MINISTER IS SAVED

Hon. C. D. Howe Believed Saved From Torpedoed Vessel

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—According to information received at the office of Prime Minister King in Ottawa and also by Mrs. Howe most of the passengers and crew who were aboard the British motorship Western Prince, sunk by a German submarine north of Ireland, are safe. No specific mention is made of Hon. Clarence D. Howe, Canadian Minister of Munitions, and his party who were aboard the Western Prince. Unofficial word from London indicated Mr. Howe and associates were safe. There will be no definite information until survivors are landed, which may not be until today or later as the Western Prince was so far at sea.

SHEFFIELD HIT AGAIN

Royal Air Force Continues Activity Over Enemy Country

MANY ARE HOMELESS
SHEFFIELD, Dec. 16: (CP)—All available food stocks and electrical cooking apparatus were commandeered today for canteens feeding Sheffield's homeless after last night's air attack, the second of large proportions on the centre of the steel industry. The number of persons killed is described as fewer than might have been expected by the many houses destroyed. The Nazi attack was again centred on Sheffield last night. The worst of it took place before midnight, a mist coming up later to ground the Nazi planes, six of which were brought down on the Yorkshire moors. German planes, operating singly and in small numbers, raided London, Liverpool and other points today.

LONDON, Dec. 16.—With but light and scattered thrusts by enemy raiders, England had fairly quiet Saturday and Sunday nights. A town in the west Midlands and another in the Thames Estuary received brief visits from Nazi bombers Saturday night. Sunday night Sheffield received considerable more bombs. There was slight damage and a few casualties with a small number being killed. No bombs had been dropped in London for 48 hours and there have been few alarms. Nazi warplanes were reported over Liverpool and northeast England late Saturday after many quiet hours.

War News

ITALIANS PULLING OUT
ATHENS—There are indications that the Italian forces are preparing to withdraw completely from southern Albania through the flame-scarred port of Valona. Further important points have been captured by the Greeks in their relentless advance.

REFUSES TROOPS PASSAGE
VICHY—Marshal Henri Philippe Petain, President of France, has flatly refused Germany permission to send troops through France to assist Italy in the Albanian and Egyptian campaigns, it is stated here.

ONLY AN ARMISTICE
BERLIN—A rather significant statement was officially issued here today pointing out that only an armistice existed between Germany and France. Really Germany was still at war with France.

HOW ABOUT ITALY?
ANKARA—A German propaganda statement, heard here today, pointed out that Germany, not having given its consent to Italy entering the war, was under no obligation to assist Italy. It was even possible that Germany might break off relations with Italy.

Puts Building Under Control

Australia Takes Measures to Restrict Construction in Wartime

SYDNEY, N.S.W., Dec. 16: (CP)—Latest of the many financial and economic restrictions in Australia caused by war needs and conditions is the control of building by the Australian government. Regulations have now been issued under war powers providing that no building to cost \$18,000 in value may be undertaken without the permission of the Federal Treasurer. In the meantime it is reported that in the metropolitan area of Sydney alone there is a shortage of 25,000 small homes for workers and middle classes. Similar shortages exist in other capital cities.

New York Stock Values Steady

NEW YORK, December 16—Values on the New York Stock Exchange were steady on Saturday. The turnover for the brief session was 390,000 shares. The industrial average at closing was 132.31, down .04; rails, 27.85, unchanged, and utilities, 21.14, down .05. Early trend today was downward with outlook unsettled.

NEW YORK COPPER

NEW YORK, December 16 (Canadian Press)—The New York copper price was .03c. higher Saturday with March closing at 10.98c. per fine ounce.

CHICAGO WHEAT PRICES

CHICAGO, December 16—Chicago wheat prices were 1/8c. to 3/4c. lower Saturday with December closing at 88c.

Many Victims Bodies Taken Out Of Mine

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Dec. 16—Fifty-one bodies have been recovered from the Rumanian coal mine disaster of the week. Two hundred and fifty men are still underground but it is considered possible some of these may still be alive.

Ask Recruits For Gestapo

Taken As Indication of Difficulty Nazis Are Having in Mastering Conquered States

BERLIN, December 16—A call for recruits for the Gestapo is taken as another indication of the difficulty that is increasing for Germany in handling the people of European countries which the Nazis have overrun.

GALLANTRY REWARDED

Two Canadians Receive High Honors For Conspicuous Bravery

LONDON, December 16 (Canadian Press)—Two Canadian officers today received high honors for conspicuous gallantry. Capt. Douglas W. Cunningham of Calgary received the George Medal and Lieut. John M. S. Patton of Hamilton, the George Cross. The honors were for bravery displayed while commanding a company of Royal Canadian Engineers repairing bomb damage.

R.A.F. RAID ON BERLIN

German Capital Visited by British—Railways, Factories and Utilities Services Bombed

LONDON, Dec. 16: (CP)—Railways, factories and utilities services in Berlin were bombed by British raiders last night, the Air Ministry announces. The Royal Air Force also pounded Bermen and Kiel shipyards but Berlin drew the heaviest attack. Berlin itself admitted casualties in dead and wounded. In another raid, British bombers scored direct hits on two enemy merchant vessels off the French coast. Despite unfavorable weather the Royal Air Force also hit hard at submarine bases at Bordeaux, Brest and Lorient. Three British planes are missing.

Duchess Has Setback But Not Serious

MIAMI, Florida, Dec. 16.—After leaving hospital Saturday following her dental operation, the Duchess of Windsor suffered a slight relapse and was ordered back to bed. Her condition is not serious and plans are being made for the Duke and herself to sail tomorrow aboard the yacht Southern Cross on their return to Nassau, Bahamas.

POUND STERLING

NEW YORK, December 16—The British pound sterling continues unchanged at \$4.03 1/2 on the New York foreign exchange market.

Bulletins

HUNGARY MAKES PAYMENT
WASHINGTON—Hungary was the only nation to make any payment on war debt instalments to the United States which became due today. Finland, which had paid regularly before, has had a special moratorium since the war with Russia.

TO GET MORE SHIPS
WASHINGTON, D.C.—The United States Marine Commission approved the sale of twenty-four merchant vessels, including the liner George Washington, German built and taken over as a result of the last war. Formal bids will be received January 7. The purchaser will be Great Britain.

BRITISH HOLDINGS CALLED
LONDON—All British holdings in American companies, amounting to an estimated \$100,000,000, may be called in to assist in bolstering up Great Britain's financial position, it is reported.

LLOYD GEORGE MENTIONED
LONDON—The name of Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George is now mentioned as a possibility to succeed Lord Lothian as ambassador to the United States. Lloyd George was in London today, the first time in months, to confer with Prime Minister Churchill. Sir Neville Henderson, ambassador to Germany at the time war broke out, is also mentioned.

LAVAL ARRESTED
BERNE, Switzerland—Former Premier Pierre Laval, whose resignation as Vice-Premier in the Vichy government was announced Saturday, is reported to be under arrest in France. There are various reports and speculations associating themselves with the removal of Laval from the government of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain and the accession of former Pierre Etienne Flandin.

OFFICIAL IS SLAIN

Legal Advisor to French Embassy at Shanghai Dies of Gunshot Wounds

SHANGHAI, Dec. 16—A legal adviser to the French embassy at Shanghai died tonight from gunshot wounds. A number of Japanese have been already arrested and the international settlement is being combed for suspects.

Fitness Pep-up For Australia

Soldier Rejections Inspire Campaign To Co-ordinate Physical Training Aids

CANBERRA, Dec. 16: (CP)—As the result of many rejections of men for the fighting services the Australian Commonwealth Council of National Fitness has recommended a Commonwealth bureau to co-ordinate physical education in Australia.

Realization of under-development and malnutrition in this country of fine climate and abundant opportunity for open-air life was one of the most remarkable developments in Australia since the outbreak of the war. State governments have already appointed expert directors of physical training and municipalities are to be asked to help by providing swimming pools and recreation areas.

NORWEGIANS NAPLES IS MAN SHIPS STRUCK BY AIR FORCE

Have Taken Over Some of Destroyers Which Great Britain Obtained From United States

LONDON, December 16—Some of the fifty destroyers which were recently turned over by United States to Great Britain are now flying the Norwegian flag and being operated by Norwegian crews in the Allied naval activity of the war.

Carrots Instead Of Butter For Danish Children

COPENHAGEN, December 16—Danish children will henceforth have to obtain their vitamins from carrots instead of butter, stocks of which are diverted to Germany.

Greek Steamer Caught In Storm

Send Out S.O.S. Messages From North of Newfoundland

NEW YORK, Dec. 16—The Greek steamer Orion has sent out S.O.S. messages off Newfoundland appealing for immediate aid. The vessel reports herself at the mercy of a storm with steering gear broken.

CARGO IS HELD UP

Brazilian Ship Detained At Gibraltar With German Contraband on Board

GIBRALTAR, Dec. 16.—A Brazilian ship, having on board German-made manufactured goods including war materials for Brazil, is held up here by the British naval blockade. The German made part of the cargo is declared to be contraband. The cargo was loaded at Lisbon under an agreement claimed to have been made before the war whereby Germany should receive coffee in exchange for manufactured goods.

Canadian Naval Officers Saved

Two Lieutenants Among Those Rescued After Torpedoing of H.M.S. Forfar

OTTAWA, December 16 (Canadian Press)—Lieut. Thomas Lander of Vancouver and Lieut. Alexander of Winnipeg are among those who are announced to have been safely rescued from the armed merchant cruiser H.M.S. Forfar which was torpedoed and sunk by the Nazis last week.

MORE MEN CALLED UP

Australia Forming Home Army of Nineteen Year Olds and Those 25 to 35

CANBERRA, December 16—Australian men nineteen years of age and from 25 to 35 will be called up after the first of the year for seventy days' military training, it is announced. They will form a home army of 250,000 men. Men of intermediate age have been already called up.

British Campaign Carried Right Into Italy—Warship Is Struck

Fascists Lose In Two Areas

Are Falling Back Steadily in Albania and Libya

CAIRO, December 16 (CP)—Five direct hits on a concentration of cruisers and destroyers in a British air raid on Naples Saturday night is reported in a Royal Air Force communique. Two Italian battleships were also attacked but no direct hits on them were claimed. The communique said that five hits on smaller war vessels resulted in four large explosions. Against odds of freezing weather and bitter Italian rear-guard resistance. Greek fighters reported today that they had pushed their lines forward on a snowy front running half the length of Albania. Italians continued throwing reserves into the battle but all reports indicated that Greek successes were continuing.

Continuing to mop up the enemy from Egypt and extending the campaign into Libya, while assisting the Greeks to rout Mussolini's forces in Albania, the British Saturday night carried the offensive against the Fascists right into Italy with the bombing of Naples. Incendiary and high explosive bombs were dropped. Italy admitted attack on a medium-sized warship with fifty of the crew killed and injured. The people of Naples, an official Italian statement said, acted admirably under the attack. It was also admitted by Italy that the Royal Air Force attack had been carried two hundred miles into Libya.

Rome claimed that an Italian submarine had sunk a British cruiser of the Southampton class but the claim has no British confirmation and is regarded as merely another Italian report of type such as there have been many. Italian planes made another stab at Malta but when British fighters came up to intercept them they headed home.

Meanwhile in Albania Although bitter fighting is reported at some points as retreating Italians put up what is believed to be their final resistance, the Greeks continue to sweep forward with gains on all sections of the Albanian front, particularly around Pogradetz. Weather has improved and further important Italian bases evidently in danger of falling. Valona was heavily pounded again by British and Greek aircraft. Italian barracks, supply depots and air-drome were hit.

Further British Advances The British navy and air force are preparing for further advances into Libya, it is declared. Successful bombardment between Sidi Barran and Bardia has taken place. An Italian submarine attempting to interfere was immediately sunk. At least twenty-six Italian planes were destroyed yesterday with only three British planes missing.

Dense Fog In Vancouver Has Struck Traffic

VANCOUVER, December 16—Marine and air traffic of Vancouver was paralyzed throughout the week-end by dense fog. Visibility was down to ten feet. Even the streets automobile traffic was paralyzed on with the greatest of difficulty and there have been numerous accidents. It is the worst fog in twenty-five years.

Aircraft Carrier Has Been Launched

Great New Naval Craft Takes To Water on Atlantic Coast

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 16—The new United States aircraft carrier Hornet, having a capacity of 83 planes, was launched at an Atlantic port Saturday.

Committees In Cities To Aid Rehabilitation

OTTAWA, December 16 (Canadian Press)—Voluntary committees are being set up in many cities of Canada to assist men discharged from the fighting forces in rehabilitating themselves.

Military Observer For United States

Col. William B. Donovan Arrives in London, Reportedly on Special Mission

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Col. William B. Donovan, United States Army observer, has arrived in London. It is said in some quarters that he is on a special mission for Col. Frank Knox, United States Secretary for War. Col. Donovan crossed the Atlantic on a clipper plane to Lisbon.

EDITORIAL

Beginning Of The End . . .

The way the campaigns are going today it might be that the war in Europe may not last as long as had been expected. Possibly another year may see its end. It is doubtful if it can last another winter after this. Our reason for suggesting this is based on the double victory against Italy by Greece and Great Britain respectively. Already there is unrest in Italy and signs of unrest in other countries. Unless the Axis powers can show some definite progress it will be difficult to keep up the morale of the enemy forces.

Most people realize that the weak spot just now is the German U-boat campaign against British shipping. While there is no immediate danger, severe inroads are being made into the British merchant marine. We feel sure the British will be able to cope with this menace and we are equally sure that the United States will lend every possible aid in helping to carry food, men and war supplies across the Atlantic once it is made clear that to neglect doing it would be dangerous to the people of this continent.

On the whole the war situation never looked more hopeful than it does today. It may be different tomorrow or next week or next month but we do not think the resilience of the European nations is as great as was that of Great Britain after Dunkirk. Neither the Germans nor the Italians can stand punishment as well as the British. The winner is the one that can give and take and refuses to view a knockdown as ending the fight. Britain got her knockdown in Flanders but she has recovered and we shall soon see if Italy can stand defeat as well as did Britain.

That Black Cat . . .

Superstitious people will rejoice over the result of the Vancouver election. According to southern newspapers a black cat appeared on the platform when Dr. Telford was speaking just before the election. This is construed as a bad omen and on this occasion the fates ruled true to form. The Doctor was defeated. If he had been elected we probably should have heard nothing of the black cat.

No Interest In Election . . .

Very little interest was taken in the civic election at Vancouver this year. The average attendance at meetings was said to have been thirty. Even the C.C.F. meetings were not anywhere near crowded. It was this lack of interest which caused the defeat of the mayor. Either the Vancouver proletariat no longer trusts Dr. Telford or they have ceased to believe in the efficacy of the C.C.F. as a cure-all for all their troubles. Possibly it was because most of the men are working and it was wages they wanted not excitement.

TROOPS AID HOMELESS

LONDON, Dec. 16: (CP) — To raise funds for people rendered homeless by air raids, troops stationed at a southeast coast town have formed a concert party and are giving regular shows.

FROM FAR EAST

MELBOURNE, Dec. 16: (CP) — In addition to war guests from the United Kingdom, Australia has found homes for 3,156 Britishers evacuated here from Hong Kong and Shanghai.

PARADOX OF 'XMAS

At this time when people are being called upon to make sacrifices to assist in the war effort, Rev. H. G. Funston, in his morning service at First Presbyterian Church yesterday, appealed to this community to forego bacchanalian festivities which had become unappropriately associated with the Christmas season and devote what was thereby saved from foolish spending to the relief of those "who are fighting our battles."

Mr. Funston was outspoken in his comments upon the paradox of celebrating with drunkenness, depravity and licence the sacred oc-

casian of the anniversary of the birth of the Prince of Peace and the Savior of the World. What would Jesus think of people who thought it necessary to have a drink to celebrate his birthday?

It was a dark occasion indeed today to witness the world at war oblivious of Christmas principles. But it appeared that this must be so. After all, a truce for one day with the understanding that war would be resumed on the morrow would be but a sham.

Mr. Funston asked if nations which had become selfish and forgotten true Christian principles were not in a measure responsible for the present condition of affairs as well as nations which would live by the oppression of others and, therefore, must necessarily be overcome.

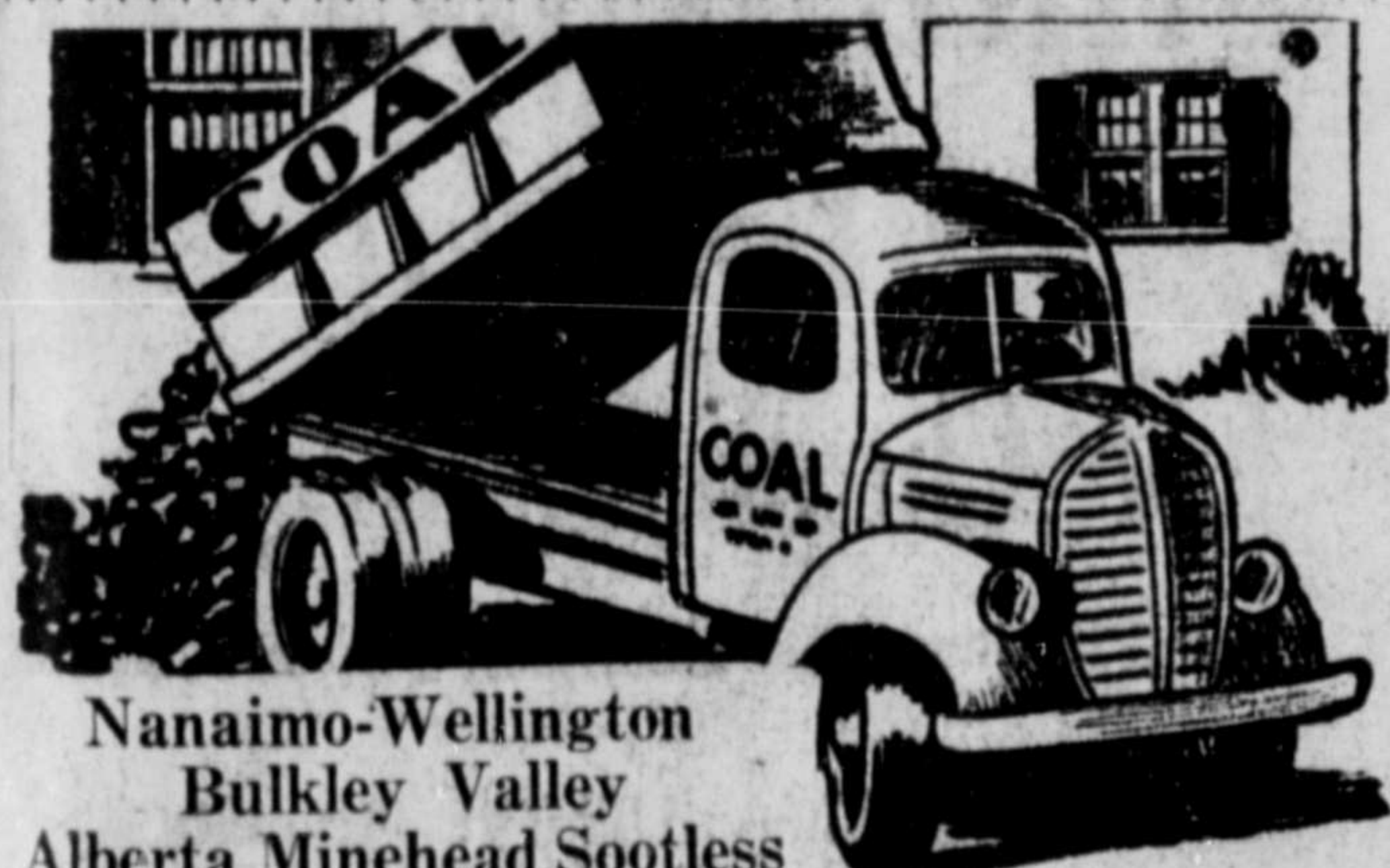
