Fears Nazi Invasion Of Canada

WAR INTENSITY STIFFENS GRIT OF FRANCE: IS READY FOR TRIALS

Canada's Military Attache To France Finds Nations Confident In Its Leadership In Morale

By GLADYS M. ARNOLD Canadian Press Correspondent

PARIS, June 12: (CP)—The courage and confidence of the people of France is unquestionable and intensification of the war has brought a corresponding stiffening of their determination and morale, said Major-General L. R. LaFleche, military attache of the Canadian legation in Paris and former deputy minister of national defence at Ottawa.

General LaFleche spoke with warm admiration for the high quality, the strategical and technical genius of the French army and its command. He said: "General Weygand inspires every confidence while Marshal Petain, whose name will be forever associated with the victory of Verdun in the First Great War, is one of the outstanding soldiers of our time and our enemies know it.

War Council Has Meeting

LONDON, June 12.—A conference of the Allied Supreme War Council was held in France yesterday. "Complete agreement" was continued on measures to be taken in order to meet developments of the war situation. Attending for Great Britain were Prime Minister Winston Churchill, Secretary of War Anthony Eden and Lieut. General Sir John Dill, British chief of staff, and for France Premier Paul Reynaud, Vice-President Marshal Petain and Generalissimo Maxime Weygand.

The spirit is excellent. There's no fanfare or exaggeration. These men face facts, take reverses calmly and do not give way to premature enthusiasm. Yet there's not the slightest doubt that final victory shall be ours.

Naval Base Raided

Italian Military Objectives At Turin And Genoa Attacked By Heavy Bombers

LONDON, June 12.—The air ministry announced this afternoon that the Royal Air Force in a ten minute action supporting the Allied armies resisting the German right wing dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs at the rate of more than one hundred per minute. Convoys were wrecked, mechanized columns scattered and the road junctions blocked.

The air ministry also announced that heavy bombers operating from the British Isles attacked military objectives at Turin and Genoa. At Cairo it was announced bombers again raided Libya, directing their principal attack on the Italian naval air base at Tobruk.

War News

WAS GERMAN SUBMARINE BERLIN—German sources today admitted that it was a German submarine which stopped the United States liner Washington at dawn yesterday.

BOMBING CHUNGKING CHUNGKING—More than 100 Japanese planes, attacking in waves, started fires this afternoon in Chungking. Heavy casualties are feared. The Soviet embassy was badly damaged yesterday in the heaviest bombing of Chungking since May of last year.

HAILE SELASSIE READY LONDON—Emperor Haile Selassie has offered the Allies to return to his kingdom of Ethiopia to lead his people in a renewed war against Italy.

MEXICAN FOREIGN POLICY MEXICO CITY—The Mexican foreign minister officially announces the Mexican foreign policy as being "pro-Ally and in co-operation with the United States.

ITALY IS BOMBED LONDON—The Royal Air Force bombed "certain military objectives" in northern Italy last night, it was announced.

HEINKEL SHOT DOWN LONDON—The Air Ministry announces that a Heinkel bomber was shot down by a Royal Air Force fighter off the southeast coast this morning.

POLISH SUBMARINE LOST LONDON—The Polish submarine Orzel, which escaped internment at Tallin, Estonia, last September has been lost, it is announced.

SWITZERLAND BOMBED GENEVA—The Swiss today counted four dead, including two women, and many injured in the bombings of cities and villages by unidentified foreign planes. At least eighteen were killed in Geneva where five bombs were dropped in the suburban district. Unofficial belief is that the planes were Italian.

TAKES BRITISH INTERESTS ROME—The United States will represent Great Britain in Italy following the departure of the British embassy staff for home following declaration of war.

TURKEY DELAYS ACTION ANKARA—The Turkish government has decided to take no immediate action as a result of Italy's entry into the war but is concentrating on defence preparation informed sources said tonight

ROUMANIAN SHIPMENTS OFF BUCHAREST—All Rumanian maritime traffic in the Black Sea and Mediterranean has been suspended by government order due to "war conditions."

MUNITIONS TO ALLIES

Thirty-Seven Million Dollar Profitless Deal Made Between United States Steel and Government

NEW YORK, June 12: (CP)—Agreement was announced last night with the United States government whereby the United States Steel Export Company, a subsidiary of United States Steel, acquires \$37,600,000 surplus munitions, equipment and ordnance, much of which was made for the last war, will be sold to the Allies. The steel company is to sell at the same price it pays to the government, thereby deriving no profit. The goods taken over technically represent turn-in on new munitions and the general purpose is to speed up deliveries to the Allies.

South Africa Makes Attack On Abyssinia

PRETORIA, June 12: (CP)—The first South African war communiqué announces that South African heavy bombers yesterday attacked military objectives in Abyssinia, causing extensive damage to buildings, personnel, roads and equipment.

OVER 250 REGISTERED

Prince Rupert Men Turn Out to Volunteer for National Service

Accepting registrations for voluntary national service kept workers busy last night at the City Hall and Canadian Legion rooms and well over 250 have now registered. Tonight is the last chance to register at these two places and it is confidently expected that large numbers will attend to do so. Plans will be announced in the press covering the taking of future registrations which will be for a very limited time.

Totalitarian Sympathizers In United States Only Awaiting Orders To March On Ontario

TURKEY TO DECIDE ON NEXT MOVE No Immediate Entry Into War Appears to be Anticipated

Premier of Ontario Rises From His Sickbed to Issue Sensational Warning—Enemy Well Trained and Ready For Action

HOMER Hepburn declared tonight that Nazi-Fascist sympathizers in the United States are waiting only for orders to march across the Atlantic to attack Ontario.

ANKARA, June 12.—The Turkish government is expected to make a decision tonight in regard to its course in the war. Some newspapers appeared today to expect there would be no immediate entry by Turkey into the war. "Turkey does not seek war but will not fall to face it with all its resources if the need arises," said one paper.

Premier Hepburn, recuperating from illness at his home here, said he considered the matter so urgent that he had disregarded physician's orders and had issued a press statement from his bedside. He said that totalitarian sympathizers in the United States were well trained and equipped with arms for quick action.

ESTHONIAN SHIP HALT

Vessel Forced To Yield Her Mails To German Naval Vessel In Skagerrack

STOCKHOLM, June 12:—The Esthonian steamer Esthonia, bound from Sweden and Canada to Esthonia, was halted by a German naval vessel in the Skagerrack today and her mails removed. She was then permitted to proceed.

Egypt Has Broken Off Relations With Italy

CAIRO, June 12.—The Egyptian government tonight severed diplomatic relations with Italy preparatory to taking up arms on the side of the Allies in the African campaign. Severance of relations was approved by the Egyptian Parliament.

GERMANS AT MARNE RIVER

Stubborn Resistance To Advance Still Maintained And Defence System Maintained

TOURS, France, June 12:—In the Vic-sur-Aisne region where the Germans crossed the south river bank and occupied a high plateau, another offensive was unleashed today. The War Ministry indicated that French withdrawals north and northeast of Paris were counterbalanced in the west where the defences were holding near Vernon on the Seine. The ministry said the German advance between Vernon and Rouen had failed to pierce the general defence system. The high command reported tonight that the invading Germans have succeeded in crossing the Marne near Chateau Thierry with some troops.

Young Frenchmen Not Mobilized To Move From Paris

PARIS, June 12: (CP)—The military governor has asked all young unmobilized Frenchmen from the age of seventeen and up to leave Paris.

ITALIANS OFF SEAS

One Vessel Scuttled After Encountering Australian Warship—One Seized In India—Others In Spain

LONDON, June 12:—The Italian steamer Romolo, after being intercepted in the Pacific Ocean by an Australian naval vessel was scuttled by her crew. All the crew were rescued and taken prisoner.

Battle Of France Now Within Sight And Hearing Of Paris—No Invasion By Italy As Yet

PARIS, June 12.—With the enemy only about twenty miles distant, the Battle of France is now within sight and hearing of Paris. The capital and metropolis of France is in readiness to repel a direct assault as the Germans throw all their force into their greatest drive so far in the terrific offensive.

Menaced by 100 German divisions on the north and eighty Italian to the east, the French high command declared today that "the entire army is intact and in good order." The situation was reported in complete control. All movements were being made deliberately and without being hastened by the enemy. Generalissimo Maxime Weygand, it was declared, was working "according to plan." Paris was but one point of a strategic line of defence and would be treated accordingly. French defenders were "fighting like demons" as the enemy, having thrown all his resources to the last tank and the last reserve into the battle, desperately fought for a speedy decision.

The chief danger to the Allies today, some observers felt, was at Rheims, the fall of which would threaten the whole Maginot Line from the rear and bring the enemy perilously close to Paris. The whole battle continued with intense fury all along the line from the coast to the Argonne today. Even instructional tanks have been rushed up by the Germans to use in their "do or die" thrust for the French capital. The Nazi hopes now appear to be that, if they can take Paris, the French resistance will collapse and give the Germans the breathing spell which they soon must have. However, at a Supreme War Council meeting of the Allies yesterday there was complete agreement that the Allies would continue their present vigorous resistance even if every foot of French soil should be lost and the scene have to be shifted elsewhere. Germany will be permitted no breathing spell. If there is collapse, it will be Hitler's. No Italian Invasion The expected invasion by Italy of the French Riviera has not yet developed although the Italians were reported today to have blown up a bridge on the frontier today. There were unconfirmed reports of Italian warships having passed through the Dardanelles. There were no less than eight Italian air raids on Malta since yesterday but British authorities declared that casualties were light and no military objectives were struck. Two Italian bombers were brought down by British land guns. Crack French troops are awaiting any break of the Italian forces across the frontier in the French Alps.

WHEAT PRICES WINNIPEG, June 12: (CP)—The July wheat advanced 3/4c to 75 1/4c on the Winnipeg wheat market yesterday. This morning futures from the age of seventeen and up at New York went up 1/4c to 1 1/2c with September at 83c.

BOMBING OF PARIS

Waves Of German Planes Continue To Fly Over French City, Dropping Incendiary Missiles

NEW YORK, June 12: (CP)—National Broadcasting Co. correspondents in Europe report that waves of German bombers continue to fly over Paris and part of the city is still burning as a result of incendiary bombs. Air fields are among the points around the French capital which have been struck by the German bombs.

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EDITORIALS

EXTRAORDINARY ABOUT FACE

It is quite probable that the people of the United States have been at heart with the British and French in the present war but they had a curious way of expressing it. Radio broadcasts from most of the stations seemed to indicate otherwise. The opinion was freely expressed that some of them might have been in the pay of the German government.

In the past week or two a marvellous change has taken place. Everything we hear from across the line seems to be that the people of that country are very strong with the Allies in sentiment, at any rate. The President has declared himself without qualification and the Mayor of New York is outspoken. Sneakers over there are denouncing Italy with an emotional abandon which is refreshing to hear.

It looks today as if public opinion in that country was gradually working to a point where actual active participation would take place. All that is needed is some little incident in which that country is directly concerned to bring about the final break. If this does not take place before the election, it should happen before the end of the year.

PRETTY GOOD START

The Allies got off to a pretty good start yesterday in the war against Italy. The first thing the Allied navies did was to clean up the enemy merchant marine, picking up in all about thirty vessels that had not reached neutral ports. Then the Royal Air Force got busy and attacked an Italian air centre in Libya, destroying a number of planes, hangars and an ammunition dump. It was a good beginning and indicates that the British are not always asleep.

This Dominion Is Building Up Its Active Service Force

Canada's War Personnel Soon Will Total 120,000—To Recruit 38,400

OTTAWA, June 12.—Before long Canada's active forces will have reached a total approximating 120,000 men of all ranks and services.

WILL LIVE AT OTTAWA STOCK MART MOVING UP

Princess Juliana and Little Daughters To Meet Governor General at Ottawa

Buying Activity Which Started Yesterday Continued in Early Trading Today

HALIFAX, June 12: (CP)—Princess Juliana, heiress-apparent to the throne of Holland, and two infant children, brought to Canadian haven by a Dutch naval squadron at the invitation of Lord Athlone, Governor General-designate, are expected to stay at Quebec until the Governor General and Princess Alice arrive when they may go to Ottawa. With the Princess are her little daughters, Beatrice, aged two-and-a-half years, and Irene, nine months, the Baroness Veyrum, Baroness Roell and Rear Admiral Baron and Baroness De Vos Van Suenwky.

Her Royal Highness and party were welcomed by Lieutenant-Governor F. F. Mathers of Nova Scotia, Commander Edson Sherwood R. C. N., representing Government House, and W. H. Measures of the Department of External Affairs.

Only a few persons on the dock were aware at the time of the arrival of the royal party.

MESSAGE BY HUNGERFORD

MONTREAL, June 12.—S. J. Hungerford, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways, yesterday sent the following message to all officers and employees of the system:
"To my co-workers of the Canadian National:
"We face a ruthless enemy. It is true that distance now separates us from the inferno of battle but there is a front line in Canada no less than in Europe. For Canadians that fact constitutes an emergency to be met with immediate resolve when our kinsmen of the Canadian forces—naval, land and air—are in the war zone. At a time when the Allies have received and sustained hammer blows of a weight and ferocity unknown in past wars the duty of Canadians at home stands clear. Now we must accept grave duties and responsibilities and recognize that the need is immediate and imperative."
"The Allied armies have performed great feats but they need material, material and yet more material. These requirements demand that industry produce at utmost capacity, that transport carry munitions and supplies promptly, swiftly and efficiently. That is the task of the Canadian National Railways—the task of every individual member of the system no matter where he, or she, may be employed."
"We are all proud of the loyalty, the efficiency and the good spirit of the men of the National system but all must now excel themselves in their daily tasks that by so doing they may support the men in the field. We have been doing a good job. We must do even better and I ask every employee in every department of the system to throw his whole energy into his daily task. The soldier in the field has scant respite. Support him. Do your job better than you have ever done it before."
"The work of civilians in the factories, on the railways and in the ships, combined with the gallantry and fortitude of our soldiers, will yet bring victory but our co-operation must be instant, continuous and complete. As the Prime Minister of Canada has 7

AST DRY PROVINCE

Urgent Need of Prohibition Is Urged On P. E. I.

CHARLOTTETOWN, June 12:—Dry forces on Prince Edward Island are fighting a hard battle against the proposal to permit the sale of beer and wine as beverages. The Island province is the last bulwark of prohibition in the Dominion.

Down and down the province, voters recruited by the Prince Edward Island Temperance Federation are urging the electors to vote down the amendment to the law when they vote June 25.

The appeal is being made partly on patriotic grounds. The liquor traffic "paralyzes the national efficiency and cripples the war effort," Rev. Dr. John Coburn, secretary of the Committee on Social Service of the United Church of Canada, said in one speech.

Coburn made a tour of the province denouncing any change in the law, only provincial prohibition legislation in the Dominion.

Two years earlier, the same proposal was embodied in the Conservative Party's platform in a provincial general election. The party lost the election.

Good Schoolwork Means Free Ball

Oregon Baseball Man Provides Special Bleachers for Youngsters

SALEM, Ore., June 12: (CP)—George E. Waters, 72-year-old Salem merchant who once played a lot of baseball, spent \$50,000 on a park to be used by Salem's team in the Western International League. He says, though, that he "just did it for the kids."

Waters' model minor league park includes a bleacher section for 1,000 youngsters. All they have to do to get in free is work hard on their studies and do a good deed at home every day.

Waters has a special agent who checks up on report cards—a poor one means the boy doesn't get into the park. He says he's not trying to make any money—"All I want is just to make expenses—and give the kids a break."

"CAPETOWN" IS OFFICIAL
CAPETOWN, June 12: (CP)—This South Africa metropolis will spell its name as one word officially. Town Clerk M. B. Williams has announced. The city has large stocks of stationery on hand with the "Capetown" spelling.

A Private Fight
The government itself has remained on the sidelines while the issue was being fought out. Premier Thane Campbell said during the house debate on the plebiscite bill he felt the people should be the "final judge."

The bill was not a government measure but was introduced by John Mustard, Liberal assemblyman for the 3rd King's District.

The plebiscite will be the second the voters have taken on prohibition since it came into effect around 29 years ago, succeeding the old Scott Act. In 1929, a proposed change-over to government control was voted down.

Another method of planting, adopted by modern gardeners is that of massing large quantities of flowers of one variety and it



At a time like this when all thoughts are on the war, it is difficult to turn our minds to our gardens. And yet it is a very pleasant interlude to watch the plants grow, the flowers unfold and Old Mother Nature working away as usual, producing and re-producing, with no thought that on another continent people are killing each other for no reason except to satisfy the lust for power of two malevolent creatures.

I have done very little visiting of late so all I can do today is to tell something about my own garden. As I have said before, the aim is to keep a succession of bloom from early spring to late autumn with as few bare spots as possible. The rockeries supply the spring bloom and, even when the bloom is over, these rockeries have a pleasing appearance. The varied shades of green is always picturesque.

This year, as passers-by will have noticed, there has been a plentiful supply of sweet rocket. I try to eradicate the white flowers among them and encourage the mauves. I never sow any seeds and, when the flowering season is over, I am quite ruthless with the old plants, tearing them out and making room for other plants to develop. I think I have never had as fine a showing as this year and all the plants were self-seeded and in most cases were allowed to bloom where they first came up. That is the only way to develop the informal idea.

Where it possible I would do away with all rows of plants but the lines of a small garden make this hard and also cultivation is more difficult. So I compromise and plant a few rows here and there, allowing stray foxgloves, sweet rocket and other plants to remain wherever they happen to come. I am not recommending that form of gardening because most people like some degree of formality. An engineer or architect naturally turns to formal design.

English wallflowers, Siberian wallflowers, columbine and Canterbury bells may be sown now. Columbines take several seasons to develop into really strong plants but they winter well and are sure bloomers.

This is the time of year when many people neglect their gardens. It is better to hoe than to water during a dry spell. The surface of the soil cannot be stirred too often. Some people go over their gardens with rake or hoe after every wet spell.

I could go rambling on about the garden for half a day but I am sure you would tire of it. I am just reading a new book "Green Grows the City" by Beverley Nicholls in which the author tells how he made a beautiful garden from an unattractive three-cornered back yard in the suburbs of London, England. He tells how and why he did everything and a few interesting pictures show the results. He spends a good deal of money on it, while I spend almost nothing. Happily a lot of neighbors are good to me, so that helps.

ALERT BAY, June 12: (CP)—Missionaries of the Church of England in Canada point out that the wives and children of Indians are glad to do their share winning the war. At the Tuberculosis Preventorium here 30 older girls of the school meet each week to knit and sew for the Red Cross. The older boys recently raised \$11 by putting on a Red Cross tea. They didn't mind doing the baking and the cooking for this event but became self-conscious when called upon to pour tea and serve, says the report.

must be admitted that this has a very nice effect. The difficulty is that, when the blooming season for that mass is over, there is a large bare patch left. Take for instance stocks. I recently planted a group of stocks in the back part of the garden. These are now coming in bloom and I am enjoying them. In a few weeks they will be past their best and then they will disappear or at any rate become untidy. By that time it will be too late to plant anything else for the present season and the only way to fill the gap will be to plant for next year.

Those of you who are interested in day lilies should take a look over mine. There are several different colors and they will make a fine showing for the next few weeks. Naturally, they tend to yellows but gradually the variety of colors is being extended. They do well in this climate, winter without difficulty and can be depended upon to bloom, differing in this respect from peonies or German iris.

My regal lilies seem to be likely to bloom well again. This is the fifth season I have had them and I have had very few losses. When they are in bloom they are generally admired. The great thing seems to be to give them good drainage. They winter well and slowly increase from year to year although not regularly. It seems to me that they are better when allowed to take care of themselves although they can be helped by a little fertilizer. I have read that they like lime rubble such as old plaster pounded up small. One grower says you cannot have really good regal lilies without rubble.

Some people in the city have had good results from anemones. They provide a wonderful variety of color and are quite worth trying. From a dozen planted in the spring I now have ten plants but some of them are rather weak. The first flower is now out and I expect there will be more soon but they are irregular and rather disappointing. The best I have seen in the city have been those grown by Frank Dibb and Charles Balagno. It is a question whether they should be taken up in the fall or allowed to remain in the ground.

This is a good time to sow seeds of rock plants for next year such as aubretia. They may then be covered during the worst of the winter months and planted out in the spring. Aubretias sown now may possibly bloom in the fall in a small way and the plants should be quite strong. Winter killing is a common complaint.

EMBASSIES IN MARBLE

Envoys in Washington Uncle Sam's Problem Children; Six Diplomatic Chiefs Without a Country

WASHINGTON, June 12: (CP)—The United States capital is rapidly becoming a city of embassies without a country.

In embassy lane—Massachusetts Avenue—marble villa after brick chateau is pointed out to visiting firemen as the embassy of a land that is no more and in many of them live men who realize they are men without countries, says Jack Stinnett in Washington Daybook.

There are six embassies here of lands which have been absorbed by Germany or captured by the Nazis and subjected to a government domination that leaves their ambassadors not knowing for whom they speak nor to whom they owe allegiance.

The Czechoslovakian flag still flies over the residence of Vladimir Hurban and Mr. Hurban still comes and goes on the business of his state, but where is that state today?

Count Jerzy Potocki still is "His Excellency" when he enters a Washington drawing room and his 16th Street palace still is the recognized center of Polish activities in the United States, but where is Poland? At last report the "capital" was Angers, France.

Still a Belgium

Count Robert van der Straten-Ponthoz, who also lives on the great avenue of nations, represents a nation torn asunder—Belgium. His cabinet and council is in Paris and has not given up; his King, who appointed him, has; and the United States, which recognizes his credentials, refuse to recognize the conquest of the nation that sent him there.

Henrik de Kauffmann's status theoretically has not changed, for he is Washington's minister from Denmark—but the status of his country has. When the minister receives an order from Copenhagen today, how can he know whether it comes from the government that appointed him or from some Nazi overlord?

Dr. A. Loudon is another man whose daily problems must cause sleepless nights. Queen Wilhelmina, to whom by oath he owes his all, and her government, are in London; and Arthur Sevs-Inquart, the Austrian Nazi leader, is in supreme command of all the civil functions of the Netherlands.

In a similar plight is Wilhelm Munthe Co Morgenstjerne, the minister from Norway. The great lobe of the country that he represents is in German hands, King Haakon and the Norwegian government are in England.

Have Social Status

The social status of these ambassadors without a country is unchanged. Washington still recognizes them as representatives of the nations that appointed them. They still call almost daily at the State

Department and report or confer on the problems of the world.

But behind the scenes, they rapidly are becoming the State Department's problem children. Refusing to recognize a conquest is one thing, but when you have to straighten out the affairs of Americans and the United States government in a conquered land, that's another.
