations in Denmark and there is expected to be a grain shortage which will be felt through possible exhaustion of feed for the all-important live-stock industry.

## WAR CHIEFS IN SESSION

Another Meeting of Supreme Council—Ribbentrop Lies

LONDON, April 29.—The second within a week, the Allied Supreme War Council held its ninth meeting at No. 10 Downing Street and was reported in complete agreement on all war matters. The Norwegian situation was dealt with and the speech of German Foreign Secretary Joachim von Ribbentrop, in which an attempt was made to fix the guilt for invasion of Norway on the Allies, was described as consisting of "lies we might have expected from him."

## PASSING OF TETRAZINI

Noted Italian Opera Singer Dies At Milan After Long Illness

MILAN, April 29:—Louisa Tetrazini, celebrated Italian opera singer, died in Milan on Sunday at the age of sixty-eight years. She had suffered a paralytic stroke and brain hemorrhage, having been ill for some time.

## Bulletins

### CRITICISM IS RISING

LONDON—Criticism is developing in London over the handling of the Allied campaign in Norway. There is increasing dissatisfaction and some members of Parliament are reported to be demanding a secret session so that the war effort may be fully and freely discussed. News of Allied reverses is the cause of discontent. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain is expected to make a statement tomorrow. Clement Atlee and Sir Arthur Greenwood conferred today with Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain.

### ARE BLIND FOLLOWERS

LONDON—Dino Grandi, Marshal of Italy, declared that the Fascist state cannot and will not stay out of the war. The people of Italy, he declared, are bound to their Duce with blind devotion and will unquestioningly follow him in any decision he may make. The Italian press approves Germany's action in Norway and wishes the Reich army every success. Von Ribbentrop's speech is approved.

### MAPLE LEAFS WIN OPENER

WINNIPEG—Vancouver Maple Leafs Saturday night defeated Winnipeg St. Andrew's 37 to 30 in the opening game of the best out of five series for the western Canada basketball championship title. The second game takes place tonight. The winners will meet Montreal Y.M. H. A. for the Dominion title.

## MOSLEMS WANT INDIA ALLIED WITH BRITAIN

League Head Says They Can Never Evolve Common Nationality With Hindu Peoples

**OPPOSED TO PARTITION**  
DELHI, April 29.—The All India Moslem Congress, in session here, refused by resolution, support to the proposal of partition of India under self-government.

CALCUTTA, April 29: (CP)—In President M. A. Jinnah the All-India Moslem League has a strong head. The recent League session in Lahore gave him an opportunity of asserting leadership just as pronounced as Mahatma Gandhi's over the Congress party. Five years ago the League was split into two weak rival sections and had little electoral strength. In late years, however, it experienced a remarkable resurgence owing to Jinnah's leadership and the clumsy handling of the Moslem minorities by Congress governments in the provinces.

The Moslems propose that their independent northern and eastern federations shall be permanently allied with Great Britain. They are free from facts either about the spinning wheels or the dictatorship of the proletariat—creeds of the Congress right and left wings respectively.

Avowed objective of the Congress is independence for a united India, the constitution to be settled by a constituent assembly. Jinnah, on the contrary, says that Islam and Hinduism are not religions in the strict sense of the word but are different social orders "and it is only a dream that Hindus and Moslems can ever evolve a common nationality."

### What Moslems Want

"If the British government is in earnest about securing the peace and happiness of the people of this sub-continent, the only course open to us all is to allow the major nations separate homelands by dividing India into autonomous national states," Jinnah argues.

"The present artificial unity of India dates back only to the British conquest and is maintained (Continued on Page Two)

## TO RESUME TRADE TALK

Italian Ambassador Sees British Foreign Secretary In London

LONDON, April 29:—Italian Ambassador to Great Britain Boscaini conferred with British Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax at the week-end. Trade relations are understood to have been discussed and it is expected there may be a resumption of negotiations which were suspended in February because of British blockade activities involving seizure of Italian ships carrying German coal.

Italy, it is learned in official quarters, made diplomatic approaches to the British government for a resumption of trade and economic negotiations. It is considered probable that British officials will go to Rome within the next few days to resume negotiations.

## MINES ARE EFFECTIVE

Main Entrance of Narvik Harbor Are Latest Part of Norway Coast to be Blocked

LONDON, April 29.—The British Admiralty says that 100,000 mines have been laid in recent weeks along the Norwegian coast, these mines having been responsible for twenty-five per cent of the German sea losses in that area.

Yesterday the British Admiralty announced the laying of two new mine fields, 140 miles apart, north and south of Narvik, at the main approaches of that port. As a result some of the ships of the Navy will be released for other duty.

# EDITORIALS

## NEWSPRINT EXPORT

Just now the newsprint industry is of particular value to Canada because it allows this country to keep up a steady export trade with the United States, thus enabling the Canadian government to purchase United States war materials for the Allies on the cash and carry basis. Purchases of American goods can be made only on an exchange basis. At present the rate of exchange is ten to eleven per cent in favor of the United States. To prevent it falling lower there must be a large Canadian export business. That means that newsprint, lumber and other goods must be sent south in quantities.

Canadians who wish to help keep up Canadian credit in the United States can do so by refraining from buying American goods wherever possible. Every dollar spent on American goods reduces the amount of war material that can be purchased.

## ARE STILL WORRYING

The powerful group of Maclean publications is still worrying over the composition of the Canadian cabinet. The opinion it voices is that some outstanding man or men, presumably from outside Parliament, should be taken into the government to help at the present time.

May we suggest that these publications are now out of date. The electors of the country have done the choosing. They returned Hon. Ian McKenzie in Vancouver with an increased majority. They returned, in fact, all the ministers of the crown and they gave them a large backing. Why then should the power behind the Maclean group of publications continue to worry.

This group campaigned with all its force against the return of the Mackenzie King government never missing an opportunity to distort facts in order to try to bring about its defeat. In spite of this the people of the country returned the government with an overwhelming majority. The result seems to indicate that the influence of the Maclean publications is not of great importance. In view of this we cannot see why they do not turn to some different topic for a few days.

## MOSLEMS WANT INDIA ALLIED WITH BRITAIN

by the British bayonet but the termination of the British regime, implicit in the recent declaration of his Majesty's government, will herald a break-up.

"Moslem India cannot accept any constitution which must necessarily result in a Hindu majority government. Moslems are a nation according to any definition of a nation and must have their homeland, their territory and their state."

Jinnah said he "never dreamt that the Congress would ever come so low as they did in the provinces they governed." This was a reference to the allegations of ill-treatment of Moslems there. He added that the Congress idea of a constituent assembly was impracticable and that the League asked the British government "for a declaration that no constitution will be thrust upon us Moslems without our approval."

The resolution passed by the League asks that any constitutional plan for India should be based on the demarcation of geographically contiguous units such as will constitute the areas in which Moslems are in a majority, that is, Northwest and Eastern India, into independent states in which the constituent units shall be autonomous and sovereign.

Without exception, Hindu politicians and the press condemn this plan. The British-owned newspaper, the "Statesman," says that the conflicting claims of League and Congress mean a sick headache for everybody but it must be recognized that partition is becoming a live issue.

The "Statesman" has the impression there are more young Moslem All-Indian Nationalists than the League is willing to admit. They belong to the intelligentsia but, if passions rise further and the issue becomes definite, the partitioners' appeal will be based more on religious grounds and Moslems who are Indian nationalists will be hard put to it to keep their end up.

**Fatal Spade Riots**  
A side-issue at the Moslem League conferences was provided by the Khaksar affair which Jinnah showed skill in handling. The Khaksars, a Moslem organization, have uniforms, carry spades as a symbol of labor and are supposed to give implicit obedience to their leader.

At Lahore, just before the Moslem League session, a number of Khaksars attacked a party of police with their spades, killed two constables and injured others in the party before they were dispersed by firing. The government then declared the Khaksars an unlawful association and their leader was arrested. The government announced a judicial inquiry into the firing and delegates contented themselves with a resolution calling for this.

Violent character of the movement posed a problem for the League but the Punjab's premier, Sir Sikander Hyat Khan, a prominent leaver upheld law and order.

NEW YORK, April 29: (CP) — Before a capacity crowd of fifty thousand fans at the Polo Grounds yesterday, Brooklyn Dodgers defeated New York Giants for their eighth straight victory without a defeat so far this season. A home run in the ninth decided the issue.

At Boston, the Bees got into the winning column for the first time this season with a close victory over the Phillies. Home runs were made by Joe Medwick, Johnny Mize and Don Gutteridge as the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Chicago Cubs at Sportsman's Park.

Catcher Ernie Lombardi homered as Cincinnati Reds defeated Pittsburgh Pirates. The Red, as a result, climbed back into runner-up position ahead of the Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Giants who are now tied for third place with the Chicago Cubs.

Cleveland Indians defeated Detroit Tigers both Saturday and Sunday and held first place in the American League. The Boston Red Sox assumed the runner-up position by winning a twelve-inning game from the Philadelphia Athletics. **KETCHIKAN AIR BASE**

Governor Gruening Announces Important New Project on Annette Island

KETCHIKAN, April 29.—Governor Gruening of Alaska, at Ketchikan Saturday on his way back to Juneau after a trip to Washington on territorial business, announced that \$100,000 would be spent this year on preliminary work in connection with the establishment of a great air base on Annette Island, sixteen miles from Ketchikan. The project is to be completed within two years.

The new air base will form an integral part of the defence and aerial transport system of Alaska. It will be used by the Pan American Airways clipper plane service from Seattle to Alaska. There will be a shuttle air or boat service between Ketchikan and the air base.

Governor Gruening stated that he had endeavored to have additional steamers put on the Alaska run this summer but had found a shortage of ships a difficulty, there having been a great demand for tonnage. Shipyards were engaged all over the country in rushing out orders for new ships.
