# WAR CRISES IN TWO AREAS

## Situation Is Tense Both in Balkans and Far East; Outbreaks Are Likely

### Japanese Said To Be Ready To Take Over Shanghai International Settlement; British-Rumanian Relations Are More Critical

CHANGHAI.—Despite Japanese denials, well-informed sources insisted today that fourteen thousand Japanese soldiers of Japanese dominated Nanking puppet government are concentrated outside of Shanghai while it is rumored Japan plans taking over the international settlement French concession on October 18, coincident with the reopening by Great Britain of the air road.

BUCHAREST.—Formation of 150 planes, some with German markings, flew back and forth over Bucharest and oil towns of Plesti and Giurgiu today. They swooped low over the British legation in Bucharest where the staff is speeding packing up.

LONDON.—Sir Reginald Hoare, British minister in Rumania, has notified Premier Ion Antonescu that relations between Great Britain and Rumania have reached a critical point.

## GUARDSMEN DISPATCHED TO HAWAII

Time Since 1918 That They Have Been Sent From United States Shores

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 11.—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson issued last night that, as a step in strengthening defenses in view of the situation in the Far East, 5700 National Guards, specializing in anti-aircraft functions, have been ordered from California to Hawaii and will proceed immediately. It will be the first time since 1918 that National Guardsmen have been sent beyond the territories of United States proper.

## G BERTHA GUNS BUSY

Regular Display as Shells Are Fired Across Straits Into Dover Area; R.A.F. Answers

BRISTOL, Eng., Oct. 11.—Nazi long range guns, bombing the Dover area at dusk last night, opened up with single rounds when increased to salvos of shells. Flashes of the guns lit the French coast around the batteries. The bombardment resulted in no damage of consequence to property and there were no casualties. Royal Air Force bombers in large numbers, swarmed across the channel in the teeth of a southwest wind and lambasted the Nazi gun positions with tons of bombs, hitting particularly hard at Calais and Griz Nez.

## MILITARY COMMAND FOR WEST

Change in Set-up, Affecting This Coast, Announced by Minister of National Defence

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—Creation of a military command to include British Columbia and Alberta is announced by Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence. It will be headed by Major General R. O. Alexander of Toronto.

The command will serve the same function as the Atlantic command in the east. The new command will be responsible for all operational matters affecting Pacific defences and will work in close co-operation with the navy and air force. It will have supervision over coastal defence forces through fortress and area commanders and will direct operations of all mobile and land forces detailed for Pacific Coast defence. It will also be responsible for internal security measures and protection of vulnerable points defined as military responsibilities.

## Bella Bella Plane Crash

VICTORIA, Oct. 11: (CP)—Flight Sergeant F. J. McMahon sustained slight injuries when a Royal Canadian Air Force plane crashed while taking off at Bella Bella yesterday, the western air command announced. Flying Officer Gan-ymon and Sergeant Ewart were uninjured in the crash.

Indians and fisher folk of Labrador and northern Newfoundland. He began his work in that bleak region in 1892. He navigated ships up and down the treacherous coast, journeyed inland afoot or by dog team over windswept fields of ice and snow, came out to enlist more and more aid for his people, and built up a chain of hospitals, schools and relief centres. His active participation in the work virtually ended in October, 1934 when, as he sailed from Boston for a lengthy stay in his native England, he remarked sadly: "I'm getting too old to drive dog teams and I'm afraid I must take it easy until the time comes to cash in my checks." Hardships and years of intense physical exertion had brought on a chronic heart condition which forced him to "take it easy." But he continued to do what he could for Labrador and his 73rd birthday on February 28, 1938, saw him at (Continued on Page Four)

## IS MOVE ON SUEZ COMING?

Premier Mussolini Gives No Hint of Axis Intentions But Newspaper Has Suggestion

PADUA, Italy, Oct. 11: (CP)—Premier Benito Mussolini witnessed a military demonstration here yesterday but refrained from any speech or hint of axis intent.

The newspaper Il Piccolo called the parade a "prologue" to undisclosed events to come and some observers regarded it as a possible prelude to a new axis thrust.

It is reported that at the recent conference at Brenner Pass agreed upon a pincers movement on Suez and that Nazi military activities in the Balkans at present are preparatory to such a manoeuvre.

## PAY VISIT TO DETROIT

Pan-American Delegates Are in Automobile City in Course of Tour

DETROIT, Oct. 11.—Twenty representatives of nine Pan-American nations, visiting United States to inspect the country's defences, arrived in Detroit yesterday and inspected automobile manufacturing plants which are being or may be used in the making of war supplies. Henry Ford and Edsel Ford were among those to meet the delegates.

## PACIFIC DEFENCE

Minister of Air Gives Impressions Following Inspection Trip to Coast

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—Canada's home air defences on Pacific as well as on Atlantic coasts are being strengthened, said Hon. C. G. Power, minister of national defence for air, following return from his recent trip to the Pacific coast where he visited many stations nearing completion.

Speaking of the Pacific coast, Major Power said it was a very big coast to patrol and watch and he admitted "it is a fact we have not aircraft nor personnel for all our projected squadrons at both coasts." Major Power announced that recruits of the Royal Canadian Air Force would be stepped up in ratio of from five to seven or an increase of forty per cent., the pilots' training period to be reduced from the present fourteen weeks.

## EVEN GERMANS ADMIT DEVASTATING ATTACK ON PORT OF HAMBURG

Royal Air Force Planes Range Over Wide Area of Reich to Cause Widespread Destruction to Enemy War Machine

BERLIN, Oct. 11.—the great north German port of Hamburg suffered considerably last night at the hands of the Royal Air Force, the German News Agency admitted today. "Devastation visible for over a radius of one kilometer (five-eighths of a mile) was done by the Royal Air Force in the central section of Hamburg," the News Agency reported, and another section was left a "shambles of ashes." At least three persons were killed and fifteen wounded in Hamburg.

## NEW SUGAR PLANT NOW PRODUCING

First Official Car Sent From Winnipeg To Portage

WINNIPEG, Oct. 11:—First official car of sugar from the New Manitoba Sugar Company factory was shipped from Winnipeg today, billed for Portage LaPrairie over lines of Canadian National Railways. The new plant, constructed at a cost of approximately two million dollars, has a capacity to work and refine 1500 tons of sugar beets in 24 hours of continuous operation.

## Rumanian Assets Are Impounded

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 11.—The United States Department of the Treasury yesterday ordered the impounding of funds and assets of Rumania and its citizens in the United States. The value of these funds and assets is estimated at \$100,000,000. Henceforth, before such funds can be withdrawn, special treasury licences must be obtained. The reason of the impounding is to prevent the funds and assets from falling into German hands.

## FEW BOMBS ON LONDON

Little Activity in Way of Dropping Missiles on British Metropolis Yesterday

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Only a few bombs were dropped in one section of London during daylight raids on the British capital yesterday and today, although there were three alarms, no bombs were dropped, an official communique said, although, during the night, the enemy again reached the city. Enemy planes attacked points in Kent, along the south coast and in the Thames Estuary as well as Liverpool.

## ENTRY OF RUMANIA

German Troops Expected to Move Into Balkan Country After October 15

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Oct. 11.—German troops, already in Transylvania, are expected to enter Rumania between October 15 and 24, it was announced here last night. It had been reported elsewhere that the first German troops were already in the country. Italy, it was stated, would participate with Germany in the training of military units in Rumania.

## Canadian Food Going Overseas

Hon. J. G. Gardiner Confering With Lord Woolton in England

LONDON, Oct. 11: (CP)—Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Canadian minister of agriculture, conferred twice yesterday with Lord Woolton, the British minister of food. Sending of food overseas from Canada to Great Britain is under discussion.

## BALKANS TENSION

All of Southeast Europe May Soon Be Drawn Into Extended Axis War Front

BUDAPEST, Oct. 11: (CP)—German military penetration of Rumania has aroused Balkan fears today that all southeast Europe may soon be drawn into an extended axis war front. A strongly organized diplomatic campaign to draw Greece and Turkey away from Great Britain and secure obedience of other southeastern European countries is awaited as the next logical step. If the campaign fails, Balkan observers predict that military action is almost unavoidable. Britain Freezes Assets

The British government today blocked all Rumanian credits in Great Britain. It was not known whether Rumanian ships in British ports were included in the order of seizure which was made presumably because German troops are entering Rumania and because the Rumanians have arrested and allegedly mistreated British subjects. The action of the British in freezing Rumanian credits is similar to action taken in the United States.

The British legation in Bucharest is reported to have already burned its documents preparing to leaving the country. Communications between the British embassy in Bucharest and the Foreign Office in London have been disrupted. Only one of many messages dispatched yesterday got through and its contents were not disclosed.

## To Study Methods Of Great Britain

United States Sending High-Ranking Air Commanders Overseas

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 11.—Two high ranking officers of the United States Air Force have been sent to England by clipper plane to study British air defences and methods of combatting Nazi air raids, it was announced today by Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson.

## EMBARGO ON SIAM

Licences for Export of United States Planes to Oriental Country Revoked

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 11.—Licences for export of fighting planes from the United States to Siam have been revoked. Some such planes, now at Manila on the way to Siam, have been ordered returned from the Philippines.

## INCIDENT SUSPECTED

Assassination of Japanese - Controlled Mayor of Shanghai Viewed by Some as Put Up Job

SHANGHAI, Oct. 11.—Fu Siu, 69-year-old puppet mayor of Shanghai, was assassinated in his own home in the Hong Kew district of Shanghai last night. Almost immediately Hong Kew was placed under martial law and Japanese troops crossed into the international settlement, ostensibly to search for Chinese Nationalists who may have slain the mayor.

Some suspicion was held about the prostitute with which the Japanese entered the settlement following the incident.

There was also some speculation as to how an assassin could have got into the heavily guarded home of the mayor.

The whole incident is regarded as having serious international possibilities in view of the already tense situation.

Fu was slashed with a meat chopper, his injuries including severed jugular vein. A long trusted servant who escaped on a bicycle is suspected.

## TO BUILD NEW TANK

Three Thousand Of Fresh Design To Be Turned Out In Canada—Huge Expenditure

OTTAWA, Oct. 11: (CP)—Designs of a new type of tank are being completed and preparations are under way to manufacture 3,000 in Canada, Hon. Clarence D. Howe, minister of supply, told the Canadian Press Today. The total output now planned will cost about \$150,000,000.

**Graft Always Kills a Nation**

Army Speaker Illustrates Dictum From His Own Experiences And From History

"Graft always kills a nation" was the concluding statement of Lieut. Marcel Godfrey of Vernon, now stationed at Prince Rupert, who addressed the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its luncheon yesterday. It was graft that caused the collapse of France, just as it ended the empires of Rome, Greece and Egypt.

The speaker told of experiences in South Africa when he saw a tribe of black ants oust a tribe of white ants and take possession of their homes. He also referred to what happened in the history of Atlantis when the more virile group was at war with the weaker. In the old days the man with the largest family became the strongest and eventually displaced the others. While the speaker did not think war was wholly bad in itself, the concomitant rape and slaughter of innocents was always bad.

Lieut. Godfrey told of being in France at the time of the Stavin-ski riots when only the arrival of a military force stopped what might have turned into a revolution. At that time France was honeycombed with graft. France was decaying because people forgot that they were Frenchmen and thought only of themselves. When contracts were let most of the money went in graft and was used by the political party. Graft always ended in one way. And yet the French people, as a whole, were a singularly fine people. He had tramped all over the country, living with the French people and he loved them. It was because they were such a fine people that they became the victims of the grafters. "Graft always kills a nation," he declared.

Dr. Neal Carter presided and visitors, in addition to the speaker, included Rotarians W. E. Drake and C. H. Orme, also R. L. McIntosh and W. L. Armstrong. Harry Robbins, manager of the Prince Rupert Cannery, was introduced to the club as a new member.

During the luncheon a bottle of muskig honey presented by Mrs. John R. C. Deane of Port Simpson was raffled and won by George Mitchell, the proceeds, amounting to nine dollars, being handed over to the treasurer of the Red Cross fund.

Lieut. Godfrey was the recent winner of the Beatrice Stone medal for an oil painting described by the Art Gallery Council of Vancouver as a distinguished piece of work of considerable technical excellency.

Threshing Of Timothy Seed About Completed—Fine Grain Crop

SMITHERS, Oct. 11.—Threshing of timothy seed in the Bulkley Valley is about completed and the work has been carried out with the finest fall weather ever remembered by the oldest pioneers in this district. **AGAIN ATTACKING LONDON**  
LONDON.—Relays of German bombers began night attacks on London at the customary time tonight and anti-aircraft guns went into action with a thundering roar. The raiders were also reported again over Liverpool which had its longest raid of the war last night when forty high explosive bombs were dropped on ports and shipyards, causing several casualties. Four times today German air raiders thrust at London and four times they were hurled back by Royal Air Force fighters and ground gunners. The Air Ministry said that five German bombers were shot down yesterday and five British planes were lost with two pilots reported safe.

ROME.—Two British land attacks on Italian positions in Eritrea and Kenya Colony were reported today as well as on Torbruk in Libya. It was claimed that the attacks were repulsed but there were no British comment.

ATHENS.—Italian nationals have been ordered to leave Greece, it was reported today. Premier John Metaxas has conferred with the British ambassador.

OTTAWA.—The Royal Canadian Air Force requires one thousand men who are experienced in radio work for service both at home and overseas.

**LOS ANGELES 'QUAKE**  
LOS ANGELES.—At 9:27 last night Los Angeles district experienced one of its heaviest earthquake shocks in years. No serious damage was done.

**BOMBERS FOR BRITAIN**  
WASHINGTON.—Delivery of one hundred and fifty divy bombers of most up-to-date type has been diverted from Sweden to Great Britain.

**SEVEN LOSE LIVES**  
SOREL, Que.—Seven persons lost their lives when an automobile was struck by a backing freight train here.
