EDITORIAL

PRIME MINISTER'S SPEECH

In the course of his Labor Day speech Prime Minister Mackenzie King had some rather interesting things to say. Discussing democracy and dictatorships he said:

"We have not needed Hitler and Mussolini to tell us; that dictatorship is at war with democracy. In a world of narrowing distances there is no longer room for those two systems to survive side by side. Sooner or later, the one will extinguish the other. Light will fade into darkness or the darkness will vanish before the light. And again: "The triumph of the Nazis in Europe would involve for the peoples of this continent the substitution of fear for freedom and of economic domination for ssocial progress. It would spell the doom of democracy in the new world."

A SAD PROJECT

After discussing some of the steps already taken by Daily News. Canada to help meet the present situation the Prime Minister said:

"Unless Naziism in Europe is destroyed the threat of world domination by a ruthless foe will hang continuously over our heads just as, in recent years, the threat of invasion and domination has hung over the heads of the free peoples of Europe. To meet that threat, our own standards of behavior and living would increasingly become those of the totalitarian states. Our democratic institu- SCHOOLS & COLLEGES | efforts will be paraded during the relieving suffering caused by entions, one by one, would disappear and with them what we have won of freedom.

"Unless the enemy is defeated and the enslaved countries of Europe restored to freedom, there will be no prospect of improving or even of maintaining the standards of Canadian life which Canadian energy and Canadian skill have won, no hope of enlarging the opportunities for the happiness of our own or succeeding generations. Free labor will have to compete with slave labor. Men who have hitherto had the right to choose where they would work . and at what they would work will find themselves in hopeless competition with conscript labor, automatic, soulless, driven by the merciless lash of a ruthless state."
